# SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS RIGHT OF R.R. COMMISSION TO SPACE OIL WELLS

# CONSERVATION **ac**t sustained IN NEW RULING

ACTION IN REFUSING A PERMIT TO DRILL ALSO UPHELD

AUSTIN, June 12. (AP)-The Texas supreme court today upheld the right of the railroad commission to regulate the spacing of oil wells in the interest of conserva-

The opinion sustaining rule 37 promulgated by the commission was in the case of C. H. Brown and the commission against the Humble Oil & Refining company.

The court held that while the commission's acts must not be uneasonable, unjust or arbitrary if was definitely charged by law with enforcing conservation and the rule tended toward that end. At the same time, the court sug-

gested that the rule be amended to specify more clearly exceptions authorized under the law so all per-sons interested in a field might know more definitely their property

"We hold that the railroad commission has the power, under the conservation statues, to promulgate a spacing rule, as was done," the court said, "regulating drilling of oii wells, and to provide for excep-tion to the rule to protect vested rights and to prevent waste and the render the rule invalid.

"No unreasonable hardship need result if the rule is faithfully and impartially applied by those authorized by law to administer it'

The court further said subdivision of tracts of land subject to development as a whole would not give the right to drill wells under an exception to the rule.

"Where rule 37 is in force in certain territory," the court continued, "a voluntary subdivision of a tract of land subject to development for oil and gas as a whole would not entitle the owner of said divided tract, or tracts, as a matter of right, to an exception of rule 37 on the ground of vested rights, because such act would destroy the rule and render the conservation laws a nullity."
Rule 37 also was upheld in the

case of Maurice Stewart against the railroad commission, in which Stewart was refused permission by the commission to drill a well in Gregg

A Travis county district court granted Stewart an injunction prohibiting interference by the commission, and the appeals court reversed the decision. The supreme court upheld the court of civil appeals.

"We find nothing in this record

which shows the action of the rail-road commission in refusing the permit was unjust, unreasonable or arbitrary," the court said.

The billion dollars allocated includes \$223,000,000 or CCC-which finds it can't recruit 300,000 authorized ew men without liberalizing restrictions; \$500,000,000 or roads and grade crossings—which can't be distrib-ted until each state submits a complete program for pending its share; \$250,000,000 for Ickes' slum-clearnce and housing projects-which Ickes lieutenants say re seriously delayed since real estate speculato ipped off by DAI as to probable sites.

Then there are \$100,000,000 to army engineers—for elatively slow projects; \$100,000,000 for a Wisconsin rogram—dependent on raising of a similar amount by state, and enabling legislation; \$10,000,000 for laine's Passamaquoddy power project-to which obections are heard as to employment prospects, feasiility, and partisan politics; and \$100,000,000 for Dr. ugwell's Rural Resettlement Administration - inside which confusion seems to reign supreme.





CHICAGO, June 12 (AP)-Invisible barriers against the free flow of and agricultural products among the sister states have been a survey by the Associated Press indicated today.

The check on milk and nearly everything that grows varies widely except in its purpose, which is under the constitutional guarantee of right to protect the health of its citizens. The checks range from requiring that products for importation meet the standards of the state of origin to an absolute embargo.

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Alcoholic liquors are an exception, being subjected to almost as many sets of regulations as there are states






