Man arraigned in rustling cases

PORTALES, N.M. (AP) — An El Paso man accused of cattle rustling has been released on bond after his arraignment.
Freddie Lucero, 35, was arraigned Friday before Magistrate Jane Martin on felony counts of exportation of livestock and removal of property.
Lucero is accused of taking cattle from two ranches in the Elida area and selling them at auctions in Floydada and Dalhart, Texas.
Twenty-one head were taken from the ranch of B.J. Moore and cattle operations owned by Todd Firkens and Durward Dixon between December 2001 and February 2002, said Roosevelt County Deputy Marlin Parker. The cattle were sold for about \$6,200 in Texas, he said.

Skellytown fire rating improves

SKELLYTOWN — This community's fire department's rating should lower insurance rates come September.
The state fire marshal's office in Austin has notified Guy McKissick, fire chief of the Skellytown Area Volunteer Fire Department, that effective Sept. 1, the Public Protection Classification for the Carson County community will be upgraded from seven to six. The area surrounding Skellytown that is served by the volunteer fire department received a six and nine split rating.
With the split class, according to the fire marshal's office, all property located within 1,000 feet of a fire hydrant and within five miles of a fire station, will get a rating of six. All property located farther than 1,000 feet from a fire hydrant and within five miles of the fire station will get a class nine rating.

The ratings, on a scale of one to ten with one being the best, is recommended by the Insurance Services Office of the Texas Department of Insurance to the State Fire Marshal's Office, also part of the Texas Department of Insurance.
"One is good," McKissick said of the rating system. "Ten is none. We went from a seven to a six."
That change should be reflected in better insurance rates for residents of Skellytown and for up to five miles outside the city limits.
The improved ratings, McKissick said, were because of the department's increased training and additional equipment.
"We were first rated at seven," McKissick said, "and we added on quite bit of equipment. It's hard to get anymore. Even a new pumper won't do it."
While the rating officially covers a five mile radius from the fire station, McKissick

said that most insurance companies will go up to nine miles because of the capacity of their tank trucks and pumps.
"We can haul out 10,000 gallons if we empty the station," McKissick said.
Better insurance rates for Skellytown and up to five miles outside the city limits, he said, are assured.
"It even benefits people in Texroy in Hutchinson Co.," McKissick said. "They ride on our insurance rating."
The rating is based on the fire department's abilities, including equipment and training, and the availability of water.
McKissick said the city got the improved insurance rating because of what the fire department chose to do with its training and equipment and because they can document what they've done.
"Of course, the new water tower helps," McKissick said. "It added a little bit to it. It makes a difference."

Officials: More charges likely in Friday wreck

Pampa Police Department, Department of Public Safety and Gray County Sheriff's Department responded to a motor vehicle accident Friday afternoon which sent several people to the local hospital.
Steven Lee Ferguson, 35, 2224 Christine, was arrested for intoxication assault after he rammed into one vehicle on private property and then struck another in the roadway on Texas Highway 70 north of Pampa Regional Medical Center.
Ferguson was observed by the property owner damaging the property. According to a report from the sheriff's department, the property owner blocked the subject's escape route with her vehicle.
Chief Deputy Kelly Rushing said Ferguson, who was driving a 1999 Chevrolet pickup, then rammed her car and drove onto the nearby highway.
Traveling westbound on County Road C, officers said, he ran a stop sign striking the driver's side of a 1997 Ford Pickup driven by Graciela Damain Hernandez, 55, of 609 N. Russell.

Department of Public Safety Trooper Jessie Cerda said he arrived at the accident scene shortly after it occurred around 9:30 p.m. He said it happened about one-half block inside the city limits. He said the Hernandez vehicle was traveling from the north to the south on Texas 70.
Cerda said Hernandez, who was seriously injured in the wreck, was taken to Pampa Regional Medical Center. Two passengers in the vehicle were Mayra Hernandez, 14, and Raymond Hernandez, 19. Mrs. Hernandez and Mayra Hernandez were transported to the PRMC Emergency Room by Rural Metro Ambulance Service.
A passenger in Ferguson's vehicle, Toby Hernandez, 36, of 1829 N. Dwight, was also transported to the hospital by ambulance.
Conditions of the patients and type of injuries was not available from PRMC at press time.
Ferguson made bond Saturday afternoon and was released from the Gray County Jail.
Rushing said additional charges are pending against him in connection with the incident.

