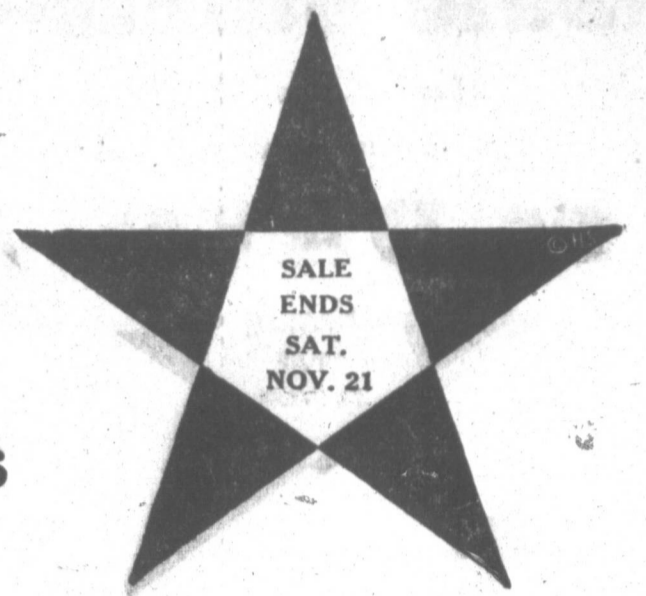

Chinese Troops To Seek Release Of Missionary

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—The government of the Chinese province of Kiangsu has ordered troops to undertake at once the rescue of J. D. Vinson, American missionary of Lexington, Va., captured by Chinese bandits Sunday.

HOUSTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—Efforts of the state department at Washington to obtain release of Rev. J. W. Vinson, Presbyterian missionary captured by bandits near his mission at Hanchow, China, Sunday, had proved unavailing today, according to the missionary's brother, William A. Vinson, Houston attorney.

Judge Vinson said he received a telegram from Senator Morris Shepherd, promising to aid in efforts to effect his brother's release. W. P. Feck, consul at Nanking, has been instructed to treat with the captors.

Rev. Mr. Vinson was graduated from Austin college at Sherman about 30 years ago. He continued his studies at the Union Theological seminary at Richmond, Va.

Another brother of the missionary is Dr. Robert E. Vinson, one-time president of the University of Texas and now president of Western Reserve University at Cleveland.

Woman Juror To Face Prosecution

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 4. (AP)—Contempt of court proceedings were instituted today against Mrs. Genevieve A. Clark who two weeks ago insisted on acquittal and deadlocking the jury of which she was the only woman member in the trial of W. E. Foshay and six associates on mail fraud charges.

Judge Gunnar H. Nordby suggested an order requiring Mrs. Clark to appear in federal court Monday to show cause why she should not be held in contempt on grounds she once was in the employ of Foshay, had made up her mind before the trial to vote for acquittal and had perjured herself to get on the jury.

At the trial, Mrs. Clark, a small, slender woman, wearing middle age, held out alone against the 15 men who served with her. The jury finally was dismissed after deliberating a few hours more than a week and a new trial of the promoter and his associates ordered for Jan. 11.

"Cow War" Front Will Be Moved

BURLINGTON, Ia., Nov. 4. (AP)—National Guardsmen may have to move to a new sector in the Iowa "cow war."

Sheriff Harry V. Maas said today he had asked Gov. Dan Turner for troops to help enforce the state bovine tuberculosis test law in Lee county after refusal of farmers to permit veterinarians to inoculate cattle on the farm of Frank Poeding.

The veterinarians, headed by Dr. Peter Malcolm, chief of the campaign, found gates to the Bogdell home barred. A throng of farmers confronted them and one tire on an official's automobile was cut, another deflated and a trunk on it smashed, the testers said.

Dr. Malcolm said he believed troops would be necessary for the Lee county campaign.

Testing in Des Moines county, where troops stationed, continued without opposition.

East Texans Tell Sterling Oil Plan To Bring Chaos

AUSTIN, Nov. 4. (AP)—A large delegation of operators in the East Texas oil field told Gov. Ross S. Sterling today "chaos, jealousy and suspicion" would replace the present satisfied demeanor of that field should the existing per well method of prorating production be replaced with a proposed acreage basis plan.

