

But if the foundation or basis of your other statements are as far off as the true facts expression. In fact, using your otherwise. comparison, if Texas was as literally dry from a prohibition fall standpoint, Texas would be rather wet prohibitionally speaking.

"We are enclosing herewith two rainfall charts, both made up from government records. as proof that this section is not as dry as you seem to think.

"Furthermore, we resent a magazine that is usually as broadminded and broad visioned as Liberty is, making such insiduous statements about any section whether they are true or not, and we much more resent their being made when they show such a total lack of information on the fastest developing section in the entire Southwest.

"It is true that many years ago when the eastern part of Texas was the western frontier of the United States, that this section was looked upon as semi-arid, but now it is recognized as being one of the greatest agricultural sections in the Southwest and with potentialities that cannot be visioned. 



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
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