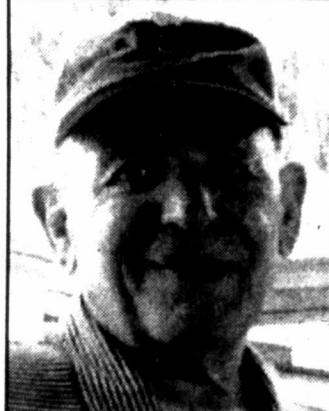
He married Jerry Shelton on May 17, 1957, in Pampa.

PAMPA

Today's forecast calls for partly cloudy skies with a slight chance of thunderstorms in the afternoon, highs around 90, south winds 10 to 20 mph, and a 20 percent chance of precipitation. Tonight should be partly cloudy with a chance of thunderstorms, lows in the lower 60s, south winds 15 to 20 mph and a 30 percent chance of precipitation. Tuesday, partly cloudy. Breezy. Chance of thunderstorms in the afternoon. Some thunderstorms may be severe. Highs around 90. South winds 20 to 25 mph with higher gusts. Chance of precipitation 30 percent.

STATEWIDE

Skies are expected to continue to be cloudy over Texas, along with isolated showers and thunderstorms.

Sunday night was pleasantly cool across North Texas as some high clouds drifted southeasterly across the region. Temperatures were mostly in

the mid-60s except for Dallas-Fort Worth, where temperatures rose into the lower 70s.

Winds were generally light from the north to northeast, and patchy fog was forming early Monday around the Mineral Wells area.

A weak stationary front extended on Monday from Southeast Texas westward into the southern Hill Country and Edwards Plateau. A batch of showers and thunderstorms was occurring in the panhandle, near Dalhart and Amarillo and extending southeasterly to near Lubbock.

Low clouds covered parts of Southeast Texas from Lufkin and Beaumont eastward into Louisiana. Winds were northerly at 5 to 10 mph over the eastern half of the state, but turned easterly over the Hill Country and southerly from the Rio Grande Valley through West Texas and into the panhandle.

Temperatures at 4 a.m. ranged from the middle 60s in the panhandle to the upper 70s along the Gulf Coast.

In the Hill Country, temperatures should be partly cloudy Monday night and Tuesday with isolated showers and thunderstorms.

For Southeast Texas and the upper Texas coast, skies will be mostly clear with lows in the 60s and 70s, but isolated showers and thunderstorms are expected by early evening on Tuesday.

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Forest ranger held without bail in fires

DENVER (AP) — A U.S. Forest Service technician accused of starting the wildfire that has blackened nearly 103,000 acres and destroyed 22 homes appeared in court in handcuffs Monday and was ordered held without bail.

Prosecutors said Terry Barton, 38, started the fire June 8 while burning a letter from her estranged husband, then lied to investigators about it. If convicted of all charges she could be sentenced to a total of up to 20 years in prison and be fined \$250,000.

Barton looked down as the charges against her were read in court. Her voice quavered as she told U.S. Magistrate Michael Watanabe that she understood she could be sentenced to prison.

U.S. Attorney John Suthers asked Watanabe to keep Barton held without bail pending a preliminary hearing.

"She would return to a community in which there is considerable hostility towards her and she could be considered a flight risk," Suthers said.

Barton was charged with setting fire to timber in a national forest, damaging federal property and making false statements to investigators, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Bill Leone.

At the time the fire broke out, Barton was assigned to patrol the Pike National Forest in central Colorado to enforce a fire ban imposed because of a drought.

Barton, an 18-year Forest

Service employee, said she burned the letter within a designated campfire ring, where fires normally would be allowed.

"She attempted to suppress the fire but it grew," Leone said.

Wind drove the fire to within 10 miles of Denver's far southwestern suburbs last week, or 40 miles from the city limits. Calmer, cooler weather and higher humidity helped crews dig lines around 47 percent of the blaze Sunday, but about 5,400 people remained out of their homes.

