Members of that class said all friends and parents of the class will be welcome to attend the reunion.

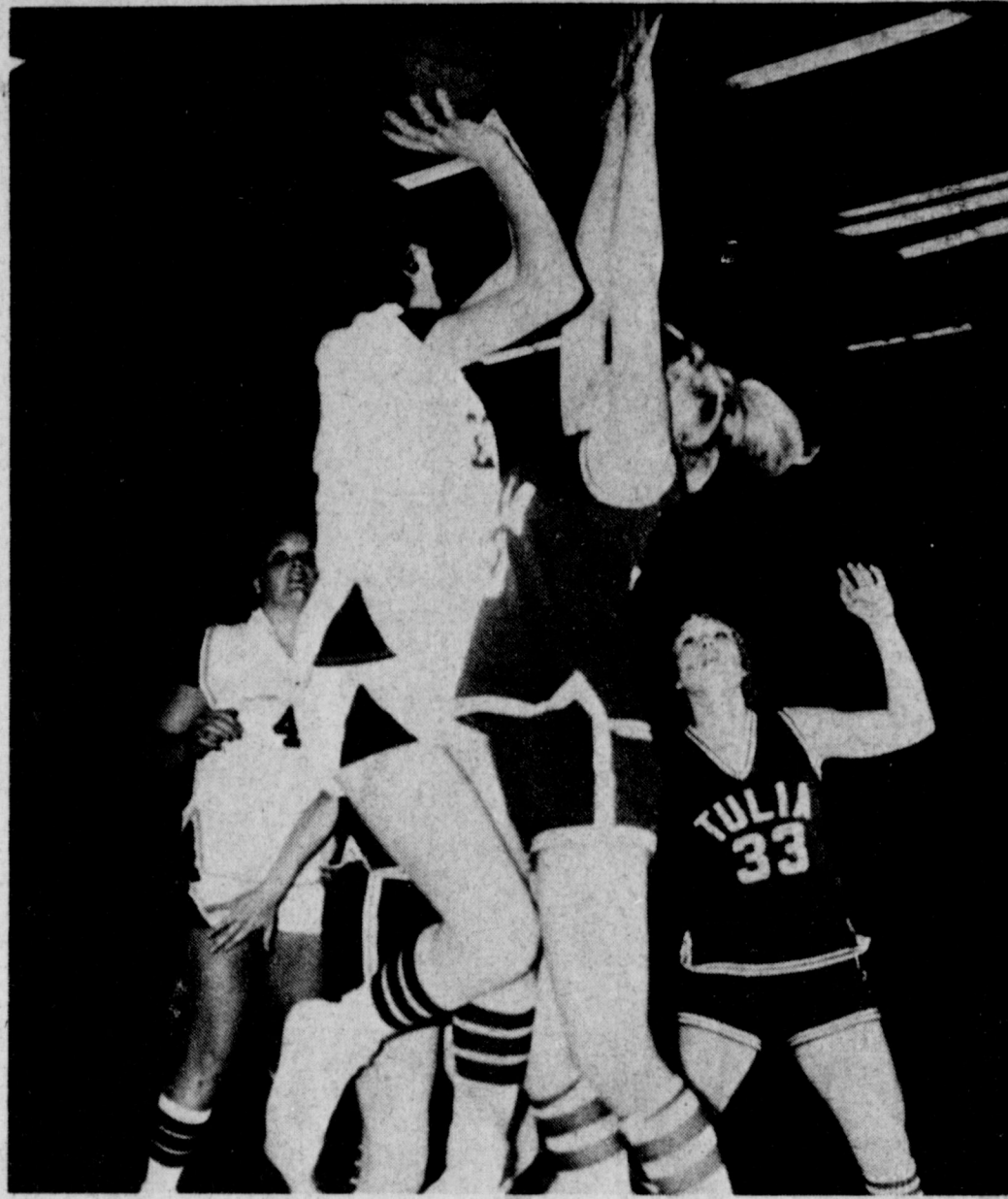

Gins Lag Behind Last Year

On the 12th day of December, 52,780 bales of cotton had been ginned at the 12 rural cotton gins in this area, reported Joe Harbin of Bailey County Electric Cooperative.

Most cotton is reported to be harvested, with many bales in the fields in modules waiting to be transported to cotton gins in the area.

Although some cotton ginner reported they had reached completion with the harvest, others said they would still be ginning cotton into January.

Mules' Basketball Off To Good Start

"Give them time, and they'll be there" was the philosophical approach quoted by Muleshoe Mule Basketball Coach Mike Mayberry late last week. Coach Mayberry reminded that last year, the Mules' basketball team showed themselves and other people in the district that they could be competitive. He said one of the key things to remember was that in past years, the Mules had not competed well in the district at the boys' level and this year, they will be serious contenders for district championship.

Thursday night, both the Mules and the Mulettes played teams from

Lorenzo and won both games. They followed this with unanimous wins over the Olton boys' and girls' basketball teams Friday night to go into the finals in the Saturday night play-offs of the Olton tournament.

