

HEAT WAVE, MORE THAN MONTH LONG NOW, HANGS ON

OKLAHOMA IS HARD HIT WITH SEARING WAVES

NOWATA TEMPERATURE 114—ROCKIES ARE COOLER

OKLAHOMA CITY, where no rain had fallen in 42 days, reported a temperature of 104 yesterday—the thirty-seventh day of more than 100 degree.

A few of the other hot spots on the weather man's map were: Dallas, 100; Fort Wayne, Ind., 102; Peoria, Ill., 104; Springfield, Ill., 118, equalling the all-time record of the day previous; Concordia, Kan., 118; Des Moines, Ia., 106; St. Louis, 108; Omaha, 102; Chicago, 95; and Cincinnati, 96.

The heat wave held on tenaciously today, with a steadily mounting toll of victims.

Thirty-six persons are known to have perished during the past few days as a result of the record-breaking temperatures that baked the mid-continent with no immediate general relief in sight.

A cool wave, reported sweeping down on the stricken areas from the far northwest, failed to put in its appearance yesterday and temperatures skyrocketed far beyond the century mark at a number of points. Scores were prostrated. Further crop losses were reported.

Texas had 15 deaths. Nebraska counted 7 dead since last Saturday, although scattered rains fell throughout the state, reports said little was left of grains, potatoes, potatoes, forage crops and gardens, scattered by hot winds and devastating heat.

It was 103 in Lincoln, the state's capital yesterday—the fifth day in which 101 was exceeded in the past week.

Missouri has had three deaths since the current hot spell began. Illinois 3, Indiana and Arkansas one each; Wisconsin, Michigan, and Ohio, 2 each, while Ohio in addition counted 5 deaths as an indirect result. These 5 were drowning victims. Electrical storms hit Dayton, Columbus, Sidney, and Springfield, Ohio. One man was killed by lightning in Springfield.

Fourth other persons perished near Denver in a terrific rain and hail storm.

The Rocky mountain region was cooler, but the central west and southwest boiled. Nowata, Okla., had a maximum temperature reading of 114. Kansas City, where two of the Missouri death victims were reported, had a high of 110. The mercury hit 113 at Emporia, Kan., further complicating the water shortage problem. Emporia authorities attempted to conserve water by limiting the depth of bath tub water to 4 inches. Emporia has had 55 consecutive days of temperatures above the 100 mark, and many other southwestern communities have suffered somewhat similar fates.

Canyon Flood Fatal to Four

DENVER, Aug. 10 (AP)—A flood clogged death trap in twisting Bear creek canyon west of here claimed the lives of at least four persons.

Only two of the victims were identified. They were Mr. and Mrs. John Husband of Denver, swept to their deaths as they attempted to flee from their stalled automobile to the upper hillside. Husband was 56 and his wife 52.

The two unidentified bodies were those of a boy, about 12, and a man.

More Than 1,000 Guns Taken From Guard Armories

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10 (AP)—William Stanley, acting attorney general, said today the department of justice had called attention of the war department to the theft of 1,027 guns, including ten machine guns, from national guard armories in 31 states since January 1, 1932.

Stanley said in a press conference that the department of justice regarded the thefts as "a very serious matter."

"The criminals have to get guns somewhere in order to operate," he declared. "We hope the people of the states become interested in protecting their arms."

He said the war department was anxious to cooperate and had agreed to communicate with the governors of the various states in an effort to stop raids on the armories.

A formal statement made public by Stanley showed 23,110 rounds of ammunition had been stolen in addition to the guns taken.

He said efforts of the division of investigation of the department had resulted in recovery of 211 automatic pistols, 14 automatic rifles, five other rifles and considerable ammunition.



CRIME NOW EASIER TO WEAR DOWN

During the last year or so the nation's fight against crime has taken on an entirely new aspect; or, to be more exact, it has resumed an old one.
 Organized society's war on the underworld has passed a turning point, and that point is best exemplified by the bloody career and death of John Dillinger.

