## Gray citizens to pay \$10 annual auto fee

Gray Countians will pay a \$10 fee per vehicle per-year beginning in January, 2003, following a 4-1 vote of the members of the Commissioners Court.

The action comes as an attempt to remedy a deficit budget.

At the close of an all day meeting Thursday, the Commissioners voted for the fee after the third session of reviewing the proposed county budget.

Voting for the fee were County Judge Richard Peet and Commissioners Joe Wheeley, James Hetley and Gerald Wright. Commissioner Jim Greene voted against it.

Commissioners Court agreed to provide an information sheet in the County Tax Office explaining that the members of the Commissioners Court are the people responsible for the registration fee.

"The staff in my office is charged with dealing with the public and their complaints regarding this increase," said County Tax Collector Assessor Sammie Morris. "I understand the necessity for the initiation of this fee and would

appreciate the Court's effort in educating the public about the fee and their justification for imposing it."

In a consensus of opinion, the Commission indicated signs will also be posted in the tax office stating to contact members of the Commissioners court with any complaints in order to discourage harassment of employees in the motor vehicle registration office.

The fee will be assessed when the annual car registration is made in the vehicle registration office.

County Auditor Elaine Morris told the Commission on Aug. 9 there is a \$735,000 budget deficit after departments and agencies made requests for funding.

In an effort to close the gap, the Commission decided to implement the vehicle fee rather than raise property taxes.

"We increased property taxes close to eight percent last year," said Wheeley. "I don't want to increase taxes again this year."

Peet said there are approximately 23,000 vehicles in Gray County.

He said the residents of Gray County who do not pay property taxes will also be paying for.

## Poker Run to benefit Wheeler tot with CF

WHEELER Little Cooper Adams has a disease which has no cure, but the people of Wheeler are in there battling for him.

The 13 month old was diagnosed with Cystic Fibrosis in February, 2002. On Saturday, Wheeler residents are hosting a Poker Run for the toddler.

His parents, Doug and Joannie Adams, are faced with enormous medical bills, grandmother Pam Hibler said this week. While the couple has insurance, the medications alone for Cooper are about \$5,000 a month.

A genetic disease, CF is a life-long illness that affects about 30,000 Americans a year. The illness affects the respiratory and digestive systems

along with the pancreas.

There have been many advances in technology, medication and techniques to help these children within the past 10 years but no cure has been found.

Cooper is the only child of the young couple. Joannie was born in Pampa and reared in Wheeler with her parents, Pam and Lee Hibler.

Doug is the son of Dale and Becky Adams of Shamrock. He grew up in Canadian as well as Shamrock.

Hibler said the chances greatly increase that a second child will also have the genetic disease.

sees is in Oklahoma City, and the couple has not been able to qualify for any assistance programs to help with the medical bills.

His grandmother said her grandson has done quite well since he was diagnosed and is getting the correct medication.

"Of course, he has bad days as well as good days," she said.

Born in July, 2001, the family knew something was wrong, but didn't know what.

"He cried constantly, and also had diarrhea frequently," said Hibler. "They tried nine milks before he was diagnosed. His doctor then prescribed enzymes which settled his stomach down considerably."

His other medications include three

## Abilene pair happy their baby's back

ABILENE, Texas (AP) — Just over a day after being reunited with their abducted 1-month-old girl, an Abilene couple say they're overjoyed their baby is back safe in their care.

"She's doing great," the baby's father, Salvador Chavez, said on CBS' "The Early Show" on Friday. "I think she feels that she's at home where she belongs. She's a very happy baby. She smiles a lot."

While the baby was missing, Chavez said, Gov. Rick Perry called to assure the couple that a lot of people were working on it.

Nancy Chavez was snatched from the family's minivan about 4:30 p.m. Tuesday outside Abilene's Wal-Mart when her mother, Margarita Chavez, turned around to stow a shopping cart.

## Poll says Sanchez closing gap on Perry

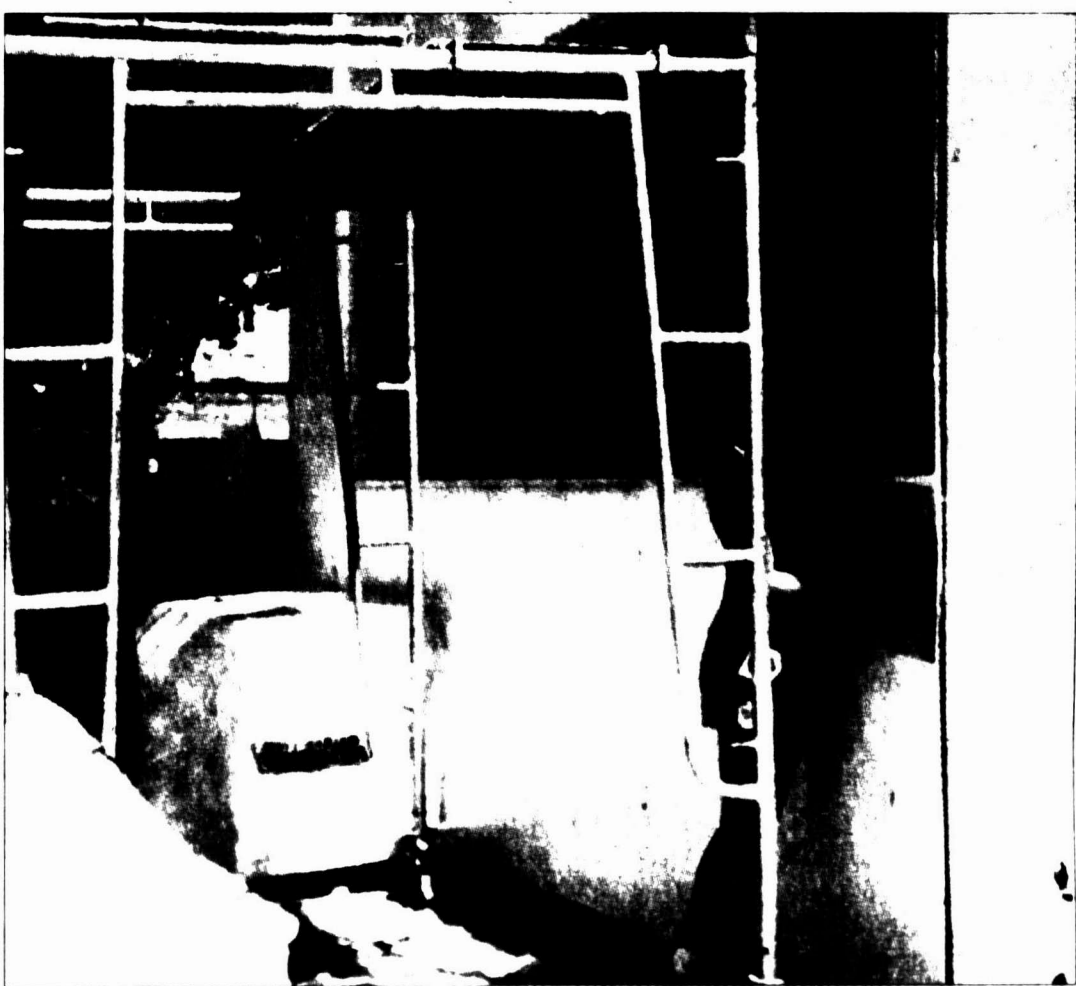
AUSTIN (AP) — Democratic challenger Tony Sanchez is closing the gap on Republican Rick Perry in the campaign for governor, according to a statewide poll released Thursday.

