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




TDH links chili to botulism outbreak

DENTON (AP) — An outbreak of botulism at a church supper in Sanger has been linked to Sheriff Blaylock's brand chili purchased at Town Talk Salvage in Fort Worth, the Texas Department of Health said Sunday.

TDH officials say that, until further notice, no one should eat Sheriff Blaylock's chili regardless of where it was purchased and no one should eat any brand of chili purchased from Town Talk Salvage. Officials have not determined how or where the chili became contaminated.

A call made by The Associated Press to Classic Foods of Fort Worth, the maker of Sheriff Blaylock's brand chili according to TDH, was not immediately returned. A listing could not be found for Town Talk Salvage in Fort Worth.



County tax rate hearing **Tuesday**

Gray County Commissioners will hold a public hearing at 9 a.m. Tuesday, Sept. 4, on the 2002 county tax rate and 2002 budget. The meeting will be at the temporary county courthouse at 315

The commission approved an eight percent property tax hike on Aug. 24 in a 3-2 vote. As the assessed values were increased, the increase actually means lower taxes.

Voting in favor were Commissioners Jim Greene, James Hefley and Gerald Wright. Commissioner Joe Wheeley and County Judge Richard Peet voted against the proposal.

Wheeley and Peet indicated they were both against the measure instead of favoring a measure to add \$5° or \$10 fees to car

Taxes on the average homestead would decrease by \$1.35. or 0.96 percent, under the proposal which passed compared with last year's taxes.

LIPSCOMB - Nine indictments ranging from retaliation to burglary to drug possession were handed up after a meeting of the Lipscomb County grand jury Thursday.



Open container law goes on books; Tougher license revocation rules, too

AUSTIN - Labor Day drivers are facing stepped up law enforcement activity - and a long-awaited open container law to combat drinking and driving.

The new open container law went into effect Saturday, just as the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) and other law enforcement increased patrols for the Labor Day weekend.

A tougher, expanded Administrative License Revocation (ALR) law also goes into effect the same day.

"Alcohol and cars don't mix, period," said DPS Director Col. Thomas Davis Jr. "The Legislature has given law enforcement a much-needed open container law to help us drive that point home."

As part of Operation CARE (Combined Accident Reduction Effort) - a nationwide effort by all state police agencies to reduce fatalities during holiday per ods all available troopers will actively search for drunk drivers, speeders and seat belt violators Labor Day weekend. The increased patrols

will take place from 6 p.m. Friday, Aug. 31, through midnight Monday, Sept. 3.

House Bill 5 makes it a Class C misdemeanor to possess an open container of an alcoholic beverage in the passenger compartment of a vehicle. It also strengthens the punishment for repeat DWI (driving while intoxicated) offenses. A second DWI conviction within five years now requires a mandatory one-year suspension of the offender's

Upon reinstatement, they must have an ignition interlock device installed on their vehicle for an additional year. During the

suspension, the offender is not even eligible for an occupational license to drive to work. DPS has observed that in the majority of alcohol-related crashes that an open container is present. The law also reinforces that it is illegal to drink while driving.

"These new laws are just the most recent indication that the people of Texas are fed up with the death and destruction drunk drivers cause," said Davis. "The bottom line is that responsible citizens don't drive drunk."

House Bill 63, which also took effect Sept. 1, requires law enforcement officers to confiscate the driver license of anyone charged with DWI and increases suspensions outlined in the ALR laws. For example, if a driver refuses a breath test they now face a driver license suspension of six months - double the prior law. The updated statute applies ALR punishments to boating while intoxicated if the suspect refuses a breath test. In that circumstance, boaters also face confiscation of their driver license and possible license suspensions.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress resumes its legislative battles this week with the White House pressing for more education and defense money and Democrats saying the evaporating budget surplus has put all new spending in jeopardy.
