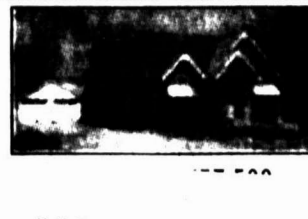

**DPS troopers seize 50 lbs. of marijuana**  
Bonds of \$50,000 each were set this morning for two Ohio residents arrested after DPS trooper seized 50 pounds of marijuana from their vehicle.

Charged Saturday with possession of marijuana over 50 pounds and under 2,000 pounds were Richard Phillips, 35, and Suzette Alicia Chung, 34, both of Solon, Ohio.

A third person, Sharon Marie Auxilly, 39, of Bronx, N.Y., was arrested at the sheriff's office on an Arizona fugitive warrant after she came there to check on Phillips and Chung, said Chief Sheriff's Deputy Kelly Rushing.

Phillips and Chung were being held this morning in lieu of \$50,000 bond each and bond for Auxilly was denied due to her fugitive status, a jail spokesman said.

Rushing said it's believed that Richard Phillips is not the correct name for the arrested man and authorities are investigating that possibility today.

Phillips and Chung were stopped at 1:10 p.m. Saturday for speeding on I-40 East near Groom, a DPS spokesman said.

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## VA clinic remains in limbo

No decision has been made on whether a community based outpatient clinic with the Veterans Administration will be located in Pampa.

The Pampa News reported in July 2000 that the community was under consideration as a locale for such a clinic.

Lou Zickar, an aide in Congressman Mac Thornberry's Washington, D.C., office, told The Pampa News on Friday that no decision has been made about the outpatient clinic.

"We have been in touch with the Veterans Administration," said Zickar. "We continue to be aware of the interest (in Pampa) but no decision has been made."

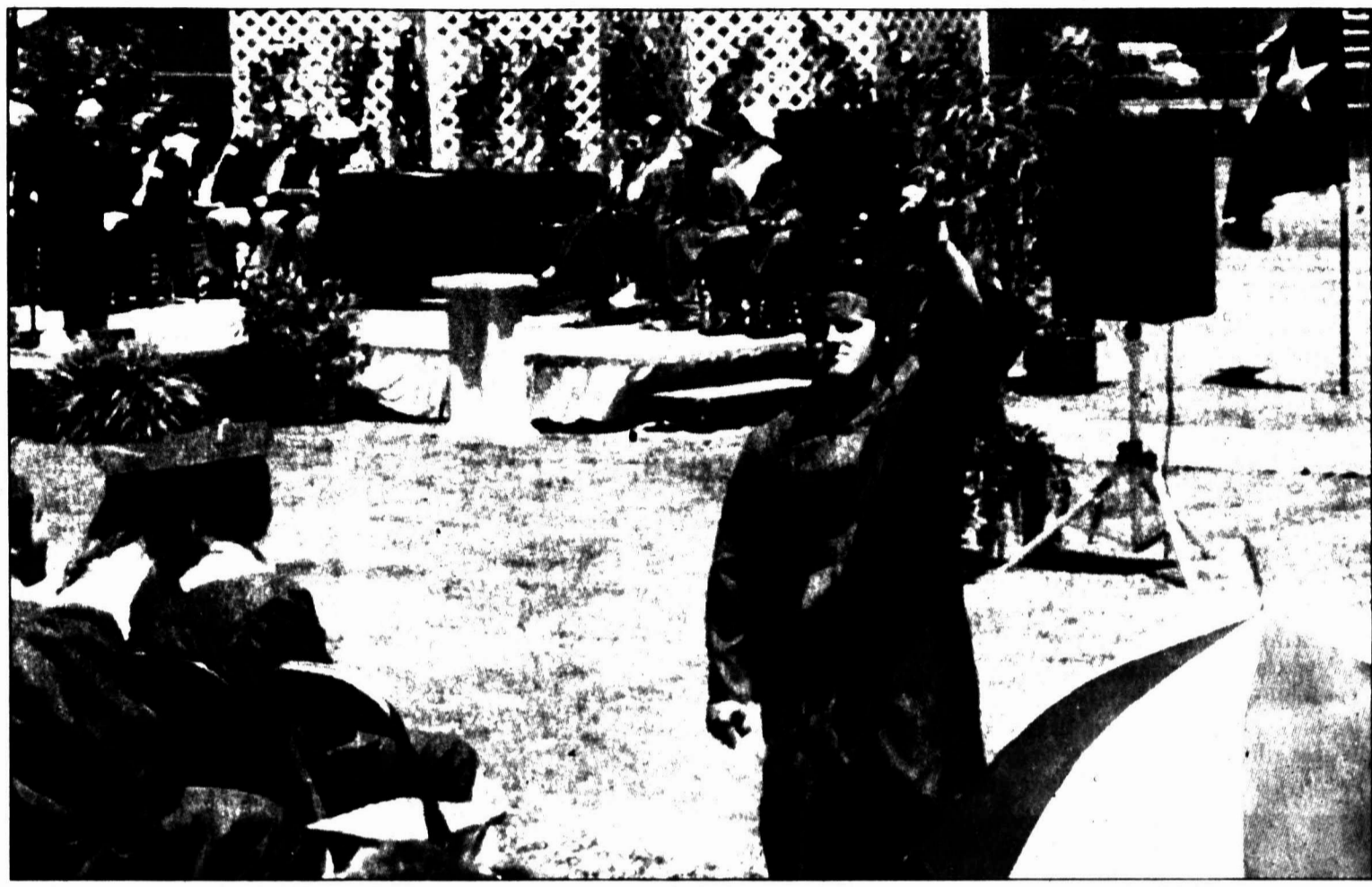
Tina Frohwein of the public affairs department at the VA hospital in Amarillo said there was some discussion concerning a VA clinic in Pampa about two years ago, but there is nothing in the works.