The air was calm Monday in Denver, where a faint, smoky haze hung in the air. Afternoon temperatures were expected to jump into the 80s and 90s.

Barton lives in Florissant, about 60 miles southwest of Denver. The city was among the hardest hit by the blaze, and many homes were evacuated.

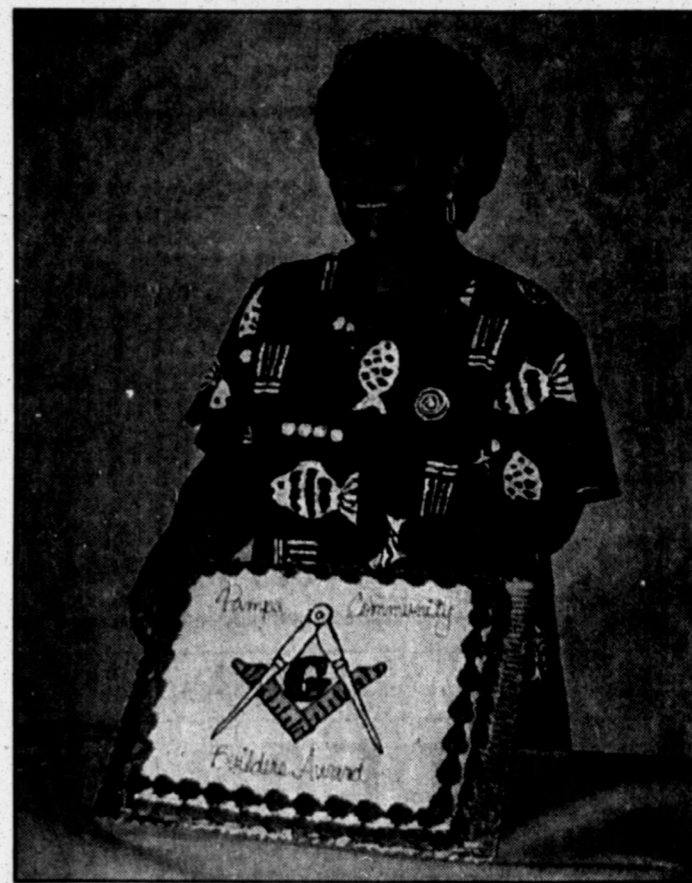
"We all wanted to believe it was some fool from somewhere else. You can understand that, we don't want to believe it. That it's one of ours makes it real sad," said Jody Penny, 45, who was evacuated from Florissant Heights on Tuesday.

Barton initially told authorities she smelled smoke, discovered an illegal campfire and tried to put it out by throwing dirt on it. Investigators later determined she could not have smelled smoke from the position she reported.

Another blaze flared in southwest Colorado and had forced the evacuation of about 860 homes by Sunday night. It had burned more than 26,000 acres in the San Juan National Forest, about 10 miles north of Durango.

Residents of an additional 450 homes were told to be ready to leave. One cabin was destroyed, and fire managers were trying to determine whether others had burned.

If the city added a loop to the fire hydrants on the west side of town, he said, they could add another point.

"But the city can't afford that," McKissick said. "We're pretty close, but it gets cut off at the football field."

In addition to upgrading and adding to their trucks and heavy equipment, McKissick said they've also improved the personal equipment for each fire fighter.

"We've got bunker gear," McKissick said of new personal gear. "They used to have plastic raincoats and hip

boots. We've got real bunker gear. If you don't have your personal protective equipment, you should never leave the station. They've got to have the best we can afford."

McKissick said he's proud of the department, one of almost 30 volunteer fire departments in the Texas Panhandle.

He says that since 1997, the department has concentrated on improving training and certification and upgrading its equipment.

"Now everybody knows our fire department," McKissick says. "What we're capable of. We're not just a

bunch of good old boys that go out and jump in the fire."

McKissick said that Fritch and Phillips fire departments helped Skellytown with their training.

"Even Pampa helped us," McKissick said. "It'll just bow you over the help you get."

He said Pampa's been over to Skellytown to help them train.

"They have level two instructors," McKissick said. "Even Kim's been over here herself."

