



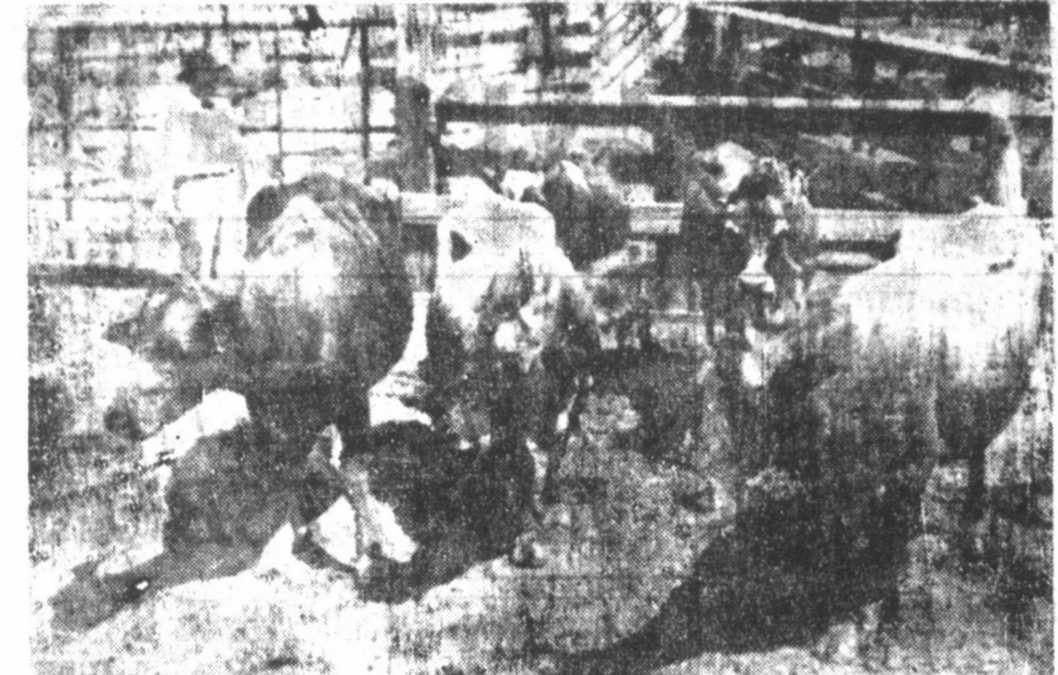
Jealous Wife Burns 'Pictures' That Cost \$1,700

# UNION WANTS PRESIDENT TO INTERVENE IN MELLON STRIKE

## SITUATION IS DANGEROUS TO PEACE IN AREA

### FEAR GENERAL STRIKE BECAUSE OF MELLON POLICIES

By The Associated Press.  
Pittsburgh's central labor union spokesman for 100,000 workers, wants President Roosevelt to intervene in the Aluminum Company of America strike because the situation is "very dangerous to the industrial peace" of the area.

Telegrams asking action were sent last night to the president, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins, and Governor Gifford Pinchot. The messages warned that policies of company officials "dominated by the powerful Mellon financial interests" might lead to a general strike.

Mr. Roosevelt's aid in settling the strike at the Kohler company's plumbing factory in Kohler, Wis., was asked by the Wisconsin state federation of labor today.

The cotton textile industrial relations board offered its services in averting the impending nationwide textile strike, but it got scant attention from the United Textile Workers of America. Only something specific can halt the walkout, strike headquarters indicated.

Acting on recommendation of the national labor relations board, the NRA revoked the blue eagle of the Chicago Motor Coach company. Striking bus drivers rejoiced, hoping to gain the public's support.

A dynamite bomb was exploded early today outside the home of the Republic Steel corporation's general manager at Birmingham, Ala. A former employee was caught by detectives who had laid a trap for the bombers. The plant has been operating with non-union labor since a strike began.

