TEXAS LOANS JUSTIFIED, IS FINAL RULING

HOLDS 'TEXAN HAD NO PERSONAL INTEREST' IN DEALS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1. (AP)—The senate banking sub-committee investigating Reconstruction Finance Corporation loans today exonerated Jesse H. Jones—RFC chairman—of charges he was personally interested in loans by the government corporation to three Texas mortgage companies.

The committee, made up of the same senators who are investigating stock market practices, concluded that the loans to the Bankers Mortgage company, the Midland Mortgage company and the Southwestern Investment company, all in Jones' home state of Texas, were justified, adequately secured and Jones "had no personal interest in any of them."

Chairman Fletcher made public the conclusions informally in a talk with newspapermen, after a brief executive session of the subcommittee.

Formal complaints had been made that many mortgage company loans were going to firms in which Jones had a direct or indirect interest.

Fletcher said there were two suits being tried in Texas involving some of the loans but added:

"The thing we are concerned about was something else and we found that Jones didn't use the RFC to serve his personal individual interests. We found the loans justified, amply secured and Jones has no interest in them personally."

The subcommittee will proceed with investigation into loans to mortgage companies organized since the RFC act was amended to permit such loans.

The amendment was put through congress primarily to permit banks which were reluctant to borrow from the government on account of the publicity involved, to organize mortgage companies and obtain loans indirectly.

Irvin Cole Is New Secretary Of Wheat Body

Irvin Cole of Pampa is the new secretary of the Gray County Wheat Control association.

He has replaced James Jackson, who has gone to Memphis to be county agent of Hall county.

Most of the detailed work of the association has been completed. However, about 60 tardy wheat contracts are being completed for mailing to Washington.

Gray county was one of the first to complete the bulk of wheat contracts, but date of the receipt of check is uncertain. The Washington office is said to be deluged with work.

Cleveland Man Charged In El Paso Mystery

Clews In Van Horn Slaying Of Pretty Widow Lead to Filing Murder Charges.

EL PASO, Dec. 1. (AP)—Assistant District Attorney John Penn announced that a charge of murder will be filed today against Arthur C. Wilson, 28, Cleveland, O., in connection with the slaying of Mrs. Irene Diebolt, 28, attractive Cleveland widow.

The widow's body was found near Van Horn, Texas, east of El Paso, on November 7. She had been beaten over the head, a cord tied tightly around her neck and all her clothing except silk stockings removed.

Identification was established yesterday by Cleveland police who showed pictures of the slain woman to Mrs. Frank Cheska of Cleveland, Mrs. Diebolt's sister.

Sheriff Chris P. Fox said he has been informed that Mrs. Diebolt left Cleveland with Wilson in September for California in an automobile bought by Mrs. Diebolt with part of \$4,000 she received from insurance following the death of her husband.

The sheriff said that a federal plant inspection station crew on the boundary between Arizona and California gave him a license number of a car that passed through there east on November 2 that was found to have been issued in Cleveland to Wilson. Inspectors at the station said the driver had a "companion."

A Pecos, Texas, tourist camp operator supplied the clue that led to the identification of the woman. He turned over to officers several days ago a storage receipt issued by the Fuller Cleaning and Dyeing Works of Cleveland, O., to Arthur C. Wilson for an overcoat placed in storage.

The receipt was found in a cabin that a man occupied in the Pecos tourist camp for two hours on the night of November 5, the day that undertakers say the woman was slain.

Camp attendants said that the man arrived at the camp at midnight wearing bedraggled pants and a clean white shirt. He refused to let anyone help him unload his automobile. Attendants reported the next morning that the man kept water running in his room for two hours and that he departed at 2 a. m.

Scraps of paper were found in the washbowl with Cleveland addresses on them. On the floor of the cabin was a freshly washed electric iron evidently forgotten by the man when he made a hurried departure. This iron was tested in an El Paso laboratory and found to contain human blood in a crack that had not been cleaned out by the washing, Sheriff Fox said.

Mrs. Bratton's Brother Hunted By U. S. Agents

WICHITA, Dec. 1. (AP)—An abandoned automobile identified as belonging to Mr. Mrs. Harry Pritchard, Wichita couple missing more than a week, has been found near Bristol, Okla., officers here said today. The car bore blood stains on the driver's seat and a blood-soaked blanket was on the floor.

