Lloyd Offers Tips To Young Homemakers

The first meeting of the Muleshoe Young Homemakers was held September 11 in the Homemaking Department. Nita Lloyd of Pioneer natural Gas gave a demonstration on preparing chicken. She passed around several simple recipes for chicken which everyone sampled.

There are 30 different varieties for serving chicken that are flavorful and inexpensive, according to Ms. Lloyd. A few are: cold for picnics, using odds and ends for soups and appetizers, and there are dieter's ways that are low in calories and high in protein.

Ms. Lloyd said to thaw chicken, it is best to put it in the refrigerator for one to two days instead of just setting it out. If you don't have time for that, put it in cold water for about 35 minutes. Once the chicken is thawed, do not refreeze, cook it and then refreeze. Refrigerated chicken will keep for three days. She said to refrigerate the broth separately from the chicken because it seems to spoil easier if together. Cut the chicken when it is partially thawed and it will be easier.

To conserve energy, Mrs. Lloyd suggested to cook two chickens at once. If one of the chickens is refrozen, she said it is best not to cut it up. She also said not to continuously open the oven door. The oven drops 25 degrees every time it is opened. Another suggestion is to use lids and this will speed up cooking.

To check chicken for doneness, pierce it and if the liquid runs clear instead of pink, it is done. A meat thermometer in the thickest part of the meat can also be used. The chicken is done when the thermometer reaches 190 degrees. Mrs. Lloyd also noted that if the meat against the bone is pink, it does not mean that the chicken is not done, it is just a chemical reaction.

The Young Homemakers hold meetings regularly on every second Tuesday of the month. A program is presented at each meeting. On this year's list of programs, there will be demonstrations shown from Pioneer Natural Gas and Southwestern Public Service. UNDERNUTRITION OF PRESCHOOLERS

Not enough calories or selected nutrients is the most common cause of undernutrition in United States' preschoolers.

The nutrient most commonly lacking in the diet of preschoolers is iron. Of all the nutrients, the iron allowance is probably the most difficult to provide in the diet.

Lean meat, deep green leafy vegetables, and whole grain or enriched cereals and breads are the best sources of iron in the daily diet. Also, liver, other organ meats, dried fruits, legumes, shellfish and molasses are iron rich foods.

Most infants receive some type of iron supplement due to the fact that milk, the principle food in the diet at that age, is a poor source of iron.

Mild anemia caused by

insufficient intake of iron does influence behavior in young children although it does not seem to have any direct effect on intelligence. It does, however, cause a decrease in attentiveness and an increase in irritability.

Iron deficiency affects the child's defenses against disease. Poor physical growth is also evidence of undernutrition. However, children grow at different rates, so this is hard to measure, and social and environmental factors do play a part.

Some of the areas of the child's life that may be affected are reading ability, concentration, motivation and agility. Undernourished children are less active and do not participate fully in activities and in their environment.

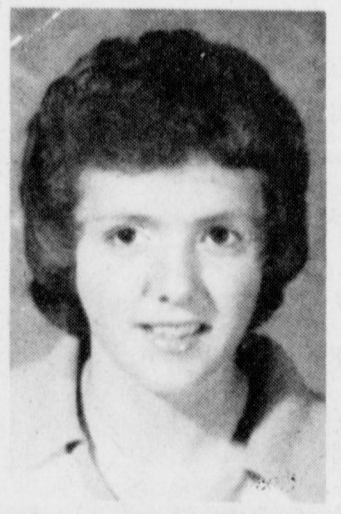

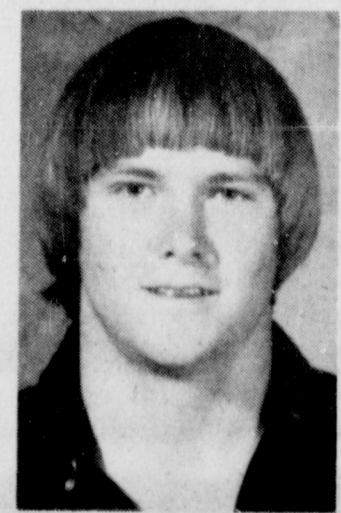

A knack for whittling has paid off for a Muleshoe man. He is the proud possessor of a creation of his own, which is a scale model windmill he worked on.