Myron Blaisdell, head of the protestants, said those who appeared in the group were unanimously of a belief the new plan was not a "conservation measure" and was unfair to the little operator.

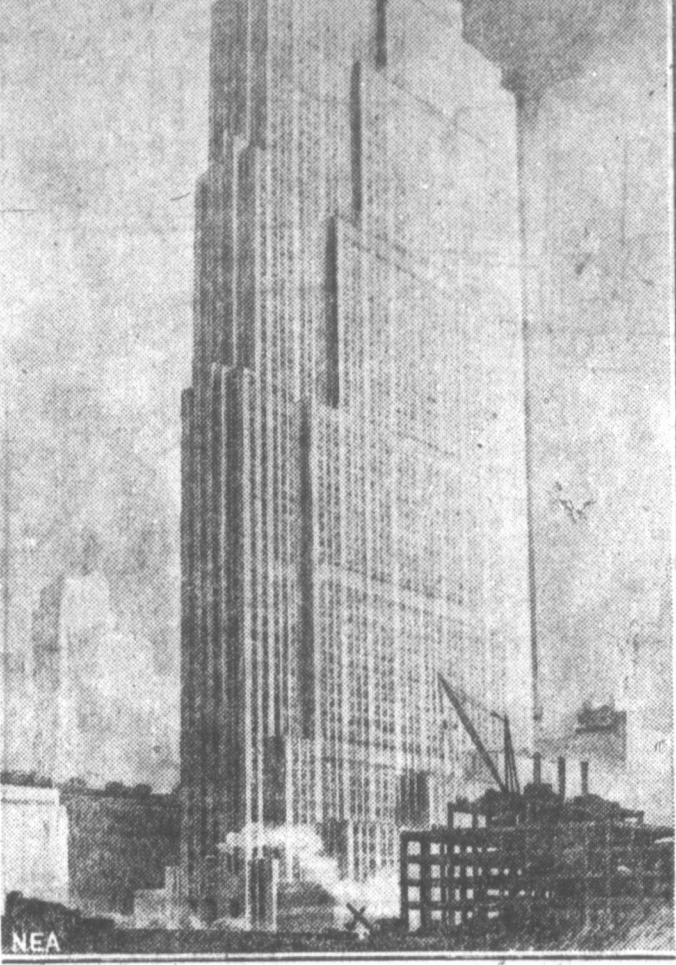
The acreage plan of prorating would set an allowance of four barrels per acre for the entire area but the minimum production for any one well would be 61 barrels daily and would range upward to a maximum of 400 barrels, allowed a 100-acre tract. The operator on a one acre or less area would be permitted to withdraw 61 barrels and this would increase one barrel per acre up to a 20 acre unit tract.

When the plan was submitted to Governor Sterling last week by Charles F. Roesser of Fort Worth, president of the Texas Oil and Gas Conservation association, and a committee representing a mass meeting of operators which evolved the idea, the chief executive expressed tentative approval of it.

It would replace the present 150-barrel per well allowable being enforced under martial law in the field.

How Radio Building Will Look



Here's an advance view of what is to be the world's largest building—the 66-story central unit of New York's Radio City for which contracts in excess of \$50,000,000 have just been let. Three square blocks of property in mid-town Manhattan have been cleared for the huge project, and work soon is to start on the structure pictured above and on an international music hall and a motion picture theater. The office building, which will contain nearly 600,000 square feet of floor space more than the Empire State building, is to house the National Broadcasting company, the Radio Corporation of America, and 27 broadcasting studios.

JAPAN DEMANDS THAT CHINA RECOGNIZE TREATY OF 1915 —EXTENDS MILITARY SCOPE

TOKYO, Nov. 4. (AP)—While its troops moved farther into Manchuria and encountered Chinese machine guns in one instance, the Japanese government tonight began drafting a note to the League of Nations insisting that China recognize the validity of treaties under which Japan operates in the Chinese territory.

The Japanese note will be in reply to that of Aristide Briand, acting president of the League council, setting forth his views regarding the five fundamental principles to which the Tokyo government previously had asked China to subscribe as a prerequisite to the withdrawal of Japanese troops from the Manchurian occupied area.