"We had initially requested a facility in Pampa, but the reason it wasn't approved was because of funding restraints," she said. "We don't determine our own budget."

The budget for the Veterans Administration is decided by congressional action.

In July 2000, Kaye Green, then in charge of Strategic Plan Overview in the VA Health Care System in Amarillo, said a proposal first must be sent to the regional office of the VA Health Care System in Mesa, Ariz. If approval is granted in Arizona, then headquarters in Washington, D.C., must approve the request. The U.S. Congress then must give final approval.

Green also said at the time that the project would be dependent upon budgetary considerations. Green has relocated to another VA facility, Frohwein said.

## CRMWA, Mesa rehearing set for mid-June

WHITE OAK — A rehearing on Mesa Water high impact pumping permits is expected to be scheduled for mid-June.

Pumping permits were approved May 15, by the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District board of directors for Dallas businessman and Roberts County rancher I. Boone Pickens and his neighbors,

operating as Mesa Water, Inc., in an effort to sell their water to downstate urban areas.

Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA), however, which pumps from a well field in Roberts County, last week asked for a rehearing on the Mesa permits.

C.E. Williams, general manager of the Panhandle Groundwater Conservation District (PGCD), said today that after talking with board members, he expects them to schedule

a rehearing in mid-June, possibly June 17 or June 18.

"We could effectively deny the request by sitting on it for 90 days," Williams said, "but I don't think that would be right."

Williams said CRMWA is by law entitled to a rehearing, and the water conservation district would go through the process.

"We just want the district to look at it again," Kent Satterwhite, general manager of CRMWA, said today.

The dispute arises from the deletion of a paragraph in the draft permit for Mesa, agreed to by Mesa and CRMWA earlier this year. The water district staff took the paragraph out because it would, in effect, force them to enforce a rule that had not been passed by the water district board.

When Mesa applied for their applications in September 2000, they were unable to name an end user for the water as required by district rules. (See REHEARING, Page 3)

## WEATHER FOCUS

### PAMPA

Today's forecast call for partly cloudy and breezy, highs 95 to 100, and south winds 15 to 25 mph. Caution is advised on area lakes through tonight. Tonight should be partly cloudy and breezy with a slight chance of thunderstorms, lows 64 to 69, and south winds 15 to 25 mph. A chance of precipitation is 20 percent. Tuesday, partly cloudy. Chance of thunderstorms. Highs 84 to 89. South winds 15 to 20 mph becoming east at 5 to 15 mph. Chance of precipitation 40 percent.