Pampa has an insurance rating of five. White Deer has a rating of seven.

New legislation changes EQIP

United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has announced the existing EQIP (Environmental Quality Incentive Program) has been changed with the implementation of the new farm bill, raising the cost-share maximum limit, setting all cost-share rates at 75 percent, and reducing the length of the contract term.

A short sign-up period is currently under way through June 28 at the local Agriculture Service Center.

Additionally, a water conservation cost-share program is now in place for the Ogallala Aquifer. Cost-share is available for water-conserving practices including new center pivot irrigation systems based on scoring at a 75 percent cost-share rate.

Applications for this program are being accepted now through July 12 at the local Agriculture Service Center.

Woods cruises to 3-stroke win at U.S. Open

FARMINGDALE, N.Y. (AP) — Don't consider the "Tiger Slam" a real Grand Slam?

Tune in again about two months from now. By then, it's very possible Tiger Woods will have addressed those concerns.

The genuine slam seems downright inevitable after Woods cruised to a three-stroke victory Sunday in the U.S. Open, making him the first player since Jack Nicklaus three decades ago to win the first two majors of the year.

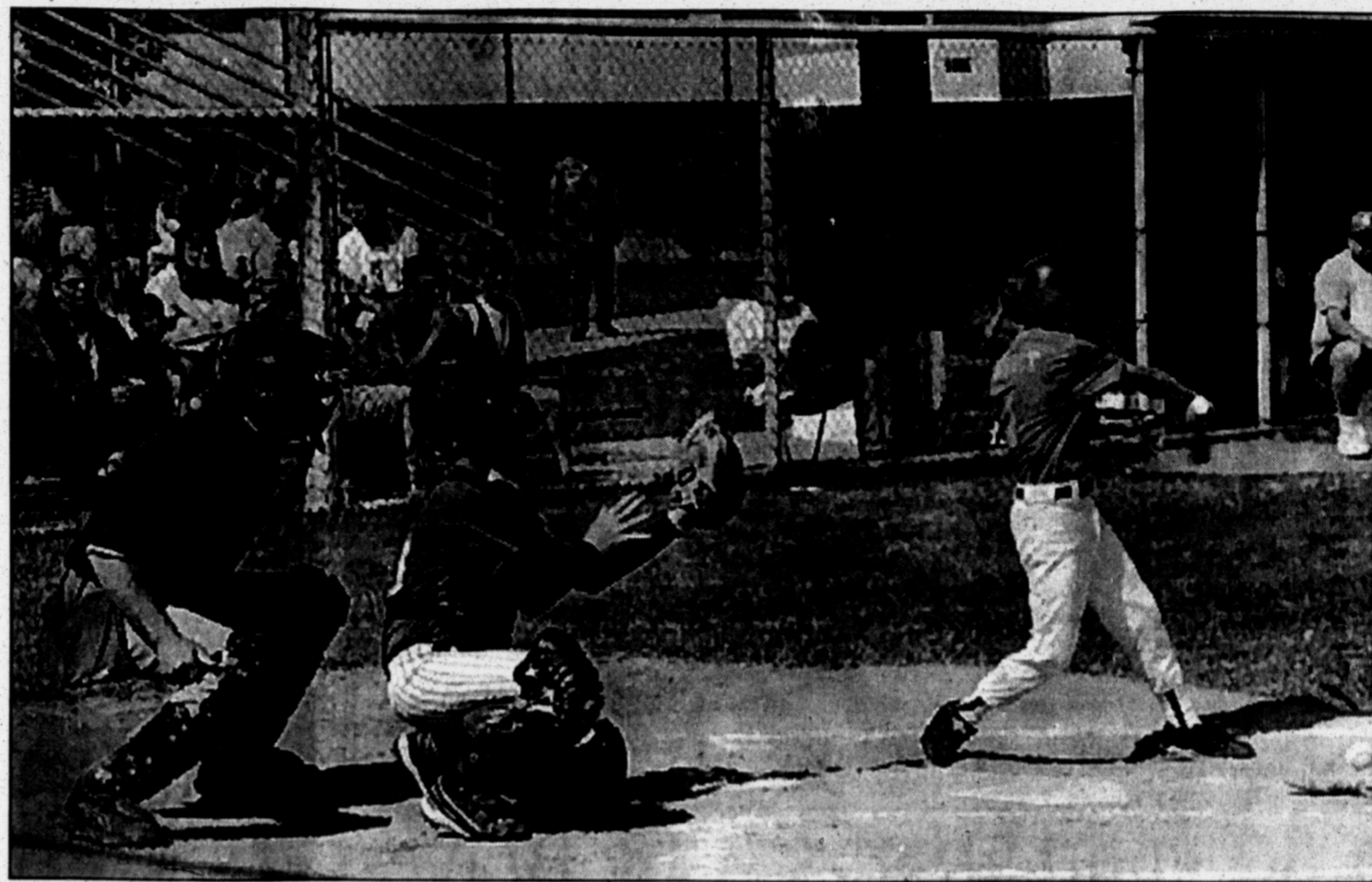
Woods still takes umbrage at those who say he hasn't won the slam already. After all, he became the first player to hold all four major championships at the same time, a streak that began at the 2000 U.S. Open.