Tokyo will contend that one essential point must be China's recognition of the 1915 treaty under which Japan was given certain rights in Chinese territory.

China contends that this treaty, originating out of the "twenty-one demands," was signed by the Chinese under duress and therefore illegal. Japan maintains the treaty was legitimate and binding and as nearly perfect as numerous others now in effect.

It was understood here that Briand had suggested Japan should refer to the Chinese proposal to refer existing Sino-Japanese treaties to the Hague for adjudication. This Tokyo considers improper and unfair.

The reply to the Briand note will be in the nature of restatement of Japan's attitude emphasizing that a fundamental solution of Sino-Japanese difficulties hinges on Chinese recognition of the 1915 pact.

The note also will say that unless China recognizes and lives up to the terms of that treaty, normal relations between the two nations cannot be enjoyed.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—Possible further action by the American government in the Manchurian situation hinged today on confidential reports to Secretary Stimson from George Hanson, consul-general at Harbin.

Hanson for several days has been gathering first-hand information in the northern area where Japanese troops have been reported moving nearer the Siberian border. The State department officials look on the matter as extremely delicate and are following developments as closely as they did the earlier Sino-Japanese phases in Southern and Central Manchuria.

Gale In Isles Is Very Damaging

LONDON, Nov. 4. (AP)—A toll of at least one life and widespread damage to property was taken by a gale, the first storm of Autumn, which has been sweeping the British Isles for the last 24 hours.

The gale reached a velocity of 75 miles an hour in some places and was still moving along, today although its force was somewhat diminished. Property damage occurred both along the coast and inland. The high wind uprooted trees levelled chimneys, blew down wires and demoralized coastwise shipping. Several districts in Wales were flooded by overflowing rivers and houses on the outskirts of Cardiff stood in water three feet deep.

Will Rogers To Speak Tonight On Rockne Drive

SAN ANTONIO, Nov. 4. (AP)—Will Rogers, who arrived here yesterday by air from Mexico City, will speak tonight at 9 o'clock over station WAOI and the National Broadcasting chain on the Knute Rockne memorial program.

He will be picked up by the chain here, following such speakers as Mayor James Walker of New York, Mayor Anthony Cermak of Chicago, Al Smith, and other nationally known figures including Slip Madigan, football coach at St. Mary's university in California; Chick Meehan, coach of New York university and the Four Horsemen of Notre Dame.

Democrats Will Hold Pursestrings Of U. S. Treasury

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—Democratic control of the house—fashed by yesterday's election—puts the party in charge of the federal pocketbook.

The constitution dictates that all revenue measures must originate in the house. This would give the Democrats full responsibility over tax legislation and consideration of the war debts and one year moratorium. They also would get the whiphand over appropriations.

Republicans still have nominal control of the senate but President Hoover must wind up his four-year term with the opposition in control of congress or at least on even terms.

It is the first time such a situation has existed since the Republicans captured congress in 1918 for the last two years of President Wilson's term.

The veteran representative John Garner of Texas is expected to dictate the Democratic policy in the house on the vital revenue program should his party get power. While he would be elected speaker under a Democratic regime, he still would keep a close eye on the ways and means committee of which he is now ranking member.

Enid Will Seek New Gas Service

ENID, Okla., Nov. 4. (AP)—The Enid city commission voted unanimously today to seek another gas supply for Enid under a new franchise at a consumers' rate not to exceed 35 cents per 1,000 feet.

The action followed a report by the Oklahoma Natural Gas corporation, present distributor, that it was unable to break a contract with the Consolidated Gas company, to supply gas at a gate rate of 20 cents per thousand.

Baker P.-T. A. Has Large Membership

One hundred twenty persons are now included in the membership of the Baker Parent-Teacher association, according to announcement of officials this morning.

The organization has just closed a membership drive, and the losing team is to serve refreshments at a meeting tomorrow afternoon at the school.

Vindication in the face of charges developed in the legislative investigation of city affairs. Twelve new supreme court justices, divided between five Republican and seven Democratic nominees in a bi-partisan agreement, were elected.

The city manager plan which has been in effect in Cleveland for eight years apparently was rescinded.

Mayor Frank Murphy was re-elected in Detroit.