### STATEWIDE

Surface moisture increased in West Texas early Monday in response to a low-pressure system moving in from New Mexico.

Isolated showers and possibly a thunderstorm were occurring from near a line from Clarendon to Silvertown across the southeastern panhandle.

Low clouds covered the panhandle, far west and much of the southeastern half of Texas, while skies were mostly clear in the west.

Under the low-pressure trough's influence, winds were mostly light from the south and southeast at 5 to 15 mph.

Early-morning temperatures ranged from the upper 60s to lower 70s.

Extremes were 63 degrees at Marfa and 80 at El Paso.

It should be partly cloudy through Tuesday in West Texas with a slight chance of thunderstorms from the panhandle into the mountains of Southwest Texas.

Thunderstorm chances will increase across much of the region into Tuesday night as a cold front enters the panhandle and pushes into the South Plains. Skies will become mostly cloudy.

Daytime highs will be in the mid- to upper 90s, except for 80s in the Guadalupe Mountains to near 105 along the Big Bend of the Rio Grande.

Lows overnight should drop to the 60s, except for lower 70s across parts of the south.

On Tuesday, highs were expected from the upper 70s in the far northwestern panhandle into the 80s across the South Plains, except for 80s in the Guadalupe Mountains to near 103 in the Big Bend valleys.

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# Congress begins Sept. 11 hearings

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress sets out this week to learn why, despite disturbing reports at home and abroad, the FBI and CIA didn't do more to anticipate and prevent the Sept. 11 attacks.

"Our main goal is to protect the American people," said Rep. Nancy Pelosi of California, top Democrat on the House Intelligence Committee. "In order to do that, we must find out what got us to where we are now."

The House and Senate intelligence panels meet jointly behind closed doors Tuesday to begin an analysis of intelligence agencies' preparedness for Sept. 11 and future terrorist threats.

On Thursday, the Senate Judiciary Committee is expected to hear in public session from Coleen Rowley, the Minneapolis FBI agent who has charged that bureau headquarters mishandled the investigation of an alleged terrorist now linked to the attacks.

The FBI has come under sharp criticism for not seeing a link between the Minneapolis case and the warnings of a Phoenix field agent that Middle Eastern men were training at American flight schools.

Newsweek magazine reported that the CIA tracked two of the Sept. 11 hijackers when they attended an al-Qaida meeting in Malaysia in January 2000 and afterward, but didn't inform the FBI or the Immigration

and Naturalization Service. The INS could have denied them entry into the United States or the FBI could have monitored them while they were in the United States.

The CIA declined comment, but a U.S. intelligence official familiar with the investigation told The Associated Press that the significance of the meeting increased after it became clear the two — Nawaf Alhazmi and Khalid Almihdhar — were associated with an alleged mastermind of the October 2000 bombing of the USS Cole in Yemen.

Sen. Richard Shelby, R-Ala., vice chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, declined to confirm the Newsweek report. In an interview Monday on ABC's "Good Morning America," he complained of a pattern of CIA failures. "I know the director over there is in denial. But I believe he is totally wrong," Shelby said.

"Some hard questions have to be answered," Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., a member of the Senate Intelligence and Judiciary committees, said on CNN's "Late Edition." She said the hearings would probably reveal other missed chances to foresee the attacks. "I expect there are numbers of bits and pieces that weren't put together."

FBI Director Robert Mueller and Attorney General John Ashcroft, appearing separately on several Sunday news programs, agreed the

agencies need to improve how they gather and share information. But they added that better coordination still probably wouldn't have stopped the Sept. 11 attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon.

"There is a torrent of information that comes in" from the FBI's 56 U.S. and 44 overseas offices, Mueller said on NBC's "Meet the Press." The bureau's inspector general is looking into the Minneapolis and Phoenix cases, he said, but "there was nothing specific in either of those instances that had a direct relationship to Sept. 11."

Last week, Mueller announced major FBI changes intended to better collect and analyze information about terrorist threats and place more emphasis on prevention.

The Bush administration also decided last week to issue new surveillance guidelines that allow the FBI to monitor Internet sites, libraries, churches and other places open to the public to help prevent domestic terrorism.

Critics of the expanded powers say they will infringe on civil liberties.

