CAGE BATTLE SCHEDULED AT GYM TONIGHT

STRONG PANHANDLE 5 WILL REPLACE SHAMROCK

The Panhandle Panther basketball team will replace the Shamrock Irishmen as the Harvesters' opponents tonight it was learned this afternoon when Shamrock called Coach Odus Mitchell to say that it would be impossible to get the Irishmen here because of the storm. The team girls also cancelled their game with the Pampa girls.

The game will start at 7:30 o'clock and will be followed by a game between the Harvester B team and the Gorillas. Coach Pat Gerald has practically the entire squad of Panthers that went to the district semifinals last spring back this year. The Panhandle quintet won several encounters from the Harvesters last season.

The Harvesters hit an early season stride last Friday when they downed the Clarendon Bronchos. The encounter tonight is expected to be one with a letterman team that fell before the Harvesters by only three points last season.

Coach Odus Mitchell will probably start his regular team of Captain Woodward or Bill Kelley and Marbaugh, forwards; Fullingim, center; Kelley and Patton, guards.

to serve. The sheriff may leave at the prospective juror's place of residence with a member of the latter's household over 18 years of age a written notice to the juror, stating the time and place of the meeting of the grand jurors. A juror legally summoned, who does not report promptly, may be fined as much as \$100. When for some reason no jury list is made out as required by law, the sheriff may be ordered to summon not less than 12 nor more than 16 qualified men. Each prospective juror must be questioned as to his qualifications to serve. When 12 qualified men have been chosen and proved qualified, and none challenged for any cause, the grand jury is ready to take its oath and proceed to its duties.

and squawks and squeaks until he becomes a little pig. Later in life he is a poor fish and a sucker, but often acquires horse-sense. Road hogs flourish, and end-seat hogs obstruct, and the early bird gets the worm. Some peep's look sheepish, act like crawfish, or they grouse and growl, or snap like turtles. Some men are bull-headed; other are cow-licked. Husbands have lived to be mere insects. Occasionally one meets a consummate ass. We have wise old owls and sly old foxes. The eagle-eyed prey upon their fellow men. Sometimes a dirty dog runs amuck. Kangaroo-courts are com-

mon. Codhoppers hop and jay-walkers walk. But most of us get stung without a bee in sight. The female of the species is more deadly than the male. Old maids get cattish, and maids that are not so old, kittenish. Men are sharks, old bears, or wolves in sheep's clothing, and pull the wool over our eyes. Some folks are 100 per cent bull. We honor heroes, and everybody knows some old crab, some dumb cow, or some silly goose. Men are leeches; the wise ones shut up in season like oysters or clams; or, like snails, they draw back into their shells. Every county-seat has its courthouse rats; every town has its chickens and old hens. The whole human world is infested with parasites.

"We develop ephantiasis, horse's neck, Charlie horse, and a whole of a lot of other things. We are land-lubbers and sea-dogs; turtle-doves and otherwise fine birds, such as lame ducks or early birds. We are dark horses, hunks of cheese, little shrimps, and mites, so often wiggle out of things. We do the goose-step, the turkey-trot, and the camel-walk while we get a hump on ourselves. We have our bear-cast, ham-actors, and jack-leg lawyers. We sing like canaries, laugh like hyenas, grin like Cheshire cats, shed crocodile tears and hound and buffalo one another. We are stubborn as mules, slick as eels, but often have to pony up. We are the biggest toad in the puddle or the smallest tadpole in the pond. We make 'em pigeon-toed, walrus-toothed, pug-nosed, monkey-faced, chicken-hearted, and cock-eyed; and all of us are more or less cuckoo. Finally, we sing our swan song and croak. Now, isn't the science of words just wonderful?"

Texas Lawyers Told To 'Dress' For High Court

AUSTIN, Dec. 8. (AP)—First appearances before the United States supreme court are regarded as an "event" in the lives of lawyers.

Several of these "events" have been experienced by the young assistants to Attorney General James V. Allred and they usually are the subjects of a great deal of good natured rallying just before they leave for the nation's capital.

