

huge water supply beneath the Texas Panhandle and South Plains, extending into West

Texas, is slowly being depleted. However, it is predicated that the Aquifer will survive-if farmers who depend on it for irrigation go out of business or take up dryland farming, according to a Department of Interior official from Washing-

Robert Broadbent, assistant interior secretary for water and science said during a news conference that the lower the level of the High Plains Aquifer, the higher the cost of pumping water to the surface.

"I think agriculture is going to be subject to the same economics that anybody else is. If you can no longer afford to buy the products you need to make agriculture productive, you're going to go out of business or go into dryland framing," he said. "I think you're going to see some changes.

Interior Secretary Donald Hodel was also present at the conference as the department released a new report on U.S. underground water supplies.

Hodel said water is plentiful nationwide and that the federal government should stay out of managing underground water resources.

The Texas Legislature has approved a \$1.4 billion water package that must be approved by voters in a referendum. It includes a provision for voluntary local regulation of underground water.


Library News

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




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Wheat Rust May Prevent Grain Heads

Most wheat farmers throughout the Panhandle, South Plains and Rolling Plains have missed their opportunity to use fungicide to combat the worst outbreak of leaf rust to strike the region in many years, says a plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

But a few may still be able to obtain some advantage from treating their crop, said Dr. Robert Berry, who sounded the alarm for area producers two months ago.

County Extension agents in the northern tier of Panhandle counties echoed the view that producers reed to take a very close look at their crop to decide if it is economically feasible to apply fungicide. "This is espec-ially true from Interstate 40

according to the Interior Department report, which was compiled by the U.S. Geological Survey.

"Unless effective conservation measures are implemented, the irrigated acreage will be decreased by slightly more than one-half of the present acreage by the year 2030," it said.

The report included a case study of Floyd County (located some 65 miles east of Bailey County) in the Texas Panhandle, showing how increases in electricity and decreases in the underground water level can make irrigation economically unfeasible.

Between 1952 and 1981, the cost of pumping water in Floyd County increased 594 percent, without adjusting for inflation, the report said. Meanwile, the index of prices received by farmers fell 116 percent.

In 1958, the annual irriagation withdrawl in Floyd County was 61.5 billion gallons. By 1969, it son welcomed the boys into the had increased to 103.5 billion troop, presenting them with the gallons. But by 1979, withdrawals decreased to billion gallons.

From 1945 to 1984, the water level in one Floyd County test well dropped from 60 feet below the land surface to 245 feet below it, the report indicated.

According to the report, more

than 80 percent of the fresh ground water pumped in Texas in 1984 was used for irrigation. About 10 percent was used for public drinking water and less than 10 percent for industrial

"I think economics is going to take care of it a lot (the depletion)," Broadbent said.
"If you can't afford to pump it, then you're not going to pump the ground water, and the ground water is going to stabilize and may even come

up."
If West Texas farmers cannot irrigate, they have to give up crops like corn and cotton in favor of non-irrigated crops such as grain sorghum and wheat.

The report said the Houston area is also rapidly drawing water from the coastal quifer system, which is causing land to

'Most producers made their decision a month ago, with, many feeling the rust wasn't serious enough to justify the treatment," Berry said. But changing weather conditions have provided warmth and moisture which have aggravated the situation."

Producers who have wheat already blooming, or in later stages of development, with rust already evident on the flag leaves will find it is too late to expect satisfactory results from fungicide application, the Extension specialist said.
"Those plants will continue to

decline and results of fungicide application will probably be disappointing, although there might be some yield enhance-ment," Berry said.

Fields which are in the flag stage of early heading, but without rust damage to the upper leaves, can still be treated with an expectation of good results, the pathologist said.

Berry described the Rolling Plains wheat crop as a "complete disaster" from the rust. "Many early fields are in the milk stage with absolutely

Diabetic Retinopathy Listed Major Cause Of All Blindness

The leading cause of blindness in people ages 20 to 64 is a disorder that strikes diabetics.

Diabetic retinopathy robs the sight of about 5,000 Americans a year, says the Texas Medical Association.

The loss of sight results from the death or leakage of small blood vessels of the retina, the inner lining for the back of the eye where visual images are formed. The leaking blood reduces vision and can produce scar tissue on the retina, leading to permanent loss of

But if the disorder is diagnosed early, laser treatment can reduce the risk of severe visual loss, says the American Academy of Ophthalmology, whose members are medical doctors specializing in eye care.

Treatment is usually effective im controling retinopathy. Although the disorder tends to recur, repeated treatments can maintain existing vision.

Motion For Dismissal

COLLEGE STATION -She was the first woman nominated for president and the first woman to argue before the Supreme Court.

But for decades, no one remembered that Belva Lockwood - a 19th century advocate of equal rights - had been the subject of a ship's figurehead until a Texas A&M University graduate student did some detective work in a Connecticut seafaring museum.

Working with a clue from an old issue of Smithsonian Magazine, Carol Olsen found that a life-size figurehead previously tagged "Unidentified" was a likeness of the feisty New Yorkborn activist and 1884 presidential candidate.

"This demonstrates that unknown figureheads can be identified, even though their history is often lost once they are separated from the ship," said Olsen, executive administrator with the Institute of Nautical Archaeology, a research group affiliated with Texas A&M.





TRERC research shows home buyers make over \$40,000

COLLEGE STATION -Most Texans who purchase a home are young marrieds, have no children and make more than twice the median income for all Texans. That profile of state homebuyers was released by the Texas Real Estate Research Center (TRERC) at Texas A&M University.

Half of the homebuyers made at least \$40,000, compared to the \$19,618 median income for the state as a whole, said Don E. Albrecht, a research scientist for TRERC and the Department of Rural Sociology at Texas A&M. The majority had incomes of more than \$25,000, and nearly twothirds had incomes of \$35,000 or more.
