FATAL ACCIDENT SCENE--Ed W. Johnson, 95, and his wife, Blanche Collum Johnson, 88, lost their lives around 5 p.m. Wednesday when the accelerator apparently stuck on their car, and the car veered out of control on a city street, and into a brick home on West Third Street. The Johnsons were both pronounced dead on arrival at West Plains Medical Center.

Local Man, Wife Are Killed In Wednesday Car Accident

An apparently stuck accelerator, combined with a vehicle veering out of control, proved to be a fatal combination for longtime Muleshoe and Bailey County residents Ed and

Blanche Johnson around 5 p.m. on Wednesday.

They were both killed after their late model car climbed a steep embankment in the 1000 block of West Third Street, and struck the northwest corner of a brick garage and house.

According to an eyewitness, the Johnsons had been visiting at a home near the fatal accident site. When they started to leave, the accelerator stuck on the car. Mrs. Johnson, who was the driver, backed down a driveway, running over several small bushes lining the drive, then pulled the gear into forward.

She went through the drive, with the accelerator still stuck, veered across the street and onto a curb with both right tires. From there she pulled the car to the left, which sent it out of control in a skid. The car

went across the street on an angle, up an embankment, across a yard, and struck the corner of the house and garage.

Momentary confusion arose when ambulance drivers were summoned to the accident, but failed to give the police department information about a wreck. The local police dispatcher on duty was not informed of the accident, or where the ambulance checked out until they called for, first, the fire department to send a truck to hose down the area, asked for a Justice of the Peace, then asked for the Jaws of Life to free wreck victims.

The Jaws of Life was used by the Muleshoe Fire Department Rescue Squad to open the doors of the car to remove the victims. A justice of the peace could not immediately be located, and the victims were pronounced dead on arrival at West Plains Medical Center by Dr. Homer Allgood.

Damage to the Autry home in the collision included damage to the northwest corner of the brick home, the house was knocked off the foundation, a large crack ran the length of the Con't On Page 6, Col. 1

Littlefield remains unbeaten for the season, and will be playing the winner of the Abilene Wylie-Colorado City game in regional action next week.

Weekend Rain Expected To Continue In Area

Frustrated farmers checked a grey, leaden sky Saturday morning and watched rain pour down onto crops still in the fields.

By presstime, more than one half inch of rain was general in the area, with rain promised throughout the day as farmers waited to gather crops again.

Unseasonable wet weather was expected to stay in the area for Saturday and Sunday, along with a few thunderstorms.

With the cotton harvest just getting underway after being delayed because of wet weather during the early part of November, all harvesting came to an

abrupt halt again when rain moved into the area in the early morning hours on Saturday.

Earlier in the season, cotton ginner had hoped to have all the cotton processed by Christmas, but those hopes were beginning to wane with the hit-and-miss moisture that was continuing to dance across the South Plains.

Ginners were reporting some weather damage to cotton, which was showing up with spots after being affected by the continuing wet weather.

National Weather Service was calling for a 90 percent chance for measurable rain throughout the day on Saturday, accompanied by light to moderate winds.

Precipitation was expected to continue across the Panhandle and South Plains through Saturday night and Sunday, with a good possibility of rain mixed with snow.

Blood Drive Slated Here

December 5

United Blood Services of Lubbock will be conducting a community-wide blood drive in Muleshoe on Wednesday, December 5, at the fellowship hall of the First United Methodist Church.

'M*A*S*H' is the theme of the drive, according to a spokesperson for the drive, each person who donates blood between the hours of 11 a.m.-7 p.m. will be getting a M*A*S*H T-Shirt.

Donors are asked to be between the ages of 17 and 65. Parental consent forms will be available for prospective donors who are 17 years of age.

Donors must weigh a minimum of 110 pounds and must wait at least eight weeks between donations.

You may not donate blood if you have or had hepatitis, current active disease of heart, lung, kidney, liver or stomach; internal malignancy, diabetes requiring insulin or habitation to injectable drugs.

Conditions which will cause a temporary deferral include acute symptomatic flu cold or upper respiratory infection; close contact with hepatitis in past six months; tattoos in past six months; active infection or disease presently requiring medication; vaccinations in past 24 hours, some vaccinations have longer deferral periods; major surgery or blood transfusion in past six months; dental surgery in past three days; pregnancy in past six weeks and lived in malarial area in past six months.

United Blood Services also says, it is best that you eat a substantial meal before donating, preferably one low in fats. Fasting is not recommended.

If you are taking vitamins, hormones, birth control pills, diet pills, antihypertensive medications, or antibiotics for acne, you may donate unless otherwise deferred.