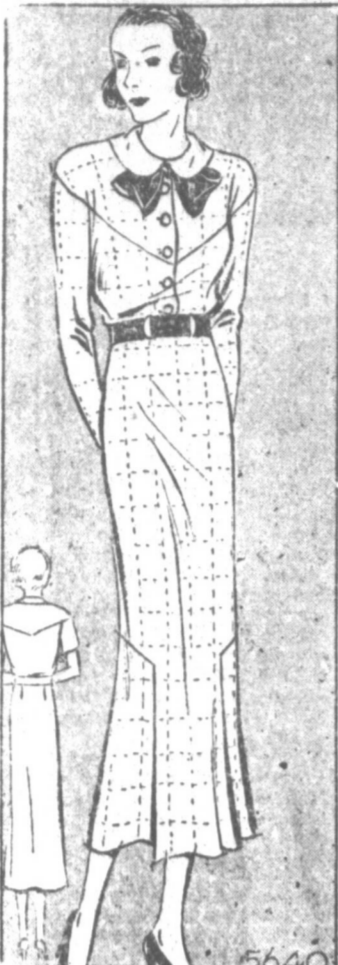

## ENROLMENT IN SCHOOLS DUE TO BE 3 300

### SCHOOL FACTS GIVEN BY LIONS CLUB SPEAKERS

The Pampa Independent district has an area 12 by 15 miles and a scholastic population of 3,000. Supt. R. B. Fisher told Pampa Lions Thursday. However, enrolment in the various schools of the district is expected to reach 3,300 before the end of the term.

Buses carry 700 children daily. The Kingsmill and Hoover schools have been abandoned and the pupils transported here. The Merten school has 3 teachers.

Supt. R. B. Fisher recalled that the late Judge B. M. Baker secured the creation of the Pampa district, which has five members on the board of education instead of the usual seven. The local district is not restricted by many of the school laws which are enacted.

C. T. Runkapillar is president of the board, J. M. Daugherty is vice-president, C. P. Buckler is secretary and other members are Roger McConnell and Roy McMillen. Joe Smith is business manager and tax assessor-collector. The board is legislative rather than administrative.

Two-room cottages are being erected at the Sam Houston and Woodrow Wilson schools to accommodate the low sixth grades which are being removed from the central campus.

There were 102 teachers last year, but about 110 will be needed this year. Salaries will range from \$105 in the grades, on the average, to \$125 in high school on a 9-month basis. Altogether, there are to be 138 employees in the system. The average cost per pupil per year is about \$65. In this cost, however, is the sum due annually for the interest, retirement, and sinking funds occasioned by bond issues for the buildings. This average is far below most schools in the Panhandle.

There will be eight teachers with M. A. degrees in the high school next term. The number of B. A. degree holders has been increasing rapidly for several years and the standard has been adopted by the school for all grades. There are 38 1/2 units of affiliation approved by the All-Southern List of Accredited High Schools.

Yesterday's program was arranged by Joe Burrow. Howard Neath presided in the absence from the city of President H. H. Hicks. Visitors were Maurice Saunders and Eugene Worley, the latter a candidate for state representative.