Cecil Davis started on the windmill some three years ago, and has produced a working scale model windmill.

A minister by the name of Miller figured out the working parts and took the plans to Wisconsin to work them out, said Davis.

His windmill is of pine and the cross braces are carved from fir. Also used

were bass wood and gum for the main arm of the wheel. The wheel is of steel.

Davis said he used tweezers to hold the small nails in the construction and drilled the holes for the nuts and bolts, which also had to be handled with tweezers.

The windmill is a model of the former well-known Eclipse windmill, which was sold by Higginbotham-Bartlett during early settlement years of the county.

Davis, a retired rancher and farmer, recently exhibited the scale model

windmill at the Curry County Fair in Clovis.

He said he has been putting together windmill kits for several years and at one time, he had seven windmills on his farms.

They were all wooden windmills and were used for watering his feeder stock on the ranch.

"A windmill was a way of life during the early days," commented Davis. "It brought water to both livestock and to the family. If the wind was not blowing, the farmers and ranchers had to use pump jacks. A lot of time, we stayed at the windmills at night to keep them going."

Davis added that he had eaten a lot of meals right at the windmill, as someone would bring him meals, which lots of times consisted of vienna sausage and pork and beans.

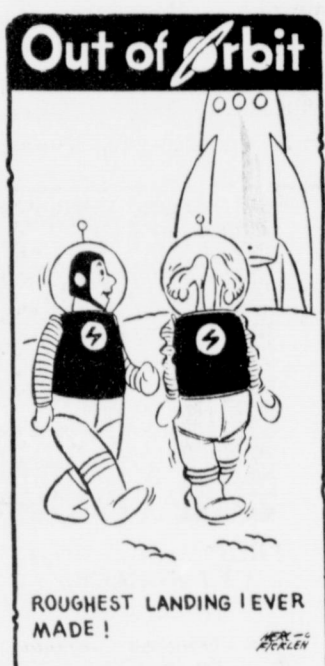
Cecil Davis was born on a ranch, and spent all of his life, until retirement on a ranch. His father was ranching seven sections of land south of Muleshoe in 1920. He also leased 14 additional sections while Davis was a young man.

At one time, Davis got lost, when he was around

10 years of age. He found his way home by locating a very tall set of gateposts which were used to guide

persons to the main headquarters on the ranch.

Now, Davis, who is an avid collector of historical data and antiques, especially brands and branding irons, has retired and pursues his hobbies in Muleshoe.

