Welcome to His Office Everybody has access to his office. When he became chairman of the committee last December, he said that he wouldn't have someone at the door to stop people from coming in.

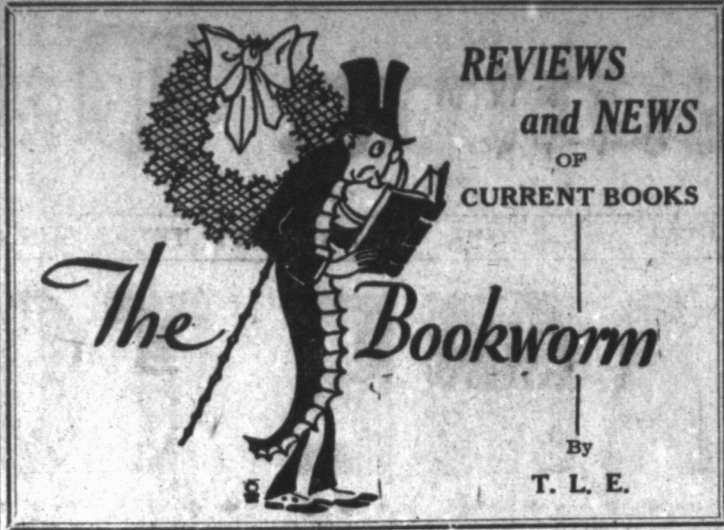

REVIEWS and NEWS OF CURRENT BOOKS By T. L. E.

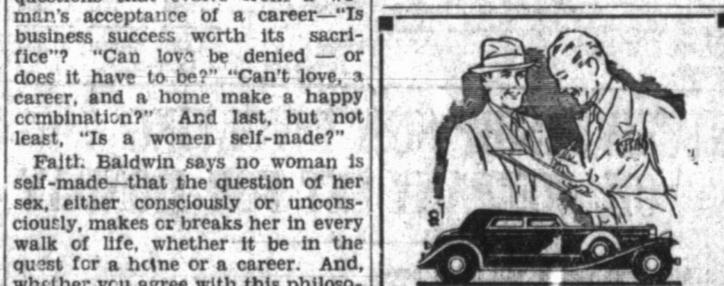

The Campaign Puzzle

Study Past State-by-State Votes in Making Your Forecasts

Virginia's vote for president in 1928:
Hoover 164,609
Smith 140,146

Virginia, which has 11 votes in the electoral college this year instead of its former 12, stepped out of the ranks of the "solid South" in 1928 to vote for a republican candidate for president for the first time since reconstruction days.

The campaign in that year centered about the personality and views of Alfred E. Smith, Bishop

In the state elections of 1930, democrats elected a secretary of state, state treasurer, state auditor, superintendent of public instruction, two appellate court judges and the clerk of the state supreme court.

Of the state's 13 congressmen, democrats elected nine in 1930, a gain of six seats from the party. The governorship was not involved in the 1930 elections.

Programs for increasing employment and lowering taxes have been the major issues thus far in the current campaign.

Interest in the national campaign has overshadowed all local issues, but political students are watching closely developments in the campaign of the veteran Senator James E. Watson (R) for re-election. He is opposed by Frederick Van Nuys (D).

Prohibition and economic programs have been the most widely discussed issues in the current campaign.

Indiana's vote for president in 1928:
Hoover 848,290
Smith 562,691

Indiana, which has 14 electoral votes this year instead of its former 15, has voted for the republican candidate for the presidency in every election since 1892, save in the three-cornered race of 1912 when it gave its vote to Woodrow Wilson.

This state administration, likewise, usually has been republican. Republican governors have held office for the last 16 years, and until two years ago republicans held all elective state offices.

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Oregon's vote for president in 1928:
Hoover 205,341
Smith 109,223

Oregon's electoral votes have been cast for the republican candidate in every presidential election since 1888, except when the progressive split gave a plurality to Wilson in 1912. The state has five electoral votes this year, as in 1928.

In the 1928 campaign the interest of the state's voters was centered on the prohibition views of the two candidates and on the Tammany affiliations of Alfred E. Smith.

The senatorial election of 1930 saw Charles L. McNary (R) victorious over Elton Watkins (D) by a

vote of 137,231 to 66,028, but in the gubernatorial election of the same year an independent, Julius L. Meier, received a majority over his republican and democratic opponents. Some of his adherents professed to view his election as a re-

turn to the state republican organization.

Prohibition, power and economic recovery are the issues attracting most attention in the current campaign.
