Her scholarship is a Business Scholarship for Leadership. She is also on the Dean's Honor List for the winter semester at Tech.

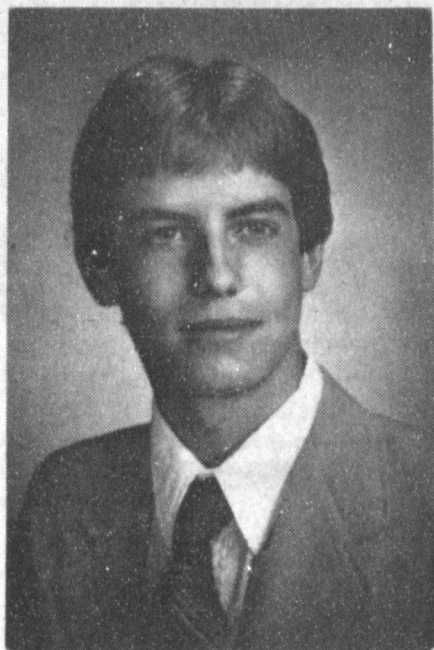

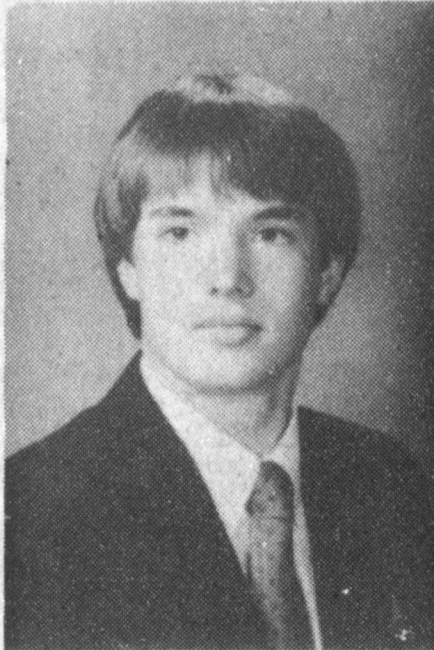

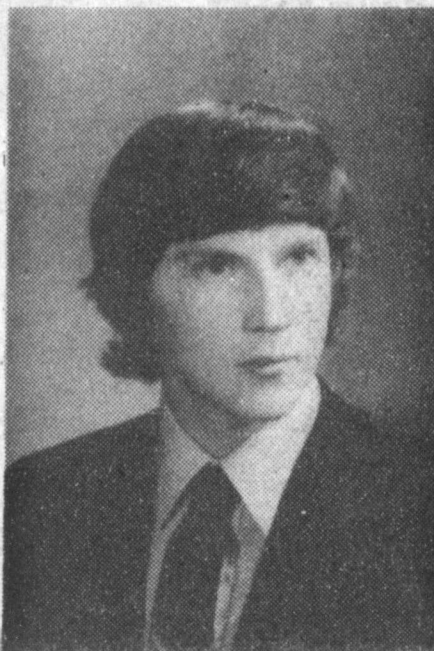

MHS Seniors Joining Project Graduation

Muleshoe High School is among 33 high schools in West Texas whose seniors this year will enjoy an alcohol-free and drug-free alternative to the traditional parties where alcohol is allowed, that in the past have been an accepted form of celebration following graduation, Mel Pope, District Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation in Lubbock, announced. The celebration is also called 'Project Graduation.' Muleshoe held such a party in 1985.

Muleshoe seniors are planning a trip to the student union building at Eastern New Mexico University at Portales, and will return to Muleshoe about 5 a.m. for breakfast in Muleshoe. Last year, the group had their celebration in the Texas Tech Recreation Center in Lubbock.

"Most of the communities who have accepted the alcohol-free and drug-free alternative this year know how nice it is for their young people to have a great time at graduation without drugs and alcohol, because 22 of these same high schools had such a celebration last year," Pope continued.

There are 90 Project Graduation celebrations throughout Texas in 1985 according to statistics reported to the SDH &

PT by the schools.