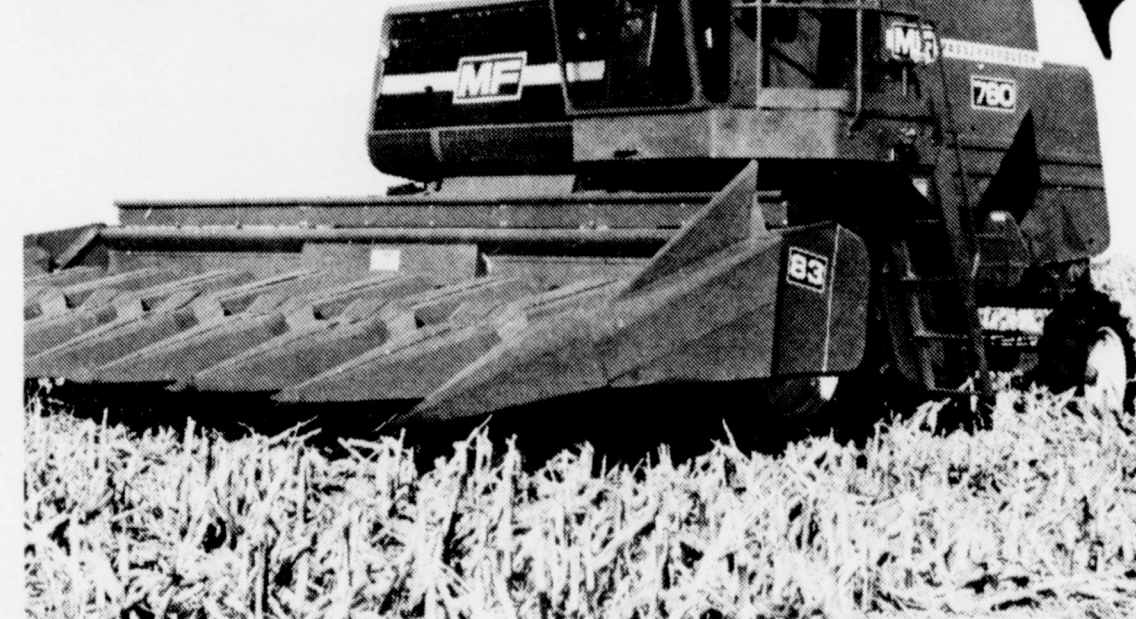

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

(H.J.R. 108)
House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years. A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

(H.J.R. 133)
House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 13)
Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 133)

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Tejas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. 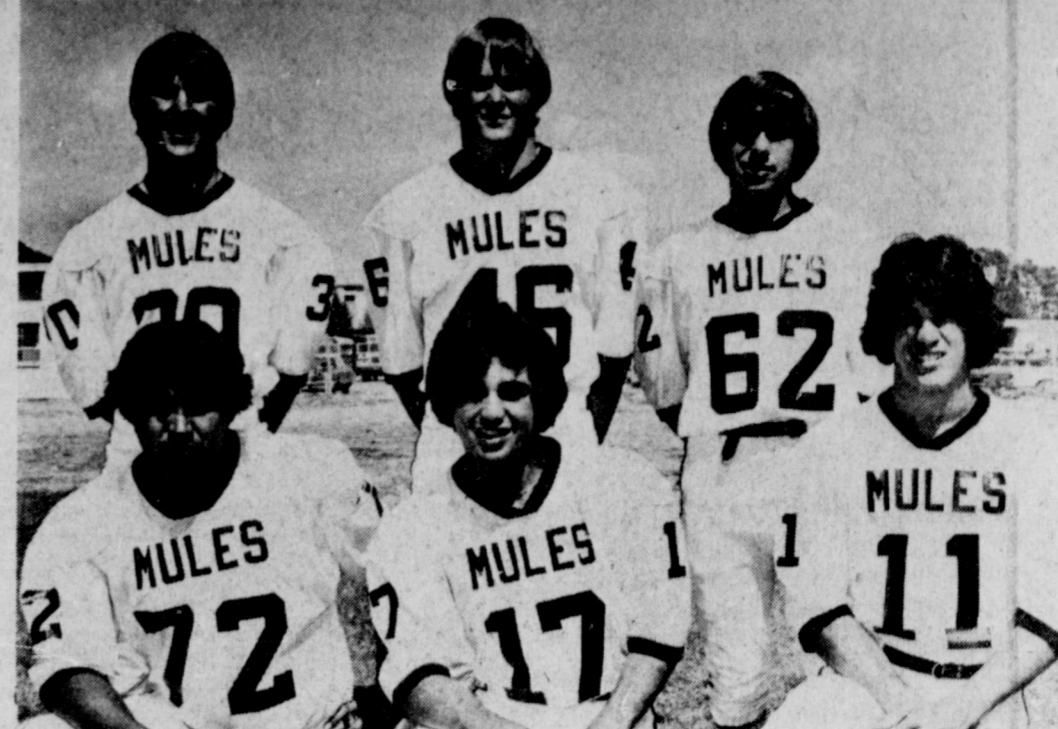

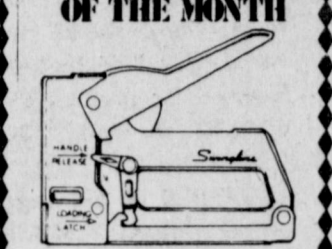
