AMERICAN HOSPITAL IS WRECKED; EMPEROR **ESCAPES**

WITH EMPEROR HAILE SE-Dec. 6.—A squadron of Italian air planes smashed more than 1,000 bombs into this city today. The emperor's palace and an American hospital were hit. About 12 persons were killed and

Approximately 100 of the bombs hit the emperor's palace, but Haile Selassie himself had taken refuge in the old Italian consulate and so escaped injury.

The American Seventh Day Ad-

ventist hospital and a Red Cross tent were hit by the bombs. One ward and the office of the American hospital were wrecked. Casualties were heavy among the

civil population, and panic broke Major G. A. Tiefraipont, a Bel-gian officer, was wounded, and Miss Petra Hovig, a Norwegian nurse, suffered a broken leg. The emperor was not injured in

The raid lasted exactly 17 min-The anti-aircraft guns around the palace opened fire ineffectively.

CRISIS GROWS DESPITE BRITISH AND U. S. MOVES

BY A. T. STEELE SHANGHAI, Dec. 6.—The central Chinese government expressed gratification today at the American and British pronouncements in the North China crisis, but a spokesman asserted the negotiations over the separation movement "turned

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definitely worse." The spokesman for the Nanking government said the latest obstacle to settlement of the North China autonomy controversy was attributable to anger by the Japanese military over the strengthened position of the central Chinese au-

He expressed fear that a "manufactured incident" was now impend-

The Chinese government is gratified at the Hull and Hoare pro-nouncements, which come at a most opportune and critical moment," a foreign office spokesman told the Associated Press at Nanking.

"We are sincerely hopeful they will have a salutary effect on Japan," he asserted, referring to the statement by Secretary of State Hull, calling for observance of treaties, and by British Foreign Secretary Sir Samuel Hoare, admonishing Japan over North China

incidents. The spokesman said his government wished to emphasize that Chinese representations to Washington and London were not directed toward invoking any treaties such as the nine-power pact, guaranteeing the independence and ter-ritorial integrity of China.
"Our purpose was to bring the

North China situation to the attention of the governments, and to point out a possibility that treaties were violated," he explained.

He was pessimistic over the ne-gotiations—now at a standstill—undertaken in the northern provinces to forestall the autonomy move-

The Nanking government's decision to offer North China drastic administrative reforms to replace self-rule, the spokesman said, had strengthened the stand of central officials, but Japanese military opposition threatens the negotiations anew.

Authoritative sources disclosed the central executive committee was holding off appointments to high government posts as long as pos-sible pending another definite turn

in the northern situation.

A difference became evident in the attitudes of the Japanese military and diplomats.

The Japanese embassy here main-

tained an air of optimism over ul-timate acceptance of the Nanking proposals for a northern settlement through Chinese reforms despite the renewal of Japanese military pressure at Peiping.

War Minister Gen. Ho Ying-Ching, sent north by the Nanking government to work for a settlement, authoritative sources said was still under a warning by the Japanese military to leave North China immediately.





A. U. convention.

Avery Brundage of Chicago, Olym-pic committee chairman who heads the pro-participation forces, and Jeremiah T. Mahoney of New York, A. A. U. president, on the side fav-oring the boycott, both claimed vic-

It seemed unlikely that the joint committee could reach an agreement. Both sides were worried, however, about the outcome if the subject came to an open fight in the general sessions of the convention, which begin tomorrow.

Other important matters to be

considered were whether to hold the Olympic track and field trials and the national championships together cr separately, the awards of places and dates for both the title events and the trials in all sports, the consideration of numerous record appli-cations, and the hockey committee's special "headache," imported play-

Regardless of the outcome of the A. A. U. battle, it seems certain that the United States will be represented at the Olympics. The Olympic committee has taken no official notice of the protests so far, going ahead with its plans for sending the athletes abroad.

The utmost the A. A. U. could do would be to refuse to certify them and perhaps suspend those who

Mahoney indicated last night, however, that no such drastic steps would be taken. He was confident that the boycott forces could muster encugh votes to carry a resolution calling on the Olympic committee to withdraw its acceptance of the German invitation and to refrain from sending teams to Germany.

If successful, the "opposition" plans to initiate a move to instruct delegates to the American Olympic committee to carry on the fight when that body, meets Sunday. A. A. U. representatives hold more than 25 per cent of the A. O. C.

## THE NEW DEAL WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON .- There is a great deal of headwagging among New Dealers this season and nearly every other wag has to do with Justice Owen Josephus Roberts of the United States Supreme Court.

Roberts has come to be known as the "odd man" on the court, by which it is meant that there are four liberals and four conservatives and that you just can't tell about Roberts.

Thomas Reed Powell, Langdell professor of law at Harvard and a foremost authority on jurisprudence, recently went so far as to say that Roberts "is at the moment the supreme court of the United States.

As the test of AAA's validity draws nigh, with the Wagner labor act, Social Security, the holding company act, and various other measures following close behind in the parade to the highest bench, the jitters as to Roberts increase in New Deal legal offices.

Nothing has happened since Roberts wrote the 5 to 4 opinion against the railroad pension act, which Chief Justice Hughes declared "raised a barrier against all legislative action of this nature by declaring that the subject matter itself lies beyond the reach of the congressional authority to regulate interstate commerce," to encourage anyone to believe Roberts isn't whetting

his ax for further progressive legislation. In the case of Hughes, the government's lawyers are far more hopeful. They could hardly afford to be otherwise, for without Hughes they would be lost. On their fingers they always first count Brandeis, Stone, and Cardozo, ther add Hughes after little hesitation, and finally mention Roberts with either a groan or a prayer.

Answering the published theory that Hughes yearns to go down in history as the chief justice who stood like a rock against New Deal radicalism, they point out that he has stood with the liberals in every important 5 to 4 liberal-conservative split thus far.

Although he voted against the government in the NRA case, he was the one of nine and when he ruled against it in the oil cases he was one of eight-including Brandeis and Stone.

Hughes was on the liberal side in the 5 to 4 decisions along with Roberts, in the Minnesota moratorium and New York milk cases and upheld the government in the 5 to 4 gold cases.

And when Roberts jumped to the conservatives on the railway pension case, Hughes read a hot minority opinion in answer to Roberts' sweeping condemnation

There is one factor which it is well to take into consideration. Th is the health and the ages of the

One or two of the conservative justices show occasional signs of wear. And death, or prolonged illness that would necessitate refirement, would mean a new liberal on the land's highest bench. With one more liberal on the court, the New Dealers would not need to worry about Roberts.

It may be rather a delicate subject, but there is food for thought in the fact that the economic and political future of the United States may depend on whether just one old gentleman manages to keep his feet dry.