For more than a decade the underworld in every large city was a commercial undertaking. It bought and sold commodities like any other business group. It muscled its way into legitimate business enterprises and perverted them to its own uses.
 Its big gangs—the Capone mob in Chicago, the Purple gang in Detroit, Egan's Rats in St. Louis, the Diamond outfit in New York—were made up of business men.
 The business was anti-social, to be sure, and it was attended by a terrific amount of violence; but it was business, nevertheless, and the big criminal got his money by buying and selling, rather than by direct action in the old-time manner.
 If you examine the picture now, you will see that this condition has changed. Our public enemies these days are in the tradition of Jesse James rather than Al Capone. They are highwaymen, of the immortal stamp, and not masters of commerce.
 Dillinger, Machine Gun Kelly, Baby Face Nelson, Clyde Barrow—these men had their allies and their confederates; but they were essentially individualists. They went out and took what they wanted by strong-arm methods, just as did the 17th century highwaymen of England.
 They defied the police; the Capones and the Diamonds, all too often, corrupted and co-operated with the police.
 This means that gangsterism today is far less of a menace than it was half a dozen years ago.
 To be sure, the utmost vigilance still is necessary. The work that has been done so well in the last 18 months must continue until highway robbery becomes a relatively rare crime. But the worst is over.
 We are no longer nourishing a world within a world, in our big cities. The gangster is no longer a high-powered business man whose contacts and influence reach far up through the social fabric. He is what the old-time outlaw was—a lone desperado whose days are inevitably numbered.
 The tide of crime has begun to ebb at last.

Woodward Says Huge Chain of Stores Organized

LIVINGSTON, Aug. 10.—The same protection for independent merchants which Attorney General Jewel Lightfoot gave independent oil companies was promised here by Senator Walter Woodward of Oklahoma, candidate for attorney general.
 Senator Woodward recalled how General Lightfoot tried the suit which broke up the oil trust in Texas. Senator Woodward was assistant attorney general under General Lightfoot.
 He promised the same protection for independent home-owned mercantile businesses.
 "I am interested in protection of the home-owned independent merchants against what appears to be a well-planned scheme on the part of huge out-of-state chain store organizations to sap the life blood out of the home-owned independent merchants," Senator Woodward said.
 "As attorney general I propose to lend every assistance to prevent unlawful combinations which appear now to be in the process of formation by these huge foreign out-of-state chain store organizations."
 "A chain store organization of 14,640 stores is in the process of formation," Sen. Woodward said. He displayed a clipping from the Dallas News of July 29 of an Associated Press dispatch which said

the Safeway Stores, Inc., owning 3,289 stores and controlling subsidiaries which own others is about to go in with other chains to form a group of 14,640 stores.
 "My opponent and his law partner are attorneys for one of the big chains planning this combination, the Safeway Stores, Inc.," Senator Woodward said.
 He displayed a letter from J. E. Terrill, an official of the Retail Merchants Association of Dallas which said his opponent and his opponent's law partner are attorneys for the Safeway Stores, Inc.
 "I was present at the last session of the legislature and with my own eyes saw my opponent in Austin lobbying for the chain stores against legislation affecting them," he said.

PARIS SUBURBAN STATIONS BEAR STRANGE SIGNS

PARIS (AP)—A Frenchman never knows these days when he runs for 5:15 what he'll find in the station where the train used to be.
 A short time ago the French railroads signed an agreement with the motorbus operators. The railroads agreed to suppress their local lines and the bus owners promised to stay out of the long haul business. Now the railroads are trying to find uses for the abandoned stations.
 Take the Boulinville station. Instead of posters calling to the attention of the maintainers, there's a sign: "First Class Midwife." Part of the station is rented to a dentist.
 Another station is an automobile showroom. The Porte Maillot station on the outskirts of Paris has become "The Cafe of the Inn of Father Louis." Another house—a cheese factory.

International Sunday School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: Amos Pleads for Justice.
Scripture Lesson: Amos 5:1, 1-15, 21-24.

