
This Line's Busy, Sir

NOME, Alaska, July 10. (A) — Their attempted non-stop flight from Seattle to Tokyo having ended near here in failure, Reg L. Robbins and Harold S. Jones of Texas today planned an early return to the United States to try it again.





RETURN OF PROSPERITY NOTED

Conditions are improving in this country. People re going right down the line with their purchasing. In April nearly 37 billions of dollars changed hands in buying of various kinds of merchandise. Moreover, these dollars bought 25 per cent more than they did on January 1, 1928.

May was the sixth consecutive month during which the output of passenger automobiles increased. Export sales are growing rapidly.

Nearly two millions of men who were unemployed Jan. 1. now are gainfully at work. Large concerns report increases of as high as 26 per cent over May of last year, Shoe production in April was the highest of any month since October of 1929. Stocks of manufactured merchandise decreased 10 per cent during the first five months of 1931.

Business is ready for the taking, and the wide-awake merchants who go after it with advertising, energy, and initiative will get the cream of the profits. Not even the farmer is as bad off on the average as it seems. Here is a "farmer's prayer," taken from a Missouri paper:

Eastern Fields **Curtail Activity**

OIL CITY, Pa., July 9. (P)-Efforts to reduce oil production in an between cutput and consumption has brought a drastic drilling curtailment throughout the eastern fields during the first six months of 1931. The number of completed wells diminished to 882, which was 1,650 less than the number com-pleted during the first six months of 1930.

1930 the five-spot water-flood method was hitting its peak in the Brad-ford, Pa., and Allegany, N. Y., fields, with a consequent increase in production. During the first six months of 1931 this program was greatly half of 1930.

In other areas of the eastern field drilling was also greatly cut down. The new Tioga-Wayne gas field showed the only increase in drilling and not one barrel of oil was added to production by the 99 wells com-pleted there. In the West Virginia sector the search was also principally for gas with hearly as many wells being drilled in the six-month period but with oil production 1,171 parrels less.

Drilling throughout the first six months of 1931 was confined to tested areas with the exception of the new gas pool being opened in northern Pennsylvania and southern New York.

In all areas drilling programs were curtailed more and more as the price of oil declined and the only activity shown was in the search for gas or where contracts made it imperative to drill to fulfill leasing




