weapons offense. Both men were booked into the Gray County Jail following their arrests at 1:07 a.m. and had not posted bond by press time today.


Food drive set

Pampa Good to go

County signs contract; restoration to begin

It finally happened.

There wasn't whooping and hollering at the Gray County Commission meeting Wednesday morning as County Judge Richard Peet signed the construction services contract with Phoenix I to begin the final phase of the courthouse

But there was a great sense of relief as the Judge Peet signed the document.

Peet said County Attorney Todd Alvey has reviewed the contract for the county, and that Lyman Labry of the Texas Historical Commission approved it.

Phoenix I is set to begin work on Monday.

Planning on the project began nearly three vears ago. In October, 1999, ArchiTexas was hired by the Gray County Commission to draw up a master plan to restore and renovate the historic courthouse

Architects and other staff members from ArchiTexas toured the building to evaluate the needs of the building.

Each department head in the county contributed input of their needs to function more efficiently and meet the legal requirements imposed upon them by state and federal laws.

After many meetings and much planning, ArchiTexas of Dallas drew up the plans to help the building to qualify for a grant from the THC to fund the project.

In May 2000, Gray County officials received word they qualified for the largest grant given by THC - \$3.8 million to fund the courthouse project.

John Kiehl of Panhandle Resources Planning Commission was hired as project coordinator and has worked with the commission throughout the process.

The county is contributing \$1.3 million toward the matching grant.

Courthouse employees moved out of their offices in July 2001 to four temporary locations in Pampa while the restoration project is under

Asbestos abatement was completed in the initial project start-up.

As workers began removing ceilings which were lowered in the 1970s, elegant wood cary ings in the District Judge's Courtroom were uncovered and will be restored during the pro-

Electrical rewiring is one of the costhest items which will be completed during the renovation. The wiring of the building was done when the building was built in 1930 and has not

Texas loses tuberculosis-free status

Texas cattle producers may face increased costs of shipping cattle out of state if the U.S. Department of Agriculture chooses to impose tuberculosis testing of animals used in

"This is not a human health concern," said Burt Rutherford with the Texas Cattle Feeders Association. "It is an animal health issue."

While state officials claim it is pos-

The testing, however, will be costly for the producer, Rutherford said.

The Lone Star State is expected to lose its tuberculosis-free status in May when the USDA issues its decision following two incidents of infected herds during the past 12 months. In both instances, Texas Animal Health Commission officials blamed the importation of Mexican feeder cattle.

"Texas livestock brokers import nearly one million Mexican feeder cattle a year," said Dr. Linda Logan; state veterinarian and executive director of the Texas Animal Health Commission.

Arafat emerges from headquarters; **Church of the Nativity fight worsens**

West Bank headquarters Thursday, blinking in the sunlight and flashing victory signs after Israeli troops withdrew from his compound and released the Palestinian leader from months of confinement.

As the siege in Ramallah came to an end. the monthlong standoff at Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity took a turn for the worse. Israeli troops fired at three armed Palestinians walking from the besieged compound into Manger Square, killing one and wounding at least two who staggered back into the shrine, the army said. Palestinians returned fire.

Hours earlier, a fire broke out during another gunbattle, damaging several rooms and offices in the compound, but not the church itself. The Palestinians said the fire was sparked by Israeli flares shot into the church compound during the fighting. Israel initially accused the Palestinians of arson, but Col. Miri Eisin of Israel's military intelligence later said that Israel was checking whether the flares did indeed spark the flames.

An Israeli army spokesman, Lt. Col. Olivier Rafowicz, said Palestinians had booby-trapped doors in the compound.

The Franciscan press office in Rome said the parish hall and offices of the Franciscan monastery in the church compound were destroyed by the fire. In a statement, the Franciscans, a Roman Catholic order, held Israelis and Palestinians equally responsible for "this continuing, intolerable and increasingly dangerous situation."

> Early Thursday, Israeli tanks and armored vehicles moved into the town of Tulkarem, declaring a curfew and arresting five supporters of the Islamic militant group Hamas. Troops also entered the Tel and Beita villages, and the Al Arroub refugee camp, the military

On Thursday morning, Arafat, 72, emerged from confinement for the first time in months. Hundreds of Palestinians chanted "God is great" and cheered as Arafat appeared at the door to his office building, steadied by aides. Arafat raised his hand to make a V-sign and moved it to the rhythm of the chants before speeding away in a black limousine, accompanied by security guards with raised assault rifles.

