St. Louis Pilots **Are Going Good** After 24 Days

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 14. (AP)- With the worlds record for sustained flight again in their possession, Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brine soared on today taking up the twentyfourth day of their endurance grind at 7:11 a. m. (CST). At that hour they had been up 576 hours and had beaten the mark of the Hunter brothers by more than 22 hours.

When Jackson and O'Brine will Declares He Is Friend land remained problematical today. "I think we will be up next year if the weather and everything holds out," O'Brine radioed from the endurance plane, Greater St. Louis. Both fliers have talked of remaining aloft for 1,000 hours, and it was considered unlikely at Lambert-St. Louis field, over which they are flying, that they would come down before reaching that goal if everything continues to go well.

We don't, of course, hank on to laws quite that to get rid of corns. idiotic. But in general it may be said that it is not our tendency to follow this British lead in handling out cf date laws. Our governing bodies almost invariably lack the courage to repeal such ordinances. To do so might offend some group of the populace; consequently we let the laws remain, and then make no pretense of cnforcing them.

As a result, we have these queer "blue Sunday" drives every so often. In countless cities and towns there are laws which forbid everything from playing golf to buying postage stamps on Sunday. Generally these laws are allowed to lie ignored; but once in a while some sheriff or mayor or chief of police conceives it to be his duty to enforce them, and a whole community. is inconvenienced and upset-all because the law-makers lake the courage to repeal laws that no longer have public support.

So it is that every state and city has laws that are never enforced. There are horse races in states whose laws strictly bar horse racing. There are Sunday novies in towns where Sunday movies are illegal. We prefer to let laws go unenforced rather than to go to work and repeal them. It is not a healthy attitude.-NEA.





"But, in the Post's opinion, this frantic, last-minute grab for possibly fading administration

"The Post still hopes that Sterling's apparent gains are no more than surface indications reflected from his lavish expenditure of money. And, even if he gets into the run-off, an adroit, fire-eating campaign such as Jim Ferguson can make could defeat him. "The Post can't believe, yet, that the voters of Texas will permit a multi-millionaire with neither ability nor training for state affairs, to buy and club his way into the governor's man-