Before the year was over, he captured the British Open and PGA Championship. In April 2001, he finished off his version of the slam with a victory at Augusta National.

Now, after winning his second straight Masters and conquering brutal Bethpage Black, he's halfway home to an accomplishment no one can dispute.

"I've won the slam before," Woods said. "You can call it what you want. But when I was at home, I had all four trophies on my mantle, and no other person can say that."

"So," he added, "this will be a different type of slam, it being the calendar year."

"He didn't struggle this week," Bruce Fleisher said. "He certainly likes this golf course."

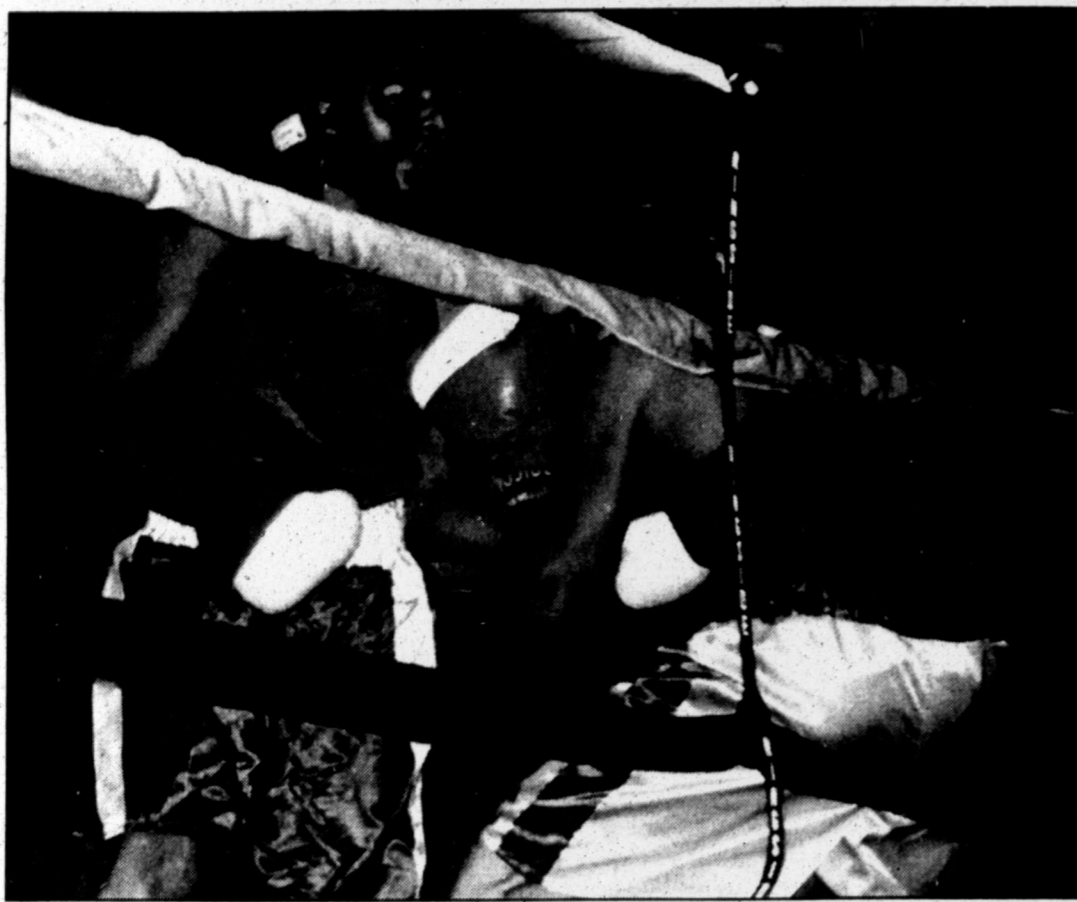
Morgan trailed by a stroke when the final round started, and he carded an eagle, five birdies and two bogeys for a 14-under 202 total.