In a triumphal tour of war-scarred Ramallah, he waved at schoolchildren, symbolically spread plaster on the bullet-pocked wall of a police station and prayed over makeshift graves of Palestinian fighters in a hospital parking lot.

Verdant fields raise suspicions Mexican state hoarding water

CIUDAD DELICIAS, Mexico (AP) — Normally, SUMMER DAY Care Eduardo Melendez's healthy pecan trees and thick carpet of vibrant green alfalfa would draw

> But this year, fields such as his in the drought-stricken state of Chihuahua are raising angry suspicions in a bitter fight for Rio Grande water that threatens to escalate into a standoff between the United States and

> U.S. officials say that under a 1944 treaty, Mexico owes Texas farmers 1.5 million acre feet of water. Each acre foot is equivalent to 326,000 gallons (1.24 million liters). The treaty gives Mexico a larger quantity of water, but via the Colorado River far to the west.

> Mexico says that because of drought, it doesn't have the water to pay the growing debt

But South Texas farmers and even Mexican farmers in the neighboring state of Tamaulipas say the water shortage is not solely caused by Mother Nature. They claim Chihuahua growers are ignoring the treaty and gobbling up water before it reaches them downriver.

Texas farmers were to meet Melendez said. with U.S. legislators Friday in Brownsville to show them dying fields and to urge Congress to stall bills sought by Mexico, such as agreements on immigration, until the matter is resolved. Outside the agricultural city

of Delicias, verdant fields

sharply contrast with the stark, brown mountains. On a recent afternoon, waist-high wheat waved in the breeze, and alfalfa blanketed fields near lush pecan orchards. Workers moved metal tubes

guiding water from canals into the fields. Delicias is near the Rio Conchos, the main tributary feeding the Rio Grande. According to a study by

Texas A&M University, Chihuahua has expanded agricultural production even as Mexico reneged on agreed water payments. Texas farmers say the water shortage has cost them an estimated dlrs 1 billion so far.

The study found Chihuahua's production of thirsty crops like corn and alfalfa jumped more than 60 percent between the drought years of 1995 and 1999. "We were really shocked,"

said Parr Rosson, who headed the study. Since the study ended, corn

acreage increased by another 25 percent and that of alfalfa by 11 percent, he said.

Chihuahua growers say falling prices for drought-resistant crops left them no choice. "There was no way out other than by planting alfalfa,"

Farmers here say they are hurting too. The area's reservoirs are at less than 25 percent capacity.

"The water levels have." dropped so low that cars and bodies started appearing," agricultural engineer Humberto Estrada said. "They found the body of a mayor who was missing. All kinds of things at the bottom of the dam have started appearing over the past few years.'

Many farmers have drilled wells to tap groundwater to support the thirstier, high-value crops. Chihuahua has huge lakes hundreds of feet underground.

Those wells, however, could also be lowering the levels of the Rio Conchos, which flows over the underground lakes, according to Rosson. "It's a slow process, but

pumping and pumping over time could be causing less flow down to the Rio Grande," Rosson said. Rosson agrees that Mexico

doesn't have the water to pay, but he said Texas would like to see gestures of good faith, such as investment in more efficient irrigation systems. Melendez's farm uses indi-

vidual sprinklers to water each pecan tree, ensuring that the water gets to the roots. But most growers continue to use the least-expensive method: flooding fields, losing large amounts of water to evapora-Texas farmers say Mexico

must drastically reduce the water supply for Chihuahua

"Why should they have the water and not us, when they're using water that's illegal? That water belongs to somebody else, not them," said Jo Jo White, irrigation manager in Mercedes, Texas. "We've suffered a hardship for seven years because of this illegal act." ...

get," he told reporters. Yet he also held out hope for a renewal of peace efforts, noting that a majority of Israelis and Palestinians favor a peace deal. Israel's government has branded Arafat an enemy and said he was no longer a partner in peacemaking.

Israeli tanks pulled out of Ramallah late Wednesday, after six wanted men in Arafat's compound, including four assassins of an Israeli Cabinet minister, were driven to a Palestinian prison where they will be guarded by British and American jailers.

The arrangements of their imprisonment are supervised by a former warden of Brixton Prison, a high security lockup in London where IRA fighters and others jailed on terrorism charges were held, the British ambassador to Israel said.