The Mules' 43-36 victory over the Olton team evened their season record out at 3-3. Saturday night, the Mules were to take on Shallowater and the Mulettes were pitted against the Abernathy girls' team in the championship games.

Also, last year, coming off a very late football season, the Mules lost the first five games they played, becoming strong

enough later in the season to finish in the district.

He reminded, "We like to run for the championship, and I am very proud of our team."

Only three basketball players from last year's team are with this year's basketball team, and again, they started late, as there was another extended football season. This year, all the varsity Mules basketball team were football players. Only one of the team was a starter last year, and he is Mike Northcutt. "Mike is a gifted athlete," said Coach Mayberry, "and we need gifted athletes. He has a lot of talent which will help the other players perform well, also."

Following an injury in the Muleshoe-Idalou football game, Mike did not work out for the first 10 days of basketball practice, and by the time they played their first game, all the other teams in the district had played eight or nine games.

And, this year, the Mules had three losses before they started clicking in the Olton tournament during the weekend. The boys won Thursday night by a score of 51-49 and were scheduled to play Olton on Friday night.

Realistically, the coach believes that the team is two weeks behind, but he was quick to remind that the early games of the season will give the roundballers the expertise they will need to go into a district that he described as "very competitive this year."

All of the basketball players have a built-in integrity and top characteristics, added the coach. "Our heads are not down, our team will be competitive," he added.

School Dismissed For 'Weather Day'

School students in Muleshoe got an impromptu one day vacation, Friday, following between four and a half and five inches of snow that fell Thursday afternoon and night.

By late morning Friday, snow was beginning to melt under the bright, sunshiny skies, but a hard freeze was predicted for Friday night, and the ice was expected to boost the number of vehicle accidents throughout the area. Wrecker drivers were kept busy Thursday and Friday, assisting motorists who suddenly found themselves skidding into ditches and off the main highways.

Although two fender-benders were reported, no injuries had been reported from vehicle accidents in the immediate area by Friday at noon. Only one accident had been reported to have hit a cow three miles southeast of Muleshoe Thursday night. The cow was the only casualty, although heavy damage was sustained by the vehicle involved.

It was noted by the law enforcement agencies that traffic both inside and on the highways was moving at too fast a speed for road conditions around Muleshoe on Friday.

The snow was preceded by a light freezing rain Thursday morning, and by mid-morning, snow was beginning to fall. No accumulation was noted until rather late Thursday afternoon, although the ground was dusted with white before night.

Thursday night activities were conducted, but many activities for Friday, such as school, were postponed.

Friday afternoon, streets were clearing and snow was beginning to melt on the trees, buildings and

houses. Temperature was expected to dip into the lower 20s for Friday night, and a driving hazard was expected.

West of Muleshoe, snow accumulated up to four inches, and to the east, the snow accumulation was lighter, up to two inches. Around Lubbock, freezing rain had created driving hazards in that city.

Editor's note: The Sandhill Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Sandy Creek takes a side-long glance at the Iranian situation this week.

Dear editor: The trouble with public opinion polls is that sometimes they get into the hands of the wrong people.

A recent poll reported that we Americans are becoming a nation of pessimists, that we think the past was better than the present and the future will get worse, that we have no confidence in ourselves, that as a world force we've become ineffectual.

The Iranians must have gotten hold of this poll and believed it.

It's possible. You've got to remember they're led by a strange guy who has never been seen smiling. There must be a hundred thousand pictures of him circulating in Iran, I've seen at least a thousand myself on television, and not once has he been caught cracking a smile. Nobody has told him that American polls are taken to make interesting reading, to give columnists something to write about, and frequently have no real bearing on anything.

The Ayatollah Khomeini, you know, is the man who told Iranian youths "don't go past high school because it will damage your brain." He must not have caught on to this before he had already finished college himself and it was then too late, the damage had been done.

However a lot of the Iranian youths must not have believed him as I understand there are about 50,000 of them in college in the United States. I doubt if it will hurt them. I know lots of

kids who went through college and it had no effect on their brains one way or the other.

As for our being a nation of pessimists who see the future as bleak, that's mostly hokum. Most people throughout history have spent very little time peering into the future. They take no thought of tomorrow because they're

