BRITISH PEER JAILED; POLICE SUSPECT CREW

CHARGE INFORMATION BEING WITHHELD BY 'PERSONS'

COLORFUL AVIATOR IS LATEST FIGURE IN SLAYING

LONG BEACH, Cal., Dec. 9. (AP)-The Captain Walter Wanderwell murder mystery unfolded like a gripping drama today. Grand jury action was threatened, members of the crew of Wanderwell's yacht, Carma, were forbidden to discuss events preceding the slaying, and a scion of British nobility was arrested.

Throughout the development William James Guy, young Welsh soldier of fortune held as a suspect n the killing Monday night of the co'orful globe-trotter, clung to his alibi that he was 30 miles away from the scene of the shooting on the

Investigations were climaxed last light by a charge of Police Lieut. Owen Murphy that "certain persons, for reasons best known to themselves, have been withholding in-formation from the police."

"Unless this attitude is changed, he said. "I will demand a grand jury investigation to determine if a conspiracy exists to cover up evidence. Shortly before this order was is

ued, federal authorities requested police to arrest Lord Edward Eugene Fernando Montagu, second son of the Duke of Manchester, British Peer, and a member of the Carma crew. He was transferred to the Long Beach jail by two detectives, Miller and E. W. Vance, who said they understood Montagu had ove stayed the terms of his visitors permit which allowed him to enter the United States. Meanwhile auhorities located Edward Delarm Guy's chief alibi witness. Delarm was placed in technical custody and detectives began questioning him the Texas Railroad commission, regarding various details of Guy's and H. M. Stalcup, vice-president detectives began questioning him alibi. Manner of Selection Is Told in This Article

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of articles on the manner of selection and duties of grand juries. Wide-spread approval of recent articles on criminal law and procedure in Texas has inspired a continuation of them.)

The grand jury system; wherein a person accused of a crime is en-titled to a review of the evidence by twelve fellow citizens of his county before he goes to trial before twelve other men, is firmly stablished in Texas jurisprudence. Texas statutes throw a protecting of regulations about selection of the grand jury from the time the jury commission is appointed. The law provides that the district judge shall, at each term of district court, appoint three persons to perform the duties of jury commis-sioners, who shall possess the following qualifications. 1. Be intelligent citizens of the county and able to read and write: 2. Be residents of different portions of the county. 3. Be qualified jurors and freeholders of the county; 4. Have no suit in said court which requires the intervention of a jury

Oath Is Required.

COLDEST WEATHER IN TEXAS RECORDED HERE

Progressively colder weather, with a record of 7 degrees above zero yesterday and a steadily falling snow forming a blanket of white over this entire territory this morning.

Railroad employes learned that he snowfall was very general, but that temperatures varied surprisingly by cities and by hours. hazards were developing and car trouble was widespread. Nevertheess, both merchants with winter stocks still on their shelves and farmens with thirsty wheat welcomed the snow.



Texas Lawyers Told To 'Dress' For High Court

AUSTIN, Dec. 8. (P)—First appearances before the United States supreme court are regarded as an "event" in the lives of lawyers. Several of these "events" have been experienced by the young assistants to Attorney General James V. Allred and they usually are the subjects of a great deal of good natured rallying just before they leave for the nation's capital.

They also are given voluminous advice by their fellow workers, ranging from how the cravat should be tied and adjusted to how many inches of shirt cuff should show be-low the coat sleeve. Some of the advice, if followed, undoubtedly would get the advisee into hot water the minute he set foot in the dignfiied chamber of the country's highest tribunal.

One assistant attorney general who had been advised on all sides concerning his conduct, said it was the most free advice he had ever heard given. "All that advice from so much legal talent should have been worth a fortune," he said. Maurice Cheek, who stepped into

Fred Upchruch's shoes as legal advisor to the Railroad commission in oil and gas regulation matters, was the latest member of the attorney general's staff to appear before the supreme court. Cheek, after being deluged with free advance, went to Washington to represent the state in the appeal from the McMillan case, the first suit filed in federal court attacking state proration of oil production.

Attorney General Allred has adopted a rule in the conduct of his department that capital newspapermen would like to see adopted in other departments.

Instructions have been issued to the outer guardians in the attor-ney general's office to give news-papermen the right-of-way into his office at all times. The instruc-tions provide that Allred may be contacted by newspapermen, regardless of the importance of the conference in which the attorney

general may be engaged.

In issuing the instructions, Allred said he realized that news could not wait; that newspapermen usually made their questions short and to the point and didn't ask to see him while he was engaged unless it was something important that need-

ed attention without delay.

The correspondents would saved numerous tedious 'waits if similar rules were adopted by other department heads.

He said his abductors made no attempt to rob him and told him if They prom he said, to park his car in Dallas and leave the claim check at a leading hotel. He was unable to find the check, however.

Rev. Mr. Dudley said he received telephone call from Ardmore at 11 a. m. vesterday from a man who engaged him to perform a marriage ceremony in the afternoon. At 4 p. m., two men came to his home and explained that the ceremony was to take place at Achille, Okla., a short distance from Durant. The three started in Rev. Mr. Dudley's automobile and a short distance, one of the men threatened him with a pistol, compelling him to let one of them drive. They passed through Sherman; Gainesville and Denton en route to Dallas.



Boy Convicted In 'Witchcraft' **Slaying Trial**

VICTORIA, Dec. 8. (A)-Henry Eguia, 16, was convicted by a district court jury today on a charge of murder in connection with the "witcheraft" slaying of Domingo Cisneros, 21, last June and was sentenced to four years in the Gates-ville reformatory.

His father, Manuel Eguia, and an uncle, Alfredo Flore, also charged with murder, will go to trial next

A story of witchcraft was investigated as a possible explanation soon after the slaying of Cisneros. Young Eguia was said to have been subjec to epileptic fits and had gone to a woman fortune teller for advice. She told him that Cisneros had cast a spell over him and he would not killing with sledge hammers

cover from it until he killed him. Sheriff Robert S. Weisiger, who with two state rangers arrested three other men, was told that the fortune teller convinced Eguia and his family that Cisneros' death was necessary

Members of the Cisneros family was questioned as to a possible mo-tive for the slaying and were said to have agreed that witchcraft might have been responsible: They could think of no other explanation.

Cisneros, a 22-year-old nursery-man, was called to the door of his home the night of June 18 and shot to death. Henry Eguia surrendered to officers immediately. Three heavily armed men were reported to have accompanied him to the