"We've got a wartime situation," Ashcroft said on CNN, stressing that the guidelines would apply only to anti-terrorism activities. "We need to make sure that we're doing everything possible to prevent the next attack."

# Russia assails Pakistan over terrorists; Musharraf presses for meeting

ALMATY, Kazakhstan (AP) — Russia ratcheted up pressure on Pakistan on Monday, criticizing Islamabad's alleged aid to terrorists.

Pakistan's president said he was willing to meet India's prime minister without conditions to defuse their conflict over Kashmir.

Asked by reporters about what would be his preconditions for such talks, President Gen. Pervez Musharraf said, "You need to ask this question

of Prime Minister Vajpayee. What are his conditions? I don't have any conditions," referring to the Indian leader.

The Pakistani leader spoke at a news briefing in Almaty after arriving here Monday for a regional security summit among 16 nations. Indian Prime Minister Atal Bihari Vajpayee, who arrived in Almaty on Sunday, has refused to talk with Musharraf until infiltration of Pakistan-based Islamic militants, and

attacks in Indian territory, are halted.

Russian President Vladimir Putin was due to arrive later Monday to try to mediate between the Indian and Pakistani leaders.

There was heavy cross-border shelling Monday in three areas of Kashmir — Batalik, Kargil and Dras, an Indian Defense Ministry statement said. Indian officials said that three people, including a policeman and a Muslim guer-

rilla, were killed in shootings in India's portion of the disputed Himalayan region.

Indian shelling along the frontier killed seven civilians and injured 16 others, including three women, said Brig. Saulet Reza, spokesman for the Pakistani army.

India said its army hit and destroyed 13 Pakistani bunkers across the other side of the line from Dras, which is 95 miles north of Srinagar, the summer capital of India's

Jammu-Kashmir state.

Scores of people piled belongings onto trucks Monday in a mass exodus from Kotli in Pakistan-occupied Kashmir, after officials imposed an overnight blackout throughout the region. Witnesses spoke of Indian artillery shells landing just a mile from the city, about 25 miles away from the frontier separating Pakistan and India. Farther south, in Khoiratta, residents said almost 10,000

of the village's 15,000 people have fled.

Hours before Putin was due to arrive in Almaty, Russian Defense Minister Sergei Ivanov accused Islamabad of allowing "terrorists" from Afghanistan to cross into India. He assailed Pakistan for conducting missile tests that further exacerbated the crisis.

"Armed terrorists and extremists from Pakistan keep infiltrating into Indian territory," Ivanov said.

The district worked out a temporary permit to allow Mesa to go to potential water buyers with assurances of being able to provide water, but CRMWA, whose well field is next to part of the Mesa properties, protested the application in the summer of 2001.

Mesa sued CRMWA, claiming CRMWA's well field would suck water from beneath Mesa landowners' property without due compensation.

PGCD staff worked out a settlement between Mesa and CRMWA and a draft permit was drawn up in April, but one paragraph of that draft permit was deleted in the final permits issued in May.

That paragraph, inserted at the insistence of CRMWA, prohibited the water district, the only regulatory agency that can control pumping of underground water in the area, from regulating pumping through computer modeling. The paragraph insisted regulation be done through actual monitor-

ing of the water table.

"We want them to regulate based on reality," Satterwhite said.

He said CRMWA feared the water conservation district would issue more permits and when the district's computer models indicated depletion in any one area beyond the district's stated limit (50 percent of the water that was in storage in 1998), the district would shut down all pumping, including CRMWA's.

While Mesa and CRMWA agreed on the wording of the

paragraph in the draft permit, it was deleted by the water district. Williams said the paragraph would limit the tools the district could use to regulate water, and he did not want to get into enforcing rules written by third parties and not adopted by the water district's board of directors.

Williams also pointed out that the wording of the paragraph is not in CRMWA's permit.

Pickens told the Associated Press that CRMWA's move would be an added expense for him and for the taxpayers who have to pay for CRMWA's and the PGCD's lawyers.

It the board does not change its mind following the rehearing, CRMWA can then appeal the water district's decision in district court.

Stadium instead of McNeely Fieldhouse. Dr. Orr said more friends and family of the 258 graduates were able to attend.