Results of the contest for governor in Kentucky, where William B. Harrison, Republican, and Judge Ruby Laffoon, Democrat, were opposed, will not be known until after the counting of ballots which begins today.

Local elections were held in several other states but aroused little interest outside the communities affected.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4. (AP)—A clean sweep was scored by the anti-prohibitionists in yesterday's five congressional elections.

All the new representatives-elect are for out and out repeal of the eighteenth amendment or modification.

The two Republicans elected, Edward L. Stokes, of the second Pennsylvania, and John B. Hollister, of the first Ohio, are for repeal. Stokes wants light wines and beer until the amendment is removed from the constitution.

Michael J. Hart, the Democrat, who was victorious over his dry Republican opponent in the eighth Michigan district, is a modificationist.

Two other Democrats, Martin L. Sweeney, elected to the twentieth Ohio, and Joseph Delaney, seventh New York, also are anti-prohibitionists.

Wets Number 150
The wet bloc in the house now claims about 150 in its group. Three years ago it had less than seventy members.

Unless the congressional situation changes again in the short time between now and the first Monday in December, when matters start up on Capitol Hill, it practically assures that President Hoover will have during the remainder of his term a politically hostile house.

Also, it foreshadows the election as speaker of Representative Garner of Texas, and designation of southern Democrats to chairmanships of many powerful committees.

The lineup now is Democrats 247; Republicans 215; farmer-laborite one; vacancies two.

There are one million children with weak hearts, 375,000 with organic heart diseases, more than 300,000 cripples of whom 100,000 need special training, and one million school children with defective speech, of which number less than 60,000 are receiving any attention for the defects."

PANHANDLE PRORATION IS NOW BEING ADMINISTERED

J. M. McDonald Has Enlarged Staff—Order Is Given in Matter Below.

Administration of the new Panhandle proration by the local railroad commission staff headed by J. M. McDonald is under way. An enlarged personnel is in charge.

The order, based on the hearing in Amarillo of Oct. 3, and intended to eliminating waste of oil and gas, is as follows:

"IT IS, THEREFORE, ORDERED by the Railroad Commission of Texas that all conservation rules and regulations heretofore adopted and now in force for general application shall continue to apply to the Panhandle district of Texas, as hereinabove defined, and shall be observed and enforced. Where such general rules are in conflict with rules for said district promulgated by this commission in compliance with, and enforcement of, the provisions of the conservation laws and the common purchased act (acts forty-second, legislature, first called session, page 58), the latter rule shall prevail. In addition to said general rules and until changed by order of this commission, the following rules shall be effective in said district as of 7 a. m., Nov. 1, 1931.

"RULE 1. The following definitions and procedures are prescribed: a. By 'individual leases' and/or 'individual producing properties' are meant those leases and/or properties heretofore treated by their respective owner operators and others as individual units and those leases and/or properties that may hereafter be acquired by their respective owner operators as individual units in accordance with common usage and custom in the oil and gas industry.

"b. The 'daily potential production of a well' and a lease and/or properties is the amount of oil said well and said lease and/or properties is capable of producing during a period of twenty-four (24) hours if pumped or if operated naturally under the usual methods. The daily potential production of wells shall be determined by gauges or other physical tests carried out and conducted by the Deputy Supervisor of this commission at such times and for such periods and in such manner as in his judgment and the judgment of this commission will insure a just and fair determination of such potentials. All stock tanks shall be kept under seal by gaugers during tests. The daily potential production of the field shall be the aggregate daily potential production of all wells therein, and the daily potential production of the district shall be the aggregate of the daily potential production of all wells in all fields in said district.

"c. Each semi-monthly period of the calendar month, beginning at 7 a. m., on the first day of the month and extending to 7 a. m. on the 16th day of the month, and beginning at 7 a. m. on the 16th day of the month and extending to 7 a. m. on the first day of the succeeding month, shall be taken as the 'allocation or production periods' and at the end of such period the Deputy Supervisor, after first determining the facts, shall prepare data and schedule upon which to base the allocation of production period."

"RULE 2. Until changed by subsequent order of this commission not more than fifty-five thousand (55,000) barrels of oil per day shall be produced from the Panhandle district during any day these rules are effective; the commission being of the opinion that a daily production of oil at this time in excess of fifty-five thousand (55,000) barrels will create waste.