Perry, who became governor when George W. Bush was elected president in 2000, still holds a 12-point lead over Sanchez, but the margin has been cut in half since May.

The poll by Austin-based Jeff Montgomery and Associates, an independent research firm, surveyed 1,152 voters from July 31 to Aug. 8. The poll has a margin of error of 3 percentage points and was not paid for either candidate or party, the firm said.

## AA bans aggressive dogs in cargo hold

DALLAS (AP) — American Airlines has banned aggressive dogs from its planes after a pit bull escaped from its cage in the cargo hold of a Boeing 757 and chewed up electrical cables.

Crew members said they heard thumping from the cargo hold and discovered that backup radio and some navigational equipment wasn't working.

The airline said the ban was a matter of safety and would apply to all pit bulls, Rottweilers and Doberman pinschers and any other dog that exhibits aggressive behavior.

The American Kennel Club called the airline's move an overreaction.

"There is broad agreement among canine

experts that aggressive or dangerous behavior is not breed-specific," claimed the kennel club's chief executive, Alfred L. Cheure in a letter this week to American officials.

Cheure said the pit bull's rampage was caused by a problem with the container, not the dog. He said American should upgrade standards for on-board cages instead of banning some dogs.

Word of the ban spread among dog fanciers, some of whom ship their animals to shows around the country.

Carla Restivo, a Dallas breeder of American Staffordshire terriers, a kennel club-approved version of the pit bull, said she found it hard to fault American Airlines.

### STATEWIDE

Southeast Texas should receive more precipitation today, as Galveston recovers from receiving nearly a foot of rain Thursday.

A flash flood watch was issued this morning for nine southeast Texas counties through this evening, including the cities of Houston and Galveston. Rainfall is not expected to be as heavy as Thursday, but ground is saturated in many areas and runoff may cause problems.

Temperature extremes Thursday ranged from 105 at Fort Stockton to a low of 64 at Marfa.

South Texas today should be very hot. In the Coastal Bend and Rio Grande Plains, care should be taken as hot temperatures combined with very humid conditions will result in heat index values climbing into the 105 to 109 degree range in the late afternoon. In an area generally along and south of I-10 in the south-

east, average rainfall amounts of 1 to 2 inches can be expected today with isolated amounts of 3 to 5 inches possible. Highs today should range from the upper 80s in the southeast, to more than 100 in the deep south, and the mid to upper 90s elsewhere. The outlook calls for mostly clear and hot through the weekend in the south and west with highs in the upper 90s or above. In the southeast and the Hill Country/west central Texas it will be partly cloudy, with highs in the low to mid 90s, hotter in the west, and a chance of afternoon and evening showers and storms.

In West Texas today through early next week it will be mostly sunny and hot, with highs in the mid 90s to triple digits. A slight chance of thunderstorms is forecast Saturday in the southern Panhandle/northern South Plains. In far West Texas, evening thunderstorms are possible through the weekend.

Skies in North Texas today will range from mostly sunny in the west to mostly cloudy in the east. A chance of showers and thunderstorms is forecast for the southeastern third of the region. Highs today will range from the upper 80s in the east to the mid 90s in the west. Saturday through Tuesday, it will partly cloudy and slightly warmer over the region, with a slight chance of rain forecast in the far northwest and southeast this weekend, and continuing in the southeast early next week.

county services with the implementation of the vehicle fee. County Treasurer Scott Hahn estimated approximately one-fourth of the county's residents do not currently pay property taxes.

"One-fourth of the people would begin to generate revenues that they are not currently doing ..." to provide for infrastructure and to maintain services, said Peet.

Morris told the Commission the amount generated by the registration fee will equal a 4.3 percent increase in property taxes. She estimated approximately \$233,000 will be generated by the fee.

She said there will be no need to raise property taxes because funds won't need to be budgeted for the non-recurring expenses after next year.

The commission indicated the \$233,000 vehicle registration fee will more than likely be the only additional fee. The budget is expected to be adopted and the tax rate approved at the Sept. 3 meeting of the county commission.

While stating there is a \$765,000 deficit in

the 2003 budget, County Auditor Elaine Morris said \$658,000 of the upcoming budget are non-recurring expenses which will not be in the budget in the years following the 2003 budget year.

Non-recurring expenses in the upcoming budget year are: courthouse restoration expense which includes moving expense, \$240,000; airport matching and capital outlay, \$43,000; road and bridge paving and capital outlay, \$155,000; anticipated favorable budget variance, \$220,000.

Commissioners Court has met three times in the past two weeks — Aug. 2, Aug. 9 and Aug. 15 — to discuss the budget requests made by county department heads and agencies seeking funds from the county.