The ceremony started at 2 p.m., a time chosen over late afternoon because it's less likely there'll be a thunderstorm. Dr. Orr said two attempts for evening outdoor ceremonies have failed when storms sent participants and guests indoors.

Though no count was taken, Orr said he estimates "at least" 3,500 guests attended. He based his figures on the fact bleachers on one side of the field were full, chairs were on the track and others stood along the fence. Had it been held inside the fieldhouse, the attendance would have been limited to about 2,000.

"We've known for a long time that many of the graduates wanted an outdoor ceremony," the superintendent said.

Commenting on temperatures that went into

the mid-90s, Orr said, "it was an unusually hot day for the first of June ... ordinarily it's not that hot."

Many of those attending the ceremony sat under umbrellas or wore hats and sunglasses.

Heard said her mother wasn't able to stay for the whole ceremony because of the heat, but the fact didn't dampen her family's celebration of Ty's graduation.

"She came back to the house afterwards and we had a great time," she said.

Outdoors isn't the only place it gets hot, Orr said, noting that on past Friday night graduations inside the packed, non-air-conditioned fieldhouse "It gets pretty warm, too."

"I don't think it was any hotter than if it had been in the fieldhouse. At least we had a breeze," Carter said.

Orr said the Saturday afternoon graduation fit well within the school schedule because Saturday was a required work day — a contract day for staff members.

And I am a dad who had heart bypass surgery 18 years ago, and an angioplasty this spring to widen narrowing arteries near my heart.

I have suffered and watched others suffer. I have lost and watched others lose. I have seen the fear, dread and uncertainty of those who live with someone who has heart disease or stroke.

But there's good news: Although diseases of the heart are the nation's No. 1 killer and stroke is No. 3, for men and women alike, they're not inevitable. Lifestyle changes — diet, exercise, etc. — can eliminate some risks; medical treatment can control others.

So, for the sake of Dad's health, please schedule that appointment. It's a loving gift that the entire family will appreciate.

DEAR LARRY: While your gift idea may not be traditional, thank you for a heartfelt suggestion. And what better gift can a husband and father give to his family than peace of mind?

DEAR ABBY: I am a single guy and would like to know at exactly what time adults lose their minds after having kids. Allow me to share two recent experiences involving irresponsible parents.

My sister called to ask if I could help her husband fix their car. The repairs were major and would take four to six hours. 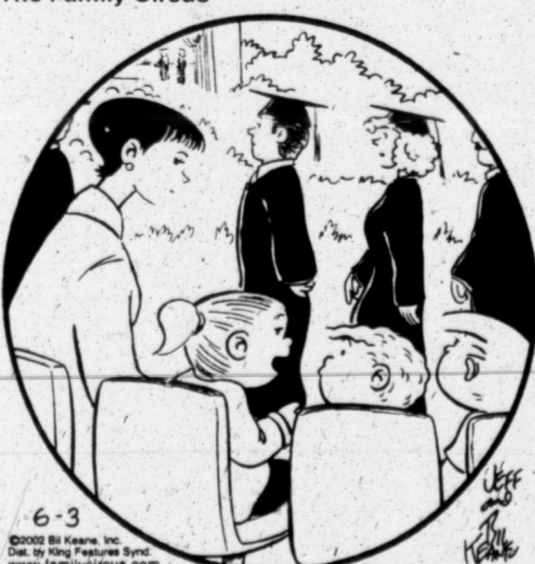

"This was one of those mother-daughter things we wanted to do together. We both ran the half-marathon (5K) last year and we set a goal to try the long run this year," Ronna said.

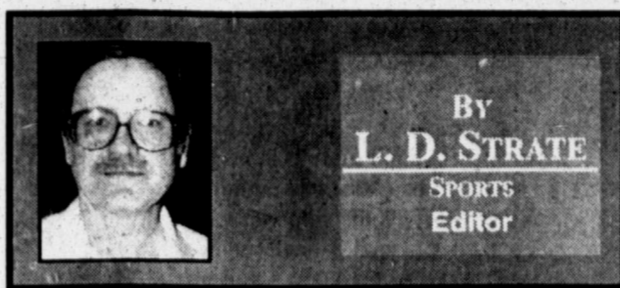
Long-distance running is nothing new to Kendra, who is a home-schooled high school junior. Kendra competes as an individual in high school cross country meets in the fall.