"RULE 3. The daily amount of oil to be produced from each individual lease and/or property shall be determined by multiplying the total daily allowable production from the district, as fixed under the provisions of Rule 2 hereof, by

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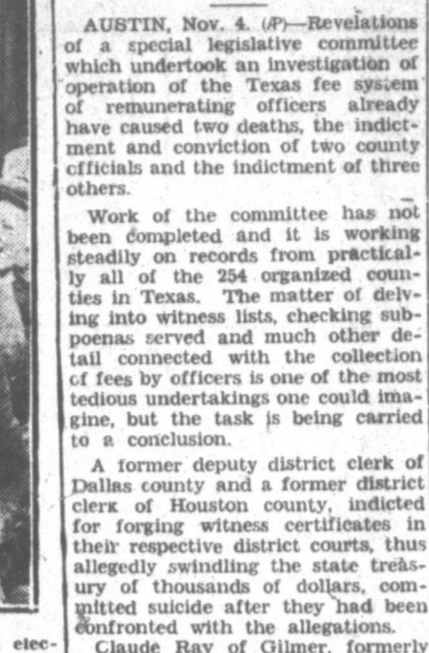

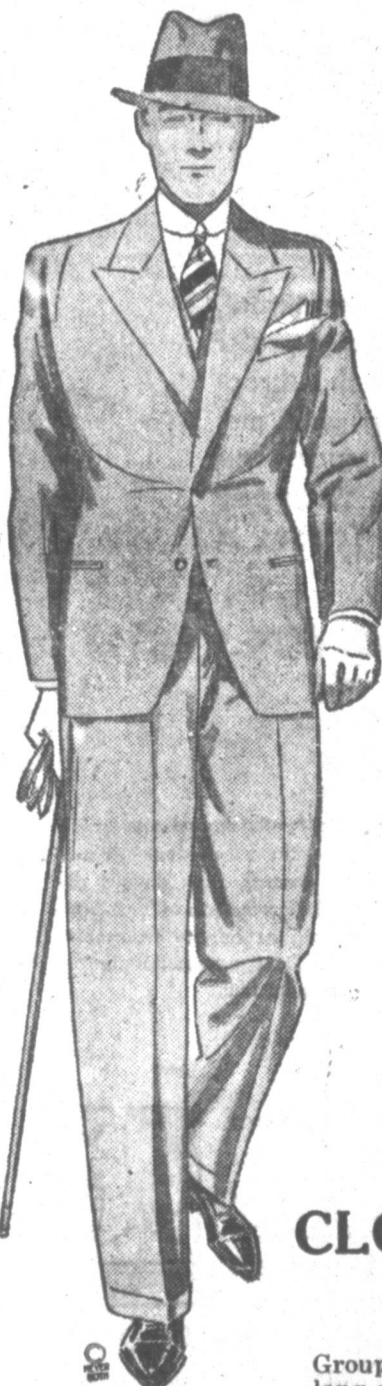

Colonel Thompson Pledges His Support to Governor Sterling

AMARILLO, Nov. 4. (AP)—Mayor Ernest O. Thompson of Amarillo, frequently mentioned as a probable candidate for governor of Texas, has eliminated himself from the campaign of 1932.

In a letter addressed to Gov. Ross Sterling and made public today, Colonel Thompson pledged his support to the re-election of Governor Sterling.

"Some months ago," the letter reads, "an article appeared in The Dallas News saying that I was a vowed candidate for governor. I promptly wrote you that such was not the case and that I would support you in my feeble way for a second term.

"Lately some good newspapers have kindly referred to me in the latter of being a probable candidate for the governor's office next year. That is mighty nice of them, and, of course, I would be a strange person not to be appreciative. But I am of the same mind as when I wrote to you before on this subject.

"I will gladly support you for re-election to a second term."

The letter was dated October 16, making its public. Colonel Thompson stated that he hoped to seek "rumors that might be injurious." His name had been mentioned frequently in news and editorial columns of newspapers throughout the state within the last year, with reference to the governor's chair. Amarillo newspapers recently predicted that if Mayor Thompson could campaign on a utility rate issue, a Panhandle man would be elected in the governor's chair for the first time. The prediction was based on the record he has made in reducing every utility rate in Amarillo.