## Legion to Meet At Mineral Wells On Next Sunday

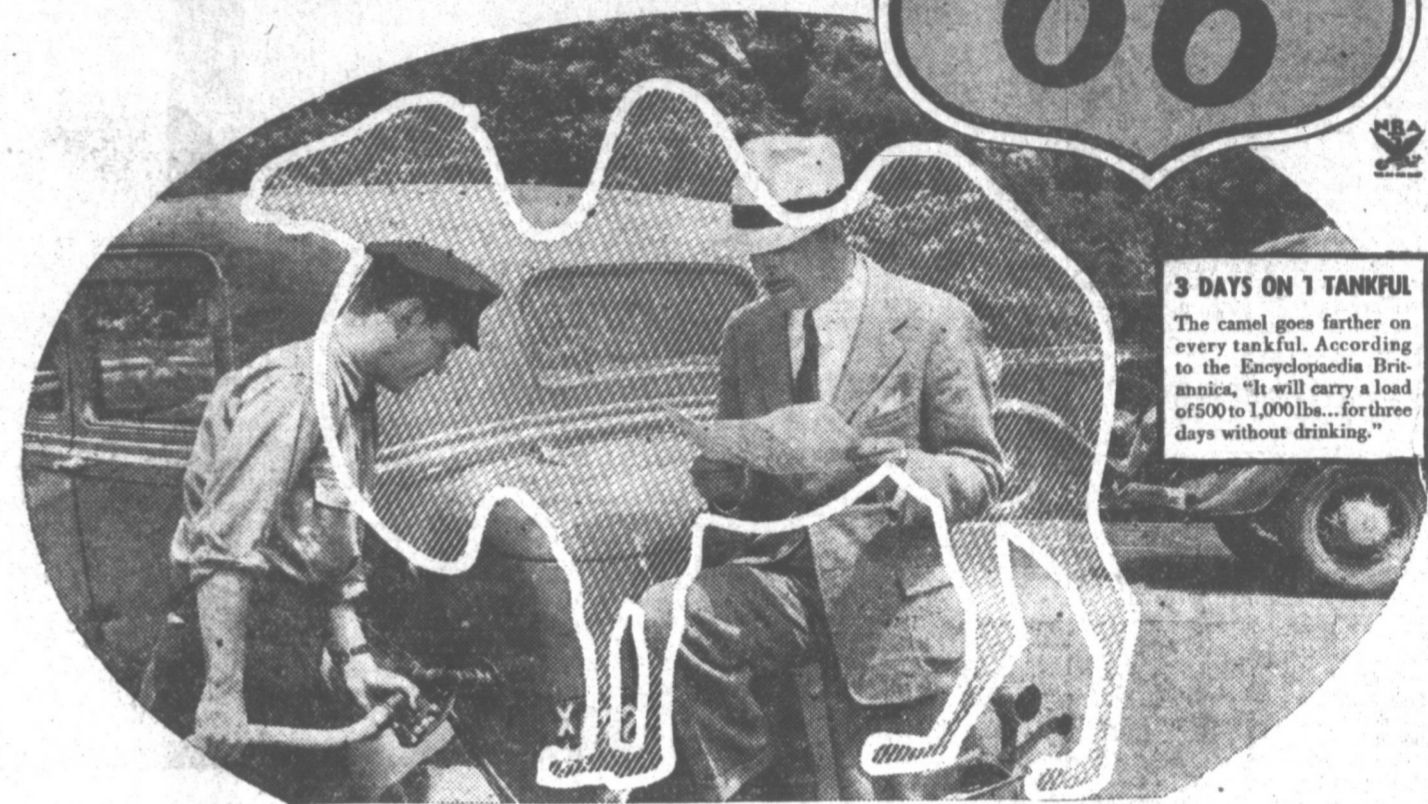
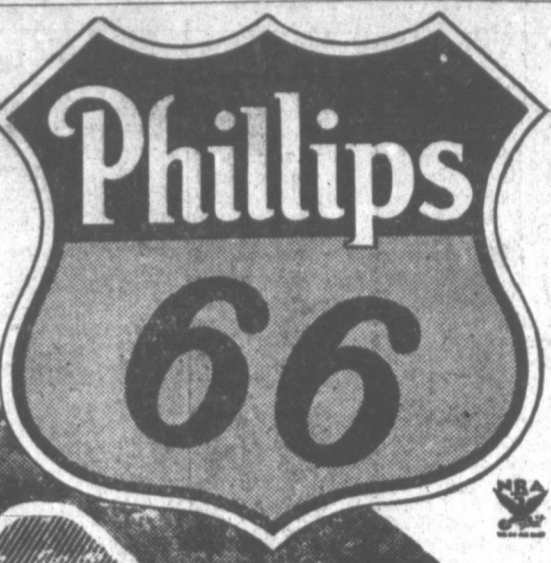

## FRANCE FINDS OIL IN HER OWN EMPIRE—"SECOND CALIFORNIA"

CASABLANCA, Morocco, Aug. 24 (AP)—France's 70-year-dream of finding oil in her own empire has come true.

How long it will last is problematical. A well has been brought in between Fez and Rabat, producing 700 barrels a day, a run which compares favorably with that of many European fields.

Active drilling is going on in nearby fields with expectation that more productive wells will be working soon. But the bare discovery of oil in Morocco, after many years of geological work, has brought joy to France.

While French experts do not expect Moroccan production to supply the French market, they hope to make Morocco self-sufficient. The North African protectorate imports 140,000 tons of manufactured petroleum products each year, with a value of \$9,000,000. They also hope to be able to supply the neighboring colony of Tunis.

News of the discovery of Tsefat, the new well, spread through Morocco as quickly as the fire which broke out at first in the well itself. Everyone is talking oil and the newspapers freely speculate on the change big production would make in the protectorate's economic life.