As the troops pulled out of Ramallah, hundreds of Palestinians surged toward Arafat's compound. In the parking lot just outside his office, Palestinian men hugged and kissed each other on the cheeks to celebrate the Israeli withdrawal. Dozens of Palestinian security officers who had been holed up with Arafat chanted and thrust their rifles into the air in

After daybreak Thursday, hundreds of ordinary Palestinians wandered around the sprawling complex, which had been under Israeli control since March 29, the start of Israel's military offensive against Palestinian militants.

Residents with shovels and brooms dug up earthen barricades Israeli troops had erected around the compound, while others took stock of the damage. Buildings had been scorched or punctured with large holes from Israeli shelling, and cars flattened by tanks were strewn in the parking lot.

"You see what happened here," said Saleh Yassin, 32, a Palestinian policeman who lives near Arafat's headquarters, gesturing toward the wreckage. "Angry is too little a word for how we feel."

Under the terms of his release, Arafat is free to travel in the West Bank, Gaza Strip and abroad — for the first time in five months. However, aides said he was likely to stay in the Palestinian territories for at least the next few days.


Israeli Prime Minister Ariel Sharon warned that if attacks on Israelis resume, Arafat may not be allowed to return. Sharon told ABC's "Nightline" that violence often breaks out when Arafat is out of the country. "So if there will be a wave of terror, and if he'll be going around the world inciting," Sharon said, "then we have to consider and discuss what to do."

He said he had given no guarantees to let Arafat come back.

Israel had first imposed restrictions on Arafat five months ago, when it destroyed his helicopters in air strikes, effectively grounding him in Ramallah in an attempt to pressure him to rein in Palestinian militants and prevent attacks on Israelis. The blockade was gradually tightened, with tanks deployed outside his headquarters in January.

On March 29, troops took over Arafat's compound, confining him and several hundred aides and security guards to a few rooms. The operation came two days after a suicide bomber killed 28 people in a hotel dining room in Netanya, where guests had arrived to eat a ritual seder meal at the start of the Passover holiday.

Israeli forces have been surrounding Bethlehem's Church of the Nativity since April 2, when more than 200 Palestinians, including gunmen, took refuge inside as Israeli troops invaded Bethlehem. Israel says everyone is free to go, except for 20 to 30 wanted militiamen inside. The Palestinians demand safe passage to Gaza for the wanted men, while Israel says they must be tried by Israel or sent into



Bond denied in drug arrest

Bond was denied Wednesday for a Pampa man arrested on drug charges Tuesday night when officers from several agencies conducted a raid on his home with a search warrant for methamphetamines.

As was the case in another bust several weeks ago, police said an "abundance of complaints" from neighbors helped officers to make their case.

Michael Eldon Marsh, 45, 2200 N. Nelson, remains behind bars at the Gray County Jail where he was arraigned this morning before Justice of the Peace Kurt Curfman who denied bond.

Marsh is charged with possession in a drugfree zone of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) over one gram and under four grams. The drug-free zone relates to the home's one-block distance to Travis Elementary School and that designation raises the crime's severity from a third to a seconddegree felony, police said.

million or more. Logan said, however, she doesn't have the resources to test and monitor the state's 153,000 herds of cattle.

AP quotes state officials as saying they fear loss of the tuberculosis-free status could taint Texas beef. Assuming Texas loses its

tuberculosis-free status, it would join Michigan as the only other state not to be designated free of the disease by the federal government.

"The beef industry in the United States has had TB eradication as one of its goals for more than 50 years," Rutherford said. "We're nearly there. I fully expect that we'll get there. I've got every confidence that we'll retain our TB-free status following the two years after USDA publishes their rule. We'll be working under more restrictive guidelines, but I'm very confident that after two years, we'll be back to TB free sta-

Put organs on the free market


There are six-person and there are threeperson families. So is it fair that a six-person family live crowded in a 1,500 square foot house, while that three-person family enjoys 5,000 square feet?