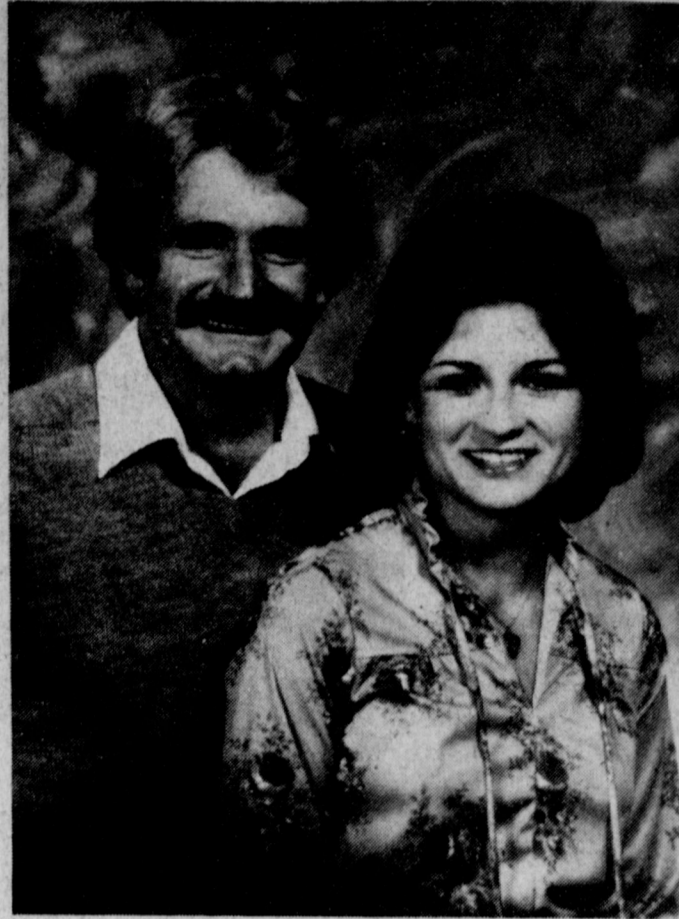

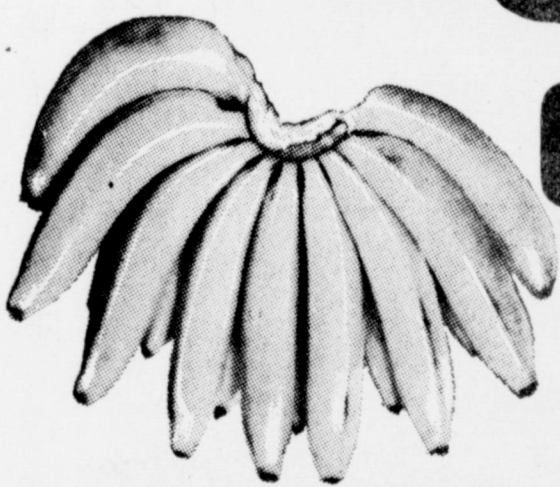

Terraces Add More Moisture To Farm Land

By: Sandy Noble
Soil Conservation Technician

Parallel terracing can reduce erosion, conserve moisture, prevent gullies, and increase yields. Each of these is a factor in farming which can be the difference in profits or losses.

The manner in which most rainfall is received in this area is too rapid to be absorbed by the soil. As the rainfall runs off the land into roadside ditches and playa lakes, it carries tons of topsoil with it.

The majority of our topsoil losses due to water erosion are the smaller clay particles in the soil. These clay particles are more fertile than sand particles and also hold more water and fertilizer for crop use than do the sand particles which remain. These sand particles left, if fertilized, are subject to severe leaching when rainfall is received.

Parallel terraces can be installed to stop these losses. The layout for these terraces can be adjusted to fit all sizes of equipment.

Terraces 'trap' water on the land. As this water cannot run off, it is held on the soil surface until it can be absorbed. In some instances, terraced land may produce a crop while unterraced land is too dry to produce.

If this sounds like it can benefit you and solve some of your erosion problems, contact the Soil Conservation Service for your county. Government cost share assistance may also be available for the land saving practice.

FHA Attends Party For The Holidays

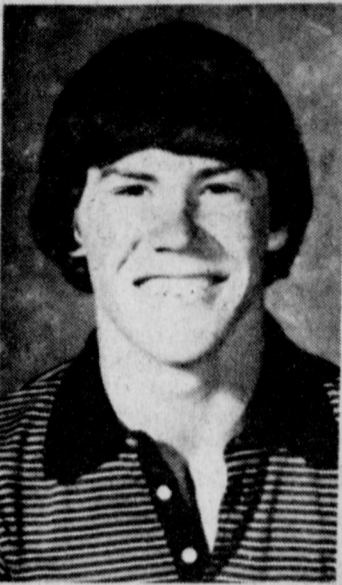

The party was fun thanks to the 25 members and officers who attended. The FHA members would like to thank Mrs. Powell for making the party such a success by letting us have the party in her home.

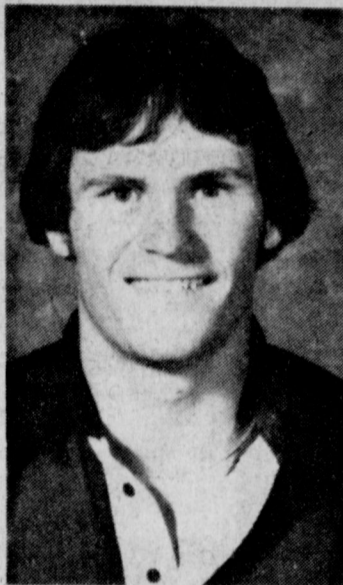
