'NO KNOWLEDGE'

Secretary Denies **Tapes Tampering**

WASHINGTON (UPI) -Rose Mary Woods. President have the opportunity to speak Nixon's personal secretary. testified today she had no trial." knowledge of how 18 minutes were obliterated from one Watergate tapes or whether

there was any deliberate tampering with the tapes. Miss Woods, suddenly recalled to the stand on order of U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica, said she had no additional information to give regarding the mystery of out if Miss Woods was-Nixon's tapes.

'Do you have any knowledge that anyone tampered with. altered, erased or obliterated any portion of those tapes?" asked Jill Volner. as an assistant special prosecutory.

'No, ma'm I don't.' Miss Woods replied.

Miss Woods testified twice previously in Sirica's hearing on the White House tapes-once on Nov. 8 when she did not mention an 18-minute gap on a taped conversation between Nixon and his former aide H.R. Haldeman on June 20, 1972, and again on Nov. 26 when she said she may have caused part of the gap.

Sirica, saying he wanted to "get to the bottom" of the problem, ordered Miss Woods recalled.

We want to find out the truth in this matter." Sirica told Miss Woods during her 65 minutes of testimony. "Do you know anything that would throw light on this very serious problem about what caused that 18minute gap?

He told Miss Woods his hearing into the tapes case was

"the greatest forum you'll ever in" but stressed "this is not a

"I think it is a trial." Miss Woods replied. "I have been tried by a jury of newspapers. radio and media.

"If I could offer any idea, any proof, any knowledge of how that 18-minute gap happened. nobody on earth would be happier to offer it.

Sirica said he wanted to find represented by White House lawyers or anyone when she initially testified.

We want to get to the bottom of this." Sirica said. "I think the whole thing should be opened

He ordered: "Have her come right down.

The month-old hearing was then recessed and Sirica directed Miss Woods be told to appear without being told "anything that took place in this courtroom this morning.

Samuel J. Powers, one of Nixon's team of lawyers, was testifying when Sirica interrupted. He said Miss Woods was brought to the court as a "fact witness" for the White House on Nov. 8 but did not know at the time whether he had the power to represent her

in court. In her second appearance. Miss Woods said she accidentally obliterated four to five minutes of a conversation between Nixon and H. R. Haldeman, then his chief of staff, on June 20, 1972. That was three days after the Watergate break-in. She said she did not believe she possibly could have

Seeking To Avoid **Gasoline Rationing**

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The federal government moved today to increase the price of home heating oil a part of its energy crisis strategy of reducing gasoline output and avoiding rationing.

The Cost of Living Council. which has charge of the government economic stabilization program, decided to allow new pricing scheduled for heating fuel to encourage refineries to switch more production from gasoline. The theory behind the plan is

that by allowing the industry a greater profit on heating oil than the more profitable gasoline, increased amounts of fuel to heat homes-and also to run trucks-would be available. That switch would reduce gasoline availability and thus reduce consumption, possibly without the necessity of rationing which Nixon strongly

opposes The President is expected to make a decision within a month on the rationing question. He called in his Cabinet and other top advisers-including newly

named energy adviser William E. Simon-to discuss the situation this morning. The fuels shortages were caused by an embargo on U.S. shipments by the major Arab oil-producing countries because of American support for Israel. Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger arranged a meeting this afternoon with Oil Minister Sheikh Ahmed Zaki of Saudi Arabia to discuss the situation.

(UPI) - By a hair-thin escape a hair. from the enormous radiation at mighty Jupiter, Pioneer 10 was proving today that the gateway to the outer planets is open for future spacecraft exploration.

Jupiter is the key because its tremendous orbital motion can be used to catapult heavier spacecraft on their way to the fluffy, gaseous planets beyond

At Jupiter. Pioneer found the radiation to be worse than any scientist had estimated-one million times that of earth. radiation can "fry" the solidstate circuits of a spacecraft.

Passing Jupiter at its closest point of 81,000 miles, Pioneer used up 99 per cent of its margins," Robert S. Kraemer. the space agency's director of interplanetary systems, said Tuesday.

Hofheinz Wins **Mayor Election**

HOUSTON (UPI) - Fred Hofheinz, the son of the man who built the Astrodome, won 95 per cent of the city's black vote and was elected mayor of Texas' largest city Tuesday

The 35-year-old son of Judge Roy Hofheinz narrowly defeated City Councilman Dick Gottlieb, who failed to draw his conservative middle class voters to the polls

Hofheinz, an attorney with a Ph.D. in economics, acknowledged it was the support from the liberal, black community that provided his margin of victory. Only about a third of the city's registered voters turned out in mild weather to vote in the election, and the outcome was close. With all of the city's 309 precincts reporting, Hofheinz had 123,635 votes or 50.6 per cent to Gottlieb's 120.608 votes.