It's the same thing with cars. I've seen five-person families squeezed into a Honda and two-person families riding comfortably in a Lexus SUV. Sometimes checking into a hotel, there's a husband, accompanied by a wife and three children, asking for two roll-away cots to be placed in the room, while Mrs. Williams and I check into a spacious suite with a sitting

Is any of this fair? Shouldn't there be some kind of committee to decide which family deserves and gets the larger house or roomier car, and which family should have the more spacious hotel accommoda-

You say: "Williams, you've finally lost it. Can you imagine all the hassle and conflict that would result from some want-tobe tyrants deciding who should get what? Moreover, who in their right mind would produce homes, cars and hotels if some wacko communistic scheme decided who gets what, instead of the way we now do it through prices people are willing to pay?" You're right, and your reasoning also applies to organ transplants. Let's look

Last December, Larry Kramer, founder of Gay Men's Health Crisis and ACT UP,



received a liver transplant at the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center. Kramer is 66 and a homosexual with AIDS, who spent seven months on the organ transplant wait-

When the news broke about his having received a liver transplant, there was outrage on the talk radio circuit. Talk show hosts and their callers decried Kramer's transplant, arguing there were needier and more deserving people waiting around for livers. Some callers argued that people with self-inflicted illnesses, such as AIDS, obesity or smoking-related cancers, shouldn't receive organ transplants, or at least should have the lowest priority.

All of that is nonsense. Who gets what organ transplant should be decided using the same mechanism as we use to decide who gets what house, car or hotel room namely, prices.

In other words, there should be a market for buying and selling organs. The greatest salutatory effect of an organ market would be a massive increase in the supply of organs. For example, I should be able to

write a contract to sell my organs, say, to Body Parts, Inc., for \$300,000. The proceeds might become a part of my estate. At my death, my organs would be harvested and the \$300,000 paid to my estate.

Most people think organ donations are the way to go. For those people, I'd like to ask: What else would they like to see provided through donations? Cars are important. Why not provide them through donations? What about houses, food, clothing, medicine, doctor and plumbing services? If these goods and services were mandated to be provided through donations, we'd have the same supply problems as we have with livers, hearts and kidneys.

An organ market would eliminate the arbitrariness of doctors and bureaucrats sitting around like gods, deciding who will die and who will live.

You say, "Williams, with market allocation of organs, only the rich would be served." Nonsense. I'd like to see the evidence for such a conclusion. Is it only the rich who have cars or homes or hotel rooms and are able to acquire loans?

The great unappreciated advantage of market allocation of goods and services is that it reduces the potential for human conflict. Why is it that we see conflict in who gets what organ or what's taught in public schools, and no conflict in who gets what car, home or what's taught in private schools? The answer ought to tell us some-

Two-year-old dog survives 24 days alone at sea

HONOLULU (AP) — Jay Leno wants to fly her to Los Angeles as a guest on his latenight talk show. News crews from across the country also are itching for a chance to sit down with the little hero.

First, though, she's got to cool her paws in quarantine.

Forgea, the 2-year-old mixed terrier whose story of being cast adrift on the high seas has made international headlines, was to make her U.S. debut before the media Thursday.

That's when the dog that spent 24 days alone on anabandoned fuel tanker was to arrive in Honolulu Harbor via a tug dispatched to tow the dis-

abled vessel.

The U.S. Coast Guard scheduled a news conference at which a Humane Society veterinarian would parade Forgea before the cameras or 30 minutes before placing her in a kennel and taking her to a private vet for an examination.

Under state law, the dog must be placed in quarantine for 120 days. The law requires imported pets to be held before being released to their owners or adopted.

She will spend the fourmonth period at the Kauai Humane Society, a satellite quarantine facility on the island of Kauai, said Eve Holt,

Humane Society spokeswoman. There she will receive more personal attention than at the state animal quarantine on Oahu, Holt said.

Forgea traveled to Hawaii aboard the tug hired by the U.S. Coast Guard to tow the dereliet tanker Insiko 1907. The tug's crew captured the dog Friday when it went aboard the tanker to prepare it for towing.

Forgea was unintentionally left alone on the crippled tanker on April 2 after the cruise ship Norwegian Star rescued her Taiwanese owner, Chung Chen-po, and 10 members of his crew.

Lawyer says Midland police **Horoscope** broke window to enter apartment FRIDAY, MAY 3, 2002

AUSTIN (AP) — Midland police broke a window to open a door and enter an apartment without a warrant before arresting Texas running back Cedric Benson and a female acquaintance on misdemeanor drug and alcohol charges, their attorneys said Wednesday.

Midland police said they arrested the Big 12 freshman of the year and the woman about 2 a.m. Saturday after responding to a call about loud music. They said they met with some resistance but eventually were allowed inside.