This development, officers here viewed as definite proof that Pritchard, a Wichita merchant, and his wife have been murdered, and spurred the search for Jack Wisdom, 26-year-old Kansas ranch hand, last seen with the couple here November 23.

Department of justice agents have been ordered to assist in the search for Mr. and Mrs. Harry R. Pritchard, who disappeared from their home in Wichita, Kan., home last week. Mrs. Pritchard is a brother of Mrs. W. A. Bratton of this city.

The couple were accompanied by Jack Wisdom, who is being hunted as their abductor. A murder theory was advanced Wednesday afternoon when a blood-stained glove, identified as one belonging to Mr. Pritchard, was found near Wellington, Kan. To further the belief that Mr. Pritchard met with foul play, a strange care occupied by a man and a woman who seemed to be in a hysterical condition, was seen near where the glove was found on the same afternoon.

Joseph B. Keenan of the department of justice sent two men to work with officers of Kansas and Oklahoma. It has been learned that Wisdom's sweetheart has disappeared from her home on Coffeyville. The Pritchard car was seen near Coffeyville the night after the abduction, but it outdistanced pursuing officers.

ARGUS M. FOX WINS FLIP OF 'EAGLE' COIN

GAME WILL START AT 2 O'CLOCK ON DECEMBER 9

THE first stroke of fate in the bi-district contest in Texas Inter-scholastic League football favored Pampa last night and the Abilene Eagles will play here Saturday, December 9, at 2 p. m. Abilene defeated Cisco 20 to 0 yesterday to win the district 3 title while the Harvesters were winning over Borger, 25 to 6.

Assistant Coach Argus M. Fox called "heads" on the flip of a coin at Abilene last night and so it fell. Abilene school officials previously had declined to consider any proposition to come to Pampa, in the absence of their superintendent, R. D. Green, who was attending the state teachers meeting in Austin.

Wishing to hasten preparations, Pampa school officials then telephoned Fox to maneuver for a flip

Tickets for the Pampa-Abilene football game of December 9 will be placed on sale next Tuesday morning at the office of Joe Smith in the court house. All season tickets have expired, but holders of the tickets may obtain the same seats by paying for them at \$1 each total cost not later than next Friday noon, December 8. General admission will be 75 cents and reserved seats 35 cents extra. Student tickets will be 25 cents if bought at the school office. Abilene has asked for 500 tickets to start her sale. Abilene may bring a special train.

JAMES ALLRED TO MAKE RACE FOR GOVERNOR

TO ANNOUNCE AT DEL RIO BANQUET ON DECEMBER 15

AUSTIN, Dec. 1 (P)—James V. Allred, now serving his second term as attorney general of Texas, will seek the democratic gubernatorial nomination in the primaries next year.

This information came to the Chatterer from a source regarded as unimpeachable and set at rest any fear that Allred might cross the boys up by seeking the junior United States senatorship, which also will be a much sought-after prize in next year's elections.

Predictions generally are rash, but the following is based on reliable information: Allred will announce for governor at a banquet to be tendered him by Del Rio friends December 15. It is likely he will there set forth the principal planks in the platform he will take before the people and on which he will seek their suffrage.

The youthful attorney general, it was learned confidentially from a source close to him, has never entertained much thought of getting into the senatorial contest. Whatever ideas he may have had along this line were abandoned when the word spread that young Joe Bailey, congressman-at-large, would go after the office now filled by Tom Connally. Political observers in general appear to be taken from granted Bailey would oppose Connally months before Bailey's formal announcement that he would be a candidate.

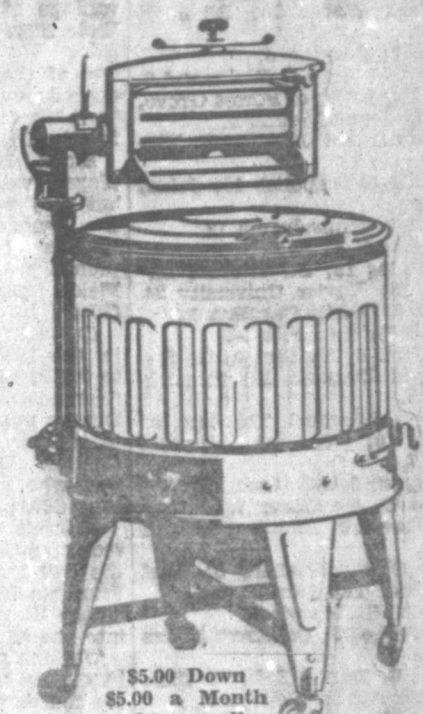

Watkins passed over the goal line to Geary for a Dumas counter in the fourth period, and Geary intercepted a pass and ran 30 yards for the final Demon touchdown.

