

Schools take threat precautions

FBI: Danger chances appear to be low-level

Students in the Pampa Independent School District were in school today with no incidents reported following a precautionary alert to all Texas school districts.

"We received notification" Wednesday afternoon from the Texas Education Commissioner about a vague threat on an unknown Texas school in retaliation for the U.S. bombing in Afghanistan," said PISD Superintendent Dawson Orr. "I immediately contacted all PISD principals to make them aware of the situation."

Orr said he immediately contacted the Pampa Police Department. "At our request, the police have increased their presence in and around all local school areas," he said.

He said the school has been operating under the up-dated security plan which was implemented in 1999 in the school dis-

"The plan we put in place three years ago allows for entrance to the schools by certain doors only with appropriate adult supervision," he said.

"Also, after the Sept. 11 attacks, Pampa PD has had a more visible presence around the schools," he said.


Orr said the school is using caution in protecting the students. "It is important we carry on and use good common sense," said Orr.

"My daughter is in school today," said Orr. His daughter is a junior at Pampa High School. PHS School Liaison Officer Colby Brown said there's increased police presence in the local schools.

"We're driving around a lot more in the areas, too," he said.

He said most administrators and teachers also have children who are in school today.

PEDC's dissolution won't affect city financial rating

The City of Pampa's financial rating will not be affected by the dissolution of the Pampa Development Economie Corporation, according to City Finance Director John Horst.

Horst said Thursday morning that the PEDC was a different component unit from the City of Pampa from the inception of the

A&M admissions program draws criticism

HOUSTON (AP) — Texas A&M System regents unfair and academically indefensible preferential have tentatively approved what they call a "pilot treatment scheme. program" to automatically admit the top 20 percent of students from 250 underperforming state high schools to the school.

The so-called "low performing" high schools typically have a greater percentage of minority students than other institutions, A&M officials have said. The university, under the plan, would automatically admit the top 10 percent of students from the state's other high schools.

But some have criticized the plan as an attempt to circumvent the 1996 Hopwood court decision that bans Texas universities from using racial preferences in college admissions or scholarships.

Texas Attorney General John Cornyn has been asked by regents who conditionally approved the plan last week to rule on its constitutionality. If the plan is approved, it would be evaluated after a few vears, officials said.

On Wednesday, Cornyn's office would say only that it has been contacted by the regents.

Representatives of Young Conservatives of Texas said they asked Cornyn to "reject this illegal,

'Solely for the purpose of favoring black and Hispanie students over whites and Asians, this policy would give preference to students from mostly minority high schools," the group told the Houston Chronicle in a prepared statement Wednesday.

Wendy Gramm, an A&M regent who is the wife of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, said from her Washington, D.C., office on Wednesday that part of the proposal's goal is "to make sure our flagship institutions are more representative of our popula-

Joe Estrada, A&M admissions director, said three percent of this year's 44,000 students are black and 10 percent are Hispanic. A&M, which is 80 percent white, is perceived by many minorities as inhospitable to them because of its traditions and mostly white population.

The nine regents first discussed the plan in October, Gramm said. She said then that it might violate the Hopwood decision and make the system vulnerable to lawsuits.



Austin American-Statesman on hauling anthrax to Texas: Texas managed to "just say no" to anthrax last week. Citizens should be glad.

Shipping anthrax-contaminated material from the East Coast for disposal in Texas never sounded like a sensible idea. Texas power plants, labs, industries and feedlots generate staggering amounts of dangerous waste. It hardly seems prudent to invite toxins from

Yet Texas came close to becoming the disposal site for the anthrax-laden materials rounded up on the East Coast. The materials were assembled during the investigation of letters contaminated with anthrax, an animal disease that can be fatal when spread to humans. Infectious anthrax spores have been developed as a bio-terrorism weapon. A series of East Coast anthrax fatalities / by invading Islam's third-holiest site and arrotriggered the roundup of spore-contaminated material.

What's to be done with the contaminated junk? The first plan was to send it to Port Arthur's Onyx Environmental Services Inc., for incineration. Then a group of citizens who live near the incin-

For one thing, no one had convinced the neighbors that the materials would arrive "safe to burn." They correctly noted that unusual caution must be used in dealing with a lethal disease spread by inhalation.

Nor were the scientific experts entirely convinced about safety. "I am not confident the administration has a game plan to handle the disposal of this material," said U.S. Rep. Nick Lampson, D-Beaumont, who opposed the shipment to Texas. Similar reservations were expressed at the state's main environmental agency, the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission.

Onyx finally bowed out, although its officials continued to defend the safety of incineration.

Texas traditionally has favored a "y'all come" attitude toward dangerous waste. Most recently the state has welcomed thousands of canisters of napalm, an explosive weapon made of gasoline, benzene and plastic. Leftover napalm made for use in Vietnam languished in warehouses for decades before being accepted by a Deer Park disposal company on the Gulf Coast.

