For the 12 months ending in January, consumer prices rose by just 1.1 percent, the smallest
increase since the
ending December 1986.
Last month the Fed opted to leave interest rates unchanged
and cited signs of a recovery as the reason.
Many economists believe he Fed's rate cuts will pave the way for solid economic growth
in the second half of this yea In the _meantime, analysts expect companies will continue to find it difficult to raise prices, which should keep
inflation in check in the coming inflation in
months.
In January, overall energy
prices advanced 0.9 percent, after falling sharply in each of the prior three months. Gasoline prices went up 2.7 percent last month, the bigges
increase since September. Gasoline prices were lifted by a firming of cude-oil prices last month, reflecting produc-
tion cuts by oil-producing tion cuts by oil-producing

## Bush hopes for better life for North Koreans

PANMUNJOM, Korea (AP)

- President Bush saw the unfulfilled hope of a transKorean railway that dead ends in dirt and said his wish is to see
the "evil" communist North give its people a better life by reuniting with the free South. Bush also said the United States has "no intention of attacking North Korea," as he
tried Wednesday to tried Wednesday to assuage the
anxiety many peace-seeking anxiety many peace-seeking
South Koreans felt when, in his State of the Union address last month, he provocatively labeled North Korea, Iran and Iraq "an
axis of evil." axis of evil."
At a gleaming train station just 200 yards from the hostile
Demilitarized Zone separating North and South Korea, Bush expressed a peaceful vision:
"I see a peninsula that is one" day united in commerce and
cooperation, instead of divided cooperation, instead of
by barbed wire and fear." As South Korean Preside Kim Dae-jung showed Bush the dormant Dorasan Station, they could hear the North's propa-
ganda music blaring from ganda music blaring from
unseen guard posts opposite a fence of curled razor wire.
Bush condemned the repression that music symbolized. "Korean children should never starve while a massive army is
fed. No nation should be prison for its own people," he
said.
Bush had just come from
Observatión Post Ouellette,
where where he peered across rapor
wire and land mine fields into wire and land mine fields into
the North and reeiterated his belief that it is "evil.
North Korea fired back,
accusing Bush of war monger-
accusing Bush of war monger-
ing. Korean Central Radio, a
North Korean government
mouthpiece, said the president's
address "expo
plot address "exposed a reckless
plot trying to attack militarily plot trying to on our side."
About 13 hours before Bush arrived at the hilltop post jointly manned by U.S. and South
Korean troops, a North Korea Korean troops, a North Korean
soldier walked into the southem soldier walked into the southern
sector of the DMZ under cover of darkness and defected. In South Korea, hundreds of anti-U.S. activists, fought rio police in downtown Seoul after police tried to stop them from
burning an American flag. Ambulances took away several injured activists.
The Dorasan Station and railway, a $\$ 150$ million project completed by the South just this month, goes nowhere because
the North's govemment has not the North's govermment has not
begun construction on its end. The rival states agreed at a June 2000 summit to reconnect their people by rail and highway. Bush called on North K

## Scientists: Food bacteria not going away

WASHINGTON (AP) - bacteria such as E. coli appearing in the country. Consumers beware: Scientists say the bacteria that cause
food poisonings aren't away, despite the efforts of the food industry to eliminate them. New germs arrive in
imported foods and bacteria already here develop in new forms, according to a report for the Institute of Food Technologists. The bacteria Listeria monocytogenes are so common in the environment
it's "practically impossible" it's "practically impossible"
to keep food entirely free of them. "Zero risk is not a reality," said the report released Wednesday.
The scientists also say the fertilizer poses the risk of spreading harmful bacteria to food, either by contaminating irrigation water or by coming into contact with crops.