Derek Lowe stopped his team's losing streak, beat one of the best pitchers in baseball and has the best record in the AL.

Lowe still doesn't consider himself the best pitcher on the Boston Red Sox, even though Pedro Martinez and John Burkett have as many losses and fewer wins than he does.

"I'm not the ace, I'll tell you that right now," Lowe said. "This is only 2 1/2 months. To be considered an ace, you've got to do this for years. I'm the third guy in line, and I just try to win games."

Lowe struck out a career-high 10 and allowed seven hits in seven innings as the Red Sox beat Tom Glavine and the Atlanta Braves on Sunday.

The Braves won 10 of 11 games before they ran into Lowe, including the first two games of their weekend series. Martinez and Burkett, Boston's first two starters, lost those games.

Lowe (11-3) became the AL's first 11-game winner and got his first major league hit, singling up the middle against Glavine in the third.

"It was neat to be able to help the team out and help yourself out, too, because we ended up scoring a couple of runs that inning," Lowe said. "That's the beauty of interleague play. You look either real good or real bad."

The matchup with Glavine was only the second meeting of ERA leaders in the two leagues. The other was June 26, 1998, when Al Leiter of the Mets faced Hideki Irabu of the Yankees.

This was Glavine's shortest outing of the season. He gave up five runs — though just three

were earned — in five innings. His ERA grew to just 1.71, and the homer he gave up to Trot Nixon leading off the third was his sixth in more than 110 innings.

It wouldn't be the first time. Lowe's first appearance came as a starter, though he went as a closer in 2000. Glavine has been to seven since 1991.

Armando Benitez, who blew a ninth-inning lead Friday, pitched a perfect ninth for his 15th save in 17 chances.

Athletics 2, Giants 1
Barry Zito won his eighth straight, and Adam Piatt drove in the go-ahead run as Oakland won the Bay Bridge series, beating San Francisco at Pacific Bell Park.

Oakland took two of three on the weekend from its cross-bay rival with another outstanding performance from Zito, who gave up four hits and struck out five in 6-2-3 innings.

Dodgers 5, Angels 4
Eric Karros and Marquis Grissom hit back-to-back homers in the sixth inning and Mark Grudzielanek hit a tiebreaking single in the seventh as Los Angeles beat Anaheim Angels at Dodger Stadium to win the Freeway Series.

After Grudzielanek's hit off Al Levine broke a 4-all tie, Dennis Cook came in and hit Shawn Green with a pitch in the ribs, causing the benches to clear.

Orioles 4, Phillies 2
Travis Driskill, a 30-year-old rookie, won his fourth straight decision as Baltimore beat Philadelphia at Veterans Stadium.

Driskill pitched 6 1-3 innings, allowing two runs on five hits. He walked two and struck out five.

Philadelphia starter Terry Adams pitched a season-high seven innings, but walked Driskill with two out in the third.

Brian Roberts and Melvin Mora followed with a pair of RBI doubles.

Cardinals 5, Royals 1
Woody Williams pitched a five-hitter and helped himself at the plate with a double and an RBI as St. Louis completed a three-game sweep of Kansas City at Busch Stadium.

Williams struck out six and walked one in his 10th career complete game and first of the season.

