HOUSTON, Dec. 27. (A)—Twenty-five new commercial oil fields were brought in during 1937 in the upper and lower Texas coast area.

It was a banner year for wildcatters with an average of two new fields a month coming in. Inde-pendents were responsible for many of the new fields with the major companies moving in later.

Five hundred thousand Texans employment in the huge 10,000,000,000 industry which has a payroll in this area of around \$720,-

000,000 annually.

The upper Texas coast area had
15 new fields developed and the
lower coastal area 10. The new
fields brought the number of producing areas in South Texas to 200 oil fields.

Even the submerged lands along the coast and in the Gulf of Mexico did not escape the drillers' bit Wells were sunk in lakes, streams and along the edge of the Gulf. New fields brought in in the upper Texas coast were Aldine, Friends-wood, Big Hill, La Belle, North Creek, Call, Segno Sandy Point, Danbury Hitchcock, Garwood, Mau-

ritz, Edna and Lost Mule. In the lower Texas coast the new fields developed were Chapman Ranch, Mineral, Lamar, Luby, Midway, Sandia, Slick, South Burnell, Stratton and Straunch, Nucces county led in the volume of oil de-

Aside from the vast oil field development in the coastal area, the huge refineries at Houston, Baytown, Texas City, Port Arthur, Beaumont and Ingleside were kept running full blast throughout the year except for the shortlived strike at the Shell refinery near Houston. Petroleum and petroleum products were the chief exports of Texas

during the year.

South Texas refineries handle crude oil piped from Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Colo-rado, Wyoming and New Mexico. In addition much crude oil is im-ported from South American fields. west of the Mississippi river is moved to the Houston district for refining and vessel movement.

New producing stratas in old fields were found in many sections of South Texas during 1937. The new sands revived lagging interest in many fields, particularly around the Victoria area, where explorations at the close of the year were

being made.
The daily average South Texas production under Texas proration was 500,000 barrels.

#### ENLIGHTENED PEOPLE BULWARK DEMOCRACY

There appears to be a close relationship between newspaper reading and successful de-

Recent studies in the consumption of newsprint paper (which is a rough index of the number of newspapers printed and read) show thas in the democratic countries of the world consumption of newsprint is high. In countries of less democratic form it is low.

Here are the figures: In the United Kingdom in 1936, 60 pounds of newsprint a year were used for each person. In the United States it

Now follow the figures down through other countries and think, as you read them, of the degree of democracy each country has. Australia and New Zealand, 58; Canada, 36; Sandinavia, 26; Netherlands, 23; France, 18; Japan, 13; Finland, 13; Germany, 11; Russia, Italy and Mexico, 3; Brazil, 2.

The parallel is not perfect, of course, but it runs close enough to suggest that in today's world only those countries whose people read newspapers widely can maintain democratic

If you stop to think about it for just a moment, you can see that it must be that way. under a system where the people themselves make the decisions on economic, political, and social questions, they must be informed if they are to make the right decisions and thus make democracy work. And no other popular medium has ever been devised that it half as informative as the daily newspaper.

In countries where people's opinions come to them ready-made over the air from the powers-that-be, in a form that they must accept unthinkingly, or else, newspapers do not flourish. Nor do they flourish in countries where everyone knows the papers are nothing but sounding-boards for the officials who are maintaining themselves in power.

Note also that those democratic countries which stand highest in newsprint consumption also have the best newspapers, the most in-

Glenn Frank, the educator who is now sought by the Republican party to chart its course, once said that a good newspaper, thoughtfully and carefully read, may be the equivalent of a college education, And so it may be, given intelligent, fair editorship, and thoughtful, critical reading.

You can read your newspaper, think about what is said, criticize it, go back and read it again, all quietly, thoughtfully and at your own good time. That is where newspapers stand alone as organs of information. That is why there is such a direct relationship between newspaper reading and democracy.

#### A HERO DIES

It can't be said too often, especially right now. There are heroes of peace, as well as war. In Chicago, Dr. Richard H. Jaffe is dead. In China, a Japanese flyer is dead, Back in his homeland, the Japanese flyer is honored as a hero. To the ancestral gods is told the story of how he died flying against Japan's enemies. Those gods will also know the rest of the story, whether there are Chinese babies lying mangled in some gutter, or wandering helpless and homeless. Those gods probably will not blame the flyer himself, knowing that he was only the agent of others.

But Dr. Jaffe is dead, too. He was 48 years old, an outstanding pathologist. When a mysterious disease struck down 13 newborn babies in a Chicago hospital, Dr. Jaffe took up the fight. He worked night and day to save baby lives. Overstrained by the tension of the search, the urgency of the fight, Dr. Jaffe's heart gave way. He died.

