Deportation of Alien Criminals

Civic clubmen are beginning to take notice of U.S. deportation laws and the abuses which surround them. Incredibly cruel family separations are noted, on one hand, in contrast to political racketeering on the other.

Under existing law, any judge or even police court magistrate can avert the deportation of an alien criminal, but not even the President of the United States can prevent deportation of an alien who is of good character. A proposed new law would provide for limited discretion in staying deportation of aliens, of good character who have been in this country 10 years or have members of their immediate families here as citizens. It would make it possible to deport for one crime involving moral turpitude without regard to length of residence; render racketeers and gangsters convicted of carrying dangerous weapons subject to deportation; subject the violator of state narcotic laws to deportation on the same terms as violators of federal acts; make the alien who smuggles other aliens into the country deportable, the present law enables the deportation of the alien who enters illegally but does not permit deportation of the alien smuggler.

Immigration to this country has dropped from more than a million a year to between 30,00 and 40,00 a year. For several years, more persons of foreign birth have returned to their native lands than have come here as immigrants. The alien, contrary to popular opinion, is no more a menace to our form of government than are native Americans. A few hundred aliens of criminal fame have given the illusion of this condition. There are 4,922,000 aliens in this country, of which about 1,500,-000 have directly or through their parents applied for naturalization. There are about 100,000 subject to deportation for illegal entry or other causes. Alient seamen, numbering from 250 a year upward, enter this country illegally and about half of them remain. About 289,000 Mexicans have no legal right to live in this country.

In the administration of the immigration laws, however, there is found to be a tendency of political groups to coddle the alien criminal, yet deal with severity with the alien of good character. Husbands are being torn from their American-citizen wives and children. Often the husband is deported to one country, the wife to anotother, and the children to a third-separating them beyond any possibility of reunion. Certainly such laws are barbarous and un-American, unworthy of a humane nation. If the law is not changed, 7,000 husbands must be deported immediately, and 5,000 wives and children taken from their American-citizen husbands.







no board member of employe may "receive any commission or profit whatsoever from or have any interest whatsoever in any purchase or sales of any alcoholic liquors."

An appropriation of \$25,000 is provided the board to start operations. Upon repayment of that amount, a revolving fund of \$50,000 will be set up from revenues to finance administration.

## George Carroll, **Great Baptist** Leader, Is Dead

BEAUMONT, Dec. 14. (A)—George W. Carroll Sr., philanthropist and a tax free refuge. trustee of Baylor university, died of afternoon at 5:30 o'clock

He was 80 years old and had lived here the last 62 years. Running on the prohibition ticket. Mr. Carroll was a candidate for vice president of the United States in who 1904 and two years prior had been nominated for governor on the

same ticket. He was one of the leading prohipitionists of the state, and a large part of his fortune went to aid the prohibition cause. Almost all the rest of it was given to aid Baptist

education in Texas. His largest single gift was \$100,-000 to Baylor university. It was from this money that the science hall at the college was built. At the same time, his father gave the school a like sum, from which the Baylor chapel was built.

Mr. Carroll was at one time one of the state's wealthiest men, his