They also are given voluminous advice by their fellow workers, ranging from how the cravat should be tied and adjusted to how many inches of shirt cuff should show below the coat sleeves. Some of the advice, if followed, undoubtedly would get the advisee into hot water the minute he set foot in the dignified chamber of the country's highest tribunal.

One assistant attorney general, who had been advised on all sides concerning his conduct, said it was the most free advice he had ever heard given. "All that advice from so much legal talent should have been worth a fortune," he said.

Maurice Cheek, who stepped into Fred Upchurch's shoes as legal advisor to the Railroad commission in oil and gas regulation matters, was the latest member of the attorney general's staff to appear before the supreme court. Cheek, after being deluged with free advance, went to Washington to represent the state in the appeal from the McMillan case, the first suit filed in federal court attacking state proration of oil production.

Attorney General Allred has adopted a rule in the conduct of his department that capital newspapermen would like to see adopted in other departments.

Instructions have been issued to the outer guardians in the attorney general's office to give newspapermen the right-of-way into his office at all times. The instructions provide Allred may be contacted by newspapermen, regardless of the importance of the conference in which the attorney general may be engaged.

In issuing the instructions, Allred said he realized that news could not wait; that newspapermen usually made their questions short and to the point and didn't ask to see him while he was engaged unless it was something important that needed attention without delay.

The correspondents would be saved numerous tedious waits if similar rules were adopted by other department heads.

Pastor Kidnaped And Car Stolen

DALLAS, Dec. 8. (AP)—The Rev. Forest E. Dudley, pastor of the First Methodist church of Durant, Okla., one of several "Gretina Greens" along the Texas-Oklahoma border, reported to police here last night that two men who engaged him to perform a marriage ceremony kidnaped him, instead, and drove him to a point eight miles north of Dallas, where they put him out of his car.

The minister said he walked to the outskirts of the city and boarded a street car. He walked into detective headquarters and reported the affair shortly before midnight.

He said his abductors made no attempt to rob him and told him if he offered no resistance, no harm would come to him. They promised, he said, to park his car in Dallas and leave the claim check at a leading hotel. He was unable to find the check, however.

Rev. Mr. Dudley said he received a telephone call from Ardmore at 11 a. m. yesterday from a man who engaged him to perform a marriage ceremony in the afternoon. At 4 p. m., two men came to his home and explained that the ceremony was to take place at Achille, Okla., a short distance from Durant. The three started in Rev. Mr. Dudley's automobile and a short distance, one of the men threatened him with a pistol, compelling him to let one of them drive. They passed through Sherman, Gainesville and Denton en route to Dallas.

Widow Protests Good's Furlough

SAN ANTONIO, Dec. 8. (AP)—Protest against the 90-day furlough granted Mildred Good by Governor Ross S. Sterling on recommendation of the board of pardons, was made Thursday to the board of pardons by Mrs. Martha P. Roberson, superintendent of the medical and surgical hospital and widow of E. L. Roberson, cattle inspector, for whose slaying Good was convicted.

Roberson and W. D. Allison, another inspector were slain while investigating reported cattle thefts. The furlough was granted to enable Good to support her wife and eight children during the winter, according to reports from Austin. Mrs. Roberson sent her protest to the state board of pardons and paroles.

Mayor Fines Son Double-Parking

AMARILLO, Dec. 8. (AP)—Joe Rogers, 15-year-old son of Mayor Ross D. Rogers, pleaded a double-parking charge before the mayor—and lost. Joe, a carrier for the Amarillo News and Globe, double-parked in front of an office building "to see one of my customers a minute." An officer gave him a ticket.

AMARILLO, Dec. 9. (P)—At least one of Potter county's two "forgotten men" literally was forgotten. With the second, it was a case of the officers looking for "a couple of other fellows."

That was the opinion of District Attorney Edward W. Thomerson today after the grand jury had investigated the cases of two negroes, Oscar Odell James and Jimmy Ross, who were held in jail 100 days for chicken theft before given an opportunity to answer to the state's charges.

