THIS country has mortgages tota'ing 21 billions on homes. The new federal housing act, sections 2 and 3, provides a means for refinancing part of this huge total to a lower rate of interest, averaging a little less than 6 per cent. Some contracts forbid payment of mortgage obligations in advance of monthly maturities but many do not. If Uncle Sam sets up machinery to drive down interest rates in this manner, the result cannot other than extraordinary. The extent to which this will be done is not yet certain.

ARKANSAS CITY, Kas., Nov. 9 (P) — Carrie Nation's hatchet hovered over saloon bars in Kan-

sas today. The Women's Christian Temperance union of Arkansas City, the part of the state where the militant Carrie began routing the bartenders 40 years ago. has pledged itself to swing the hatchet in an effort to keep the state dry