"What G. H. Q. was to us during the war and the Y. M. C. A. after the war is an indication of what B. R. P. M. will be to us in the future," said one paper referring to the initials by which the bureau of mineral research is known.

"We've got as good a climate as California," said another in a front page editorial, "and now we've got oil too, so California has nothing on us."

Wartime Supply Seen  
France also sees Moroccan oil supplying the fleet in event of war. A comparatively short tanker haul across the Mediterranean would bring oil to Toulon, the big naval base.

In 1895, a French engineer actively began the search for petroleum deposits in Morocco. For several centuries the natives had used crude oil scummed from water pools for their lamps. The engineer knew there must be deposits under the sands, but it took until this year to sink a successful shaft.

## Coaches Will Meet At Vernon Sept. 8

VERNON, Aug. 24 (AP)—The third annual meeting of the Northwest Texas Coaches and Officials association will be held in Wichita Falls Saturday, September 8.

Invitations have been sent to 519 high school football coaches and school principals and the meeting is expected to bring together the largest number of coaches in the association's history.

Interpretations of recent rulings in gridiron play will be featured. Ted Jefferies, Wichita Falls head coach, will give practical demonstrations of the ruling through use of members of the 1934 Coyote squad.

W. W. Gibson, assistant coach at Electra high school, is president of the association. Pat Knieff of Graham is vice-president and Volney Hill of Burkburnett, is secretary.

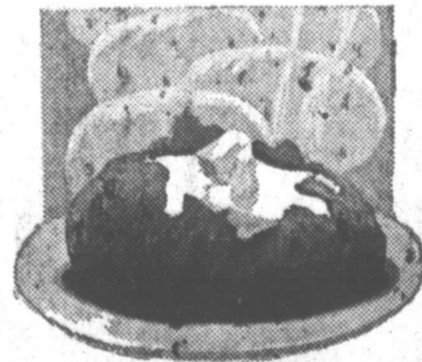

International Sunday School Lesson

BY DR. J. E. NUNN

General Topic: Hosea Preaches God's Love.

Scripture Lesson: Hosea 11:1-4, 8, 9; 14:4-9.

1. When Israel was a child, then I loved him, and called my son out of Egypt.

2. The more the prophets called them, the more they went from them; they sacrificed unto Baalim, and burned incense in graven images.

3. Yet I taught Ephraim to walk; I took them by my arms; but they knew not that I healed them.

4. I drew them with cords of a man, with bands of love; and I was to them as they that lifted up the yoke on their jaws; and I laid food before them.

5. How shall I give thee up, Ephraim; how shall I cast thee off, Israel; how shall I make thee as Admah? how shall I set thee as Zebulim? my heart is turned within me, my compassions are kindled together.

9. I will not execute the fierce-

ness of mine anger; I will not return to destroy Ephraim; for I am God, and not man; the Holy One in the midst of them; and I will not come in wrath.

Hos. 14:4. I will heal their backsliding, I will love them freely; for mine anger is turned away from him.

5. I will be as the dew unto Israel; he shall blossom as the lily, and cast forth his roots as Lebanon.

6. His branches shall spread, and his beauty shall be as the olive-tree, and his smell as Lebanon.

7. They that dwell under his shadow shall return; they shall revive as the grain, and blossom as the vine; the scent thereof shall be as the wine of Lebanon.

8. Ephraim shall say, What have I to do any more with idols: I have answered, and will regard him: I am like a green fir-tree; from me is thy fruit found.

9. Who is wise that he may understand these things? prudent, that he may know them? for the ways of Jehovah are right, and the just shall walk in them; but transgressors shall fall therein.

Golden Text: For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth on him should not perish, but have eternal life.—John 3:16.

Time: Hosea began to prophesy B. C. 722.

Place: Hosea prophesied in the Northern Kingdom.

Introduction

After two lessons on Amos, one can hardly think of Hosea apart from him. Their central messages stand in contrast at many points, not in the sense of contradiction but of enlargement and completion, the one supplying the element of truth that the other lacks or fails to emphasize. An element of tragedy runs through Amos, a note of redemptive love through Hosea. Amos, mindful of the civic and religious corruption of his day, proclaims a God of retributive justice who will surely mete out the punishment that is due. Hosea, no less mindful of these evils, which were growing steadily worse, portrays a God, who in his infinite goodness and mercy will go on loving Israel in spite of the evil ways. Stern, resolute, unflinching is the invective of Amos; tender, compassionate, loving the earnest pleading of Hosea.

