
## **HEAVY RAIN** FALLS.


Five new pupils were enrolled in Gail Public Shool this week. This is the time of year that pupile generally drop out of school; but we are glad to report an increase in our enrollment this.

April first is the last day on which entries in the contest will be received. Many of our farmers have already prepared their ground for this season's crops and some of them have planted their seed. They shouldwrite to Dallas and have their names enrolled as contestants and let their corn and cotton work for them. Any one of the big prizes will make them independent and there are twenty-nine in all. The first prize cf 31,000 in the boys' and girls' class will pay for an education and the \$2,500 first prize for the men would buy a farm that would made the owner comfortable for life If you fail to get the first prize you still have a chance at the others. But a few days longer and this great opportunity will be gone. Never before in the history of the state have men, women, boys and girls of Texas had such a chance to become independent merely by making a little greater effort in the cultivation of a few acres of land. Dallas, Texas, March 27-The Texas Industrial Congress at Dallas wants 5,000 men, women, boys and girls to write to it before April 1, stating that they will enter the corn and cotton contest for the \$10,000 in prizes offered for the best crops of corn and cotton. The men and women must raise ten acres of each crop and the boys and girls cultivate two acres of each. There are no charges of any kind to contestants but they must send in their names to the Congress before the first day of April. Applications mailed April 1st., and bearing postmarks of that date will be accepted.