Chosen on composite vote from sports editors and writers in various Southwest conference cities, this year's associated Press' consensus team of the conference's gridiron warriors lists eight seniors, two juniors and one sophomore.

It has only unusual feature—no player chosen on last season's aggregation made this year's team.

There's no second team. There are no honorable mentions. Just a first-string aggregation of outstanding players who polled enough votes to win positions awarded them by comfortable majorities.

The result gave Texas Christian three players, and Baylor, the University of Texas and Arkansas two each. Southern Methodist and Rice placed one player each. Texas A. and M. failed to get a man on the team.

Although he scored only one touchdown this season, Tom Murphy, 170-pound University of Arkansas quarterback had no competition. No player had a chance against Murphy who gathered in all but one of the votes for the quarterback post. Murphy, possessed of all-round backfield ability, proved himself one of the canniest quarterbacks in the conference by driving

the Razorbacks to the championship with the loss of only one game. Dan Harston, Jr., of Texas Christian was the player to get the "outside vote" for the signal barking job.

Charles Casper, elusive broken-field artist, end runner and leading conference scorer with 64 points, led the halfback votes, Casper won the left halfback job with a majority of five votes over any other back. He has been the scoring spark of Texas Christian this season. He had scored nine touchdowns thru Friday, December 1.

The big surprise was when Robert Wilson, 150-pound Southern Methodist touchdown artist, bested both Hilliard, University of Texas backfield ace, for the other halfback position.

Wilson won the position with a majority of five votes. Wilson is a sophomore. He developed into the Mustang, scoring punch this season, and through Friday had clicked with seven touchdowns for 42 points. Hilliard got away to a grand start, but injuries received in the Nebraska game slowed him down.

Bill Couser and Frenchy Domingue of Texas A. and M. were other players who had strong support for halfback positions.

The closest balloting was between John Kitchen of Texas Christian and Joe Jack Pearce of Baylor for the fullback job. Kitchen won by the thin margin of two votes. Spencer of A. and M. LeForge of Arkansas and Lawrence of Texas Christian received votes for the fullback job but none were close to Kitchen and Pearce. Pearce is a more versatile player than Kitchen, but the big Texas Christian back got the fullback call probably because of more power in smashing the line.

# HARVESTERS SLOW DOWN IN GIVING SCRAPPY BULLDOGS A CASUAL BEATING

## PAMPA'S PASS DEFENSE SAGS UNDER ATTACK

### BORGER SCORES FIRST COUNTER OF YEAR IN DISTRICT 1

Pampa's over-confident and somewhat careless Harvesters defeated the Borger Bulldogs 25 to 6 in a Thanksgiving day game here yesterday before a crowd of about 2,500 persons, clinching the championship of district 1 and the right to meet the Abilene Eagles in a bi-district clash here Dec. 9 at 2 p. m.

The Bulldogs, having everything to gain in prestige before a large group of loyal fans, and nothing to lose, fought valiantly throughout the game. Their goal-line stands against the pluckiness of Heiskell and Hamilton were strong enough to toss the locals back repeatedly. But the Harvesters had the punch when they put their minds on the task and their defense was impregnable except against the passes hurled by Borger's Hannah.

Pampa scored in the first, third, and fourth periods, with two touchdowns in the last quarter. Borger also scored in the eventful fourth period. The locals' inability to get the extra points after touchdowns continued, possibly with prophetic warnings against the need therefor in tight bi-district battles. The absence of Marbaugh and Dunaway was keenly felt.

Some Great Plays  
There were four great plays in the game, three by Pampa and one

by Borger. Owens' interception of a Borger pass and a nice run after he had backed out of the line was the first exhibition. Hamilton followed with a pretty 50-yard dash. Hazel Mackie supplied the closing thrill when he showed a marvelous burst of speed to overhaul Shaw of Borger, who had a big start for a touchdown which did not materialize. Hannah's pass to Shaw who lateraled out of a host of Harvesters to Stratton for Borger's only touchdown, was the pick of the Borger plays.