Permits Required

For Cranes

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials remind prospective sandhill crane hunters they need to obtain a free permit from the department to hunt cranes in any of the state's three hunting zones.

The permits must be obtained by mail or in person from the department's headquarters at 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Tx. 78744. When requesting permits, list the name, address and county of residence of each hunter.

Data collected from the permit issuance will be used to assess hunter participation in the various zones.

Complete information on season dates and zone boundaries may be found in the department's Late Season Migratory Game Bird Hunting Regulations leaflet, available at department offices and hunting license outlets across the state.

The Zone A (roughly the Trans-Pecos, Permian Basin and Western Panhandle) season is November 10, 1984, through February 10, 1985. The daily bag limit is three and the possession limit is six in all zones.

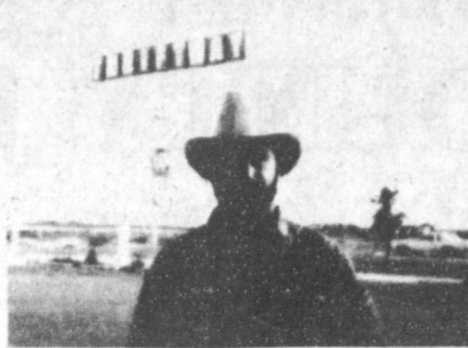
Ron George, sandhill crane program leader, said hunters also are advised to brush up on bird identification before going hunting. "Zone boundaries are drawn so as to assure hunting activity will not occur where endangered whooping cranes are likely to be," George said. "However, there's always an outside chance that a whooper could stray into a hunting zone, especially some of the foster Con't Page 6, Col. 3

of people's attitudes is conducted every other year by Market Facts, Inc. The 1984 consumer research study used a mail sample of 4,045 people representative of the continental United States population aged 13 and older. These people responded to attitude and usage questions about dairy products, foods in general, nutrition, diet and health, the dairy industry and consumer lifestyles.

Most of the people (80%) said they are more concerned than they used to be about their nutrition but only half (50%) say they have changed their diets within the past year to make them more nutritious. In 1982 78% of the people reported increasing concern about nutrition and 54% said they had changed their diets. Currently, more than 80% believe they should at least do a better job of cutting down on things that are bad for them.

One reason fewer people are changing their diets may be confusion. Ninety-one percent of those questioned felt that, if you believed everything you heard about things in foods that are bad for you, there wouldn't be anything left to eat. A similar statement, "There are so many

claims about what is good and what is bad in various foods that it's hard to form solid opinions about what to eat," brought agreement from 86% of those questioned.

More than 70% (66% in 1982) of the people said they would be interested in receiving diet and nutrition information from their doctors. Two-thirds of the people are getting most of this information from magazines and newspapers.

Awareness of the need for calcium is high, with more than 90% agreeing with the statement, "You never outgrow your need for calcium." Most people

(86%) believe that dairy products are the best source of calcium and 80% agreed that dairy products are great for making economical meals.

When questioned as to whether and how often they drink milk, about half the adults (45.8%) said they drink some milk every day. Two-thirds of the teens (62%) and four out of five kids twelve and under (81.3%) also drink milk every day. Lowfat milk is consumed by adults rather than whole or chocolate milk; but teens generally drink whole milk.

Milk is drunk at home by 91% of the people and away

from home by 46%. Ice cream has a similar consumption pattern with 75% of the people saying they ate ice at home during the preceding week and 41% saying they ate it away from home during the same period. Ice cream is most generally enjoyed between

meals. Highest consumption period for milk at home is breakfast and away from home is lunch. More than 80% of the people questioned said that milk is better than a soft drink for an afternoon break and 76% agreed that milk gives you "pep energy and vitality."

TURKEY IS A GOOD VALUE—A holiday turkey is a good value, especially if you plan to make good use of leftovers, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service food and nutritional specialist Dr. Alice Hunt. Smaller families or those who don't care for leftovers may want to consider purchasing a turkey breast or a boneless roast turkey for their holiday meal, even though these cost more per pound. Whatever the cost of your holiday turkey, you'll be getting high quality protein for your money and relatively few calories, observes the specialist. An average 3 1/2 ounce serving of turkey has 190 calories. It's all the gravy and "trimmings" that make holiday meals high in calories, she adds.