Police have refused to release the arrest

Meanwhile, Houston television station KRIV reported that Benson passed a drug

"He tested negative for any drugs in his system on Tuesday," Benson attorney Brian Carney of Midland said in an interview Wednesday night with The Associated

Carney noted that traces of marijuana can remain in the system for seven days or Jonger. "Had he been using marijuana" before or at the time of his arrest, it would have shown up in the drug test he was

Carney said Benson requested the drug test, which was administered in Austin in a state-licensed toxicology, NCAA approved lab used by the university.

He was not tested by police at the time of the arrest because there was no indication he was under the influence.

Benson, 19, and 20-year-old Melanie Robinson have pleaded innocent and their lawyers said they likely will challenge the police search and seizure as unfounded.

Carney said any resistance officers met was the locked door, which Benson did not open because the apartment was not his.

"It's not his place to let them in. The police broke a window and entered and started searching," Carney said, adding he didn't know where the window was in relation to the door. He said prosecutors told him about the broken window.

"I don't know if they crawled in or just reached in to open it," he said.

Midland County Assistant District Attorney Bob Stevens refused comment on any details of the arrest. He said he' will interview the arresting officers later this

A woman who identified herself as the apartment manager would not confirm or deny that a window had been broken.

Robinson, who leases the apartment, also did not invite officers inside, said her attorney, Ian Cantacuzene of Midland.



Jenin dispute marks new low in relations between Israel-UN

JERUSALEM (AP) -When senior Israeli officials talk these days about the United Nations, they use terminology they'd normally employ when discussing Yasser Arafat. Duplicitous and double-dealing. An enemy of Israel, whipping up world sentiment against the Jewish

And those are some of the milder epithets being tossed around.

Israel's relationship with the United Nations, long fraught with tension and turbulence, has skidded to a sharp new low with the rancorous dispute over events in the Jenin refugee camp and how they should best be brought to light.

Among officialdom and ordinary Israelis alike, the confrontation is serving to fuel a larger sense of isolation and grievance, of being misunderstood by outsiders who do not understand the harsh realities of daily life here.

Late Wednesday, the Security Council was meeting to decide how to proceed after Israel a day earlier set a series of preconditions that blocked the start of an already-delayed U.N. fact-finding team's mis-

Nearly three weeks after the worst of the Israeli-Palestinian fighting in the Jenin camp, a ragged shantytown in the northern West Bank, some of the most exploallegations Palestinians — including their central claim that hundreds of innocents had been systemati-

Flier's grandchild repeats historic trip

LE BOURGET, France (AP) - Erik Lindbergh, duplicating his grandfather's famous solo flight, landed in France Thursday after a 17hour cruise across the Atlantic - about half the time of the groundbreaking 1927 voyage.

Lancair Lindbergh's Columbia 300 — dubbed the New Spirit of St. Louis landed at Le Bourget airport outside Paris shortly before 11:30 local time (5:30 a.m. EDT). It took off from Farmingdale, NY.

Visibly fatigued, wearing his blue pilot's jumpsuit, Lindbergh addressed his sponsors and about 100 reporters who met him at the small airport.

"It was an amazing time, 1927, and I really wanted to celebrate the 75th anniversary of grandfather's flight," Lindbergh said.

The re-creation was part of anniversary commemorations of Charles Lindbergh's famous May 20-21, 1927 voyage, the first nonstop solo run from New York to Paris.

1927, Charles Lindbergh took five sandwiches with him on the journey but ate only a bite. His grandson brought six sandwiches along and ate one and

grieving Scenes Palestinians picking through the field of debris - roughly the size of two football fields — that remained of the camp's center have galvanized world opinion.

But in Israel, the assault on Jenin is regarded as a straightforward military operation justified by the camp's role as the source of at least 20 suicide bombers. As for endangerment of civilians, Israel lays that responsibility at the doorstep of the gunmen who sought shelter in the camp.

Israel has faced a flood of international criticism over conditions in Jenin in the aftermath of the fighting, but the words of a U.N. envoy, Terje Roed-Larsen, stirred the greatest outcry here. Touring the camp on April 18, Roed-Larsen called the devastation "horrifying beyond belief" and said no military end could justify such

Even before the growing dispute over Jenin, trust of the United Nations was in short supply in Israel. The 1975 General Assembly resolution equating Zionism with racism - rescinded in 1991 - still strongly colors the opinion of many here.