The vehicle registration fee is an optional fee which is decided by the County Commission in each county. Of the 254 counties in Texas, 236 counties have the fee in place. Gray and Hemphill counties are the only counties of the top 20 counties in the Texas Panhandle which have not had the fee.

Gray County will join 11 other Texas Panhandle counties with the \$10 fee while seven area counties have assessed the \$5 fee.

Tuesday, she was screaming and bleeding after being dragged across a parking lot by a car that sped away with her infant daughter. She said she somehow believed she would hold her baby again. That happened 26 hours later.

A former prison guard, who fooled her family into believing she had given birth, has been charged with aggravated kidnapping. Paula Lynn Roach, 24, remained jailed Friday on \$200,000 bond.

At a court appearance Thursday, Roach said she understood the aggravated kidnapping charges against her. If convicted of the first-degree felony, she could receive from five years to life in prison.

Roach's attorney John Young said his client is remorseful and "realizes the significant pain and headache that she caused."

Young told CNN on Thursday night, "This is not a case about an animalistic monster who is trying to harm another human being."

Questioned about reports that Roach had been saying she was pregnant, Young said, "Telling folks that you're pregnant for a year seems to me to raise other issues than premeditation. I think that perhaps raises some issues of

a young woman who has some serious needs and some serious emotional needs that either weren't being met or weren't being addressed."

Authorities in Quanah, about 125 miles north of Abilene, received a tip from employees at a nursing home where Roach had gone to show off the infant on Wednesday. Roach's mother lives at the nursing home. Shortly later, officers stopped Roach's car and took her and the baby into custody, and Nancy was returned to Abilene a few hours later.

Roach worked as a corrections officer at the Robertson prison unit in Abilene for about 20 months before she resigned in September 2000, warden James Duke said.

Police said Roach recently worked at an Abilene convenience store and had lived in Quanah, where she apparently planned to stay and raise the baby.

Authorities said Roach confessed after her arrest in Quanah, giving a written statement.

Margarita Chavez said she placed Nancy and her other daughters, ages 3 and 6, in her minivan after she finished shopping. She said as she stepped about 10 feet away to return a shopping cart, she saw a woman removing the infant and car seat.

"I yelled, 'That's my baby — don't take my baby,' but she run ... then I tried to pull her hair or something through the window. Margarita Chavez said Wednesday. "... I was hanging on the window and I couldn't hold anymore, so I fall."

## POLL

According to the poll, Perry had the support of 52.5 percent of those surveyed compared to 40 percent for Sanchez. Of the rest, 4.7 percent were undecided, 1 percent chose another candidate and 1.8 percent refused.

In the May survey, Perry had 59.4 percent compared to 34.3 percent for Sanchez.

The campaign has heated up considerably since then, with each side going into attack mode with television ads critical of the other's record in the charge to the November election.

Perry leads in every geographic region except the South Texas and border areas, where he trails Sanchez by 10 points, according to the poll. The governor's strongest lead is in Dallas, where he leads by about 27 points.

The race continues to see a strong split among ethnic lines, with Sanchez leading among black and Hispanic voters and Perry running ahead among whites.

The poll also asked voters on who could better handle a list of issues, including health care, education, creating jobs, banking and insurance, the state budget and providing leadership.

Perry scored higher than Sanchez in each category but garnered at least 50 percent support on only two issues: dealing with a projected state budget shortfall and providing leadership.

According to the poll, voters consider edu-

cation the most important issue facing Texas.

Ron Kirk's U.S. Senate campaign said the former Dallas mayor filed his federal income tax returns Thursday but did not say what, if any, details would be released to the public.

"Stay tuned," Kirk spokesman Justin Lonon said.

Kirk's filing extension expired Thursday.

As mayor, Kirk was required to submit an annual financial disclosure form, which listed sources of income, but not specific amounts. As a Senate candidate, he reported earning \$227,634 last year doing a few hours of work a week for the Dallas law firm Gardere Wynne & Sewell.

His opponent, Republican John Cornyn, earlier this week released eight years of tax returns.

Cornyn spokesman Dave Beckwith said voters are entitled to know more details about Kirk, including his household income, profits from investments and capital gains.

"At a time when the public is rightly demanding more openness from business and government leaders, this continued secretive-ness is disappointing," Beckwith said.

Cornyn averaged an annual income of \$95,976 during the past eight years working as attorney general, a Texas Supreme Court judge and for the Dallas-based law firm Thompson & Knight.

Last year's tax returns showed Cornyn and his wife, Sandra, earned \$132,906, with Cornyn earning \$81,373 as attorney general.

## Ways to feed the soul

KERRVILLE — Pastor John Petty sees them what he calls "a consistent stream of folks" who come to him for help.

They come seeking guidance from the pastor of Trinity Baptist Church in Kerrville like others who flock to ministers everywhere. The obligations Christ first in your life, and the rest will fall into place.

"If your faith in Christ isn't most important to you, life will chew you up," Petty said.

It sounds simple, Petty knows how difficult it is to do. He said he struggled personally with the notion of putting God above his family.

"If you place your faith first, God's not going to let you neglect your family," he said.

Petty had suggestions for prioritizing your life ways to put and keep God first. He emphasized the importance of the Sabbath and worship, a time to "lock the work out, lock the demands out."

"God gives supernatural rest that you cannot find in sleep," he said.

Small Bible study or prayer groups offer strength and accountability, Petty said. They give participants a more hands-on experience and the chance to help each other with challenges and demands, he said.

"I would say that's where the bulk of the strength comes from... that's what the church is for, to bear one another's burdens," Petty said.

It is healthy to be around "people that can have an objective opinion about your life," he said.

Petty emphasized that trusting Christ will not eliminate the worries and obligations of life, but will make you better equipped to deal with them.

"Life won't be able to chew you up anymore," he said.

### Tools that Help

Glenn McGinnis, owner of The Doves Nest, a Christian book store, said many of his customers seek books that will help them combat their fears

and worries.