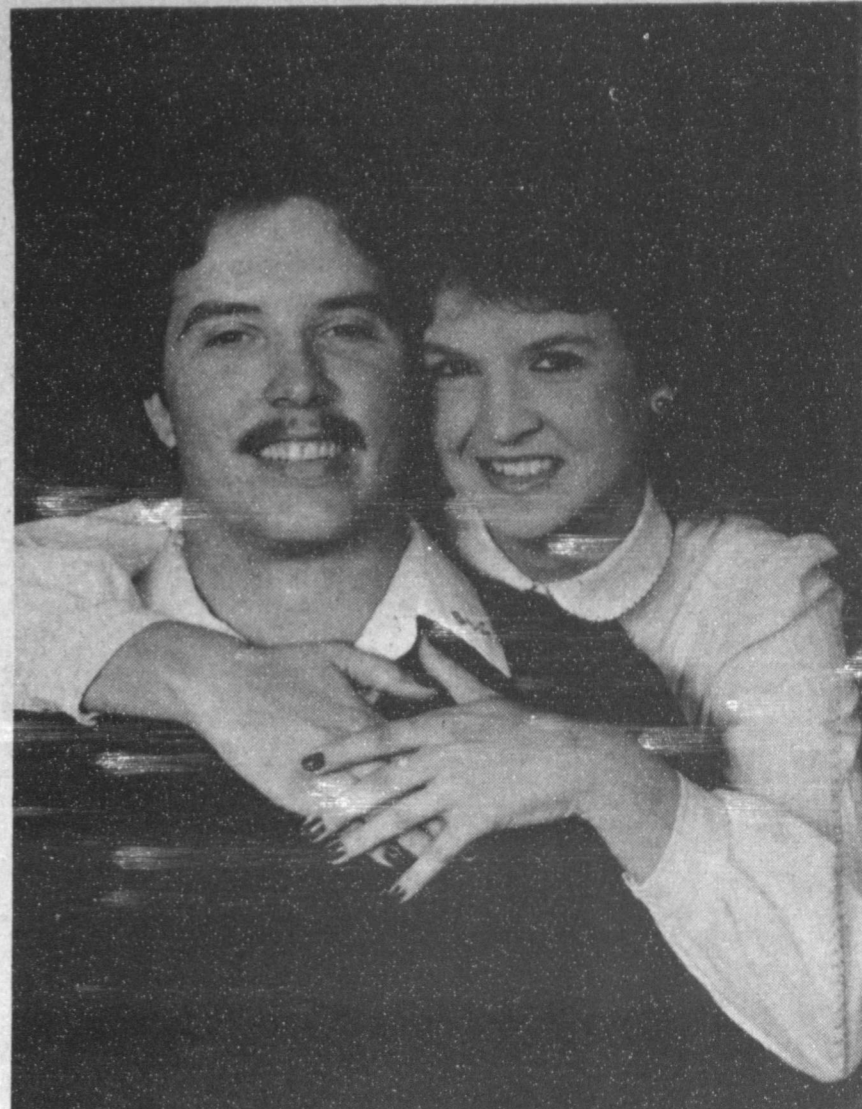

Buying Guidelines For Crabmeat

Blue crabmeat season is here, and many Texans will want to enjoy this delicacy--especially around the holidays. But, like any other perishable food, care must be taken to select high quality crabmeat in order to avoid a food-borne illness, says a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service seafood specialist.

Crabmeat is highly perishable and is frequently eaten as purchased without further cooking or other processing which would kill any contaminating bacteria present, says Annette Redell Hegen. The meat is moist and high in protein which makes it an ideal growth material for bacteria. "That's why it's so important that blue crabmeat be processed and handled safely, from cooking to final consumer use," she adds.

Buy crabmeat only from reputable and licensed dealers, emphasizes Hegen. According to law, no person can operate a plant or place of business engaged in handling and packaging shellfish without a valid certificate issued by the State Commissioner of Health, she notes.

Also, make sure the container is permanently and legibly marked with the words "Perishable-Keep Under Refrigeration," advises the specialist. Containers should bear a code indicating the day of

processing and the name of the picking plant. "Beware of crabmeat in unmarked containers," she says, "since it may have been cooked, picked and packed under unclean conditions, at too low temperature for too short a time."

Crabmeat packaged under a label containing a license number and properly stored and displayed, should cause no worries for consumers. These licensed products, processed under state surveillance, make it possible for consumers to enjoy one of the best delicacies from Texas waters, Hegen points out.

