Special Session of Legislature Called for Relief of Farmers

Austin, Texas. Aug.-Gov. O. B, Colquitt has called the Legislature to meet in special Session Monday August 24th, to pass a warehouse bill to facilitate the holding of cotton. The bulk of the Texas crop is marketed on the Eastern hemisphere and as the war has closed the Euorpean markets, the Texas crops must either be held until the war is over, thrown upon the American mills, or sold to speculators. A warehouse bill is proposed to enthe farmers to store their cotton in bonded warehouses and for the issuance of negotiable receipt under State supervision. The

bankers , it is understood, will, if | To the County or Ex Officio desired, loan money on the cotton so stored at a very low rate of interest, enabling the producer to keep possession of his cotton The Texas crop is estimated at three and one-half million bales, valued at approximately \$250.000.000. Texas produces one-fourth of the cotton crop of the world. The American mills are capable of handling about 35 per cent of the production of the United States' leaving 8,000,000 bales to be exported, and of this amount the English spinners take 3,500,000 bales; Germany 2,200, 000 bales; France 1,000,000 bales Solid Geometry, English Litera-Italy 500,000 bales; and the re-

mainder of the exports go to the mills of Spain, Belgium, Russia, Japan and other countries.





Latest Answers Obtainable on Different Farm Topics.

Dallas-When a farmer visits the 1914 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 17, Nov. 1, he should go to that fount of good, practical information, the exhibit booth of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas, where he will find the latest answers obtainable on differ-

ent farm topics. If a problem presents itself in the way of plant disease he can ascertain the proper ways of treatment. He will also find samples of adulterated seeds and how to guard against them,

The work of the students of the col-lege will be illustrated in all its various details. Photographs of the experi-mental work in progress will be shown. The proper methods of keeping dairy records will be exhibited, and there will be charts showing the relative value and cost of different rations. the

MILK TESTING CONTEST.

Students of A. and M. College Will Show Expertness at Coming Fair.

Dallas-When the students of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas gather at the 1914 State Fair of Texas, which begins Saturday, October 17, there is going to be some real milk testing demonstrations and students' judging contests. Already a good-natured rivalry is in evidence, and although the cash premiums are not so large, the honor of winning first is what really appeals to those who will take part. Milk will be tested for added water,

added skim milk preservatives, and butter will be tested for moisture, salts and the resence of other fats then butter fats. Cash prizes totalling \$70 will be awarded in the judging contests which will consist of judging two class-es of dairy products.

Factory Exhibits at Fair.

Dallas.-Miniature factores in operation promise to be one of the big features of the 1914 meeting of State Fair of Texas, which begins Saturday, October 17, and continues sixteen days. S I. Munger, director of this department of the State Fair, has already closed negotiations for a thread manufactur-ing plant exhibit, as well as various other industrial plant representations It is especially planned to show the handling of cotton, from the field to the gin and thence to the mill, an ex-hibit that will deal with the importance of developing the cotton manufac-turing industry of Texas.