The term Project Graduation and the concept started in Maine, in 1980, when horror got the attention of parents and schools. Eleven people were killed in one weekend on Maine highways, and all 11 deaths were alcohol related. Shortly following this tragic weekend was the graduation season, and one school district in Maine almost matched that figure. In one community alone, seven young people were killed in alcohol related accidents, and one wound up paralyzed and comatose. Several others were arrested for operating under the influence--all in the two weeks before graduation. It got people's attention. The Project Graduation concept has spread to other high schools in Maine, and now no young people are killed during graduation time in Maine in automobile crashes. Since that time the concept has spread all over the United States.

In 1984 two high schools in Texas had Project Graduation events. These high schools were Monterey High School in Lubbock and DeValle High School near Austin. Monterey High School had their all night

Washington Will Retire From School System

And, now, after 28 years with the Muleshoe Independent School System, George Washington is retiring at the end of this school year. Most of his years with the school have been as a coach, and later as a physical education instructor.

With the passing of the years, Washington, or 'Coach Washington,' as he is still affectionately known, has taught many youngsters, and now he says he is beginning to teach, or has already seen the children of some of his first students, graduate.

For instance, before coming to Muleshoe, Washington was athletic director and head coach at Lazbuddie for two years. While at Lazbuddie, he had Glen Watkins, and later had both Watkins' sons, Randy and Gary, in the Muleshoe Schools. Both have since graduated from MHS.

Before he crossed the 'Big Red' out of Oklahoma into

Texas, he spent two years at Guymon, Okla. as assistant coach; this was followed by one year at Wakita, Okla. as athletic director before going to Wayne, Okla. for one year as athletic director.

After coming to Muleshoe from Lazbuddie, he was assistant coach and junior high school coach under Wayne Mantooth and Bill Taylor, who is also retiring from the Muleshoe schools this year.

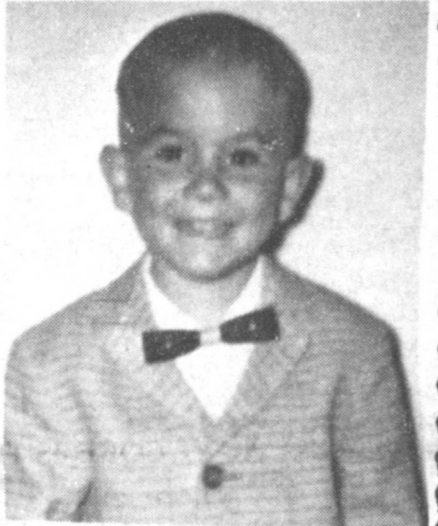

COLLEGE STATION — Witnesses who have trouble recognizing a criminal suspect in a lineup may have better luck if the lineup is conducted at the scene of the crime, says a Texas A&M University psychologist.

Dr. Steven Smith, an assistant professor of psychology whose special research area is memory enhancement, conducted experiments showing that eyewitness recognition and overall recall of an event tends to be more accurate at the place where it happened.