"Sometimes, people will come in here and they'll have a particular challenge, and for some reason, they feel they don't have a church connection, but they can always come in here and get a book that addresses their situation," McGinnis said, adding that his store was not a substitute for church, just a bridge to it.

McGinnis book store is full of books on topics from getting out of debt to surviving cancer to raising children to releasing your burdens to God. McGinnis said the Bible is the common thread in all the books he carries aimed at helping people deal with stress.

"Really, the answer to all of life's problems can be found in scripture," he said.

Small inspirational books such as "Hugs for Women" by Mary Hollingsworth offer encouragement; CDs with instrumental music also are sold in connection with the books to calm the reader down, McGinnis said.

McGinnis said he sees more books that aren't meant to be read from cover to cover, but are more for the mosaic thinker, with sections on different topics. He also sees abbreviated versions of books, as more and more things compete for readers time.

But books aren't the only thing offered to help people harness the power of their faith.

A small cross to put in your pocket, screensavers with scriptures, coffee mugs with a prayer on it are just a few gift items people can bring into their day to remind them of God's promises.

"Life has gotten a lot more hectic, and the pace has gotten faster," McGinnis said. "However, the solution is the same as it was 2,000 years ago."

Rita DeShields, a licensed professional counselor at Hill Country Christian Counseling Center Inc., said a large part of her job was helping her clients remember they are spiritual beings, and reopening their connection to God, which is

sometimes choked off by anxiety.

"I've gotta do this report, I've gotta pick up the kids... I've gotta, gotta, gotta, gotta. Gotta get out of balance quick," DeShields said of life.

Balancing the physical, emotional, spiritual and intellectual aspects of life is critical, DeShields said, pointing to a drawing of a stool with four legs representing each aspect. If one aspect is neglected, she said, the stool will topple over.

"there's more to it than reading the Scriptures," she said, emphasizing balance. "you've got to put it in action."

Daily prayer and meditation, Bible reading and fellowship with other believers is essential, she said.

"Were not in this world alone," DeShields said. "In some way, were all connected."

Equally important, was taking care of your body exercising, not drinking too much caffeine or alcohol or eating too much sugar.

DeShields often has clients write two simple prayers on sticky notes: "I bless this situation" and "Holy Spirit, let me to see this differently."

"It's like brushing our teeth," she said. "You have to develop that habit. If you don't see the toothbrush, you might forget."

The first prayer is an alternative to cursing the situation, she said.

## The secret of a Christian life

Many people greatly misunderstand Colossians 3:4, Philippians 1:21, and Galatians 2:20; especially the latter two.

In Philippians Paul tells us that "for to me to live is Christ". To him this is a fact, but among God's children today there is a big misunderstanding. They think "for to me to live is Christ" is a goal to reach. They must try to so live that they may arrive at the goal. It is a standard to reach. It is their expectation.

Let us remember, however, that Paul is not telling us here that his goal is "to me to live is Christ". He is not saying that he must go through many years, trials, and dealings of God before he can reach the goal.

What he says is that the reason why he lives is Christ. Without Christ he cannot live at all. This describes his present condition, not his goal. This is the secret of his life. His life is Christ, he lives because Christ lives in him.

Galatians 2:20 is another familiar verse among Christians. The misunderstanding many have with this verse is even graver than with Philippians 1. Again they take this verse as their goal, as their standard. How they pray and wait and long to arrive at a point where "It is no longer

I that lives, but Christ liveth in me".

But is Galatians 2:20 a hope? Is it a goal? Is it a standard to arrive at? Many make it so. They hope that one day they will arrive at the place where they no longer live but Christ lives in them. This is their goal.

What they fail to see is that this is God's way of victory - not a goal or a standard. It does not say what I should do that I may live. Neither does it say what I can do to make me live.

It simply says that Christ lives in me (Galatians 2:20). It is not a standard or a goal. It is not something which is set high above for him to exert his utmost strength to reach. Rather, it is the secret of life.

What is the secret of life? It means that the way of victory is not a goal but a process. Do not confuse the process with the goal. This is a marvelous grace God has given us. It is a way by which the defeated may overcome, the unclean may be clean, the common

may become holy, the earthly may be heavenly, and the carnal may become spiritual.

It is a way, not a goal. The way lies via a substitutionary life. As Christ is our substitute in death, so he is our substitute in life.

At the beginning of our Christian life we saw how the Lord Jesus bore our sins on the cross so that by his death we were delivered from death, our sins were forgiven, and we were condemned no more.

Today Paul tells me that because Christ lives in me, I am delivered from living. The meaning here is simple: since He lives in me, I no longer need to live. As He died on the cross for me, so now He lives in me in my place.

This is the secret of victory. This is Paul's secret. He does not say, "I hope I will not need to live or I hope I can let Him live." He just says, "No longer live I, for I have let Him live. Now it is no longer I who lives, but Christ who lives in me."

### Court rules that Muslim women can't wear scarves in ID photos

MOSCOW (AP) — A court in the Russian region of Tatarstan has ruled against three Muslim women who demanded the right to wear religious headscarves for official identification photos, a news agency reported.

The case is believed to be the first of its kind in Russia, which is predominantly Orthodox Christian. Muslims comprise the second-largest religious group.

The three women had argued that the rule imposed by the Interior Ministry of Tatarstan banning headscarves went against Islam, Interfax news agency reported.

The women said a passport photo without a head covering could lead officials to ask a Muslim woman to take off her scarf in public for identification purposes, shaming her. Islamic women must be modestly dressed and most Muslim societies require women to cover their heads in public.

The women plan to appeal to a higher court. In Tatarstan, a large portion of the population is Muslim, and an increasing number of ethnic Tatars have begun practicing Islam again in the

decade since the collapse of the officially atheist Soviet Union.

### New episodes planned for Davey and Goliath

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Davey and Goliath, the stop-action animated stars of Sunday morning TV in the 1960s who recently reappeared in a soda commercial, are getting their TV show again.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America plans to produce 26 new episodes of the Davey and Goliath show.