God's Love for Israel

"Hosea is sure that God's love for Israel is none the less real for all her foolish acts. His own tragic experience was enough to teach him that. Some time after his marriage to Gomer she became unfaithful, sinking to the depths of immorality and shame. But his undestroyed love for his wife caused Hosea to seek her out and to woo her back. He did not give her up. And exactly that was what God was doing for his wayward people. In spite of their sacrifice to Baal, their moral, social, and political corruption God could not cease loving his own. The deep compassion that Hosea had for his faithless bride was only a symbol of God's infinite love for his faithless people."

The Book of Hosea

Yet Hosea as a Book is perhaps one of the least read of all the Bible Books. For this there is a reason. Hosea is perhaps the obscurest Book of all the Bible Books."

"Hosea endorses Amos's protest against the divorce of external devotion from morality, and sums up such teaching in our Lord's favorite quotation, 'I desire mercy, and not sacrifice; and the knowledge of God more than burnt offerings.'"

"Hosea is the prophet of salvation. His is the backslider's Book. Its keyword is 'Return.' Its key-text is: 'Come, let us return to the Lord, for he hath torn and he will heal us; he hath smitten, and he will bind us up.'—Rev. John Weaver Weddell, D. D.

The first three chapters of Hosea relate the history of the prophet's unfaithful wife, and point the moral. Then follow the chapters that contain the general teachings of Hosea, from three of which our lesson is taken.

This Lesson As Applied To America Today.

"One wonders what would happen were this generation to take seriously the doctrine of God's unrequited love. In spite of our personal and social faithlessness, God loves us still. Our social order is polluted, our economic life is degraded, our political life is corrupt, but God loves us still. O America, he cries, how can I give you up? Do you not understand? Why will you not return?"

"Nevertheless, as Hosea loved faithless Gomer, as Jehovah yearned for erring Israel, even so yearns God for the heart of America today. He loves us in spite of

our sins and pleads for our faithful devotion. Herein is our hope, as individuals and as a nation, a return to a life that is worthy of God's eternal and unchanging love." The Moral and Spiritual Decline of Israel

First of all, there was a general religious lapse among the Ten Tribes. The days of Jeroboam II were noted for their ostentatious prosperity. Yet the nation at heart was decadent or dead. The boasted luxury of the time was but showy gauze half-concealing the very process of dissolution like "the changing colors of the dying mullet." The worship of Jehovah when engaged in at all was performed through the medium of carved or molten calves while the worship of Baal was not only allowed but sanctioned and

openly practiced. The spirit of the people was soaked and stained with greedy secularism. The professed piety that prevailed did not deter from callous crime. Spirituality was at low ebb. It was a period of moral and spiritual decline, of internal anarchy and misrule, and so of defeat and downfall among the nations.

The Right Ways of God, Hosea 14: Hosea's closing chapter is a gentle, earnest plea that Israel will abandon his iniquities and go back to God, whose loving arms are open to receive him. The chapter is an anticipation of the parable of the prodigal son. The nation is bidden, since it is too poor to offer bullocks to its Lord, to take instead words of repentance, "the bullocks of its lips," bringing to God a

promise to worship idols no longer. "For in thee, and not in idols, the fatherless findeth mercy." Walking in God's Ways, Hosea 14:9. This verse (v. 9) sums up and concludes the entire Book. "Who is wise, that he may understand these things?" The things that Hosea has been teaching "Prudent, that he may know them?" Know them, not merely with the mind, but with the obedience of the life, which is the only true knowledge. "For the ways of Jehovah are right," Hosea has been showing with burning eloquence how evil are the unjust ways of Israel, how foolish and wicked are the nation's departures from the right ways of Jehovah. "And the just shall walk in them." The obedient shall find God's ways a smooth and

safe path, in which he shall meet with no obstructions and encounter no dangers. "But transgressors shall fall therein." The wicked cannot walk in God's ways. They will soon be tripped up, snared by the devil, hurled over precipices to eternal death.

Walk In the Light "Walk in the light! thy path shall be a path, though thorny, bright: For God, by grace, shall dwell in thee, And God himself is light."
