He added that, in cases of cardiac arrest, the most crucial it is restarted with an AED. While CPR can keep blood flowing to the brain until the AED arrives, it can't restore the normal heart rhythm. The longer the person waits for the AED, the less chance that the normal rhythm will be restored.
"Each minute we lose waiting for an AED means a 10 per ent less chance that the patient will survive," says Dr. Loose tes, we can save thousands of lives every year."
Each year, 18,000 Texans suffer sudden cardiac arrest, either from heart disease or from trauma such as drowning or electrical shock. Currently, more than $95 \%$ of those victims die efore reaching a hospital.
It is our goal to change that statistic. We believe widespread achieving this goal," says Kelly Curry, a quality management specialist with Lubbock's Covenant Health System, who cochaired the American Heart Association's Texas AED Placement Program. Lt. Rip (Ralph) Faulkner of the El Paso
Fire Department shared chairmanship duties.
"We put "because we want to get those AEDs out there in emergency responder vehicles, where they can save lives, as quickly as we can." grant award requires each agency to purchase their AEDs within 90 days of the award. Except for a few agencies where training will be needed, the AEDs can be put into use
