Hot time in S'town Councilman resigns; recall petition now in circulation

SKELLYTOWN - A recall petition is circulating in this Carson County community in an effort to remove the mayor from office.

The community of Skellytown is also short one city council member and apparently without a city secretary today.

City Councilman Jim Davis walked out of Tuesday night's meeting after the council. three to two, voted not to allow City Secretary Nancy Grogan, the to return to work. Grogan was suspended with pay Thursday by Mayor Lucille Lawrence.

Davis said this morning

that he could not return to the city council under its present leadership.

"The vote was for her not to come back to work," Mayor Lawrence said following Tuesday night's meeting when she was queried if Grogan's employment had been terminated. "If she's not going to come back to work, she's not going to come back to work."

The mayor said that Grogan's termination is apparently what the council intended with their vote.

Davis, who voted along with newly elected Chad Johnson to return Grogan to work, questioned why the city secretary's employment had come up again.

AUSTIN (AP) - The proposed 90-mile Texas 130 toll road, the most expensive highway project in Texas history, will be a bit cheaper than the state expected.

The price tag for the toll road that will run from Georgetown to Seguin is \$1.38 billion. The state's estimate had been \$1.4 billion to \$1.5 billion.

Permit hinges on 3 words

WHITE DEER – Three little words may halt the proceedings today at the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District meeting here.

Scheduled to meet this afternoon to, among other things, consider the high impact production permit applications filed by a group of Roberts County landowners operating as Mesa Water, Inc., the water district board of directors were expected to approve the applications, but a last minute objection may have delayed the approval.

T. Boone Pickens, Dallas businessman and Roberts County rancher, and his neighbors who want to sell water beneath their land to thirsty cities downstate were expected to have their applications approved at the water district's meeting this afternoon, but three words added to the title of the applications have apparently caused Mesa officials to object.

The landowners applied for pumping permits in the fall of 2000. Although protests and lawsuits over the applications seemed to have been settled last month, clearing the way for approval of the permits, Mesa reportedly raised objections Tuesday over the wording of the (See PERMIT, Page 3)

Shooting, wreck go to grand jury By KATE B. DICKSON

Charges that erupted from a fatal shooting incident and two traffic deaths are among 38 cases that will go to the Gray County Grand Jury on Thursday, said 31st District Attorney Rich Roach.

Grand jugors will hear witness testimony concerning a late night shooting on March 10, in which a 22-year-old Logan, N.M., man was shot dead at 2217 N. Christy. The victim was Dustin Wade Stone who, police said, collapsed inside the home after he was' shot in the head. He died several hours later at an Amarillo hospital.

Charged in that case with being a felon in possession of a firearm is Gregory K. Lang, 31, of the North Christy address. Police identified Lang as the shooter of Stone but Lang was not charged with that offense.

Police said Stone, who was armed with a rifle, and Marshall Clayton Johnson, 36, 1441 N. Charles, forced their way into the home on North Christy. A sword was confiscated from Johnson.

Johnson's case will also be heard by the grand jury,

Roach said. In the traffic death case in

which an 11-year-old boy died, grand jurors heard witnesses last month and will hear the testimony of another witness Thursday, the DA said.

In that case, the Department of Public Safety is recommending that Donna Montgomery, 42, of McLean, be charged with criminally negligent homicide, DPS Sgt. Don Cameron said previously.

Killed in the March 20 two-pickup crash on Texas 273 at FM 2473 - commonly known as Nine-Mile Crossing - was Kaid Shaller, son of David and Irene Shaller of Lefors.

According to the DPS, Shaller was killed when his father attempted to avoid a collision , with Montgomery who, troopers said, had fallen asleep at the wheel while on her way home from work at the Jordan Unit. Shaller was bringing his son home from school at the time

Roach said it's his understanding Montgomery may have moved to Tennessee.

The other death case involves Vartan Allahverdi, 46, of Tujunga, Calif., who (See SHOOTING, Page 3)

Gregg County Sheriff fires jailers

LONGVIEW (AP) -¹ Five Gregg County jail employees, including three supervisors and the administrator, have been either been fired or forced to quit by Sheriff Maxey Cerliano after he said an internal investigation showed they allowed "routine jail documentations" to be falsified.

Another eight employees have been disciplined for obeying orders they knew were wrong, but were allowed to keep their jobs, Cerliano said. No criminal charges will be filed, but falsifying government records is a crime, according to the report.

The misconduct appears to have been going on for at least 12 years, according to a copy of the investigator's report obtained by the Longview News-Journal.

Cerliano, who has been in office 16 months, said he could not tolerate anything but the highest standards of conduct in the sheriff's department.

One fired employee blamed the record-keeping improprieties on an ongoing staffing shortage, telling investigators that she had complained about a lack of adequate staff to five previous jail supervisors, the reports show. Others said the reports were forged to produce documents that would satisfy the requirements of state law.

The sheriff said the accusations do not appear to be connected to the May 4 death of jail inmate Charles Lee Gray. The investigation into the 25year-old's death has not been completed.

