

TEXAS AND GOVERNORSHIP

Texas comes to its run-off primary with two candidates for governor. These have definite proposals for the use of gasoline tax revenues.

One, Mrs. Miriam Ferguson, gives forth her stand on public questions through her husband, who is her campaign speaker and manager. Ferguson would split the gasoline revenues three ways, schools getting a third, the general fund a third, the highway department a third. This might cut the state tax levy a cent or two.

The other, Ross Sterling, would continue giving the schools a forth, assume all county bonds issued for construction of state highways and use the balance for building and maintaining highways.

The Sterling program WILL CUT tax rates in each county

Consider the effect in Hale county. This county has issued \$710,000 in bonds for the construction of state designated highways. Under the Sterling plan the state in assuming these maturities, would, for 1933, relieve Hale county of payment of an immense sum. The tax rate has not yet been set for 1932. But last year we had a levy for the retirement of the highway bonds and for payment of interest on them of 30 cents on the \$100 valuation. This cost tax payers of the county, largely the owners of real estate, approximately \$50,000. Thus the Sterling plan would save tax payers in Hale county an immense sum, while the conversion of onethird of the gasoline tax to the state general fund, as Here all the ages can be seen, proposed by Ferguson, would leave that burden on Hale county and all other counties which have paved their highways and have bonds outstanding.