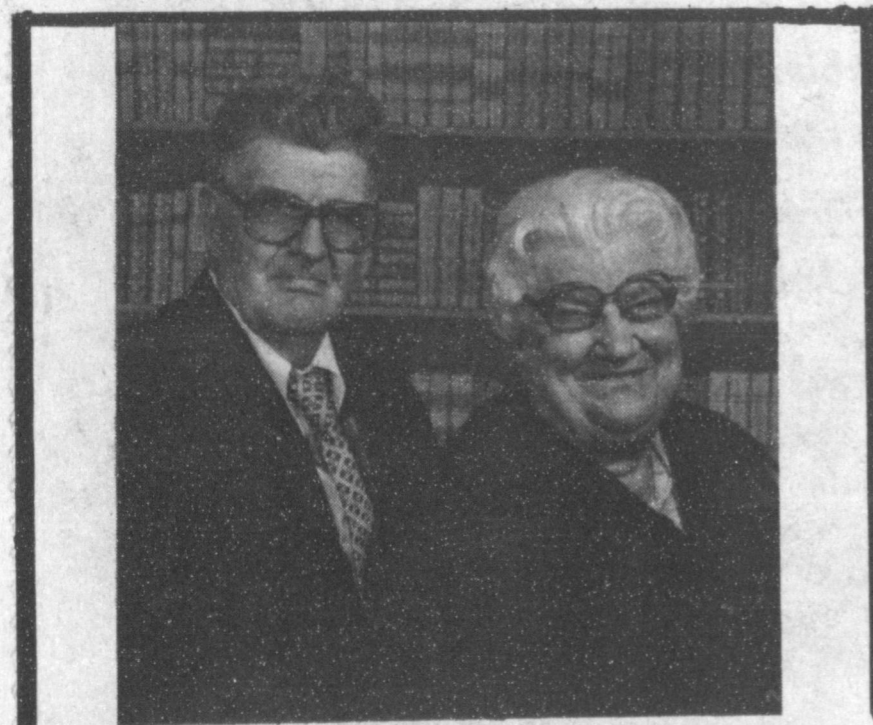
Texas license numbers consist of the state abbreviation and a number such as TX 987C or TX 654CP. Without this number, consumers have no assurance of the sanitary quality or safety of the product, she adds.

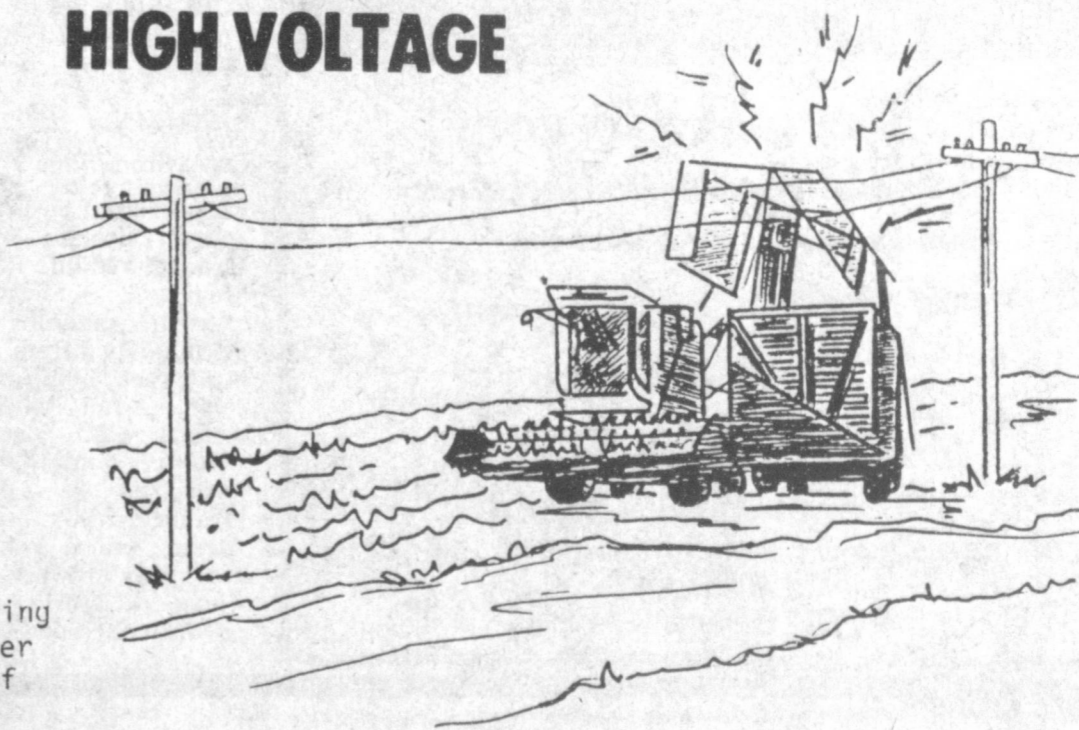

COTTON HARVEST IS HERE AGAIN and BAILEY COUNTY ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE ASSN. urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines!