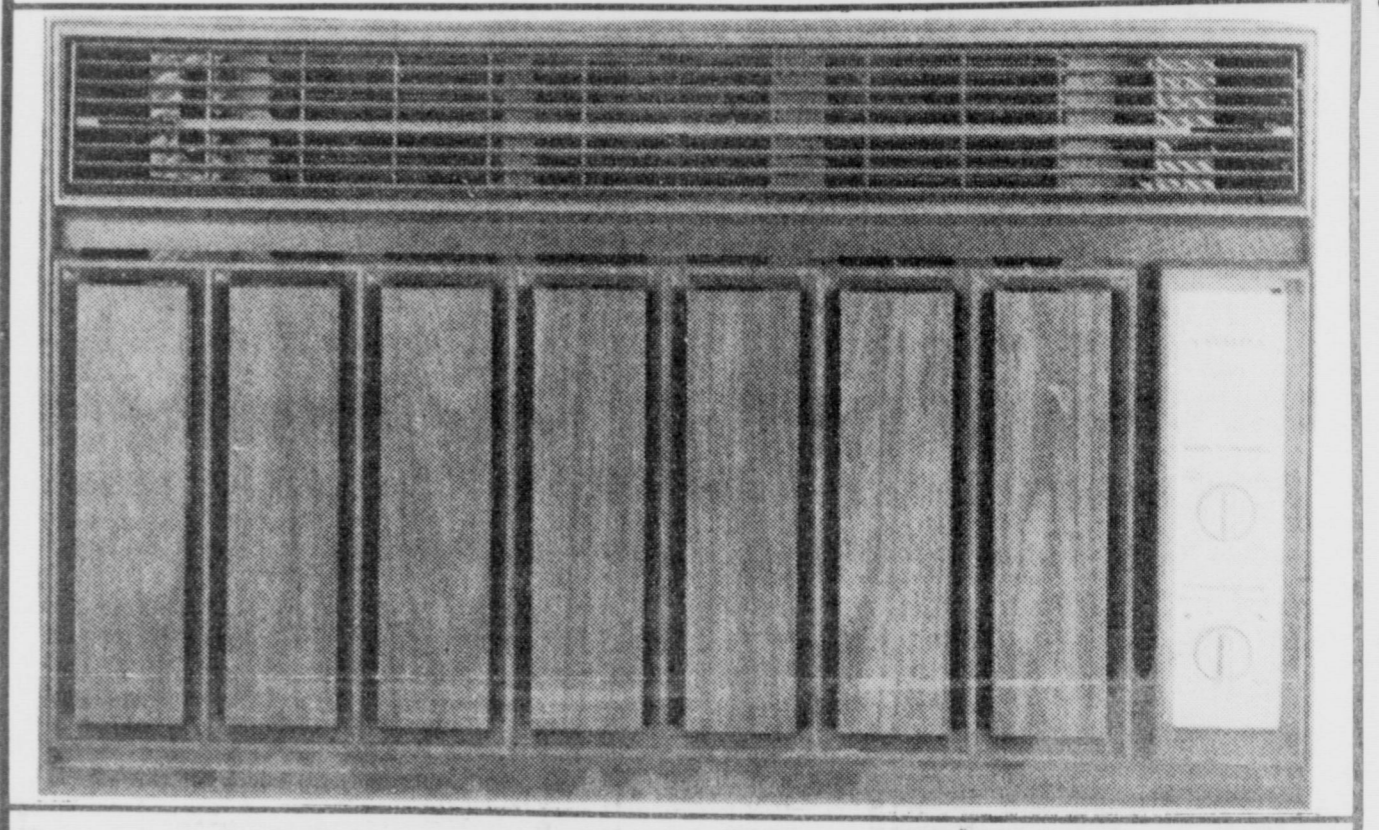

Texas A&M engineer has developed method for making robots 'see'

COLLEGE STATION — An electrical engineering researcher at Texas A&M University has developed a new method to make robots' camera "eyes" see much like humans do — with depth perception.

"It is very exciting because robot vision is important for space docking, autonomous vehicles (vehicles that drive themselves with artificial intelligence) and for robots on underwater vehicles," said Dr. Norman Griswold, the developer and an associate professor of electrical engineering.

With a grant from NASA's Johnson Space Center, Griswold has developed a new stereo vision model based on the mechanisms of human vision. Using mathematics, Griswold's system fuses the images from two parallel cameras into one image — an image that looks much like what is seen by the human eye. The process is performed by a computer in about 10 seconds.

"Once a robot has depth perception, it can reach out and grab something or know how far it has to travel to get something," the Texas A&M engineer said.

Griswold studied medical and biological journals to learn how it is believed humans see and to find out how to simulate brain function. His computer model is based on theories of how the brain's visual cortex fuses the two images from human eyes by directional filtering.

FOLK MEDICINE AND OLD-TIME "CURES"

In ancient and primitive cultures, magic, incantation, and conjuration were used to heal diseases and "cast out" death, thought to be caused by malignant spirits. The concept of incantation, recited or worn as an amulet, was regarded as effective well into the European Middle Ages. There were exceptions. The ancient "Egyptian Book of Surgery", dating from 2500 BC makes only a single reference to a method of magic in its discussions of 48 separate surgical operations.

One of the most influential concepts of medical practice was the doctrine of signatures, originating in either Egypt or Babylonia and holding sway until the 17th century. The doctrine held that all natural objects (plants, herbs, animals, animal parts) were marked by a sign that revealed their medicinal benefit for specific ailments. Basically these plants or animal parts were used because of some resemblance to the disease to be cured or to the diseased part of the body. Thus, the poppy was used for brain disorders because its fruit was shaped like a head; red roses were considered beneficial for blood problems, gummy plants for pusexuding sores, many-seeded plants for barrenness, trefoiled plants for heart trouble and so on.