The records show Cerliano ordered the investigation April 23 after receiving a complaint about improprieties with jail records. The probe was completed May 3, after and procedures have been investigators conducted interviews with 19 jail employees. problems.



Production of cars, trucks and automobile parts rose a solid 3.1 percent last month. Makers of home electronics saw output rise 0.4 percent. Computer production increased 1.6 percent, while business equipment output edged up 0.1 percent.

The latest reading on inflation was a bit worse than many analysts were expecting. They were forecasting a 0.4 percent rise in overall prices and a 0.2 percent advance in the core rate.

With the economy on the rebound from the recession, analysts generally aren't expecting inflation to become a problem.

To cope with the slump, many companies heavily discounted merchandise to bolster sales. After seeing their profits take a hit, companies are itching to raise prices but probably



Judge orders baby to stay on life support as father faces charges

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) - A judge has refused to give a mother sole custody of her brain-damaged infant, blocking her effort to take the child off life-support.

Orange County Superior Court Judge Richard Behn ruled Tuesday that neither parent is fit to care for 8month-old Christopher.

The child's father, Moises Ibarra, who wants the comatose infant kept on life support, is accused of abusing Christopher and causing his injuries.

If convicted of felony child abuse, he faces up to nine years in prison, but if his son dies Ibarra could face a life sentence.

Christopher's mother, Tamara Sepulveda, wants her son taken off life support.

The judge also found fault with her, saying he believes she failed to prevent the abuse.



A regular permit is for perpetuity.



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

Jimmy Carter addresses Cubans via live TV **TTF deadline**

HAVANA (AP) — Jimmy Carter addressed Cubans in an unprecedented hour of live, uncensored television telling them that their country does not meet international standards of democracy and repeatedly promoting a grassroots campaign for greater civil liberties.

It was not immediately clear if Carter's Tuesday night speech, broadcast across Cuba, would turn out to be more than a dramatic goodwill

concession by Cuban President Fidel Castro toward the former American president who did more than any other to try to ease tensions between their two nations.

Carter balanced comments on Cuba's system with a call for the United States to end the embargo on U.S. trade and travel that for 40 years has failed in its expressed purpose of bringing change in Cuba.

"Our two nations have been trapped in a destructive state of belligerence for 42 years, and it is time for us to change our relationship," he said.

"Because the United State is the most powerful nation, we should take the first step," Carter said. President Bush, who plans to outline his Cuban policy next week, stood by his hard-line policy on Tuesday. But Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle said after a meeting with Bush on Wednesday that the United States and Cuba "must tear down the barriers that do exist." Russia praised Castro for allowing Carter to visit and expressed hope that Carter's visit would lead to an end of the embargo. "We share (Carter's) opinion that it is time to normalize these relations, and cancel the American embargo," the Ministry Foreign said Wednesday.



Lakers end Spurs' season

LOS ANGELES (AP) -Once the fourth quarter arrives, the Lakers figure there's no way they can lose. With Kobe Bryant on their side, who can blame them?

Bryant struck again Tuesday night, scoring 10 of his 26 points in the final period as Los Angeles beat the San Antonio Spurs 93-87 in Game 5 to win this Western Conference semifinal.

"If the game is close in the fourth quarter, we expect to win," Bryant said. "We play to win; some teams play to lose. We definitely have a "swagger about us." *

The Lakers outscored the Spurs 31-26 in the fourth quarter and 125-88 in the final periods in the series.

Bryant scored 11 and 12 points in the final periods of Games 3 and 4, when the Lakers rallied for victories in San Antonio. He had a total of 46 fourth-quarter points in the five games.

Bryant's basket with 2:27 remaining snapped an 83-83 tie and triggered a 10-4 closing run. Rick Fox's layup a minute later gave the Lakers a fourpoint lead, and Robert Horry's 3-pointer with 56.6 seconds left off a feed from Bryant made it 90-83.



Richard David Coss grew up in Minneapolis Minnesota, and northern Wisconsin. He hit the detention center at the age of nine. At age eleven, he was in the state mental institution at Madison, Wisconsin. At twelve, Richard was in the state reformatory in Waukesha, Wisconsin. Between the ages of fifteen and twenty-five, Richard was confined in city jails, county jails, county prison farms and three trips to prison. Before Richard realized it, his hatred and anger had become irrelevant. What counselors, psychologist, sociologist, correction officers, special schools and prison had been unable to do in sixteen years was accomplished in one day. On March 16, 1969, while serving his third prison sentence, Richard gave his life to JESUS CHRIST and become a Christian. He was paroled from prison November 12, 1970.

On April, 1995 two of his seven grandchildren were killed in the Oklahoma City Bombing.

Richard has appeared on many television networks. He has lectured at schools, colleges, and civic clubs across America. Richard speaks about his personal life, prison reform, prisoner reform, death penalty, victim rights, gun control and the drug problem. During the 1997-1998 school year over 60,000 students heard Richard's message.


The 4-H Senior Team earned second place and will compete in June at College Station for the state title.