The denomination's predecessor, the United Lutheran Church in America, produced 65 episodes of the Davey and Goliath show and six specials from 1960 to 1971. 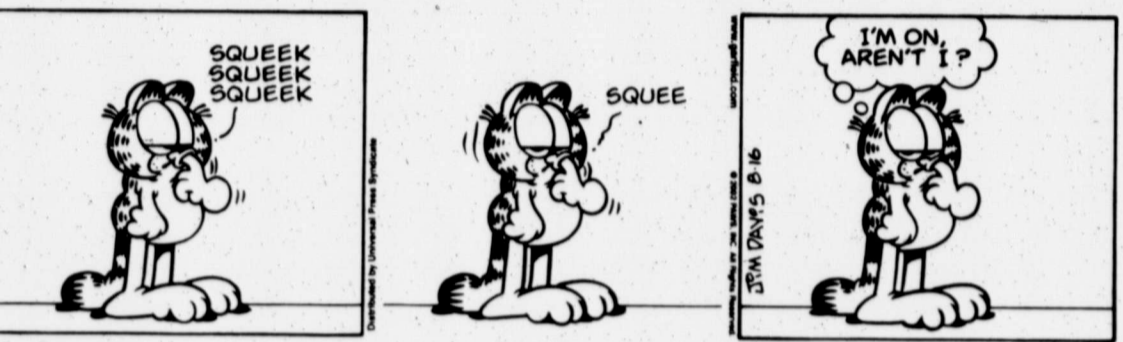

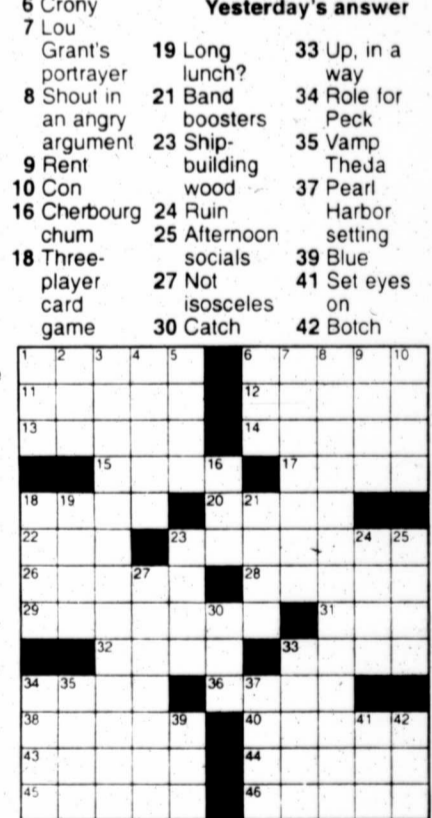

## NOTEBOOK

### FOOTBALL

**PAMPA** — The Pampa Harvesters will scrimmage Wichita Falls Hirschi at 10 a.m. Saturday in Quanah.

Hirschi is coming off a 1-9 season.

**BALTIMORE (AP)** — Kyle Rote, one of the most popular players in New York Giants history, died at 73 from cardiopulmonary complications at Sinai Hospital in Baltimore.

Rote, an All-American at Southern Methodist and the No. 1 pick in the 1951 NFL draft, later was the first president of the NFL Players Association.

Rote caught 300 passes for 4,797 yards, a 16-yard average, and 48 touchdowns. He was the Giants' career receiving leader when he retired.

### BASEBALL

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Three days of bargaining produced disagreements rather than a deal, leaving baseball players all but certain to set an Aug. 30 strike date.

The union's executive board was ready to set a strike date Monday when it met in Chicago, but delayed a decision after management officials suggested a few more days of bargaining without a looming strike date might lead to progress.

But owners then moved little on the key economic issue of a luxury tax on high-payroll teams, leaving the union on track to call for baseball's ninth work stoppage since 1972.

"It wasn't good today. They made another proposal that was fairly meaningless," said Atlanta's Tom Glavine, the National League player representative. "I think we're basically sitting back waiting for them to give us a serious offer."

After meeting twice Thursday, the sides didn't even bother to schedule a bargaining session for Friday, and people aligned with both management and the union described the sides as far apart. Negotiators on both sides refused comment.

"I've gone from as optimistic as I can be to as pessimistic as I can be," said Braves player representative Mike Remlinger. "It's back to just a flat out refusal to move."

The union's board scheduled a telephone conference call for Friday morning, and the union was likely to announce the deadline later in the day.

"I got a gut feeling they'll probably set a date tomorrow, because they haven't gotten anywhere the last three days, which to me was somewhat surprising," Houston player representative Gregg Zaun said.

Since the first labor contract that included free agency in 1976, owners have attempted to slow salaries, leading to five work stoppages in five negotiations. Management's desire for payroll restraint remains the key obstacle to a labor contract to replace the one that expired last Nov. 7.

Owners originally proposed a 50 percent tax on the portions of payrolls over \$98 million, then moved up their threshold last weekend to \$100 million. Since Monday's meeting, management has moved up only to \$102 million, according to a player and two player agents who spoke on the condition they not be identified.

The union fears a luxury tax along those lines when combined with increased revenue sharing would act as a cap because it would drain large amounts of money from high-revenue teams.

## Goosen moves within one shot of leaders at PGA Championship

**CHASKA, Minn. (AP)** — Retief Goosen, the 2001 U.S. Open champion, birdied the next-to-last hole of his weather-delayed opening round Friday morning to move within one shot of the leaders at the PGA Championship.

A three-hour lightning delay Thursday forced about a quarter of the 136-man field to finish their rounds Friday before beginning second-round play.

Goosen, who missed the cut at the U.S. Open but then tied for eighth at the British Open, shot a 3-under 69 that put him one behind co-leaders Jim Furyk and Fred Funk, neither of whom was a factor in the year's previous majors.

Goosen began play Thursday at No. 10 and was 3 under through 11 holes, then lost a stroke with a bogey at the 196-yard, par-3 4th hole. He got it back with his 7-foot birdie putt on the par-3 No. 8.

Joining Goosen a shot back were Peter Lonard, a former Australian club pro, and Justin Rose, who nearly won the British Open as a 17-year-old amateur in 1998. They finished their rounds Thursday.

