


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

Public hearing set Tuesday on plan for water usage

Pampa city commissioners will conduct a public hearing on a proposed water conservation and emergency water plan at 6 p.m., Tuesday, at City Hall.

A work session, also open to the public, is scheduled for 5 p.m. in the main floor conference room to review the city and county ETJ jurisdictional agreement, discuss a proposed ordinance exempting travel trailers from the ad valorum tax and to review the agenda for the meeting at 6 p.m.

Agenda items, in addition to the public hearing, include an election order for electing city commissioners for Ward 2 and Ward 4 and appointment of Maxine Hawkins as presiding election judge and Ruth Riehart as alternate judge for two years beginning April 1, 2002 and ending April 1, 2004.

The commission also will consider extending Animal Control agreements with the cities of Miami, Groom, Lefors. McLean and Skellytown.

A bid for a John Deer 310 SG backhoe through the Texas Local Government Purchasing Cooperative will be considered, also.

Two ordinances are to be considered at the meeting - first reading of an ordinance adopting the 2000 Edition of the International Residential Code and an ordinance adopting Water Conservation and Emergency Water Demand Management Plan.

In other matters, commissioners will consider the Top Q' Texas Rodeo Association's request for a temporary alcohol permit, approval of the minutes from the Jan. 22 meeting and (See HEARING, Page 3)

"Clyde was born on Feb. 1, 1904 on a farm east of Clarendon close to Lelia Lake. In those days, there were no telephones or fast transportation. So, at the first sign that the baby was coming, his father had to ride on horseback to Clarendon to get the doctor, but Clyde was so anxious to get started in making history, he did not wait for the doctor to arrive. He came into this world with only his mother and his small brother and sister present. However, the doctor arrived and everything went well. Clyde says he was born about eleven o'clock Sunday morning and has been tired and hungry all of his life.

"Clyde has lived in Pampa for many years. He graduated from Pampa High School in 1922 with high honors and was one of its first quarterbacks. He attended Watson Business College in Plainview and Wayland Baptist College. He has been involved in farming.

WASHINGTON (AP) -Broadcasters are lobbying hard to have the House strip from a campaign spending bill a requirement that they give politicians their lowest advertising rates. Paid political ads produced

about \$770 million in revenues for television and radio stations in 2000. But legislation passed by the Senate last year would require that political candidates get the cheapest price charged any advertiser for a given time slot.

Supporters contend the requirement would significantly reduce the cost of running for public office and, consequently, politicians' pursuit of campaign money. But the National Association of Broadcasters says it's a "slippery slope toward mandatory free time."

Sen. Robert Torricelli, D-N.J., succeeded last year in including the provision on what is known as the "lowest unit rate" in the Senate-passed campaign spending bill.

The same language is in a House campaign finance bill by Reps. Christopher Shays, R-Conn., and Marty Meehan, D-Mass., to be debated and voted upon this week. However, that could change.

In the 1999-2000 election cycle, TV and radio stations made some \$6.8 million in political contributions, more than triple what they gave in the 1996 presidential election period, according to the Center for Responsive Politics, a watchdog group.

As the fight over broadcast ad rates heats up, Republican leaders are pressing the White House for changes to the overall bill before Wednesday's scheduled vote, arguing that the legislation could doom GOP control of the House.

After years of criticizing the campaign finance system, broadcasters now are "lobbying using the same influence of big money to undermine the legislation so that their profits are protected," he said.



In 1941, he became associated with the Federal Land Bank in Houston where he supervised loans in seven counties, including Gray County.

"Clyde's philosophy is 'to serve God by serving man and making this world a better place to live.' He carried out this philosophy when he served on the City Commission for 12 years. I'm curious - was it less controversial back then than it is now

"He has been very active in helping and promoting local 4-H Clubs and F.F.A. Chapters. He dedicated a great deal of this time since 1945 in service to these organizations.

"Among his accomplishments are the Junior Livestock

vice-chairman of the general board and president of the congregation. He also taught Sunday school for 40 years.

"All of these things show the dedication Clyde has to his fellow man but the reason we are here today is to pay tribute to Clyde for his service to Kiwanis and for having over 60 years of perfect attendance. He has served as vice-president and was president of the club in 1946. He has helped in most all of the club's projects. It was not too long ago that he helped me put out flags.

"I should bring up what happened at one meeting years ago. Clyde went to the Kiwanis International Convention in Canada and came back to make his report to the club at its regular meeting. He was sitting a the head table and the president was about to call on him to make his report of what went on at the Convention. Israel launches air attack on Gaza City

GAZA CITY. Gaza Strip (AP) - Israeli warplanes and helicopter gunships attacked the Palestinian security headquarters in Gaza City on Monday, in retaliation for unprecedented Palestinian rocket fire and a shooting attack on Israeli civilians.