1. Hear ye this word which I take up for a lamentation over you, O house of Israel.

10. They hate him that reproveheth in the gate, and they abhor him that speaketh uprightly.

11. Forasmuch therefore as ye trample upon the poor, and take exactions from him of wheat; ye have built houses of hewn stone, but ye shall not dwell in them; ye have planted pleasant vineyards, but ye shall not drink the wine thereof.

Introduction
We study this week one of the bravest, most original, and most interesting men who ever lived, the prophet Amos. He was one of the twelve minor prophets so called because they were of less significance and importance than the four major prophets, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel and Daniel, but because their written works are much briefer. He lived in Tekoa, a village 6 miles south of Bethlehem, as Bethlehem is six miles south of Jerusalem. Tekoa is now only in ruins, but is still known by the ancient name.

Eastward the land slopes away for nearly eighteen miles to a depth of four thousand feet. From the foot of the slopes the land rolls away in a maze of low hills and shallow dales, the Wilderness of Tekoa. Upon this unmitigated wilderness, where life is reduced to poverty and danger, Amos heard the voice of God calling him to be a prophet.

Amos, a Shepherd Prophet

Amos was a shepherd like Moses. He was also a farmer, like Elisha. Other great men of the Bible who were humble toilers were Peter, Andrew, John and James, the fishermen; Paul the tentmaker; and infinitely greater than all, Jesus Christ, the carpenter of Nazareth. The Bible is the laborer's book, teaching the value of hard work, and having no sympathy with luxurious idleness. Amos pled this lowly and poorly paid calling in the same rough and almost barren country which, centuries later, was the home of that kindred spirit, John the Baptist.

Amos Saw the Wickedness of the Cities

As Amos saw the life of the cities he visited, he perceived that it reeked with corruption. Unscrupulous judges condemned the innocent for paltry bribes. The rich grasped the small possessions of the poor. Fines were fraudulently increased and measures were fraudulently diminished, and bad grain was sold as good. The most shameful licentiousness was practiced, idolatry with its bestial immoralities, was rampant. Everywhere Amos saw wasteful luxury and extravagance, the more disgraceful in contrast with the wretched poverty of the people among whom he lived. As he witnessed these manifold evils, the soul of the prophet raged within him. He could not but speak.

COUNTY CHAIRMEN FAIL TO OBEY LAW GOVERNING BALLOT RESULTS

AUSTIN, Aug. 10 (AP)—The Texas legislature's latest effort to speedily get election returns to the secretary of state after the unofficial count was completed has failed.

Election judges were directed to send to the county chairman the unofficial total as soon as it was available and the county chairman was instructed by law to telegraph or communicate in the most expeditious way the county total to the secretary of state.

Failure to comply with these requirements was made a misdemeanor or punishable by fine or imprisonment, but few county chairmen complied with the law. It was a week after the July 28 Democratic primary was held before the secretary of state received returns from as many as one-third of the counties.

Meanwhile an organization of newspapers had given to Texans the result of the election at great cost. The leisurely action of election officials suggests that if it were necessary to wait on the state to gather the returns it would be impossible to obtain the results before the second primary had come and gone.

Many states gather election returns as a part of the governmental function. Perhaps the Texas legislature will finally devise a way to collect the results of elections as a service without leaving the expensive burden to the newspapers or other private enterprise.

The secretary of state always has a difficult time getting the returns after the legislature strengthened the law bearing on collection of returns, he thought there would be quicker action but he was disappointed. A large staff of tabulators

was kept on the job night and day for several days but there was little for them to do.

Dempsey and Manziel own a block of 10,000 acres in the Mansfield area where they have been drilling for eight months. The formation checked favorably, the operators said. Manziel has a number of producing wells in the Gladewater area, in some of which Dempsey owns an interest.

Dempsey is expected to return to

East Texas soon and has expressed intention of being present when the Mansfield wildcat is tested. Max Baer is expected to appear in Dallas soon, and the former and present champions will be guests of Manziel.

Dempsey said here recently that his biggest thrill in a business undertaking came when his first victory well came in as a gusher at Gladewater last fall.