In recent years, many tragic incidents have occurred involving cotton module builders and power lines. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not very careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and to take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury... or even death! When you are moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

If some piece of equipment DOES contact these 7200 volt lines, it is important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger. Jump clear of the machine, being sure NOT to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call the Cooperative office whether or not the line is broken so they can help you.

REMEMBER -- a little precaution is ALWAYS worth the time it takes !!

FmHA Employees

Train In Texas

For New Program

Texas employees of the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA) have completed an intensive training session and area ready to implement the new farm credit initiatives announced recently by President Reagan, according to an FmHA spokesman, J. Lynn Futch.

Futch, FmHA State Director, said members of the state farmer programs staff and employees from all district and county offices participated in the training.

"The final regulations have now been issued in Washington," Futch said, "and Texas is now ready to work with farmers on the initiatives."

Under the new plan, FmHA can set aside up to 25 percent, a maximum of \$200,000 of a farmer's FmHA debt for five years without interest. For non-FmHA borrowers, the agency can guarantee up to 90 percent of a loan if the lender is willing to write off a minimum of 10 percent of the debt.

In both cases, Futch said, the actions must improve the borrower's cash flow position so he or she can make payments on the remaining debt.

The plan also allows FmHA to contract for outside assistance in servicing FmHA loans. The goal is better assistance to FmHA borrowers, he concluded.

parent-raised birds which winter at a Bosque del Apache National Wildlife Refuge in New Mexico.

"Hunters might have some difficulty in distinguishing juvenile birds of the two species, since young sandhills are gray-brown, and young whoopers are a rusty brown color," concluded George.

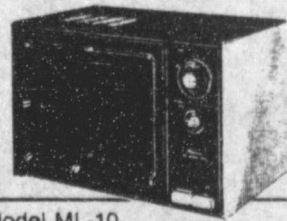

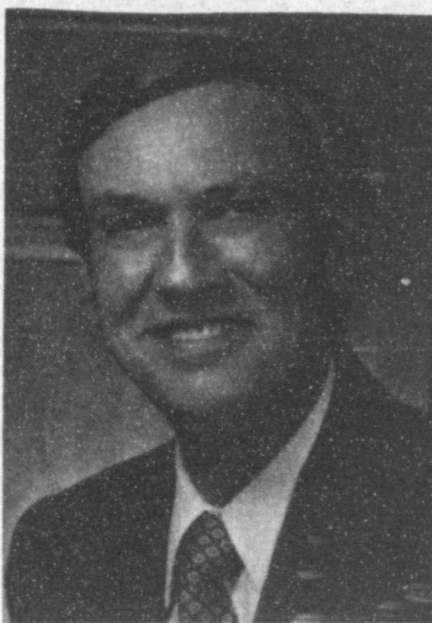

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.

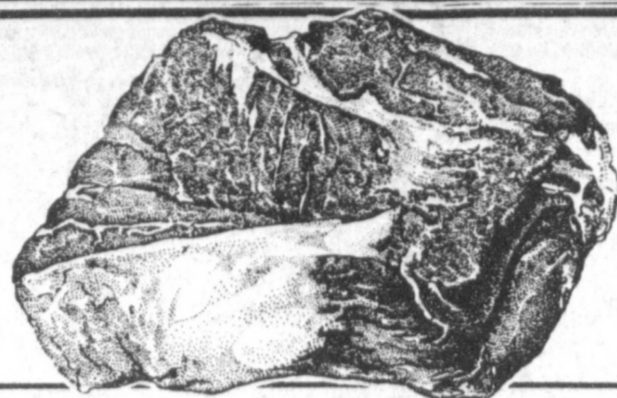

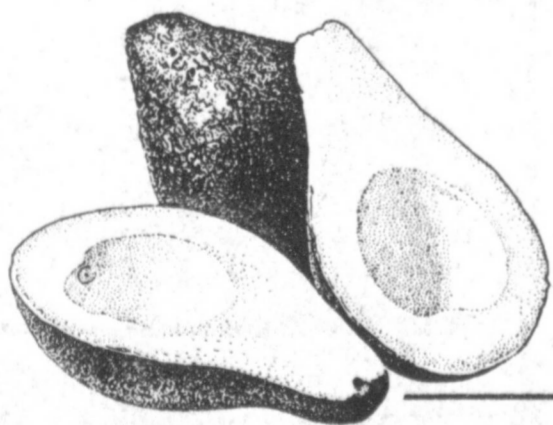
