Friendship With Our Neighbors Is Essential to City's Advancement

Pampa is rapidly taking an important place as a center of commerce on the upper North Plains of the Panhandle. The viewpoints which dominated her when she was struggling to reach her maximum growth in the shortest time are no longer sufficient.

The bigger city must be dominated by two things: 1. Alertness to make use of opportunities for permanent development; and 2. Energy in assisting materially in the development of the surrounding territory. How to blend those two objectives to the satisfaction of the city and the communities round about is the problem. It is well known that many cities fail to do this, while others are signally successful.

It is time for Pampa to study her territory and to lend leadership and other assistance in its progress. This city cannot afford to be selfish. It cannot afford to be guilty of the things which have aroused its ire when witnessed in Amarillo.

Cooperation of the right sort was shown last month when the county-wide road bond issue passed. Approval was gained by making the advantages not only acceptable to this community, but with most other communities of the county. The same principle applies to other nearby counties. What helps the area within a radius of a hundred miles is going to help Pampa.

With these thoughts in mind, let us seek friendships with our neighbors and strive to be genuinely helpful to them.

ORLANDO'S UNIQUE SITUATION

Orlando, Fla., has had an unusual situation in regard to its newspapers. Several months ago a consolidation was announced of the Morning Sentinel and the Evening Reporter-Star under the same ownership so as to enable more economical publication.

However, details were not thoroughly worked out at the time of the merger. About three weeks ago the Reporter-Star went back to its separate publication, and the Morning Sentinel started the Evening Sentinel. It just required the publishers two weeks to realize how foolish they had been. The Evening Sentinel was discontinued, and the Reporter-Star moved back to The Morning Sentinel.

Thus, the merchants of Orlando are getting the advantage of consolidated newspaper publishing. Few cities under metropolitan size find it advisable to support more than one newspaper ownership, and it is no wonder that Orlando is no exception to the general rule.

WASHINGTON—From dusty files in the manuscript division of the library of congress there comes the story of a perhaps hitherto unchronicled incident of Admiral Perry's historic expedition in 1854 to open the isolated empire of Japan to western commerce.

The document, written by John Glendy Sproston, was found by a woman engaged in preparations for the establishment of a Japanese division in the library. Sproston was an officer in the expedition.

It was March 28. The United States squadron lay at anchor off Uruga, and negotiations were progressing toward a treaty. Four Japanese ships approached. Japanese commissioners sought and were given permission to visit the Admiral's flagship.

"Five or six officers from this ship (the Macedonian), among them," wrote Sproston, "started in a boat for the flag ship. . . . On the quarter deck were arranged tables, or I might say a table, for they were placed so as to form one continuous array of delicacies. . . .

Merriment
"Having walked 'round the ship, they (the Japanese) descended into the cabin with the commander and captain. "Their retainers remained on deck and joined us in the onslaught on the numerous edibles there displayed. Champagne, sherry, port, whisky punch, and in fact every kind and quality of wine or liquor that come first to hand satisfied their wants.

"A rather tall and gaunt Japanese that sat next to me drank them all, and was of course rather merry afterwards. The various toasts of the evening were 'Japan and California, may they be united by steam and commerce' and 'The ladies of Japan, may we become better acquainted with them.'

"In the course of the afternoon the Commodore made his appearance on deck with the commissioners, and said: 'Gentlemen, we will now adjourn to hear the minstrels.'

"A profound silence followed by a shrill whistle from one of the Japanese followed this.

Day's End
"The Commodore looked grave (no one appreciates a joke less than he does). However, all hands proceeded to the place of amusement. . . . I thought that the commissioners would have died with suppressed laughter (for they never laughed out, as we did). . . .

"I looked, and to my astonishment saw an arm placed affectionately around the Commodore's neck, the arm being that of the chief commissioner (what will not champagne do?)

"And thus closed a day's amusement."

The next entry that Sproston made was the simple statement:

"This day has the treaty of amity and friendship been signed."

House Eager To Take Vote Upon Highway Bonds

AUSTIN, April 15. (AP)—The Texas house of representatives today evidenced a desire to dispose speedily of the constitutional amendment to authorize issuance of \$212,000,000 in state highway bonds and the resolution was almost put to a vote after about one hour's deliberation.

The bond issue resolution came up as special order but was delayed by an address by United States Senator Tom Connally.

