

### **DPS** confiscates \$52,010 today

More suspected drug money is off Interstate 40 as a Texas Department of Public Safety trooper confiscated \$52,010 during an early morning traffic stop today.





An agricultural coalition, including several panhandle organizations, is suing the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service over a minnow in the Canadian River.

Ross Wilson, vice president of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association, one of the litigants, said the group is challenging the federal agency's critical habitat designation for the Arkansas

traditionally found in the Arkansas, Canadian, Cimarron and Beaver Rivers as they flow through four

The suit was filed Thursday, May 2, in federal court in Albuquerque.

"We believe the Fish and Wildlife Service has violated the Endangered Species Act by failing to conduct a proper economic analysis of their designation of critical habitat for the shiner," Wilson said. "The Service is say

About 98 percent of the total critical habitat area is in private ownership. Wilson said the habitat designation could restrict land use and groundwater pumping in the listed areas.

## Israelis, Palestinians near agreement on church standoff

BETHLEHEM, West Bank (AP) -The outlines of an agreement to resolve the 35-day standoff at the Church of the Nativity were taking shape Monday, but the sides remained at odds on several issues, including how many of the wanted Palestinians holed up in the Christian shrine would be deported.

The Palestinians want no more than eight of those in the church sent into exile in Italy, while Israel reportedly insists that at least a dozen be deported. Another 30 Palestinian militiamen would be sent to the Gaza Strip. according to the Palestinians

A U.S. official confirmed media reports that a senior CIA official identified by the Maariy daily as Tel Aviv station chief - was involved in the talks, and would also take part in negotiations Monday evening. The U.S. official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said a resolution was not Jikely before Tuesday.

Prime Minister Ariel Sharon, meanwhile, arrived in Washington for talks with President Bush. Israel and the United States agree on the need for radical reform in Yasser Arafat's Arafat's place as its head. Sharon wants Arafat kept away from future peace talks.

Ahead of the meetings, Bush said on Monday he shared Israel's disappointment with Arafat.

'He has disappointed me," Bush said as he toured a school in Southfield, Mich. "He must lead. He must show the world that he believes

In new fighting, three Palestinians, including an activist in the Islamic militant group Hamas, were killed early

Palestinian Authority, but differ on Monday in clashes with Israeli troops in the Gaza Strip.

The Israeli military, meanwhile, said Israeli soldiers who opened fire from a tank Sunday, killing a Palestinian mother and two of her chifdren, ages four and six, were spooked by the sound of a tank tread coming loose. The army initially said that a mine blew up near the tank, but said on Monday no traces of an explosion were found. The army said it regretted the deaths. A 9-year-old Palestinian boy also was killed by Israeli fire in the West Bank on Sunday.

## **Founder of Carson County** Square House Museum dies

AMARILLO (AP) - Jo Stewart Randel, the woman who founded the Carson County Square House Museum, has died. She was 86.

Randel, who died Sunday, started Carson County Square House Museum in a cottage built in the 1880s. She served as director of the museum and chairman of the board of trustees. She was currently chairman of the finance and development committee of the

The museum opened in 1967. Today the museum in Panhandle houses 23,000 items; including 5,000 photographs. The items illustrate the history and art of the Texas

Randel, who was a benefactor to numerous

area groups, was born Dec. 14, 1915, in Clarendon where she attended McKillop School and Clarendon College.

She completed nearly 30 documentaries on family histories and on topics such as petroleum and ranching. She wrote a four-volume history of Carson County called, "A Time to Purpose," which won Texas State Award for outstanding area history.

She was preceded in death by her husband, Ralph Randel, and her daughter, Margaret Randel Koons. Survivors include a granddaughter and a grandson.

Her funeral will be Tuesday at First United Methodist Church in Panhandle. Panhandle is 27 miles east of Amarillo.

## Teen dies in collision on Lake Buchanan

AUSTIN (AP) — Officials were searching for a speedboat driver after one teen died and two were injured when a speedboat collided with their small boat while the teens were fishing on Lake Buchanan. The collision was being

investigated as a hit-and-run.

"They didn't stop; they didn't call for help; they didn't call EMS, nothing," Burnet County Justice of the Peace John Gunnoe said.

Justin Roberts, 18, is believed to have been killed by the speedboat's rotors. He was set to graduate from high school in three weeks. Fishermen found his body

floating in the lake Saturday morning. His friends, Kelly J. Corbin, 19, and Jim Daniels, 17, were also found Saturday. They were alive. "We'd like ... to find the

boat that did not stop to render aid," Rex Daniels, father of Jim Daniels, told the Austin American Statesman Monday editions.

Since the fish were biting Friday night, Roberts phoned his father around 11:30 p.m., telling him they'd be late.