If Governor Sterling does not seek re-election, Colonel Thompson is not committed himself by the letter. He stated in releasing the letter, however, that he had no intention of being a candidate.

"I consider the governor's office the greatest honor in Texas," he said. "But I have not planned to be a candidate. I believe I can better serve my own people by staying in Amarillo."

Allred Family Is Strong For Law

LONGVIEW, Nov. 4. (AP)—When Judge W. C. Hurst convened the hundred and twenty-fourth district court here recently and a man took the post of court reporter, a newspaperman became anxious enough to inquire into his background and ran across a whole family of legal talent—the Allred family.

The reporter was Mrs. Ben Allred, who was alternating for her husband, Ben Allred, who could not be present. Both Mr. and Mrs. Allred are attorneys and both are court reporters. He is a brother of Attorney General James V. Allred.

There are five brothers in the family. All of them are lawyers and four of them at one time or another has been a prosecuting attorney.

In the same court with Mrs. Ben Allred was her brother-in-law, the Allred, attorney of Henderson, with whom she took the bar examination at the same time. The Allred family maintained office in Longview during the busy days of oil activity, while also having one at Henderson.

Besides the court reporter, the attorney, and the attorney general, there are two other brothers—Ray Allred, prosecuting attorney of Pampa, Texas, and O. Allred, Fort Worth attorney.

The Allred boys did not come from a long line of lawyers. Their father is a retired rural mail carrier. In addition to having been a court reporter, they have all been newspaper reporters.

Stops are planned at Miami, Fla., and some Peruvian City is selected later. They hope to better the present record time of five and one-half days for the hop.

National Horse Show Will Open

NEW YORK, Nov. 4. (AP)—With an attendance drawn from the leaders of Metropolitan society, the National Horse show opens in Madison Square Garden tomorrow.

For one week the huge fight palace will be converted into a brilliantly decorated stable and arena for the pick of show horses and jumpers from the United States, Canada, Great Britain, France, and the Irish Free State. Awards aggregating \$100,000 in cash and trophies have attracted and entry list of horses valued at more than \$1,000,000.

The show will reach its peak on the final two nights when military teams from five countries contest over the difficult jumps for the coveted international military trophies. The countries will compete for the team award Tuesday night and the individual trophy on the closing night of the show.

The French officers, winners of the first international military trophy in 1925, are back for the first time in several years while Great Britain makes its initial appearance since pre-war days. Canada and the Irish Free State complete the invading forces.

Led by Maj. Harry D. Chamberlain, the United States army team will attempt to break the jinx which annually shoved it back into second or third place.

The yield of wheat is estimated at 3,900,000 kilos, that of corn at 6,000,000 kilos and that of alfalfa at 100,000 tons, with good production of beans and potatoes.

Abilene Airport To Be Surfaced

ABILENE, Nov. 4. (AP)—Abilene's municipal airport, recognized now as one of the best fair-weather ports in the state, soon is to be an all-weather port, as the result of a decision by the city commission to construct hard-surfaced runways.

The action followed the recent heavy rains here, which made landing on the sod runways too hazardous for the heavy tri-motor equipment of the American Airways, Inc., which has regular scheduled stops here in its airmail and passenger line.

A three-way agreement resulted in a quick decision after planes on the line had passed up the city without landing for several days, and by this agreement, the work will be done for approximately \$10,000—about half the originally estimated cost.

C. R. Smith, general manager of the southern division of the American Airways, said his company would advance \$1,000 for the work, to be credited on the annual rental for landing facilities. He also is to send an expert airport builder here to supervise construction of the runways.

Three runways will be built, 100 feet wide, and the longest 2,700 to 3,000 feet in length. Gravel will be laid eight inches deep with a clay binder. It is planned that later runways be asphalted.

Work will get under way as soon as replans can be completed.

Several bars have closed, as have two of the most famous cabarets on the border, and a clothing factory, owned by Americans, has been shut down.

Depressed business conditions in the United States, together with reduction of mining activities, an unfavorable cattle market and the American tariff, are named as factors contributing to the situation.

Customs house statistics show exports through Juarez in August were \$92,751, and about the same for September, which represents a decline of 70 per cent from figures for a similar period in 1930.
