

IOWA, CONNECTICUT AND NEW HAMPSHIRE BALLOT FOR REPEAL

AMENDMENT IS DISAPPROVED BY 14 STATES

IOWA GOES WET FIRST TIME IN NEARLY TWO DECADES

LONG-DRY Iowa, with Connecticut and New Hampshire, today brought to 14 the states which in unbroken succession have voted to knock the eighteenth amendment out of the constitution.

The Hawkeye state's swing away from the position she had maintained for nearly two decades left drys fixing their hope for a halt in the parade on Alabama and Arkansas, both voting July 18. Iowa brought in a substantial majority for the repeal amendment, even though it was not as big as that in Connecticut and New Hampshire. But with 611,900 votes in, and only 130 precincts missing, her count was 368,891 for repeal and 242,612 against. That meant she had instructed all of her 99 delegates to the state convention July 10 to vote for repeal.

From the start there had been no question about what New Hampshire and Connecticut would do. The former, with a light ballot and only one small town missing, voted 75,969 to 30,337 for repeal.

THE POOR RICH

LONDON, June 21. (AP)—Social standing doesn't count for much when it comes to surviving operations, says A. Basil Rooke, prominent surgeon.

"Generally speaking," he says, "the higher the social status, the worse the operative risk." This, he indicates, is probably due to generations of living under favorable conditions, which interferes with the natural weeding out of the weaker elements.

In like fashion, Connecticut gave a 9 to 1 majority to the twenty-first amendment, which repeals the eighteenth. Her final unofficial total was 236,915 for repeal and 35,349 against.

With these three out of the way, Alabama and Arkansas provided the next major battleground. The pros and the antis are concentrating on them, even though California and West Virginia do vote earlier, on June 27.

Drys figure that if they can hold two states this year, the question will not be put over until 1934, when their chances will be better. Wets would like to win both Alabama and Arkansas, but agree that it will be close.

After these will come Tennessee, July 20; Oregon, July 21; Texas, August 26; Washington, August 29; Vermont, September 5; Maine, September 12; Idaho and New Mexico, September 19; Arizona, October 3; North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and South Carolina, November 7; Nebraska and South Dakota will vote November 6, 1934.

Road Maintenance Contracts To Be Awarded Today

AUSTIN, June 21 (AP)—The Texas Highway commission today planned to award maintenance contracts aggregating nearly \$550,000 for repair and upkeep of highways in many sections of Texas.

Counties participating in the letting were Runnels, Coleman, Crockett, Cherokee, Randall, Swisher, Jack, Hansford, Ochiltree, Potter, Dallam, Hardin, Wise, Parker, Fisher, Martin, Wood, Upshur, Reagan, Jefferson, Bowie, Chambers, Fannin, Sutton, Midland, Travis, Trinity, Williamson, and Falls.

The commission ordered location surveys for all improperly located portions of highway 8, principal traffic artery in East Texas. The commissioners said the road would be improved from one end to the other as soon as funds are available.

Negotiations with the department and federal bureau of public roads were authorized with intention of constructing a bridge across the Neches river connecting Port Arthur and Orange. It was estimated a "high" span, to permit clearance of vessels, would cost approximately \$800,000. The commission discussed the feasibility of charging tolls for use of the bridge as a means of paying for the project.

Edwin Tiffin received 4,564 votes in Ohio's first gubernatorial election and no votes were cast against him.

SCHOOL MEN NOT ELIGIBLE

AUSTIN, June 21 (AP)—Employees of the state supported system are not eligible to serve as delegates to the Texas convention to determine whether this state favors repeal of national prohibition, the attorney general's department has ruled.

Elbert Hooper, acting attorney general, held that should a president of a teachers' college or other employe of the state school serve as a delegate at the convention they could not draw their pay from the state for their school work.

The question came up when W. N. Wiggins of Dallas, secretary of the United Forces for Prohibition, asked if J. A. Hill, president of the State Teachers college at Canyon, would be eligible as one of the candidates of those against repeal.

Both factions will hold conventions in Austin on next Tuesday to nominate 31 candidates and as many alternates as delegates to the state convention, set for November 24 when Texas formally will cast her ballot on repeal of the eighteenth amendment. In a special election on August 26 the voters will choose the delegates from the two groups of candidates, one representing repealists and the other running as anti-repealists.

Fort Sill Will Send 190 Men To Panhandle Jobs

SAN ANTONIO, June 21. (AP)—Final approval of sites of 30 additional forestry camps in Texas has been announced from eighth corps area headquarters at Fort Sam Houston.

Seventeen of the camps will be established by men from the camp Bullis receiving camp near San Antonio, 12 will be filled by Texas men sent to Fort Sill, Okla., for conditioning, and one camp will be established by men reporting at Fort Bliss, El Paso.

Camp Bullis will send companies of 200 men each to San Augustine, San Augustine county; Pineland, Sabine county; Matagorda county; Blanco county; Fort Davis and Skillman, Jeff Davis county; Caddo Lake, Marion county; Lampasas, Lampasas county; Hamilton, Hamilton county; Big Bend, Brewster county; and Valley Mills, Bosque county.

Fort Bliss will send companies of 190 men each to Stephenville, Erath county; Palsades, Timber Creek, Mesa, Tub Springs and Cito Creek, Randall and Armstrong counties; Mineral Wells, Farmersville, Valley View, Jacksboro, Cleburne and Dublin, single company of 200 men from Fort Bliss will remain in camp at El Paso.

Midwest Faints Under Heat Wave

Torrid temperatures spreading over far-flung sections of the nation added to the number of deaths of a record breaking June heat wave.

Down in Atlanta, Ga., folks perished when the mercury climbed to 97 and up north at Superior, Wis., it was only one degree cooler.

But definite relief was promised by the weather man for some sections of the middle west today as summer made its official debut. Rains which sent thermometer readings tumbling in the north west yesterday were due to spread to the central states.

Wisconsin, with 10 deaths attributable to the heat, led the fatality list. Indiana and Michigan had nine each and both Ohio and Nebraska reported three dead. Two drowned in Kentucky and a like number died in Minnesota. St. Louis, with a reading of 96, reported one drowning.

Buffalo Skull Found West Of Pecos In Creek

ROSWELL, N. M., June 21 (AP)—At least one buffalo crossed the Pecos river to the west, the belief of old-timers to the contrary.

M. Stevenson, deputy state game warden, seeing Salt creek recently, found a well preserved buffalo skull. Salt creek empties into the Pecos north of Roswell, from the west. The head might have been thrown into the creek, or it might have belonged to some animal driven west for range, but it attracted considerable attention here because of its location.

Numerous buffalo wallows still are found from just east of Roswell to the Texas plains, but it is generally accepted that the herds did not cross the Pecos.