Corbin was found by fisher-

men a little after dawn, still in

and suffering from hypothermia. Jim Daniels, a junior at Lampasas High School, was found in the water about a mile from where the teens were fishing, suffering from hypothermia. Both were the weekend.

Like all three of his friends, Jim Daniels was wearing his life vest.

"That was a blessing," Rex Daniels said. "He wouldn't be here if he didn't have it on.'

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Bush said Monday he shared Israel's disappointment with Yasser Arafat as he prepared for talks at the White House with Prime Minister Ariel Sharon.

"He has disappointed me," Bush said of the Palestinian leader as he toured a school in Southfield, Mich. "He must lead. He must show the world that he believes in peace."

The president declined to preview his White House meeting with the prime minister. "I am going to have a private conversation with Ariel Sharon and I'd rather that my Iranian arms conversation, what I'm going to tell him and discuss with him ... he'll be the first to know about it," Bush said.

But Bush said Israel's resistance to meeting with Arafat is an expression of disappointment in his ability to lead.

"After all, right before we had a security agreement done, a shipload of ammunition showed up that can probably be aimed at the Israeli citizens. So there is a high level of disappointment," Bush said of the abortive attempt to smuggle 50 tons of Palestinians.

White House Still, spokesman Ari Fleischer said Bush's view is that Sharon must negotiate with Arafat because he is the head of the Palestinian Authority.

"The president's focus is going to be on peace," Fleischer said Monday. "The ingredients are there for progress to be made. It just requires time and patience."

get Bertie LaRoe. The couple drove south, away from the oncoming twister, and stopped a few miles away.

'We sat and watched it," Shirley LaRoe said. "There were a whole bunch of people watching."

Others took cover in a nearby grain elevator, schools or storm shelters.

Eduardo Joven Castillo, 37, and his wife, Yolanda Castillo, 35, were killed in the storm. They were in their mobile home when the twister struck about 6:45 p.m. CDT, Department of Public Safety trooper Wayne Beighle said.

Their 9-year-old son, Eduardo Castillo Jr., was not injured and is staying with his uncle, who lives next door to the victims, he said.

Ten homes were destroyed and the roof of the First Baptist Church of Happy on the south end of town was blown off. Although about 50 buildings were damaged, everyone else in the town of 647 was accounted for. "We have found everybody. Fortunately all of them turned up," Beighle said.

Four people were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo. Jamie Gonzales, 45, remains in critical condition and the other three, whose names were not available, were listed in stable condition Monday, Beighle said.

Beighle said a witness told him the twister that took aim on the town was spawned by a much larger one. As the larger tornado began to move upward, the smaller twister spun off from the bottom, the witness told Beighle.

"That's what hit the town," Beighle said.

City secretary Patricia Simms said the damaged homes were located along Interstate 27, on the south side of Happy.

Lynn Adams used a broom to brush off dirt plastered against her stucco house on Monday. A tin roof barn that housed the town's school buses used to stand behind her home. The barn is now gone.

Adams and her husband were at a local school when they learned that the barn had been ripped from its concrete foundation.

"I just knew my house was gone too, but it wasn't," she said. "I don't know where the barn is, but it's gone."

Authorities from nearby communities were on the scene helping with cleanup and recovery

operations. The Red Cross had set up a shelter. Tonya Smith and her husband were driving toward Happy when they saw the tornado

"It was right beside us. We stopped and watched it until we realized what it was," said Smith, who lives on a farm west of Happy. "Our daughter and two grandchildren were here in town by themselves so I was kind of freaking out for them."

The tornado was one of at least six reported in West Texas and the Panhandle. There were no immediate reports of injuries from the other. tornadoes.

There were reports of baseball-size hail about 10 miles south of Littlefield, the National Weather Service said.

A frontal system pushing through the area sparked the outbreak of severe weather, which included torrential rain, baseball-size hail and strong, gusty winds.

Happy is in Swisher County, about 30 miles south of Amarillo.

The Fish and Wildlife Service listed the shiner'as threatened in November 1998. At that time, the FWS said that critical habitat designation would not provide any additional benefit but were forced to designate critical habitat as part of a court settlement when the Center for Biological Diversity sued the agency.

In the settlement, filed Feb. 16, 2000, in U.S. District Court in San Francisco, the FWS agreed to designate critical habitat for the minnow, long used as a bait fish.

Under the Endangered Species Act, critical habitat, the specific geographic areas that are essential to threatened or endangered species, may require special management considerations.

Critical habitat for the shiner includes nearly 1,200 miles of the Arkansas River in Kansas. the Cimarron River in Kansas and Oklahoma, the Beaver (also known as the North Canadian River) in Oklahoma and the Canadian River in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma.