Who shall say his death in the effort to save babies was not more glorious than the death of those whose work results in killing

#### Washington Letter By Rodney Dutcher

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27-"Lack of confidence" is so often said to be a fundamental factor in the business slump that it's a news item of the man-bites-dog type when anyone says that "too much confidence," rather than not enough, was one of the recession's major causes.

If you believe that overexpanded inventories had much to do with the drop in production, you're likely to be impressed by this argument now that pertinent figures on inventories are available. These figures indicate that the largest corporations had larger inventories last September than they had in 1929.

"The plain truth of the matter is that business in general had too much confidence, and speculated in inventory buying," says Dr. Leon Henderson, chief economist of WPA. "When a corporation is uncertain about the future, it does not buy materials, supplies and new machinery. Business went blindly ahead even when many storm warnings were signalling that the great mass of consumers lacked purchasing power to take their goods off the

Henderson's words have been carrying plenty of weight in Washington since he predicted the business recession with startling accurancy, many months in advance. He gets mad when anyone calls it "the Henderson depression," as some facetious commentators do.

According to Henderson's tabulations, 50 large corporations with total assets of \$1,330,-300,000, had inventories valued at \$232,456,000 at the end of 1929. But at the end of last September, even though the price level was considerably lower, these inventories amounted to \$285,606,000.


Those who are optimistic about business prospects are sure that industrial activity will pick up "when inventories get worked off."

The space-limited health umnist often has to emphasize the caloric, vitamin and mineral salt centent of food. And this favors the impression that these are the only factors involved in good nutrition Actually, there's much more than food to nutrition.
Of course, an adequate supply of

the necessary food materials is the starting point of good nutrition. But nutritional efficiency is also promoted by proper exercise in the open air, by suitable clothing, adequate rest, good mental hygiene practices.

A well balanced and adequate diet comes first. But the food one eats must be digested, absorbed, distributed throughout the body and utilized by the cells before the tritional cycle is completed. Waste These phases of nutrition—di-gestion, absorption, distribution, utilization by the cells, and elimination-are influenced by all the practices and conditions entering into one's everyday life.

It is possible to eat a thoroughly adequate diet and yet be badly nourished because one is short on rest, one is dogged by worry and rest, one is dogged by worry and amotional excitement, one overindulges in alcohol, and so on.

RUSSIA GRADUALLY CHANGING

An article in the Saturday Evening Post, "Hunting Gold for Stalin," written by a mining engineer, describes some very interesting changes taking place in Russia. He tells about a representative of the Russian government going all the way to Alaska to persuade him to come

When he introduced the representative to the superintendent of one of the Alaska mines, the Russian representative could not bethat an efficient superintenwould be working in dirty clothes, and it seemed very strange to him when the superintendent sat down and ate with the workers

When the engineer was put in charge of a new gold mine in Rusfound the output very low. When he wanted figures to show the cost, the Russian formerly in charge said they did not need them because if one project lost money, it was made up by another. But the American engineer insisted on knowing the cost. He found that the workers were very inefficient because they had no interest in the project, being paid practically equally as to needs He finally persuaded them to pay

in proportion to production. This greatly increased production and developed output. In 1929 the Russian government ruled that there should be no private gold prospecting. This resulted in there not being enough new mines found. So in 1933 they revised their order and permitted private prospecting.

Now, the author says, a prospec-

tor, who is successful. can make as much in one year as a skilled workman could previously make in a hundred years.

The art of painting seems to have got so far out of touch with the average citizen's capacity to understand and enjoy it that we speak of "art lovers" nowadays as of a class apart, like mathematicians, versed in a mystery that is closed to the common run of folk.

The Goya book is a reproduction The Goya book is a reproduction of 85 of the famous etchings Goya made to record the things he saw in Spain during the Napoleonic occupation of that country. It is a bit of living testimony that both art and human beastliness are timeless; for these powerful shocking sketches of the terrible things that happen in war might have been drawn this year, with another Spandrawn this year, with another Spanish war than the one Goya knew

It takes a strong stomach to digest some of these etchings; but right now, perhaps, is the best pos-sible time to have a look at them,

for one reason and another.
"Cezanne" includes 100 black-andwhite reproductions of the master's paintings, together with 18 in full color. It is accompanied by a learned commentary on Cezanne's place in art. Unfortunately (from my standpoint, anyway) this is addressed to those already familiar with the jargon of painting; it of-fers little help to the humble soul who would like to know what it is all about.

"The Impressionists" contains approximately 100 reproductions, some in color, of paintings by Manet Gauguin, Degas, Sisley, Renoir and others. There is an introduction telling what Impressionism is, or was, and thumb-nailing the leading members of the school.