Bernhard Langer, who at 44 is 19 years removed from the first of his two Masters victories, eagled the 542-yard, par-5 No. 7 to jump from even par to 2 under, along with Lee Janzen, Davis Love III, Jeff Sluman and Mark Calcavecchia. Langer hit a 5-wood to 20 feet with his second shot on 7, then holed the putt.

"That was nice, especially after missing a 6-footer for par" on No. 5, Langer said. Phil Mickelson, still searching for his first major after winning 21 PGA Tour events, struggled to a 76 that he finished Friday morning, putting him in danger of missing the cut.

Tiger Woods, trying for his

ninth win in a major, was among a large group at 1-under 71 as second round play opened. Also in the group were 47-year-old Greg Norman, who hasn't won a U.S. tournament in five years.

Woods had trouble controlling his driver during his weather-interrupted round Thursday because of an unpredictable wind.

Unlike the British Open, though, the gusts at Hazeltine National didn't blow him out of contention as he tries to become the first to claim all three U.S. majors in the same year — an American Slam.

At Muirfield last month, Woods' hopes of winning the Grand Slam — all four majors in the same year — ended with a weather-aided 81 during the third round.

"It's so tough to figure out," Woods said of a Minnesota prairie wind he admittedly never deciphered. "It's changing its intensity, also its direction. So you're playing two holes going the same direction; one is playing into the wind and one is playing downwind."

To try to get his driver straightened out, Woods spent more than an hour working on the practice range following his round.

While many of the 40,000-plus spectators were following the Woods-Ernie Els-David Toms threesome, Furyk and Funk, who live about a mile apart in Florida, eased their way onto the leaderboard virtually unnoticed. For good reason, too.

Furyk, preoccupied earlier this summer as his wife gave birth to their first child, missed the cut in all three majors. Funk didn't even qualify to play in them.

"It's been a good year and a frustrating year, all in one," Furyk said. "So it's been a roller coaster ride."

## Former Major League pitcher who had deformed hands is dead at 86

**HOUSTON (AP)** — Jack Dalton Creel, who pitched for the St. Louis Cardinals Cardinals in 1945 and for many more years in their farm system, is dead at 86.

Creel died Tuesday in a hospital. Visitation was Friday at Memorial Oaks Funeral and Cemetery in Houston.

Creel was born with deformed hands, yet became a dominant pitcher.

According to his son, Jack Randall Creel of Houston, Creel's birth defect never was a negative for him.

"He couldn't put his hands flat on a table, and he couldn't get into the military because his fingers wouldn't straighten out to salute," his son said.

But Creel could pitch. For 20 years he pitched in the minors and majors. He was called up to the Cardinals in April 1945, going 5-4 with a 4.14 ERA. His major-league career ended later that year, when he injured a shoulder while playing.

He then returned to the Houston Buffs, a farm club of the Cardinals. In 1947, Creel was in the starting rotation when the Buffs won the "Dixie Series," which pitted the champions of the Texas League against their counterparts in the Southern Association. Although Creel pitched for other teams, including the Beaumont Exporters, he spent most of his baseball days with the Buffs.

Creel was in his early 40s when he retired from baseball.

Solly Hemus, who spent 15 years in the major leagues as player and coach and was a teammate of Creel's, said he never knew that Creel's hands were deformed. Hemus has been in the oil business ever since his retirement from baseball.

"He was a great pitcher. He had a great curve ball. It seemed like his arms were wound tight and he was holding his hands in a curved position," Hemus said. "His hands had a very tight grip on the ball. He could pitch about 90 to 92 mph."

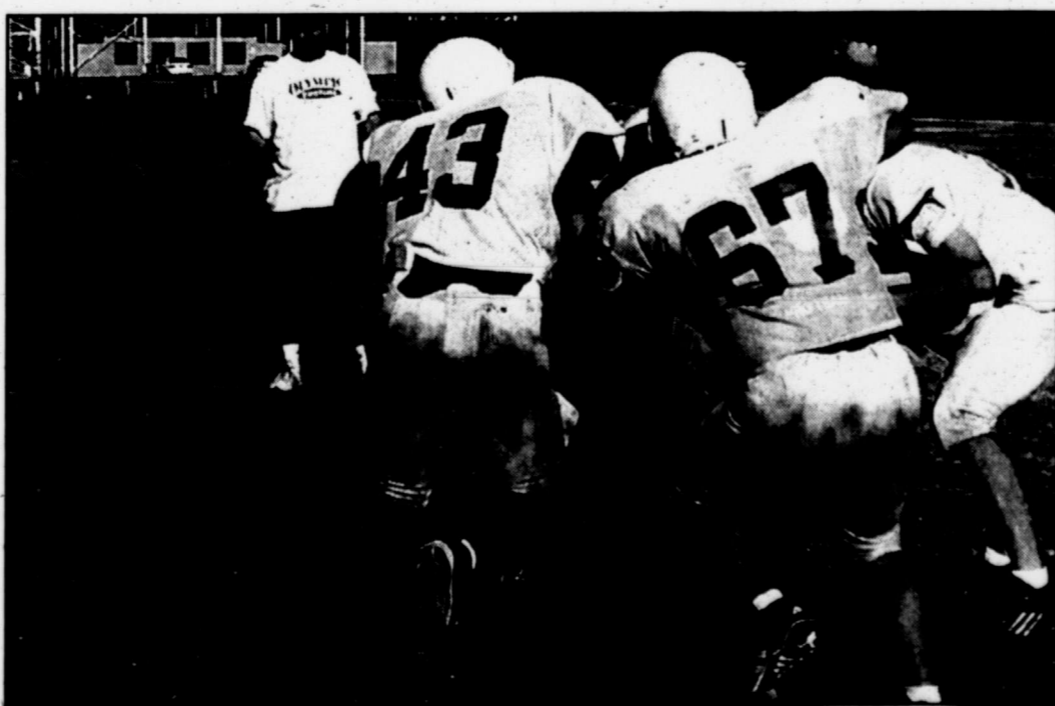
As a boy, Creel mastered the art of pitching by throwing balls against a wall and knocking down bottles at local fairs. Vendors soon banned him from playing because he always won the prize and broke most of the bottles, his son said.

