## HOOVER IS ENCOURAGED BY RECEPTIONS GIVEN HIM IN SOUTH DURING LONG TRIP

WASHINGTON, Oct. 8 (AP)—President Hoover returned to Washington today, tired but contented with the receptions accorded him in the southland which climaxed the most strenuous speaking tour undertaken since his inauguration.

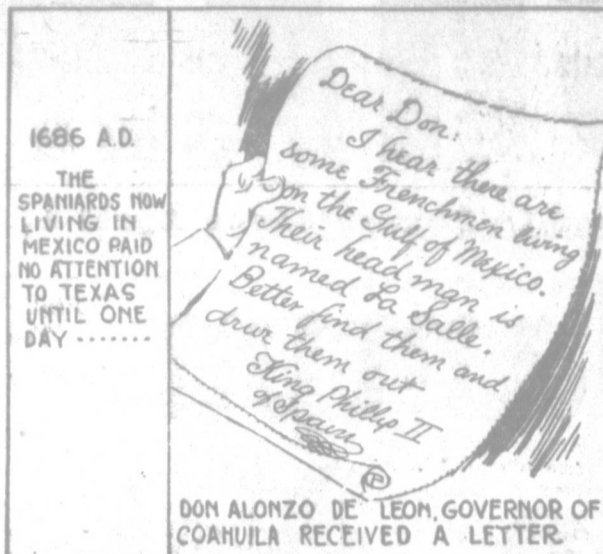

the president made a brief talk and at a third, Danville, Virginia, he assumed the role of humble listener while a textile striker, in working clothes, told him of the textile strike in that city and heard the president repeat what he had said from the train earlier in the day at the same point that such troubles must be adjusted in a peaceful manner.

At Salisbury, the president heard a man shout from the crowd as his train started away: "We're for Hoover 100 per cent."

"Now that you have the habit, keep it," the president replied and the crowd joined him in laughter.

Dispensing with the formality of his speaking trip, he told a large group at Charlotte that his ancestors came from that region and "after looking over the industrial development of this section, which has proved itself one of the most progressive in the United States, I wonder why they ever left it."

He thanked the people of the Carolinas for his reception, which he said had "overwhelmed" him.

Thousands jammed the surrounding hillsides to hear the open air presidential address yesterday in celebration of the sesqui-centennial

of the Battle of King's Mountain in South Carolina, just below the North Carolina border.

Speaking from a platform reared in a valley beneath the hill, summit on which the British under Ferguson were defeated by a small band of patriots 150 years ago, the president stressed the need for preservation of the American principle of equal opportunity for all as opposed to Bolshevism and class government.

"While we cannot permit any foreign person or agency to undermine our institutions," he said, "yet we must look to our own conduct that we do not by our failure to uphold and safeguard the true spirit of America weaken our own institutions and destroy the very forces which upbuild our national greatness."

"It is in our own house," he added, "that our real dangers lie, and it is there that we have need to summon our highest wisdom and our highest sense of public service."

"We must keep corruptive influences from the nation and its ideals as we would keep them from our homes."

"Crime and disobedience of law are the very incarnation of destruc-

tion to a system whose basis is law. "Both pacifism and militarism court danger from abroad, the one by promoting weakness, the other by promoting arrogance."

"Failure of many of our citizens to express their opinions at the ballot box is at once their abandonment of the whole basis of self government."

"Manipulation of the ballot is

a denial of government by the people.

"Corruption or even failure of moral perceptions in public office defiles the whole spirit of America."

"More destructive criticism destroys leadership and substitutes weaklings."

# MALONEY EARNS CLEAR POINT VICTORY OVER BIG CARNERA

## AMBLING ALP EASY TO HIT AND TO TAKE

BOSTON, Oct. 8. (AP)—The fist capabilities of Primo Carnera, heretofore either under or over estimated, were accurately gauged last night by Jimmy Maloney, Boston's favorite but unreliable heavyweight. Giving away 65 pounds to the Italian behemoth, the Boston "fat boy" clearly out-pointed him in a furious 10-round slugfest at the Boston garden.

Maloney proved that Carnera does not possess a killing punch. He digested exactly 195 of the giant's blows and the only time he lost his footing was when he fell against the ropes after missing a wild "round house" right to the Italian's jaw late in the bout. The Boston battler's performance, at least to the 12,000 who witnessed the exciting setto, also indicated that it would be sound judgment to disregard the 23 consecutive victories that the "Ambling Alp" has piled up against carefully selected opponents since he started his American ring invasion early this year.

The Boston battler also proved that Carnera was easy to hit. Maloney scored 192 times to the head or body of his huge opponent and 90 per cent of them landed cleanly. Most of Carnera's punches were short left or right shots to the head and body, struck after his brute force had pushed his 195-pound rival against the ropes or into a corner.

Maloney was on the short end of the 4-1 betting odds but he fought the greatest battle of his long ring career and his victory was honestly earned.

## CARDINALS DOING BETTER THAN AVERAGE OF THEIR LEAGUE IN LATE YEARS

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 8. (AP)—For the first time since 1926 a sixth world's series baseball game was scheduled today, with the Athletics and Cardinals renewing hostilities at Shibe park. There were seven games four years ago when the Cardinals defeated the Yankees for the world's championship, and there will be seven games again if St. Louis stops Philadelphia today.

As it is, the National leaguers have contributed the best performance from their league in the last three campaigns. In 1927 the Pirates were stopped by the Yankees in four straight games and these same Cardinals had no better luck against the New York Americans in 1928. Last year the Chicago Cubs won one and lost four to the Athletics.