The Harvesters looked ragged on pass defense as well as in passing. Borger's job passes led the way by dropping into the hands of pass receivers with Harvesters close by. Hannah was the outstanding player on the Borger team, but he had great help in passing from Kendrick, Shaw, and Stratton. Stephens was power in the Borger line, especially defensively.

**Best on Defense**  
Besides Owens, Green, Smith, and Pinnell played great games in the Harvesters line. Their tackling was hard and true and they opened nice holes for the Harvesters backs. Bert Stevens failed to get started carrying the ball excepting for two nice jaunts. However, his blocking was great. Heiskell showed Coach Odus Mitchell that he has four punters instead of three. Heiskell punted six times for an average of 43 yards. Two of his punts were into the wind.

Borger took the wind in her back and kicked over the goal line. Heiskell made 5 yards but Hamilton lost 10 yards on a fumble. Heiskell made a nice boot into the wind and then intercepted a Borger pass. Heiskell and Hamilton started a march down the field which bogged momentarily on the Borger 4-yard line. Borger was penalized half the distance to their goal line, two yards, and Hamilton hit the line twice for a yard total. Heiskell followed with no gain, but on the fourth down carried it over. Green's attempt for the extra point was wild.

Borger lost a yard in three tries and booted to Gregory, who returned 20 yards to put the ball on Pampa's 42-yard line. The Harvesters missed a first down and Heiskell booted at the quarter. Borger's first, first down came after a Pampa penalty but the Bulldogs then punted. Elkins and

Hamilton messed a punt and Borger recovered. Hannah passed to Stratton for 12 yards and followed with another for 7 more, but the Harvesters held. Following an exchange of punts Hannah passed to Shaw for 14 yards but on a second attempt Owens, star end, came out of the line to intercept it and run to his own 35-yard line. Elkins made 7 yards in two plunges and Hamilton followed with 12 yards. Heiskell added 15 yards and the ball was on Borger's one-foot line at the half.

**Owens Sensational**  
On the first play after the kick-off, Owens again came out of the line and intercepted a pass on his 40-yard line and carried it to Borger's 27-yard stripe before being downed. It was one of the prettiest plays of the game. Hamilton and Heiskell carried the ball to the Borger 1-yard line, where it changed hands. Borger booted but the Harvesters started back with Hamilton spinning 15 yards on two plays. Gregory lost 10 yards on a bad pass and fumble, then Borger held. Green stopped Hannah twice and the latter punted. Gregory passed to Patton for 10 yards but the Harvesters captain ran 10 yards before being run out of bounds. Heiskell made 10 yards. Hamilton followed with 6 more and then crashed over. Green again failed to kick the extra point.

**Hanna Passes Well**  
Borger completed two passes, Hanna to Captain Kendrick, but the Harvesters held and punts were exchanged. Heiskell kicked 50 yards out of bounds on Borger's 10 yard line at the quarter.

Smith threw Hanna for a loss and he kicked. Stevens made a first down and Hamilton made two more. Heiskell carried the ball to Borger's 4 yard line and then crashed over. Green kicked the extra point.

Hanna passed complete to Stratton for 14 yards after the kick-off and the Shaw booted 50 yards out of bounds on Pampa's 4-yard line. On a fake punt, Hamilton broke through the Borger line and raced down the east sideline for 50 yards before being brought down. It was the only long run of the game and Hamilton showed a deceptive speed. Stevens, on the next play, picked up 20 yards by some nice side-stepping. Elkins and Heiskell carried the ball to the 4 yard-line, where Pampa drew a 15-yard penalty. Heiskell made up the loss and Hamilton went over for a touchdown. Green again failed to kick the point.

**Nice Scoring Play**  
The Harvester second string took the field and Hannah passed three times for 25 yards. On his fourth attempt, Shaw caught the pass and lateraled to Stratton, who raced across the goal line. Patton missed a tackle on the 10 yard line at Stratton side-stepped nicely. The try failed. Shaw intercepted a Pampa pass on the 50-yard line and left for the Harvester goal line with no one in front of him. Suddenly, from no-