Pampa and Borger meet Sept. 20 in Harvester Stadium.

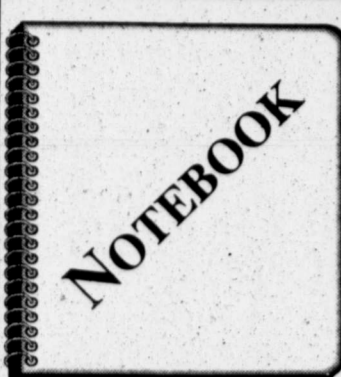
Canyon also dropped to 3A, but the Eagles aren't on the Harvesters' 2002 schedule.

## Championship experience comes through for Lakers

**SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)** — When the pressure was greatest, the Los Angeles Lakers were at their best. Maybe because they had been there before.

"We kept our composure, that's why championship experience shows through," Kobe Bryant said. "I think it was kind of a gut check."

The Lakers did indeed play like champions Sunday night, beating the Sacramento Kings 112-106 in overtime of a riveting Game 7 to make yet another return to the NBA Finals.

And when the pressure was greatest, the Sacramento Kings — except for Mike Bibby — were at their worst. Maybe because they were in new territory.

"We should have closed it out when we had a chance," Bibby said. "We played the best we could, but it wasn't enough."

The two-time defending champions received another dominating performance from Shaquille O'Neal, who ignored the pain in his arthritic right big toe. Bryant scored his usual 30 points and the Lakers finished

the Western Conference finals with a flourish.

"They pushed us to the limits," Lakers coach Phil Jackson said.

Los Angeles made eight free throws without a miss during overtime and scored the game's final eight points.

"It feels great," Bryant said. "Now we have a chance to defend our title, now it's just time to go after it."

That begins Wednesday night at Staples Center in Los Angeles against the New Jersey Nets, who went from a lottery team to Eastern Conference champions in one year.

The Lakers, who haven't won three straight titles since 1952-54 when they played in Minneapolis, were installed as early 9-1 favorites over a Nets team playing in the finals for the first time.

The Kings created plenty of trouble for themselves: 16-of-30 from the line, poor outside shooting in crunch time by Chris Webber, Doug Christie and Peja Stojakovic and otherwise sloppy play.

The Lakers, meanwhile, made 27-of-33 foul shots two

days after making 34-of-40 in a 106-102 victory in Game 6 to force a deciding game.

Jackson, the winning coach in a record 23 straight playoff series, said beforehand the Lakers would be "home free" if O'Neal made his free throws as he did in Game 6.

The big man followed a 13-of-17 performance by going 11-of-15, including 5-of-6 in the fourth quarter and overtime.

Home-free, they were.

"Over the last couple of years now, when I've needed to hit them, I've hit them," said O'Neal, who finished with 35 points, 13 rebounds and four blocks in 51 grueling minutes. "We made some mistakes, but we know what it takes to win. We didn't make too many mistakes down the stretch."

The Kings, who worked all season for home-court advantage in this series only to lose the biggest game they've ever played, couldn't say the same.

"I thought they tensed up down the stretch when Bibby was taking all the shots and the others were hesitating," said Lakers forward Robert Horry, who had 16 points and 12

rebounds.

O'Neal scored four straight points to give the Lakers a 108-106 lead with 1:27 left.

The Kings, who shot 3-of-12 in the overtime, kept misfiring or turning the ball over after that until Derek Fisher was intentionally fouled with 14.6 seconds remaining. He made two free throws.

Webber missed a 3-pointer before Bryant sank two more free throws with 6.4 seconds left to complete the scoring. At that point, he was able to pump his fist in delight.

The Kings were dead.

Finally, Bibby scored 16 of his team's 32 points in the fourth quarter and overtime. He made two free throws with 8.2 seconds left to force the overtime. Coincidentally, that was the time remaining when Bibby made a 22-foot jumper to give the Kings a 92-91 victory in Game 5.

They wouldn't win again.

"I am extremely disappointed for our team," Kings coach Rick Adelman said. "They played their hearts out in this series. I don't know what to say,

we did everything we could. We missed a lot of free throws and it really cost us."