Scarcely had the provisions of the resolution been explained by Representative Hubbard of New Boston, joint author and floor leader, when cries of "vote" were heard. Speaker Minor announced the question was on adoption of the resolution and members were preparing to vote when Representative Howley of Albany gained recognition and started a speech in his favor.

Few questions were asked of Hubbard after he finished explaining the resolution and no amendments for offered, prediction being made

the resolution would be adopted or fall in its present form.

If submitted and adopted by the people, the state would be authorized to issue \$112,000,000 in bonds to reimburse counties for funds expended on state highways and to retire outstanding bonds and \$100,000 for construction of the state primary road system.

Immediately after the bond resolution was called up for discussion, Representative De Wolfe of Goldthwaite called for a strict enforcement of the rules to keep all persons off the floor, other than representatives and employees of the house and newspapermen and the few state officials entitled to the privileges of the floor.

Hubbard advanced the bond issue as a purely tax relief measure, aimed at lightening the burdens of small property owners and relieving them of payment of the millions of dollars of county road bonds, issued

for state highway construction. Under the resolution, the state bonds would be retired from gasoline tax receipts and could never become a lien on personal or real property.

The bonds would bear not more than four and one-half per cent interest.

at Hubbard was by Representative Greathouse of Fort Worth, who asked if the bond issue would be justified in view of the economic depression.

Hubbard replied that he believed the bond issue would be justified because of the relief it would afford to property owners.

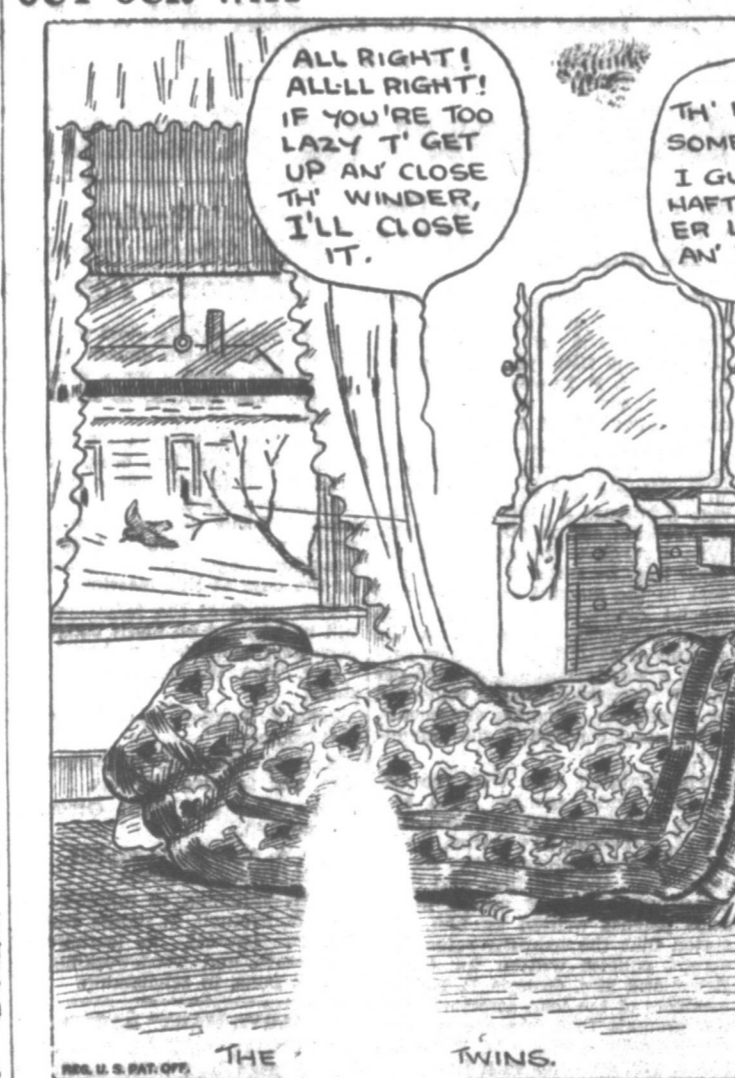

EAST TEXAS POTENTIAL IS DEEPLY CUT BY SALT FLOW

Flory Wells Among Those Which Fail to Obtain Expected Crude.

DALLAS, April 15. (AP)—Salt water, most feared of oil field bogeys, made its appearance in the edge of one of the East Texas pools this week to top off approximately 50,000 acres from the potential production area in the Kilgore district. Condemnation of this acreage on the west side of the Bateman field was only one of a conglomeration of developments, including threatened investigation of alleged hoarding of tank cars, steps by the state railroad commission to enforce production of the pools regardless of a restraining order and what some termed "virtual collapse" of the market.