An avid golfer, he became so proficient, that at age 77 he was shooting 75, his son said.

"He was very gregarious and outgoing. He loved to tell stories about baseball. His golf friends called him 'Instant Replay' because he could tell you every golf shot he made," his son said.

Creel was preceded in death in 1999 by his wife of 62 years, Frances Lucille Capps Creel. He is survived by his son and a daughter, Kaye Moore of Norwalk, Conn.

# Heavy rain forces deadlock between Braves and Giants

**Not another tie!**

Not another tie!  
Just more than a month after the All-Star game ended in a controversial stalemate, the Atlanta Braves and San Francisco Giants were forced to settle for a 3-3 tie Thursday night because of heavy rain at Turner Field in the 10th inning.

But while the All-Star tie in Milwaukee on July 9 had fans booing commissioner Bud Selig in his own backyard, this one just left everybody tired.

"I'm glad it's over," Atlanta slugger Gary Sheffield quipped. "It's past my bedtime."

Chipper Jones hit a two-out, two-run single in the ninth inning off Robb Nen, and play was halted in the top of the 10th.

After a delay of 2 hours, 33 minutes, umpires finally gave up on trying to resume at 1:25 a.m. EDT. The teams are not scheduled to meet again this season.

The game will be replayed only if

it has a bearing on the postseason race, most likely the day after the regular season ends. The Giants, one game behind Los Angeles in the NL wild-card race, close the season Sept. 29 at home against Houston.

That means they might have to make a cross-country trip to Atlanta for a chance to reach the playoffs.

"There's nothing you can do about it. If you have to come, you have to come," manager Dusty Baker said. "I hope we do have to come, because it would mean we're in the running for the playoffs."

In other NL games, it was: Arizona 7, Cincinnati 2; Los Angeles 1, Montreal 0; Chicago 6, Houston 4; St. Louis 11, Pittsburgh 5; San Diego 5, New York 3; and Philadelphia 5, Milwaukee 0.

Either way, Thursday night's game gets recorded officially as a tie, and all the stats count. Sort of like the All-Star game, which ended 7-7 when the teams ran out of pitchers after 11 innings.

The Braves, who are running away with another NL East title,

would prefer not to play an extra game — especially right before the playoffs.

Still, they don't envy San Francisco's position.

"That would really stink," Jones said. "They'd have to fly all the way over here to play a game that might not even matter."

The Orioles and Yankees tied late last season in the AL.

Randy Johnson recovered from a one-day illness and gave up only two hits in eight innings, striking out 11, as Arizona finished off a sweep at Cinergy Field.

used as a reliever for now.

Eric Gagne earned his 41st save.

Rookie Mark Prior struck out 12 in six innings — including seven in a row — and Sammy Sosa hit his 41st homer as Chicago avoided a four-game sweep at Wrigley Field.

Fred McGriff hit his 475th homer off Kirk Saarloos (5-3) to tie Hall of Famers Stan Musial and Willie Stargell for 21st on the career list.

## Cardinals 11, Pirates 5

Pinch-hitter Eli Marrero hit a tiebreaking single, and Tino Martinez added a three-run double in a six-run ninth as St. Louis won its season-high sixth straight.

The Cardinals extended their lead in the NL Central to four games over Houston by sweeping a four-game series in Pittsburgh for the first time since 1971.

The Pirates (52-69) have lost six straight, matching their season worst.

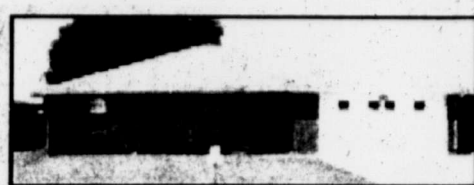

# Families file \$100 trillion suit against Sudan, Saudis for attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — Relatives of Sept. 11 victims filed a \$100 trillion lawsuit against the Sudanese government and Saudi officials, banks and charities, claiming they helped finance Osama bin Laden's network and the terror attacks.

"It's not the money. We want to do something to get at these people," said Irene Spina, whose daughter, Lisa L. Trerotola, 38, died in the World Trade Center in New York City. "There's nothing else we can do."

"This is the right thing to do," said Matt Sellito, father

of Matthew Carmen Sellito, 23, who also died at the World Trade Center. "If the odds are stacked against us, we will beat them."

The 15-count federal lawsuit seeks to cripple banks, charities and some members of the Saudi royal family as a deterrent to terrorist financing schemes.

The suit was filed Thursday in U.S. District Court in Alexandria, Va., on behalf of some 600 families. It seeks "an amount in excess of \$100 trillion" and charges the defendants with racketeering, wrongful death, negligence and conspiracy.

Lead attorney Ron Motley said the money likely would

come largely from assets held by the defendants in the United States. He said the plaintiffs were after more institutions than those whose assets already have been frozen by the U.S. and other governments.

Another attorney in the case, Allan Gerson, said Friday that one aim of the lawsuit was to choke off the financial support for terrorist networks.

"Until now, sponsoring terrorism has been a cost-free operation," Gerson said on CBS' "The Early Show." He said "we intend to stop that."

The complaint also ignores the Bush administration's delicate diplomatic balancing act

with Saudi Arabia by bluntly blaming the kingdom's officials and institutions for the attacks.

"That kingdom sponsors terrorism," Motley told reporters. "This is an insidious group of people."

The complaint names more than seven dozen defendants, including the government of Sudan, seven banks, eight Islamic foundations and three Saudi princes.

Those listed include Prince Mohammed al-Faisal, former intelligence chief Prince Turki al-Faisal, Saudi Defense Minister Prince Sultan, Khalid bin Salim bin Mahfouz of the National Commercial Bank and the Faisal Islamic Bank.

Officials from the Saudi Embassy did not return a call for comment.

President Bush's administration has been careful not to blame the Saudi government for the attacks in its drive to build a coalition for its war against terrorism.