More than 30 people were injured by shrapnel in the second air strike in Gaza City in two days. The Israeli military warned that it "will not tolerate the continued firing of rockets" at Israel and at Jewish settlements.

The Islamic militant group Hamas claimed responsibility for firing a homemade Qassam-2 rocket toward an Israeli communal farm on Sunday — a first in 16 months of fighting. The Oassam-2 has a range of five to eight kilometers (three to five miles), enough to hit Israeli towns from the West Bank and Gaza Strip. In the past, Hamas has fired several shorter-range Qassam-1 rockets that caused no damage.

In Monday's air strike, six missiles hit the large walled Saraya compound in downtown Gaza City, setting buildings ablaze and sending black smoke into the sky.

Doctors said the injured included three Palestinian journalists and news photographer George Kochaniec; a photographer for Denver's Rocky Mountain News. Kochaniec was treated for a

The attack came at a time of changeover between morning and afternoon shifts at nearby schools, and streets were crowded with youngsters who ran away from the explosions, some screaming in panic.

Electricity in Gaza City was cut after the air strike.

The missiles were fired several minutes apart, and one hit the compound while firefighters were in the area trying to douse the flames.

Hundreds of Palestinians ran to the compound demanding that suspected Islamic militants held there be released immediately. Some threw stones at officers who fired in the air to keep back the crowd. Palestinian police said all prisoners were moved from the compound shortly after the Israeli attack.

Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon convened senior Cabinet ministers and security officials late Sunday at his farm in southern Israeli to decide on a response to the firing of the Qassam-2 rockets, which fell in an open field and caused no damage. "This constitutes a very serious escalation," government spokesman Avi Pazner said of the rocket fire.

Israeli media reports said Sharon and his advisers decided on a new type of retaliation, but did not specify. Commentators suggested Israel might reoccupy Palestinian areas close to Israel for an extended period to push rockets out of range. Sharon must take into consideration the clear American interest in preventing a total conflagration between Israel and the Palestinians, at a time when Washington is constructing its campaign against Iraq," wrote Hemi Shalev in the Maariv daily.

Hamas said it was not intimidated by Israel's warnings. "Hamas will not change its strategy and we will go ahead ... until the final liberation of our Holy Land," a Hamas leader, Abdel Aziz Rantisi, said Monday.

Arafat aide Ahmed Abdel Rahman accused Israel of exaggerating the threat posed by the rockets in order to escalate strikes against the Palestinians.

Hamas identified the two Beersheba attackers as Mohammed Battat, 23, and Khalid al-Till, 23, from the village of Dahariyah, near the southern edge of the West Bank, about 15 miles from Beersheba. Hamas released the names Monday in a note on its Web site, saying they were known as Hamas supporters.

In the Sunday attack, two Balestinians sprayed automatic fire at Israelis sitting in a cafe and a nearby restaurant outside a military base, killing two women soldiers and seriously wounding five people before being shot dead by troops.

 "Suddenly someone from outside opened the blinds and began to spray the restaurant with gunfire," Liza Cohen, 65, one of the diners at the "End of the Road" restaurant,

told the Yediot Ahronot daily. "We all panicked. People lay on top of each other. It was

horrible," said another customer, Morris Levy.

In response, Israeli F-16 warplanes fired bombs and missiles at a Gaza City security compound Sunday night. The explosions shattered windows in a nearby U.N. compound and the Palestinian Planning Ministry, and 37 people were injured, most lightly.

Israeli military commanders later apologized to Terje Roed-Larsen, the U.N. envoy to the Middle East.

"I fully accept that, but on the other hand, it's totally unacceptable to use that kind of weaponry which puts civilian lives and U.N. personnel at peril," Roed-Larsen told Israel Army Radio. "Several of my colleagues were there (in the building) and some of them were simply knocked over."

Israeli helicopter gunships also fired missiles at a metal workshop in the nearby Jebaliya refugee camp where the military said mortar shells and rockets were being made. Sunday night's attack shattered windows and brought down the roof at a nearby kindergarten.

In Israel, Sharon was coming under pressure from hispolitical camp to topple Arafat and the Palestinian Authority. Former Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu, seen as a strong challenger to Sharon and a fellow member of the Likud Party, demanded that Arafat be removed.

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Labor Dept. seeks to remove Enron execs from pension plan

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Labor Department is working to replace Enron Corp. officials with an independent legal representative on a committee that oversees the company's retirement plans.

