EASTLAND, Nov. 20. (P)-Impatient at the law's delay and enraged over the condemned man's latest crime. Eastland citizens last night took Marshall Ratliff, Cisce Santa Claus Bank bandit, from his iail cell and hanged him with a stout grass rope, to a telephone cable, 200 yards from the jail.

Two years ago Ratliff, dressed as Santa Claus, participated in a bank holdup in which two officers and one of his companions were killed. Monday, after feigning paralysis and winning the sympathy of his keepers, he attempted a jail break, shooting and veteran peace officer. 





Decision on Rail "War" Not Likely to Be Very Soon

Should oral arguments and testi mony be taken in the Pampa-Childress railroad fight, as is now being done at Washington in connection with the Texas and Pacific San Angelo-Ballinger hearing, an Interstate Commerce Commission decision on the Fort Worth & Denver's petition may not be made before next spring.

Chas. C. Cook, attorney for the Pampa Board of City Development expects notification of Charles Mahaffy's recommendation concerning the testimony placed before the chairman at the Fort Worth hearing. After this notice is received, twenty days will be allowed for attorneys to file exceptions. Then a Washington hearing date will likely be set. Sometime after the Washington hearing, the Interstate Commerce Commission will announce its decision.

While the I. C. C. might depart from usual procedure and announce its decision earlier, such a course is no likely considering the sharp fight which developed between competing cities and the Rock Island and Fort Worth & Denver, Officials of the Denver road have repeatedly expressed confidence that their line would be allowed to build into Pampa. They recommended that both requests be permitted, and that joint trackage be allowed between Shamrock and Wellington.

Surveys of both the proposed right of-way and of traffic tonnage possibilities have been completed. Should the Denver road reach Pampa, it is be lieved that in the future it would continue northward to join the parent system in the Middle West.

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