Expos 6, Blue Jays 5
Mike Mordecai hit an RBI single with one out in the ninth to give Montreal a win at home, the Expos' fifth straight overall.

Mordecai, who entered the game as a defensive replacement in the eighth, singled off Kelvin Escobar.

Twins 7, Brewers 6
David Ortiz drove in three runs in a four-run first inning, and Dustan Mohr, Denny Hocking and Corey Koskie hit solo home runs, leading Minnesota over Milwaukee at Miller Park.

USA advances to final 8 at World Cup

YOKOHAMA, Japan (AP) — Ho, hum, another World Cup quarterfinals for Brazil and the United States.

The United States? That's right, the Americans are in the final eight of the world soccer championship. They got there by beating regional rival Mexico 2-0 Monday at Jeonju, South Korea. It's their best showing since the first World Cup in 1930.

"Amazing," defender Pablo Mastroeni said. "It's been a long drive coming in and this is the icing on the cake."

Brazil, which is disappointed if it doesn't win the title — it has an unprecedented

four — moved ahead with a 2-0 win over spunky Belgium, which gave the Brazilians all they could handle. Star attackers Rivaldo and Ronaldo scored in Kobe, Japan.

Mexico had tradition and the crowd on its side, and for much of the match it had the ball. But the United States got the goals. Brian McBride scored in the 8th minute and Ijandon Donovan in the 65th. Although North American neighbor Mexico had possession for two-thirds of the game, goalkeeper Brad Friedel leaped and dived to block the Mexicans' six shots on goal.

"Sometimes in games past, other things have let us down," Friedel said. "But our

effort and our heart never were lacking." Hours before the game, President Bush called Arena and the players listened in on a speaker phone.

"The country is really proud of the team," Bush said. "A lot of people that don't know anything about soccer, like me, are all excited and pulling for you."

The United States will play Germany on Friday at Ulsan, South Korea.

"We got a very difficult opponent in Germany," coach Bruce Arena said. "I think when Friday comes around our team will be ready to play."

Kenseth claims Sirius 400

BROOKLYN, Mich. (AP) — No way Matt Kenseth was giving up track position — not with a chance for car owner Jack Roush to win on his home track.

Kenseth kept his lead rather than pit for fresh tires following a red flag, then held off two rookies and Dale Jarrett to capture the Sirius Satellite Radio 400 at Michigan International Speedway on Sunday.

"Fifth or forward, you have to stay out," said Kenseth, who earned his series-best third victory this year. "If anyone told me to come in for tires, I would have refused. I didn't want to give up the lead and I didn't want tires."

Roush survived a nearly fatal plane crash in April. He is recovering at his Michigan home but came to the track on crutches to watch his four cars race.

"When we do really poorly here, and I remember the times we've done poorly as much as the times that we've won, it's a huge embarrassment and I can't wait to come back for the next race," Roush said.

Kenseth contended for the lead during the final third of the race with rookie Jimmie Johnson, but appeared headed to an easy victory with six laps to go until Elliott Sadler crashed in Turn 2.

NASCAR stopped the race to clean up the debris and ensure a green-flag finish.

"I was hoping caution wouldn't come out," Kenseth said. "We had a five-second lead, but they made it interesting by throwing the red flag. Red flags are a tough, tough deal, but it makes it interesting for the fans."

That it did, as all the teams plotted strategy before the pits opened following a seven-minute

stoppage — leading to a frantic finish of three- and four-wide racing.

When the pits opened, Kenseth, Johnson and Ryan Newman all stayed on the track as the leaders even though their tires were old.

Jarrett, the pole-sitter and last week's winner at Pocono, and another pack of cars went with the opposite strategy by going in for tires. That put them far behind the leaders, but gave them faster cars.

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
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

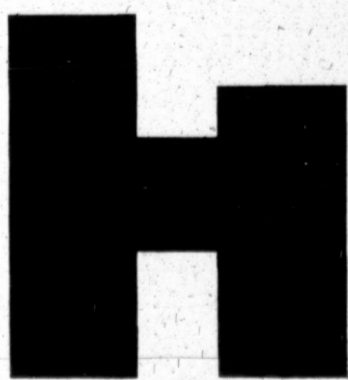