Some superstitious remedies used for illness included: A poultice of cow manure for aches and pains, a poultice of blackpepper and lard for asthma, an amulet of camphor around the neck was supposed to be effective in warding off contagious diseases, and for a sore throat the patient was encouraged to wear gold or amber bead necklaces (good for the jewelry industry but was not very effective medicine for the patient!).

A few old-time remedies have proved effective such as eating green apples for the treatment of diarrhea (modern therapy now includes apple pectin) and using the extract from the fox glove plant to treat heart problems (this extract is still used today and is called Digitalis). In years passed, the public was forced to utilize superstitious and old-time cures because of a variety of reasons: The scarcity of physicians, or because of the limitations of science in past years to find a "cure" for their ailment. We are fortunate that this is not the case today. Modern medicine, new and improved medications, and a more exact scientific approach in solving medical mysteries has given us the ability to help more ill people than ever before become well. Your best course of action when you are ill is to see your doctor. He is the expert!

Texas A&M sociologist finds Mexican-American family roles changing

COLLEGE STATION — Old stereotypes about Mexican-American families are outmoded and invalid, particularly for professional and working class families who are undergoing profound changes, says a Texas A&M University sociologist.

Dr. Norma Williams, an assistant professor of sociology who has been studying Mexican-American families in the Austin and Corpus Christi areas, says many commonly-held beliefs about Mexican-American family relationships are wrong.

"To read the literature, men have a lot of machismo, they are very patriarchal, and the women are weak, passive and submissive. I think a lot of the material is outdated and erroneous," she says. "It (the stereotype) has been overgeneralized and overromanticized."

Williams, whose research is funded by the National Science Foundation and who is preparing to write a book on her findings, says the changes taking place in Mexican-American family life include the lessening importance of the baptismal ceremonies and shrinking of extended families.

She says as more and more Mexican-American women follow careers, they are engaging in the creation of new roles for themselves and the husbands are responding to these important changes.

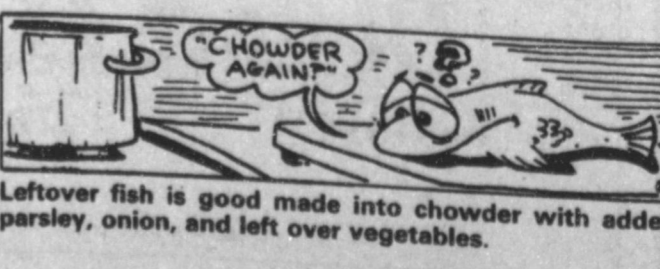

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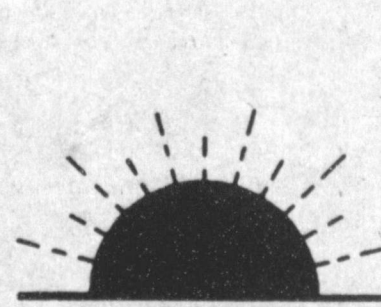
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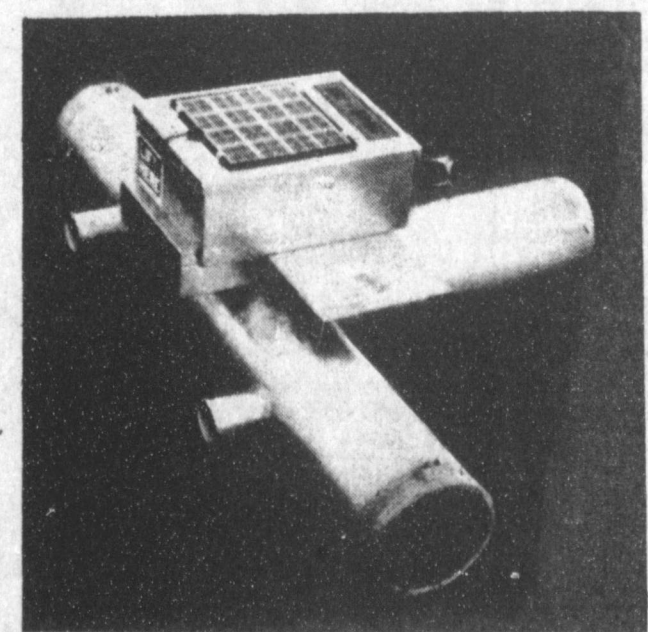
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