The Cardinals have won two games which can not be taken away from them. So win, lose or draw in the remaining game, or games, they have done better than the Pirates of 1927, the Cardinals of 1928 or the Cubs of 1929.

As the sixth game brought the baseball battles back across the Mississippi river there was no indication that the series would continue as anything but a test of pitching. Thus far it has been dominated by the moundmen, a pitchers' series to a degree unknown since 1920.

## Great Shires May Return To Ring In Winter

CHICAGO, Oct. 8. (AP)—Now that the baseball season is ended, up pops C. Arthur Shires, the self-confessed great man.

Shires is considering resuming his winter trade as a professional fighter despite the edict of Kenesaw Mountain Landis, baseball commissioner, to stay away from the boxing business.

The former White Sox first baseman is working in a Chicago gymnasium, in ring togs, and tips the scales at 190 pounds. He is going on a hair-storming tour with a team of all-American all-stars. After the tour finishes Oct. 21, Shires says he will be ready to give a lot of deep thought to the idea of returning to the ring.

## HACK WILSON GIVEN NAME OF 'VALUABLE'

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 3. (AP)—Hack Wilson, slugging center fielder of the Chicago Cubs, has been voted the most valuable player of the National league by a committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America.

Wilson, who has smashed all National league home run records this year and dethroned Babe Ruth as the major league home run king, won the distinction after a close contest with Frankie Frisch, captain of the St. Louis Cardinals, and Bill Terry, first baseman of the New York Giants, and the new National league batting champion.

The election, although made by the same committee that functioned on behalf of the National league in 1929, was unofficial inasmuch as the league last year abandoned its annual custom of picking the most valuable player and rewarding him

with \$1,000. However, William L. Veeck, president of the Chicago Cubs, announced that the Chicago club would give Wilson the \$1,000.

Wilson, although he received only one vote for first place, had a total of 70 points, five of the eight voters picking him for second place, one for third and another for fourth. Frisch received four votes for first place and a total of 84 points, while Terry was the first choice of three of the voters and had a total of 58 points.

Wilson led both leagues in home runs with a total of 56. He created a new all-time major league record for runs batted in, totaling 190, and his batting average was .336.

Mrs. M. H. Strothman and Mrs. E. F. Aymond, both of Dallas, were the first pair to start the three-day grind. The last twosome composed of Mrs. P. K. French and Mrs. R. E. Winger of Fort Worth, was not scheduled to get away until after 2 p. m.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Oct. 7. (AP)—Jimmy Donohue, parachute jumper, arrived at the municipal airport looking as if he had made a leap and landed in a rose bush. He was scratched on the arms and neck and face and his countenance was downcast.

"Just ran over a thoroughbred police dog," moaned Jimmy. "I'm afraid he's going to die. I've got him in the car but it looks hopeless."

Airport attendants went to Donohue's care to aid the injured animal, but drew back at first sight. The "police dog" was a full grown coyote, somewhat the worse for wear, but still alive. Jimmy cornered the animal and captured him just outside of Colorado Springs.

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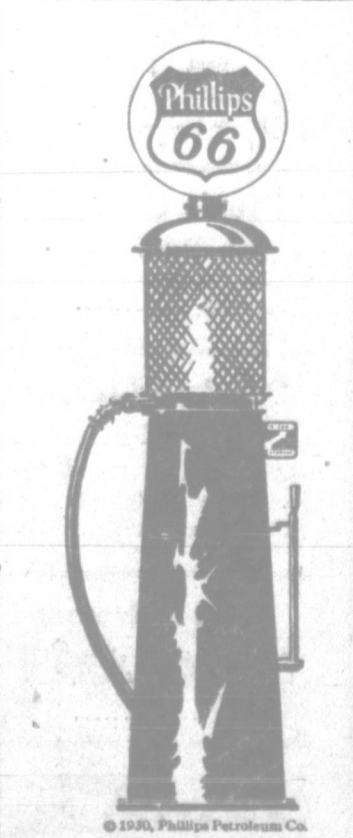

## Young Russians Held at Island

NEW YORK, Oct. 7. (AP)—Sixteen young Russians, including two women, were detained at Ellis Island today on a charge of spreading propaganda against the United States government, following their arrival on the liner Majestic.

They will appear before a special board of inquiry tomorrow to answer complaints of fellow passengers that they expressed ill-will against this country. Two American engineers, who have been employed in Russia and who declined to give their names, told immigration officials the Russians boasted of Soviet-instigated revolutions in China and India and said similar agitation was under way here.

The group was reported to be composed of students planning a survey of American commercial and industrial life, but the American-Russian institute disclaimed knowledge of its identity. Officials of the institute expressed the belief they were student engineers and their detention was only temporary.

culminate in a divorce suit, and the party suing, if the truth could be known, usually has no legal grounds for divorce. In such cases, the parties can go to Oklahoma or to other courts for their divorces—it will not be granted in my court, except possibly in exceptional cases. "I do not mean to hold that going out of the state to get married is legal grounds for denying a divorce. But usually in such cases, if the truth were disclosed, and all the truth is not often disclosed, the party is not entitled to a divorce."

clusive judge of the facts proven, the credibility of the witnesses and the weight to be given to their testimony; that is, the judge may or may not believe the witness, and his judgment in such cases is rarely disturbed on appeal. "At a meeting of the district judges sometime ago," Judge Ewing continued, it was the opinion of the judges that more frauds is perpetrated upon the courts in divorce matters than in any other class of cases. The courts are too lenient in granting divorces. In my 14 years experience on the bench, some of the hardest cases I have tried have been contested divorce cases."
