



Bailey County Sheriff Bob Henderson and Muleshoe Police Chief Wayne Holmes have joined together in an effort to try to express their concern about sightseers who are packing emergency sites.

In many instances, such as the Wednesday evening wreck northwest of Muleshoe on a county dirt road, so many sightseers packed the roads around the intersection crash, that emergency vehicles had a difficult time making their way to the wreck to remove the

Fortunately, none of the three victims received serious injuries, but it would have been all the same if they had received critical injuries.

Both the sheriff and chief reminded that stiff penalties can be assessed persons who have no business being at an emergency site, whether it be wreck, fire or otherwise, showing up and impending any legal emergency vehicle.

They said, "Please stay away from wreck or emergency sites. If this trend continues, law enforcement officers will be instructed to start handing out tickets, or take other measures."

otton harvest is here, and - the Cooperative is urging everyone to use extreme care when operating harvest. and other farm equipment near electric lines. Cotton module builders, for example, can easily contact an overhead electric line. The same hazard exists with the overhead baskets on cotton

strippers. So the Cooperative urges

Use caution during harvest

- specifically and emphatically - that operators of module builders make sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go before moving the implement from one place to another. And the Cooperative further urges

stripper operators using an overhead basket to check for overhead lines before dumping the basket.

If some plece of equipment does contact a 7,200volt overhead line, the operator should not try to back

away. The line could break, or if the line is already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.

The thing to do when equipment contacts an overhead line is to jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Once clear of the machine, the operator should move quickly away from it at a right angle to the power line. Then, whether the line is broken or not, he should call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (806) 272-4504 Just as soon as possible.



Develop Partnership For Health

A partnership in which patient and doctor share the responsibility for maintaining or restoring health can contribute to quality health care, according to a health education expert.

"Becoming an active partner in your health care starts by choosing a doctor you can communicate with," says Dr. Mary Ann Heussner. "Select a doctor who will listen, ask questions and thoroughly explain a diagnosis or treatment."

She emphasizes that patients have equal responsibilities to communicate by giving complete and accurate information to their doctors and asking questions when they don't understand.

"Since you're paying for expert medical advice, never hesitate to question your doctor about anything you don't understand," Heussner advises. "Don't be refuctant to ask the doctor to translate medical jargon into plain language or to take notes if you wish."

Heussner, who is a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economics program, notes that it may be especially important to ask questions about diagnostic tests, medications and the costs, risks and benefits of treatment alterna-

To take a more active role in your health care, the specialist advises the following steps:

• Keep a record of your personal health history. It will be helpful in providing information the doctor may need for a diagnosis. A Family Health and Medical Record is available through county Extension of-

* Prepare in advance for a doctor's visit. Be prepared to provide the doctor with specific information on your current problem, symptoms, medical history, current medications and personal habits.

Read labels on over-thecounter medicines and take prescribed medicine according to directions. Make sure you know how and when you should take the medicine and for how long. Ask about side effects, and if there are any foods, beverages, medicines or activities that should be avoided while taking the medication.

· If, by chance, you have any doubts about a treatment plan, get a second opinion. But once you and your doctor agree on a treatment plan, it's a waste of time and money if you fail to carry it out.







In climbing up, or driving up, mountains, in the United States, is it important to allow for lessening oxy-

It is very important to understand the composition of the atmosphere in ascending mountains—as it is in flying. While most of the gas that surrounds the earth (the atmosphere) is not oxygen, the supply of this gas is vital to our breathing and health.

As we ascend, the air gets thinner and we do not breathe in the normal supply of vital oxygen. If you reach an altitude of 10,000 or 11,000 feet, climbing or driving, you have reached a dangerous altitude. In a few places in this country our mountains rise this high.

Even at 8,000 or 9,000 feet, the effects are considerable. Above 9,000, extra oxygen should be used. Vision at night is very poor at this altitude without additional oxygen. If in doubt whether you are suffering from anoxia, look at your fingernails. They should be pink, and if they are turning bluish, you are experiencing


Survivors include a son, Wesley (Willard) Dement of Moss Beach, Calif; three daugh-
