Put organs on the free market

It's the same thing with cars. I've seen

Is any of this fair? Shouldn't there be some kind of committee to decide which
family deserves and family deserves and gets the larger house have the more spacious hotel accommoda tions?
You
You say: "Williams, you've finally lost it. Can you imagine all the hassle and con-
flict that would result from some want be tyrants deciding who should get what? Moreover, who in their right mind would produce homes, cars ${ }^{\text {tand }}$ hotels if some wacko communistic scheme decided who through prices people are willing to pay?" You're right, and your reasoning pays applies to organ transplants. Let's look at it.

ing list.

When the news broke about his having received a liver transplant, there was out-
rage on the talk radio circuit. Talk show hosts and their callers decried Kramer's transplant, arguing there were needier and more deserving people waiting around for livers. Some, callers argued that people
with self-inflicted illnesses, such as AIDS, obesity or smoking-related cancers, shouldn't receive organ transplants, or at least should have the lowest priority. All of that is nonsense. Whó gets wh organ transplant should be decided using
the same mechanism as we use the same mechanism as we use to decide
who gets what house, car or hotel room who gets what
namely, prices.
In other words, there should be a market for buying and selling organs. The greatest salutatory effect of a a organ market would
write a contract to sell my organs, say, to Body Parts, Inc., for $\$ 300,000$. The pro-
ceeds might become a part of my estate. At my death, my organs would be harvested and the $\$ 300,000$ paid to my estate. Most people think organ donations are
the way to go. For those people, I'd like to the way to go. For those people, I'd like to
ask: What else would they like to see proask: What else would they like to see pro
vided through donations? Cars are impor tant. Why not provide them through dona tant. Wy not provide them through dona-
tions? What about houses, food, clothing, medicine, doctor and plumbing services?
If these goods and services were If these goods and services were mandat ed to be provided through donations, we'd
have the same supply problems as we have the same supply problems as
have with livers, hearts and kidneys. An organ market would eliminate the arbitrariness of doctors and bureaucrats sit ting around like gods, deciding who will die and who will live.
You say, "Williams, with market allocation of organs, only the rich would b
served." Nonsense. I'd like to see the eviserved. Nonsense. Id like. to see tore evi-
dence for such a conclusion. Is it only the rich who have cars or homes or hotel rooms and are able to acquire loans? The great unappreciated advantage of
market allocation of goods and services is market allocation of goods and services is
that it reduces the potential for human that it reduces the potential for human con-
flict. Why is it that we see conflict in wh gets what organ or what's taught in public schools, and no conflict in who gets what car, home or what's taught in private schools? The answer ought to tell us some
thing. thing.