The department is investigating whether the officials legally responsible for Enron's 401(k) plan — called fiduciaries --- were prudent and acted only in the interest of the employees and the plan, as required under the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974, or ERISA, which governs employer-provided retirement plans.

"Our objective is to replace them with an independent fiduciary, expert in ERISA, and

experienced in protecting the interests of participants and beneficiaries in complex pension plans like Enron's," Ann Combs, assistant labor secretary for pension and welfare benefits, said Sunday.

So far, no legal action has been taken and negotiations with Enron lawyers that began about a month ago are continuing. Combs said she hopes an agreement can be reached without a "lengthy court proceeding"

"If no agreement is reached in the very near future, we will seek a court order replacing these people with a qualified independent fiduciary," she said.

Clark wins first U.S. gold in Olympics

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) With the song "This is pumping Growing Up" through her headphones, 18year-old Kelly Clark helped the sport of snowboarding come of age.

Soaring and spinning higher and faster than her halfpipe foes, Clark on Sunday became the first American to win a gold medal at the Winter. Olympics, instantly giving snowboarding more credibility than the X-Games could ever provide.

"Snowboarders have their reputations," Clark said. "But my doing this, especially in the U.S., says a lot. Maybe it will shine a light on snowboarding, and people will look at it in a different way."

The Salt Lake City Games got off to a rousing and, most importantly, safe start this

weekend. The games opened with a

> solemn tribute to a torn flag and a "miraculous" lighting of the flame courtesy of the 1980 U.S. hockey team — a show that smashed TV ratings for previous Olympics — then quickly turned to the business of sport.

> The U.S. team came away from the first two days of competition with one gold and two silvers. Mogul skier Shannon Bahrke got the medal party started Saturday with a silver, then hours later speedskater Derek Parra set a surprise world record in the 5,000 meters that held up for a silver.

Medals were to be decided around midday Monday in women's downhill, men's luge singles and women's 15-kilometer biathlon.

Later in the day, the men's

20-kilometer biathlon, men's halfpipe and pairs figure skating will be decided.

WOMEN'S HALF-PIPE: Clark gave a performance so spectacular the French judge gave her a perfect 10.0, knocking Doriane Vidal of France to second. Reuteler Fabienne of Switzerland won the bronze.

"I figured I had second place wrapped up, so I had to go for it," said Clark, whose winning routine included a 1 1/2-revolution, upside-down spin, another 2-revolution twist and the highest jumps of the competition.

American Shannon Dunn, the 1998 bronze medalist, finished fifth and teammate Tricia Byrnes was sixth.

The ultra-hip snowboarding community might scoff at Clark's celebration plans.

"I have to get up at four in the morning for 'Good Morning America,"' she said, "so probably not too much stuff.'

- MEN'S DOWNHILL: After swooshing through the ultra-steep downhill course, Austria's Fritz Strobl - a 29year-old police officer who'd never won a medal in a major competition — called his wife and two young sons with some big news: He snared the gold.

"I was just thinking of racing down the course, not of winning," said Strobl.

Lasse Kjus of Norway finished second and Stephan Eberharter, the Austrian. expected to win, was third. American medal hopeful Daron Rahlves finished 16th.

"It's a tough one to swal-

low," Rahlves said.

SPEEDSKATING: The Utah Olympic Oval is living up to its speedy reputation.

Parra set a world record in the 5,000 meters Saturday, then saw the Netherlands' Jochem Uytdehaage smash his mark to take the gold.

On Sunday, Germany's Claudia Pechstein won the gold by breaking her own world record in the 3,000 meters by more than 1 1/2 seconds. Renate Groenewold of the Netherlands was second and Canada's Cindy Klassen third.

Anni Friesinger, who had won every 3,000 race during the World Cup season, was fourth. American Jennifer Rodriguez finished seventh. despite breaking her own national record.



Bryant overcomes hostile crowd to win MVP honors in NBA All-Star contest

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Too bad Kobe Bryant can't adopt Los Angeles as his hometown. Given the way he was treated by the fans in Philadelphia, he has every reason to renounce all ties to the city where he grew up.

In a venomous display that was harsh even by local standards, Bryant was booed mercilessly Sunday at the NBA All-Star game as he scored 31 points and was named MVP of the game in leading the West to a 135-120 victory over the East.

"I'll use it as motivation, definitely," Bryant said. "I'm the type of person that if something occurs in my life that's hurtful, I'm not going to let it hurt me for long. I'm going to turn it around and use it as some kind of motivation.

Bryant used the words "hurtful" and "upset" to describe his feelings. The -booing began when he was introduced, continued after he made a series of gameturning plays and reached a crescendo when he was handed the MVP trophy.

