The justices, who are expected to decide the farm act's validity in the Hoosac Mills case, were told in two briefs that the legislation should be outlawed, and in a third that it was essential for mational welfare. "The immediate and long-time economic and social interests of the people depend substantially upon the inclusion of agriculture in the general protective system which has been adopted by the United States," the Farmers National Grain corporation contended.

That Census of Business

ho is a busy man.

and said:

Business men sometimes are rightly suspicious of statistical surveys, but there appears to be no grounds for fear in the census to be started January 2 by the U.S. department of commerce.

Basically, it is a "white collar" project to provide employment. While the value of business censuses to merchants generally is small, there is a distinct value to newspapers, chambers of commerce, and everyone wishing to show the latent possibilities in an area. Similarly, investors need such a group of facts upon which to base sales campaigns and location of plants or branches.

Locally, it is to be expected that most of those who do the work will be local residents. There has been too much of a tendency to send in men and women to do work of a sort which Pampa's unemployed could do.

The census will require most of 1936. The fields to be covered are retail trade, wholesale trade, hotels, amusements, insurance, real estate, manufacturers' sales, trucking and warehousing, banking and finance, bus transportation, business services, non-residential building activites, broadcastng, and other business activities. Data to be obtained will be the kind of business, type of operation, volume of business in 1935, operating expenses, number of persons employed, payrolls, and specialized trade statistics.

Only sworn employes of the census bureau will examine the individual returns. No access to them is permitted under the law, not even to other governmental agencies. Preliminary reports by states will be released as rapidly as compiled, beginning about July 1, next, followed by county and city reports and kind-of-business reports.

Under these conditions, business men should give full cooperation in furnishing the data.







Acting under orders from on high, a certain federal office is concicting a far-reaching plan for reorganization of the federal government. Most of the very few who know about it understand Roosevelt will spring the plan on the next Congress as one of his major economy gestures in advance of the presidential campaign.

Old-timers have seen so many reorganization plans killed off in the last dozen years that they wouldn't advise you to take this too seriously until you actually observe tangible developments.

Nevertheless, there's a strong feeling within the administration that the emergency agencies must soon be cut down and merged with the regular departments if they're not to become permanent. The reorganization planners of 1935 are taking the precaution of consulting key members of Congress, with the hope that the plan won't be promptly pulled to pieces when-if ever-it is sent to Capitol Hill. * * * *

The plan hasn't been submitted to top men in the administration for approval and dissection yet, but in its sketchy outline it would, among other things:

1.-Change the Interior Department into a Department of Federal Works, merging under it all public works and construction activities, including the housing activities, the Procurement division of the Treasury, and work-relief activities.

2 .- Transfer public lands and national parks and definitely merge AAA into the Department of Agriculture

3 .- Build the Labor Department of Labor and Welfare which would include the public health service, Office of Education, and consumer and similar agencies.

There's a lot more to it which hasn't leaked out from the planners yet. One thing that's being taken into account, however, is that this administration looks forward to a big future in housing.