Tons of New York City sewage sludge have been shipped to far West Texas and spread on the arid ground as a disposal technique. Texas lawmakers early this year came perilously close to approving a bill that many readers interpreted as opening the door to

nuclear waste from all over the country. And the nation's nuclear-weapons stockpile is being dismantled at the Pantex plant near Amarillo. West Texas is suffering water pollution linked to the operation.

Lampson, a member of the House Science Committee, correctly notes that a more trustworthy anthrax-disposal plan is needed to reassure citizens. "Public officials have a duty to decrease, not increase public anxiety," he said. Long-haul transportation of toxins on highways and rail lines increases their threat to public health. For this and other reasons, Texas should be reluctant to let entrepreneurs and officials solve toxic-waste dilemmas by saying "just come on down."

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Defending against infamy

Welcome back, liberalism. The New York Times is nattering about FBI interrogation of possible terrorists, and The Washington Post is muttering about military tribunals for terrorists. Some academics, looking back at the World

War II tribunals, are even trying to turn George Dasch into a hero. George who? As part of the Nazis' "Operation Pastorius," he was one of four German saboteurs who landed by submarine on Long Island in 1942, with the goal of blowing up hydroelectric plants, railroad terminals and bridges, and aluminum plants. They, and four others who landed in Florida, carried high-explosive bombs disguised as pieces of coal and wooden blocks.

Providentially, a Coast Guardsman encountered Dasch and others shortly after landing, and out of fear or a desire to switch sides, Dasch soon turned himself in and told FBI agents howto catch the others. A military court quickly tried the saboteurs. Six of the eight were sentenced as spies to death in the electric chair; that verdict was quickly carried out. Dasch plus another who cooperated received prison terms; released after the war, Dasch headed back to Germany and died there.

Exposure of the Nazi plot was an important step for the United States. What we now call "homeland defense" was not taken seriously

Tape shows bin Laden discussing Sept. 11 attacks

WASHINGTON (AP) Osama bin Laden contentedly recalled the Sept. 11 suicide attacks against America on a videotape released Thursday by the Pentagon, saying the destruction exceeded his estimates and the event "benefitted Islam great-

dom operation," Bin Laden said in a conversation with two aides and a Saudi sheik, but those who carried them out didn't know the precise details until just before they boarded the planes.

The tape, amateurish in quality but chilling nonetheless, was released as part of an administration effort to support claims that bin Laden was the mastermind behind the attacks that killed thousands in New York, Washington and Pennsylvania. The translation of the Arabic conversation was provided by the administration.

In it, bin Laden discussed some of the planning that led to the attacks, and recalled tuning in to the radio to hear American news

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Afghan tribal fighters launch new assault

(AP) — Backed by intensifying U.S. airstrikes, Afghan tribal fighters launched a new assault Thursday against trapped al-Qaida forces. Commanders said key terrorist leaders had likely fled Osama bin Laden's besieged mountain base for neighboring Pakistan.

Mid-East truce effort cut short by violence

- Israel severed all contact with Yasser Arafat early Thursday, launching retaliatory air strikes and sending troops to Palestinian towns after a bus ambush that killed 10 Israelis. Arafat's spokesman called the moves "an official declaration of war."

Another top Palestinian official said Israeli strikes had rendered the Palestinian Authority unable to fulfill its commitment to crack down on terror.

The strikes on Thursday killed one man in the West Bank, and a woman died of a heart attack when Israeli warplanes bombed targets in Gaza, Palestinian officials said.

The violence and harsh words appeared to mark a new crisis point in the bitter 14-month old conflict and threatened to wreck

U.S. efforts to arrange a truce.
Israel's Security Cabinet ruled out talks with Arafat hours after the Palestinian leader bowed to long-standing Israeli demands and ordered the offices of the militant Hamas and Islamic Jihad groups closed, but did not outlaw

The Cabinet statement said Arafat was "directly responsible" for the bus ambush "and therefore is no longer relevant to Israel, and Israel will no longer have any connection with him." Israel Army Radio said low-level talks between the two sides continued.



weapons in 1969, the Sun reported. The Dugway statement said researchers there have worked with anthrax since 1992, turning small amounts of wet anthrax into powder to test ways to defend against biowarfare.

Until the latest anthrax threat, Dugway scientists sent anthrax samples by FedEx to the Army's biodefense center at Fort Detrick, Md., where the bacteria was rendered harmless through radiation before being returned to Dugway for experiments. Those samples were shipped in a wet paste form to minimize the danger of a spill or accident, the Dugway statement said.

Army officials told the Post such mailings are in compliance with federal law. The Dugway statement said that all the anthrax its scientists have developed is accounted for and the researchers are cooperating with the FBI in its investigation.