Bryant was booed relentlessly during the NBA Finals last year when the Lakers were finishing off the 76ers, and he recalled being booed during his rookie season when he was fresh out of high school and returning home for the first time.

"I guess that's how Philly is," West teammate Steve Francis said. "That's unfortunate, but he lit them up again.'

Bryant's 31 points were the most in an All-Star game since Michael Jordan had 40 in 1988.

Bryant also became the

"Don't take it personal. They wish they had you," Nelson said.

A lot of teams wish they had Bryant, and he showed everyone why he has moved to the forefront of NBA superstardom.

Bryant got off to the best start of anybody, scoring eight points in the first six minutes and getting an assist by going around Jason Kidd with a deft crossover move and then feeding Tim Duncan for a dunk. Bryant also showcased some impressive ballhandling, dribbling through his legs as he came upcourt practically squatting.

Tracy McGrady scored 11 points in the second quarter to keep the East in it, but Bryant had a three-point play immediately after checking back in, then made four more baskets in the final 1:47 of the quarter — including a layup just before the halftime buzzer — as the West closed the half with a 24-7 run for a 72-55 lead.

The East chipped away during the third quarter, but Bryant wouldn't let them get too close. He scored one basket on a putback after the ball bounced over the top of the backboard, then had another bucket off an offensive rebound with 4:20 left to restore a 20-point lead, 88-68.

The boos for Bryant were fairly loud after both of those buckets. As the quarter progressed, Bryant was booed every time he touched the ball as it became clear that the West was headed for a lopsided victory.

"I'm happy I played well. I'm happy to win MVP in Philadelphia, and the booing was just hurtful, but it's not going to ruin this day for me," he said.

After Bryant got off to his strong start, Jordan was the next to reel* off a series of spiffy plays. He went baseline for a driving dunk, followed with a fast-break layup and fed a no-look alley-oop pass to Antoine Walker that he failed to convert.

Jordan was all alone ahead of the field a few moments later, but blew a one-handed dunk, causing his Eastern teammates to rise on the sideline, laughing in unison. Jordan laughed off the moment, too.

"He looked like me on that dunk, because I've been missing breakaway dunks left and right this season," Bryant said.

The West held a 23-point lead entering the fourth quarter, but the East rallied. Paul Pierce scored the first four points of the quarter, McGrady also scored four in a row and Ray Allen hit a 3pointer to complete a 13-0 run and make it 100-90. The next five baskets were all 3-pointers, including a pair by Payton that helped the West maintain a double-digit lead, and a 7-0 run ending with a dunk by Elton Brand all but locked up the victory.



made when she launched her e-Texas initiative, Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander today announced that all Texas businesses may now file sales tax returns on-line, using the Comptroller's WebFile system. "If all Texas businesses paid their sales tax online, the paper alone that we would save would reach seven times the distance from the floor of the Capitol rotunda to the top of the dome."

Comptroller Rylander said.

Comptroller Rylander said. "When I announced my e-Texas initiative, I vowed to expand the use of technology to cut costs and improve the quality of service to taxpayers. WebFile makes it easier for businesses to file tax returns and saves the state time and money,"

To use WebFile, a taxpayer completes an on-line sales tax return, and the computer checks the electronic form for errors and calculates the amount of tax due. The taxpayer has two options to submit his payment: pay the tax with a Discover or American Express credit card, along with a credit card service fee, or have the payment deducted electronically from his bank. If he uses electronic funds transfer, the taxpayer can select a date, on or before the due date, for the sales tax to be automatically paid.

"With WebFile, there's no check to write, no

AUSTIN - Making good on a promise she papers to fill out, no trip to the post office or concern about mail delivery," Comptroller Rylander said. "WebFile is quick, convenient and secure, and I urge every sales taxpayer to take advantage of electronic tax filing.

Comptroller expands on-line

sales tax filing for businesses

Each year, the Comptroller's office processes about 2.6 million sales tax returns filed by more than 615,000 businesses. More than 100,000 businesses already use electronic tax filing.

The WebFile program began in 1998. At first, it was available only to businesses that collect no sales tax during a reporting period. In October 2000, WebFile became available to short form sales tax filers 4 mainly businesses that have only one location

Now, the expansion of the program is complete, and all businesses that report sales tax are eligible to use WebFile, no matter which paper form they currently use.

"Every business that collects sales tax, from the ice cream vendor in the park all the way up to the big department store chains, can now use WebFile to report and pay sales tax 24 hours a day, 7 days a week," Comptroller Rylander said.

Sales taxpayers can access 'WebFile through the Comptroller's Web site www.window.state.tx.us/webfile/ or through the state services Web site www.texasonline.com.