Thomerson said that through an error in the district clerk's office the indictment which was returned by the sheriff's office read, "Oscar Odell James and Jimmy Ross," Sheriff Bill Thompson said he searched his jail looking for three negroes named in the indictment, always looking for the man named Odell which headed the copies.

Miss Maurine Nesbitt, clerk of the sheriff's office, said the men really were not forgotten 100 days—that she found Ross on the 6th day, after looking for him two weeks.

The men pleaded guilty and were given two-year suspended sentences.

Sport Slants

Ernie Smith, Southern California giant tackle who has the united backing of the coast contingent for All-America honors, "is a senior, taking an economics major and a product of Gardena high," according to our Mr. Paul Zimmerman, who adds:

"He plays in a dance orchestra to earn money for his college course, being a trombone player of considerable merit; just missed being a jazz singer, frequently gets down the field a tackle under his own kick and is the biggest man on Trojans' squad, standing 6 feet 3 inches and weighing 215."

Captain Johnny Vaught, Texas Christian guard, and Harrison Stafford, University of Texas halfback, have captured the eye of the Southwest critics, who nominate both for the All-America scramble. On a team that was whipped by two touchdowns against T. C. U. Stafford stood out as a blocker, runner and pass-snagger. Vaught and Madison Pruitt, at the most powerful lines in the entire country. At full strength the Texas Christian forwards did not yield a touchdown in nine games and the team had only 17 points scored against it altogether.

Many Great Linemen.

Generally the ball-toters are first to be heard about our Rocky Mountain scouts nominate Guy Martin, 200-pound Colorado college guard, for first consideration, along with Captain Frank Christensen, 190-pound University of Utah fullback.

Martin, besides his fine defensive work, was the principal offensive factor in three upset victories accounted for by the Tigers, due to his ability as a punter, his goal kicking, Christensen, a real triple threat, and Jack Johnson, steer-wrestler and tackle, are the key men in the championship Utah outfit.

"There is one boy that a great many writers are missing," writes Major Ralph Sasse, Army's head coach, "Next to King of the Army I believe he is the best end we have seen play in a long time, namely, Myers of North Dakota State. So often I feel that some of the outstanding institutions are being neglected and I know, or believe I know, an end when I see one."

He has two of the qualities that made Weir great, the ability to size up the play and know where it was coming and the speed to shift to meet it and break it up. Weighing 185 pounds, and 6 feet 1 inch tall he has all the power and speed for the ideal lineman."

Almost single-handed he tied Vanderbilt and beat Tech, Kentucky and South Carolina. His marvelous ball-carrying did it. He is the super-back of all times in Dixie."

Graham McNamee, world-famous radio announcer and the screen's talking reporter, interestingly describes the races and other events of the affair and explains some of the odd vehicles on view.

The reunion is held in Central park and this year's party brings out a large quota of old high-wheelers, a trip to a twin-seater, or Eccobike, as well as a number of tandems, including the first one built, which inspired the song indicated to "Daisy" of the Gay Nineties. One of the oddities shown is a big-wheeler pedaled by a ratchet device, the rider pumping a few inches up and down with his feet. Captain Robert Morrison, leading exponent of the ancient-vintage bike, has won a breast-load of medals by his prowess over the handlebars.

McNamee reports many other interesting and important events, including the dedication of a huge memorial to Kitty Hawk, N. C., to the Wright Brothers, commemorating their famous pioneering hop in a power-driven airplane 29 years ago; the impressive Armistice Day ceremonies in London headed by King George, and at the Arc de Triomphe in Paris; Al Capone's three-hour taste of freedom from the Atlanta Federal Prison during a court hearing; the highlights of the Yale-Harvard game; the raising of a scattering colony in Shanghai, China; the mussy inter-class fight with sacks of flour and soft tomatoes between the freshmen and sophomores of Long Island university in Brooklyn, and a novel method of teaching the shapes and names of vegetables by means of large paper mache models used in a school in Hawthorne, Cal.