Some operators argued that when salt water showed in the Magnolia Petroleum company's No. 1 Flory, and the Burton Drilling company's No. 1 Flory, the theory that unrestricted production, such as had obtained in East Texas since the discovery of oil there five months ago, caused channeling and coning to ruin of fields, had been borne out.

While the salt water disappointment west of Kilgore caused abandonment of extensive drilling plans in that section, it having been reported the Sun company, especially discarded several locations in the vicinity where derricks were up, the Lathrop Gregg county pool near Longview had been extended a half mile westward by completion of three producers. One of these, the E. A. Skipper Oil company's No. 1 Third Snoddy, was regarded by oil men as the largest yet found in that field.

More than half a hundred producers had been completed during the past week in the Kilgore, Joiner, and Lathrop areas of the field and the estimated daily production had been fixed at in excess of 250,000 barrels.

Appearance of salt water and reduction of the price of oil in the field to 35 cents per barrel, announced by several large buyers, was said to have influenced some anti-prorationists to temper their previous uncompromising attitude toward orderly curtailment of production. There were reports that some oil had been contracted for 10 cents per barrel.

The state had sent investigators into the field in response to complaints that discrimination against small operators had been shown in the allotment of railway tank cars for transporting oil. The complainants charged this action had been taken to force the "little fellows" to sell oil at ridiculously low prices to brokers.

Some relief from congestion in the field was offered by announcement of Daniel T. Pierce, assistant to the chairman of the board of the Sinclair Consolidated Oil corporation, that plans had been completed by Sinclair to ship 60,000 barrels of crude oil daily, either to its northern or Gulf coast refinery under a joint tariff arrangement with the Prairie Pipeline system.

This would be accomplished, it was announced, by construction by the Sinclair Texas Pipeline company of a 12-inch line from East Texas to a connection with the Prairie Pipeline company at Mexia.

NARCOTICS SEIZED

KILGORE, April 15. (AP)—Two men were turned over to a federal narcotic agent last night to be taken to Tyler to face charges of narcotic law violation. A special ranger working with local officers supplied information leading to the arrests. A quantity of narcotics was seized.

Japanese Prince And Princess Are Welcomed Today

WASHINGTON, April 15. (AP)—The welcome of America's highest officialdom, headed by President and Mrs. Hoover, was extended today to Prince and Princess Takamatsu of Japan.

The 26-year-old prince, as the second younger brother of the emperor of Japan, is second in line to the throne, ranking after his older brother, Prince Chichibu. The princess is a daughter of the illustrious house of Tokugawa, which for two and one-half centuries supplied the Shoguns that actually ruled the empire, but let go their rule to permit full restoration of the emperors. They are the first imperial Japanese couple to visit Washington.

A semi-state greeting had been prepared for the arrival at Union station from New York, including an honor guard of marines and a band to play the Japanese and American anthems.

Mingled with official and state entertainments, among them a state dinner tonight at the White House, were several periods during the six-day stay when the prince and princess will be free to indulge in the pleasures of sightseeing such as thousands of Americans and foreign visitors do annually.

All Bids On Gas System Returned

AMARILLO, April 15. (AP)—Announcing that the city of Amarillo will finance its own gas distribution system and let contracts on a cash basis, the city commission has returned, unopened all bids received at its meeting last night and will advertise for new bids to be opened April 28.

Mayor Ernest O. Thompson said a contract had been signed with G. M. Dunne and associates of Wichita, Kan., to furnish up to \$1,000,000 for the project, the bond company to receive a deed of trust and a mortgage on the distribution system as security.

"We learned that a good many contractors would not submit bids under the old plan because they were not in a position to finance the undertaking," Mayor Thompson said. "Operating on a cash basis will be cheaper for the city anyway."

Mayor Thompson announced that 7,000 contracts to buy gas from the municipal system had been signed, representing more than three-fourths of the city's consumers.

SANTA ANNA SURRENDERS TO HOUSTON (From a Painting by W. H. Huddle in the Capitol at Austin, Texas)

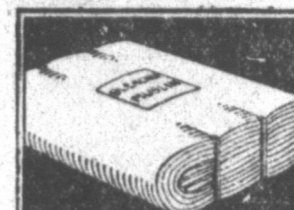