"Let the word go out that Collin County, where farmland sells for \$10,000 an acre, cannot afford to provide adequate courtroom facilities for the transaction of the people's business," Brown said.

We have two district courts and one courtroom and you can see that in this old firetrap it is impossible to conduct a quiet and dignified court when many people are present.

"Further, one of the reasons that this unfortunate incident occurred is because the county does not have the decent detention facilities for juveniles. or for adults for that matter. Since we are unable to keep juveniles in our jail, this young man was transferred to the city and got lost in the shuffle.

"And now to the matter of Charles Glover: He is ordered released.

Glover was arrested Sept 26 and charged with participating in a burglary. He was jailed with adults in the Collin County jail, but when it was discovered he was juvenile he was moved to the city jail because of a law that requires segregating adult and juvenile criminals. He was then forgotten in the city jail.

Warden, who learned he had been appointed Glover's attorney two weeks after the appointment and only then because a reporter called him to ask about the case, said the city jail's facilities were so bad that Glover never had a shower or a bath the two months he was there and only had "two donuts and a TV dinner per day since the time of his arrest.

We have now remedied the boy's condition," the attorney said. "We got him out of jail. Now we can see about the charges against him







It is ten minutes before showtime and things couldn't be worse. The announcer hasn't shown up, neither has the studio engineer and the lead act says he doesn't know what songs he'll sing. Cables like like mating snakes on the set, plaster from the walls is falling on one of the musical instruments and a Boy Scout selling candy keeps wandering out to the footlights. "Say," asks a confused backstage visitor, "are you sure you're having a program here tonight?'

NASHVILLE, Tenn. -(NEA) - When it comes to organization, the Grand Ole Opry looks like the last battle at Utah Beach. But entertainment is something else and in this regard Saturday night in Nashville is as sure as God's green apples - every week for the last 48 years, through some 2500 consecutive shows. good times and bad, the Grand Ole Opry has done its toe-tapping thing as if the gods would not have it otherwise.

Never mind that Opry organizers admit, "We do everything wrong." Never mind that there is no script and that the program director is so old (84) he has to read the schedule with a magnifying glass. The Grand Ole Opry defies all odds. Contrary to the laws of physics it moves briskly while standing still.

It is, to start with, the only live vaudeville entertainment still on the radio today. Moreover, it is probably the only radio program in the world that people pay to see (the 3000 seat Opryhouse is booked solid through January). And finally, though it hasn't changed its format (nor some of its tunes) in a half century, it must rank with sex as America's longest running variety show.

Why? Good question. How can a program which features a 67-year-old cowboy (Tex Ritter) appeal to people who've been on the moon? How does a radio show which advertises snuff get off claiming millions of listeners? And why in the world would 600,000 people travel an average of 450

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Cords, strings and tapes playpen or crib toys should not have cords long enough to become looped around a child's neck

Toxicity - painted surfaces that contain more than one half of one per cent lead are banned. Possible poisoning is difficult to determine, however, and parents must generally trust reputable manufacturers. Cleanliness - toys should be sealed in packages: toys for infants and toddlers should be washable

BATTIN' AROUND **Population Growth Can't Explain Crime Increases**

BVC.R. BATTEN What is the effect of the density of population on the quality of the environment and on human behavior?

Biologists experimenting with rats and mice have found nuerotic and anti - social behavior in crowded colonies, and so it is deduced that the high crime rate in city centers is the result of overcrowding. But this theory does not explain rising crime rates in less densely populated areas. -

In the Sept. 14 issue of Alice Taylor Day Science. and Lincoln H. Day confirm that more important factors than population density determine how man relates or reacts to his environment. They point out that population density is only an average.

It fails to consider significant differences in the patterns of concentration and dispersion of the populations within the area being compared.

As compared with Europe, for example, an unusually large oportion of the people in the United States live in very densely - populated regions of more than one million persons. while an unusually small proportion live in rural areas. The proportion of people employed in agriculture is also much lower in the U.S. than in

Europe The differences in buildings and other physical structures within the cities and the way they are used vary from one society to another. According to the authors, the structures determine the * actual operating pattern of human density

'Internal density," the number and characteristics of persons living within each housing unit, is important in evaluating the effects of density in varying societies.

