Pampa grocers are urged not to give change to unemployed men receiving grocery vouchers as part pay for work done on the city streets. The men given work thru the relief fund available here are paid two-thirds of their wage in cash and the rest in grocery vouchers which are redeemed by the re-

Several men have been purchasing grocries and asking for change, which is against the rules of the relief program. If the practice continues, the offenders will be cut from the list and not given any more work, Charlie Mullen said this morning.

Every man paid with a voucher slip needs more groceries than the amount on the slip. Grocers re-port that the majority of the men buy more than the amount provided by the voucher. Fifty men are working today, nauling caliche and cleaning streets

DEMO CAUCUS DECIDES TO LET COMMITTEE PASS ON BILL

23 TO POSTPONE **CONSIDERATION** 

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (A)-The senate refused to take up beer legislation today. It rejected ed a move by Senator Bingham (R., Conn.), almed to get immediate consideration for the 3.2 beer bill passed by the house. The vote was 23 to 48.

The democratic organization op-posed Bingham's attempt on the ground that regular procedure of study by committee was desired. The vote was decisively against the tall Connecticut opponent of the prohibition laws, although but a few minutes before he had de-clared if the measure went to the judiciary and finance committee for study and hearings, "it will just

drag along."

"If it gets back here by the middle of February we'll be lucky," he said, adding that he felt the bill "couldn't be got through before

With the remark, "I see nothing to be gained by having hearings," Bingham contended sufficient evidence had been gathered during the past year by various house and senate committees that had studied

The senators voted on non-partisan lines. The vote was not considered by the senate leaders as a test on the beer issue, because many senators on both sides of the aisle insisted the beer bill should take the normal course of committee action.

One of the strangest little sidelights on modern times that has ever been disclosed is one that came to the surface in Chicago not long ago.

Not far from Chicago there is a little farm, occupied by a man who came over from Russia 30 years ago. bringing with him his family and a whole set of superstitions that stem in an unbroken line directly from the

Members of the family had never seen a movie, heard a radio, ridden in an auto or a street car or seen a sky-They were isolated from the modern world as effectively as if they lived in an unapproachable village in the middle of Siberia. Modern life has deposited them almost within shouting distance of Chicago, but in all essentials it had completely passed them by.

Existence of this odd family became known when a daughter, 23, went to a neighbor, protesting that she had brought a curse on her family. A pigeon had circled over her head, it seemed; a portentously evil omen. Then a cow had died, a horse had taken sick, and finally her father had lost his lease on the farm. And when the father went to the police to get his girl back the whole story came out.

That there are backwaters like this in the very center of civilization is a fact well known to sociologistsand it might be added, to policemen, welfare workers and newspaper reporters. The flood tide of human enlightenment has risen unevenly; here and there it has left peculiar islands, lost in dense swamps of ignorance, and every so often some little thing happens to bring these places to our attention—this event in Chicago, for instance, a "hex" murder in Pennsylvania, for something

And such events give us a deeply uneasy feeling. We feel as if we must paraphrase Lincoln's famous rtmark; the nation cannot endure half civilized and half igno-



AUSTIN, Dec. 23 (A)—A few more weeks and Governor R. S. Sterling will return to private life after two years as chief executive of Texas. He will be the only Texas governor, save Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, who was not returned for a econd term. Mrs. Ferguson will succeed Governor Sterling this time, for her second term after a lapse

Governor Sterling never has announced his plans for the future, but his freinds expect him to return to Houston to make his home. He probably will not interest himself in politics again, although he has not publicly renounced the fickle game. It is believed likely Governor Sterling will leave the gubernatorial office, probably a few days before Mrs. Ferguson's inauguration, by resignation in order to escape festivities incident to induction of his sor. It is said it would be in the inauguration after the enmity that has existed between him and Mrs. Ferguson and her husband,

James E. Ferguson.
Should he resign it would be Lieut. Governor Witt's first chance to sit in the executive chair. During the lieutenant governor's tenure the governor has not absented himself from the state to give him occasion to take the reins of government Witt was re-elected, however, and it may be Mrs. Ferguson will give him an opportunity to be acting governor.



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AUSTIN, Dec. 23. (P) — Two "country. boys" have locked horns for the speakership of the Texas house of representatives in the 43rd legislature convening on January

Both of them-Coke Stevenson of Junction and A. P. Johnson of Carrizo Springs—come from almost the same "neck o' the woods." Stevenson's county of Kimble, in the Hill county of central-west Texas, is only a few counties removed from Johnson's county of Dimmit down in the wilder government. Dimmit, down in the winter garden district of Southwest Texas.

It is a point interesting, if not somewhat puzzling, that the big town legislators have been steering clear of the speakership for

Fred Minor, speaker of the 42nd legislature, lives in Denton, considered in the "small town" class. before him there was W. S. Barron of Bryan. Robert Lee Bobbitt of Laredo was Barron's predecessor. There are several veteran mem-bers of the house from the big cities, but they never have shown an ambition to be the presiding officer of that body.

Stevenson and Johnson each claims enough votes pledged by the new house to "get over." There will be about eight-five members who were not in the last legislature. It has been a scramble between the two candidates for favor from these novices. The hold-overs had been pretty well lined up in advance.

#### Starting 'New Deal'

This sort of a shift of leadership always occurs in some degree when a change of administrations is in the offing, but it has been accelerated this time by special circum-

stances.

While Mr. Hoover himself has shown a disposition to carry on with a militant republican program right up to inauguration day, the spirit of his former supporters in congress is badly broken. The whole disposition is to postpone reorganization of the repub ican party until after March 4, and to leave it largely in the hands of those who then will remain in of-
