OFFICER'S CAR FOUND ABANDONED NEAR CITY LATER

ELECTRA, April 14. (A)-Three men armed with pistols today kidnaped James T. Taylor, chief of police; J. C. Harris, employe of the water department; and A. F. McCor-mick, oil agent. The captives were taken in McCormick's car to a point 8 miles south of Electra, where they were released. The abductors escaped in the car but later abandoned it east of Electra.

The Electra men made their way to the Lazy J ranch, where they notified officers and were returned to town. Chief Taylor said the kidnapers gave no reason for their act, except that they "could not afford to go to jail." They took Taylor's pistol but nothing else from their captives.

"Following this action a resolu tion submitted as a majority report of the convention committee legislation was adopted. The resolving clause of this resolution as follows:

"'Therefore, be it resolved: That the American Legion, in full posses-sion of its limitless faith in the destiny of the nation we fought to preserve, calls upon the able bodied men of America, rich and poor, veteran, civilian and statesman, to refrain from placing unnecessary financial burdens upon national state or municipa; governments and to unite their efforts as they all did in 1917 to the end that the war against depression be victoriously concluded and prosperity and hap-

"The above action constitutes the mandate given me by our highest legislative authority, and the American Legion is bound by it.

"This mandate is clear cut and unmistakable. It authorizes no action but clearly restrains the American Legion from asking for the immediate payment of the adjusted service certificates.

"All my statements to the press or otherwise have been in accord with the above."