Some studies suggest according to the authors. "that human response to a given level of density is related not only to the degree of intensity of physical contact, but also the social organization, values, and lifestyles, to the individual's status and class position within his society, and to personal and

social expectations regarding a U.S., and yet is notable for the desirable way to live.

Many cities throughout the country are faced with problems of growth. Many twice as many people perbelieve that their cities are growing too large, both in absolute numbers and in the density of their populations. They are seeking to determine the "carrying capacity" of the city, county or region.

Carrying capacity can be defined as the number of persons that can be supported in a given area without degrading the environment. Thus,

carrying capacity itself is a subjective term which depends upon the viewer's own interpretation We often hear comparisons

between the population densities of the United States and those of Europe to show that we have a lot of room to grow. The Netherlands, for example, has 15 times as many people per square mile as the

That does not seem to be such a startling conclusion, but it is one that should give us a hint as to some of the reasons that we have so much unrest in our cities today. We will explore this subject some more in next week's column

DEAR ABBY: Thank you for trying to get parents to accept their homosexual children as they are. Mine never would, and I almost had a nervous breakdown trying to keep it from them.

Abby, we need love and acceptance from our parents even more than heterosexual children do. But how can children ever hope to educate their parents? They read your column. Can you help? GAY AND HURTING

DEAR HURTING: Perhaps if your parents read the classic letter Dr. Freud wrote to the mother of a homosexual on April 9, 1935, it would help them to understand, I hope so. Here it is: "Dear Mrs.:

I gather from your letter that your son is a homosexual. I am most impressed by the fact that you do not mention this term yourself in your information about him. May I question you, why you avoid it? Homosexuality is assuredly no advantage, but it is nothing to be ashamed of, no vice, no degradation, it cannot be classified as an illness; we consider it to be a variation of the sexual function produced by a certain arrest of sexual development.

Many highly respectable individuals of ancient and modern times have been homosexuals, several of the greatest men among them [Plato, Michelangelo, Leonardo da Vinci, etc.].

It is a great injustice to persecute homosexuality as a crime, and cruelty, too. If you do not believe me, read the books of Havelock Ellis.

By asking me if I can help, you mean, I suppose, if I can abolish homosexuality and make normal heterosexuality take its place. The answer is, in a general way, we cannot promise to achieve it. In a certain number of cases we succeed in developing the blighted germs of heterosexual tendencies which are present in every homosexual, in the majority of cases it is no more possible. It is a question of the quality and the age of the individual. The result of treatment cannot be predicted.

What analysis can do for your son runs in a different line. If he is unhappy, neurotic, torn by conflicts, inhibited in his social life, analysis may bring him harmony, peace of mind, full efficiency, whether he remains a homosexual or gets changed.







Electronic Revolution?

A new Electronic Revolution. affecting virtually every form of human activity, has begun amplifying the power of the mind just as the Industrial Revolution amplified the power of muscle

So said Robert W. Sarnoff, chairman of RCA, in a recent address before the Imperial College of Science and Technology in London.

The Electronic Revolution is based on new solid - state devices using microscopically small integrated circuits that contain thousands of electronic elements in the tiny space of a few square millimeters.

By 1980, he predicted, such circuits will be mass - produced so cheaply that they will involve practically no cost per function. and made so precisely that they will be almost infinitely reliable.

"The result through the rest of this century will be a fundamental and growing shift in patterns of working and living. A growing variety of inexpensive, compact and versatile devices will perform the menial tasks of the mind calculating, remembering, searching for references. measuring risks and opportunities - the whole chaos variety of noncreative activities that precede decision or

creation.

information system will link the household with people. institutions and computers in practically any part of the world In education, compact

personal systems will give students instant access to stored knowledge anywhere. In underdeveloped areas, the new technology will reduce the cost and complexity of handling information in great quantity and varied forms. In effect, the **Electronic Revloution can** enable more than half of mankind to catch up with the

Industrial Revolution. That revolution took more than a century to gather full momentum. 