Bibby scored 29 points and Webber had 20 points, eight rebounds and 11 assists. Vlade Divac added 15 points and 10 rebounds before fouling out with 46.3 seconds left in the fourth quarter.

Rick Fox had 13 points, a career playoff-high 14 rebounds and seven assists and Fisher also scored 13 points.

O'Neal and Bryant scored 40 of their team's first 56 points and wound up with 65 while their teammates combined for 47.

The victory was the first ever on the road in a Game 7 for the Lakers in six tries and left them 13-7 in seventh games.

"We just didn't get the win," Webber said. "They accomplished what they wanted to do, that's all I'll say about them."

Divac said the Kings' locker room was silent for five minutes after the players left the court.

"The Lakers won, so I have to give them the credit that they are the better team," he said. "If not, they wouldn't be in the Finals."

## Rangers hold on for 8-6 win over Royals

**ARLINGTON, Texas (AP)** — Chan Ho Park showed some of his best stuff, then his pitching began to unravel.

Park, in just his fifth start for the Texas Rangers since missing six weeks with a pulled right hamstring, opened with four shutout innings Sunday against the Kansas City Royals.

He then gave up five runs in 1 1-3 innings before the Rangers held on to beat the Royals 8-6.

"At times I've been trying to do too much," said Park, who signed a \$65 million, five-year deal in the offseason to become the Rangers' No. 1 starter. "I just have to try to get comfortable. It's kind of like the start of April for me. But I'll be fine."

The Rangers led 7-0 when

Park walked the first two batters in the fifth. No. 9 hitter Brent Mayne had a one-out RBI single and Neifi Perez added a sacrifice fly before Carlos Febles hit a two-run homer, one of his three hits.

Joe Randa hit a one-out solo homer in the sixth, and Park was gone after hitting the next batter.

"He just lost it there with his command, but he has a lot to build on the way he came out the first four innings," Rangers manager Jerry Narron said. "A big part of that is that he lost an entire month and the hitters have been locked in. It's like spring training for him."

Park (2-2) is 2-1 since his return from the disabled list, but

his ERA is 7.65 (17 earned runs in 20 innings). He went on the DL after losing the season opener April 1 at Oakland.

The first five Texas batters reached and scored against Kansas City starter Paul Byrd (8-3), who lost his bid to become the AL's first nine-game winner.

"It was one of those days. They just came out swinging and got some quick runs. They were right on everything that Paul was throwing," said Tony Pena, 18-19 as Kansas City's manager. "He knows what to do. He's one guy I don't worry about. He'll be fine."

Alex Rodriguez added his AL-leading 18th homer off Brad Voyles in the seventh.

## Cubs avoid three-game sweep by Astros

CHICAGO (AP) — Chicago Cubs manager Don Baylor didn't want to spoil another excellent outing by Matt Clement.

Clement allowed five hits over 7 2-3 innings and Moises Alou hit his first homer in a month, leading Chicago to a 4-2 victory over the Houston Astros on Sunday and avoiding a three-game sweep.

Clement (4-3) has averaged 115 pitches and nearly eight innings in his last three starts. He was over 100 in the eighth when pitching coach Larry Rothschild warned Baylor.

"I just turned a deaf ear and kept walking," Baylor said. "He was really at his best today."

But Clement, who finished with 113 pitches, 73 for strikes, hit Brad Ausmus in the head and hung a slider to Jose Vizcaino, and put the tying run aboard.

"Then I had to go get him. I wasn't going to let somebody hit a home run and tie the game," Baylor said.

Antonio Alfonseca gave up an RBI single to Lance Berkman but got four outs for his ninth save in 10 chances.

Clement allowed both runs, walking two and striking out six. He has won his last three starts with a 1.52 ERA.

"It's been a process since I got here, since the start of spring training, of building confi-

dence and trusting my stuff," said Clement, who came in a trade from the Marlins on March 28.

He's finally getting used to Wrigley Field's daytime lifestyle, he said.

"Earlier in the season, I had a little trouble getting through the fifth or sixth innings. Coming over here, not used to day games, I've finally gotten a good workout schedule."

The Astros left only six men on base, but hit into three double plays, including one in the ninth.

"They played good defense when they had to," Astros manager Jimmy Williams said.