Amarillo Ducks Quacked Way To Victory In 1904

AMARILLO, Dec. 9. (P)—A squad of 11 men with 10 uniforms—no two alike—known as the Amarillo Ducks, set a football record back in 1904 that present day high school teams, with their squads and expensive equipment, may still shoot at.

They played a 14-game schedule and were undefeated and untied. Every man played in every game. There were no substitutes, hence no substitutions. There were no waterboys, managers or scouts, and the coach frequently was not allowed to play.

The coach of the 1904 Amarillo Ducks was Bascom N. Timmons, now president of the National Press club at Washington. Only two of the squad still live in Amarillo, Bap Gernell, fullback, who tossed a pass for 75 yards for the final touchdown of the season, is a Santa Fe employe and George Calvert, left guard, is farming near this city.

Calvert said when one of the players had to take time out, the game proceeded without him, the injured player falling by the wayside until he was able to resume play. The referee, the only official, did not have a whistle. The play continued until the referee could find the ball and get it out into the open again.

Less than 100 fans usually attended the games, although the grandstand, which seated 1,400, men and women sat on opposite sides of the field. There were no pep squads or bands, and the Amarillo fans knew only one yell:

"Yellow and black, yellow and black, Amarillo Ducks go quack, quack, quack."

Black and gold are still the high school colors, but the name of the team has been changed to the Golden Sandies. The old team got its name because when not playing football, they invariably could be found swimming in a lake near town.

Leaders Cautious But Optimistic In Business Forecast

CHICAGO, Dec. 9.—An optimism savored somewhat with caution predominated today in opinions of a group of Chicago area business, financial and labor captains, as to general business prospects for 1933.

Boy Convicted In Witchcraft Slaying Trial

VICTORIA, Dec. 8. (AP)—Henry Egua, 16, was convicted by a district court jury today on a charge of murder in connection with the "witchcraft" slaying of Domingo Cisneros, 21, last June and was sentenced to four years in the Gatesville reformatory.

His father, Manuel Egua, and an uncle, Alfredo Flore, also charged with murder, will go to trial next week.

A story of witchcraft was investigated as a possible explanation soon after the slaying of Cisneros. Young Egua was said to have been subject to epileptic fits and had gone to a woman fortune teller for advice. She told him that Cisneros had cast a spell over him and he would not

recover from it until he killed him. Sheriff Robert S. Weisiger, who with two state rangers arrested three other men, was told that the fortune teller convinced Egua and his family that Cisneros' death was necessary.

Members of the Cisneros family was questioned as to a possible motive for the slaying and were said to have agreed that witchcraft might have been responsible. They could think of no other explanation.

Cisneros, a 22-year-old nurseryman, was called to the door of his home the night of June 18 and shot to death. Henry Egua surrendered to officers immediately. Three heavily armed men were reported to have accompanied him to the Cisneros home.

New Oil Order Is Being Issued Here

A new production schedule for the Panhandle field is being prepared at the local office of the oil and gas division of the Texas Railroad commission in compliance with an order issued by the commission yesterday setting the Panhandle allowable at 43,500 barrels daily. A schedule was set last week naming the allowable 45,000 barrels.

The new allowable will become effective at 7 a. m. Saturday. The change was decided following a state-wide hearing in Austin last week when nominations for the various fields were received. Production in practically every field in the state will be reduced under the

new ruling. A hearing to study ratable taking will be held in Amarillo Monday with members of the Railroad commission in attendance.

AIR RATE DOUBLED
LAREDO, Dec. 9. (AP)—Airmail rates in Mexico were nearly doubled beginning December 1, according to official announcement made by the Laredo postoffice. The rate which was formerly the same as in the United States, has been hiked to 10 cents American money for each half ounce, or 20 cents per ounce. These high rates are expected to materially decrease airmail shipments being made into Mexico, which at this time is trying to put its airmail service on a paying basis.

Rev. Doss Uses Revival as His Sermon Subject

The Rev. Thomas J. Doss, who is conducting a meeting at the Central Baptist church, spoke Wednesday to a large congregation on the subject, "The Need of a Revival and How to Have It."