In his 1941 tour de force, "The Managerial Revolution. James Burnham identified. within the American society and more generally on both sides of what we now call the iron curtain, a new class moving toward dominance: The "managers" - administrators and technocrats who, without possessing any of the traditional institutional bases of power. neverthrless manipulate the levers by which society is controlled. These men. Burnham argued, exist in both corporate and government bureaucracies, in socialist and capitalist societies alike, and their similarities are more important than their differences

This was, I believe, an important insight - a valuable new conceptual tool for the understanding of modern society. But it did not, in 1941 or for many years thereafter. apply to the men who dominated American party politics. The Roosevelts. Trumans, Kennedys and Johnsons who led the Democratic party were of an older breed; the odor of the political barnyard clung about them like a robe. Over in the GOP one can perhaps detect in Thomas Dewey and his manager Herbert Brownell, or even in the elder Taft, a trace of

the new managerial attitude toward politics; but certainly Eisenhower and Goldwater were temperamentally a world away from such a coldly. antiseptic approach. It was only with the advent of Richard Nixon that the managers finally got their hands on the White House.

Although Ron Zeigler acclaimed Nixon's march through Georgia, it had the success of General Lee's retreat.



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

The Lefors Pirates ended regular season play with a 9-1 record, going undefeated until the season finale against the seventh ranked Groom Tigers.

An undefeated team going into the last game is usually the district's representative in the playoffs. However, in the Pirates' case in 1973, the record went for naught in regards to a title because in 1-B only three district games are played and a loss usually knocks a team out.

But for head coach Leonard Tolbert's Pirates, the season was the most successful a Lefors team had finished with since 1949. when the Pirates went 10-1, and in doing so advanced to the regional playoffs.

Coach of The Year

Tolbert, in his second year as Lefors' coach, is the Panipa Daily News Coach of the Year, chosen from among nine area coaches. Besides Tolbert, Pampa area

head coaches are Buddy Williams, Pampa; Don Beck, Perryton: Larry Anthony. White Deer; Jack Hawthorne, Canadian; Jim Bateman. Wheeler; Bill Nitcholas, McLean; Don Sessom, Groom, and Orville Shook, Miami.

Runners-up for Coach of the Year are Sessom, Hawthorne and Beck. Sessom and Beck coached their respective teams to district titles and Hawthorne's Wildcats finished 8-1-1 on the year and in second. place in District 1-A behind Stinnett.

Tolbert's Pirates finished 3-5-1 in 1972 and were picked to finish second with Booker in 1-B. Lefors did come out as the district's runner-up, but not

before showing it was one of the best class B teams in the state (the Pirates were ranked in the top 20 for most of the season by the Harris Rating System).

Team Sets Goals

Tolbert bases the Pirates' success on goals set by the team prior to the season's start. "You have to set a goal and keep that goal in mind, work towards it and not accept anything less than the best your goal.

"Our goal at the first of the year was to go undefeated."

Besides the one major goal, which Lefors missed by one game, the Pirates set some offensive and defensive goals. "Our offensive goal was to make dang sure we scored more points than the other/ folks did. Defensive goals were to hold teams to eight points per game, 800 yards passing against us for the season, 250 yards passing, 20 fumbles, 20 pass interceptions and 50 first downs.

Tolbert, 29, graduated from Midwestern University in Wichita Falls in 1970. While there, he was an assistant grid coach at Notre Dame High School in Wichita Falls. The Breckenridge graduate began his college days, however, at Tarleton State, where he went on track scholarship.

After the coaching stint at Notre^dDame, Tolbert accepted an assistant's job at Paducah, whose head coach was Jerry Neely. Paducah finished 3-7 and 1-9 the two years Tolbert was there (1970, '71)







Kohoutek Commotion

Comet Kohoutek, called by Junar surface during the Apollo many the comet of the century. will be viewed and with a Kodak ultraviolet photographed from earth and space in an unprecedented scientific observation program which has begun to take on the appearance of a project for making contact with beings from other worlds

And all the commotion is justifiable

Forewarned in early March of the appearance of the comet by its discoverer, Dr. Lubos Kohoutek, scientists around the world have been able to plan and mobilize so that in late December and early January, when the comet is nearest the sun, observations from earth and space can help gather vital information about it - a cosmic wanderer that may not return to Kohoutek our solar system for at least 82,000 years, if at all.

Scientists believe that comets may contain some of the original matter of the solar system. There are numerous theories about the origin of the solar system, none of which is vet accepted as fact. It is hoped that observations of Comet Kohoutek may shed some light on the beginnings of our solar system

Already the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) has made available a ponderous array of instruments of earth and in space to study Comet Kohoutek.

Stephen P. Maran, head of NASA's Operation Kohoutek, said that the discovery of such a potentially fine comet more than nine months before perihelion is quite unprecedented.

'It may never happen again that such a long lead time is available for planning observations of a comet passing. so close to the sun," he said.