Prince Saud al-Faisal, the Saudi foreign minister, said last week that the 70-year-old U.S.-Saudi alliance was as solid now as before the Sept. 11 attacks on the United States.

He said bin Laden, who was stripped of Saudi citizenship and is accused of directing the al-Qaida attacks, had intended to drive a wedge between the two countries

when he chose 15 Saudi citizens to be among the 19 hijackers.

Several plaintiffs, fighting tears, said they would dedicate the rest of their lives to punishing those who financed the hijackings and crashes of four U.S. commercial jets on Sept. 11.

"We will succeed because we have the facts and the law on our side," said Thomas E. Burnett Sr., whose son, Thomas E. Burnett Jr., led a passenger revolt against the hijackers of United Airlines Flight 93 and died when it plummeted to the ground in a southwestern Pennsylvania field.

"We have justice and morality on our side," he added.

Burnett's mother, Deena, said her son told her in a phone call that he was "putting a plan together that he and others were going to take back the airplane."

"And he said, 'You know Deena, I think we can do it. It's up to us,' she said. 'Those words resonate in my mind. And I think we're going to do something, too. And this is a good start.'"

## NASA craft lost in space

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — A \$159 million spacecraft remained lost in space Friday, one day after it was to have left Earth's orbit to explore several comets.

NASA's Contour spacecraft was supposed to have automatically fired its solid-rocket motor at 1:49 a.m. Thursday to propel itself out of an orbit it was placed in after its launch July 3.

At the time, the octagonal spacecraft was about 140 miles above the Indian Ocean, too close to Earth and moving too fast for NASA's Deep Space Network of antennas to track.

The network was to have picked up a signal from Contour 48 minutes after the burn, as the spacecraft moved away from Earth, but by Friday morning, no signal had been received.

"I guess we are still certainly hoping this will turn out all right. Spacecraft have been lost before and safely regained," said Michael Belton, a member of the mission's science team.

The giant dish antennas in California, Australia and Spain continued to search for the spacecraft Friday, alternately sending it commands and listening for a response. Nothing was heard from Contour — short for Comet Nucleus Tour.

The mission's operations team looked for Contour at points along the paths the spacecraft was supposed to have taken. If the motor did not fire, the spacecraft would have remained stuck in Earth orbit.

Johns Hopkins University's Applied Physics Laboratory built the spacecraft, with assistance from Cornell University, for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

The spacecraft was in Earth orbit since its launch last month, looping around the planet every 42 hours on an elliptical path.

## Makers of ephedra dietary supplement under scrutiny

WASHINGTON (AP) — After years of reports of deaths linked to ephedra, the Justice Department is conducting a criminal investigation into whether Metabolife International lied about the safety of the dietary supplement.

Metabolife, the nation's leading ephedra seller, is offering to turn over 13,000 consumer health complaints to the government — but Justice and the Food and Drug Administration officials may have run out of patience.

The acting FDA commissioner, Lester Crawford, called the Metabolife offer "disingenuous," and said the agency would have a special task force comb the records for evidence of risks from the herbal stimulant.

The FDA has long sought the records as part of its probe of ephedra. Three weeks ago, the FDA asked the Justice Department to pursue a criminal investigation — one Justice lawyers themselves had been urging.

"Metabolife has refused and resisted us at every step of the way," Crawford said Thursday. "News that

so many reports exist greatly heightens our concern."

Justice Department spokeswoman Barbara Comstock said a criminal investigation of the company is under way.

At issue is a 1998 statement from then-Metabolife President Michael Ellis to the FDA that his company had "never received one notice from a consumer that any serious adverse health event has occurred because of the ingestion of Metabolife 356," which contains ephedra.

But court records from private lawsuits against the San Diego-based company suggest Metabolife in fact had received reports of serious illnesses among ephedra users before Ellis made that statement, a senior Justice Department official, Eugene Thirolf, wrote the FDA last month.

Those records were kept under court seal, but "my office stands ready" to fight to get them if FDA gives the word, Thirolf wrote FDA chief counsel Dan Troy.

Hours after word of the unusual Justice overture leaked Thursday,

Metabolife sought to stem the damage with a surprise announcement that it was giving the FDA 13,000 reports from consumers about health-related issues linked to its ephedra product.

Although 80 mention serious disease or death — and a company lawyer said a total of 100 to 200 deal with people hospitalized — Metabolife insists they don't prove that ephedra is dangerous when used as directed.

Some of the reports probably were received before Ellis' 1998 statement to the FDA, Metabolife attorney Lanny Davis said. But Ellis did not lie to the FDA, he insisted.

"It is my understanding that Mr. Ellis, as many other people, regard the phrase 'serious adverse event' as requiring a show of causation between the reported event and the use of Metabolife," Davis said. "These records, some of them on the back of envelopes or call slips ... do not seem even close to meeting the definition of a serious adverse event caused by Metabolife."

Metabolife said its reports merely

were complaints called in to a consumer hot line for weight-loss advice and thus are suspect. It contended the nation needs a better system to report problems — and promised to donate up to \$500,000 to help set up such a system.

Dr. Sidney Wolfe of the consumer advocacy group Public Citizen, who is pushing the government to ban all ephedra sales, praised the FDA's response to Metabolife.

"The question is: Are they going to follow through and get these dangerous products off the market?" Wolfe said. Metabolife's about-face on providing the complaint records shows "they are squirming to get out of the dangerous mess they've caused," he said.

Ephedra, a popular herb commonly used for weight loss and body building, has long been controversial. The FDA has reports of 100 deaths among ephedra users, and a report in the New England Journal of Medicine two years ago cited about 1,000 reports of complications linked to the herb since the mid-1990s.

## Poles preparing for Pope John Paul's ninth visit to homeland

KRAKOW, Poland (AP) — Poles prepared for Pope John Paul II's ninth visit to his homeland Friday, remembering him as the vibrant man who loved to hike the mountains of this country, not the ailing pontiff beset by symptoms of Parkinson's disease.

John Paul II's four-day visit will be limited to the Krakow region because of his health. Among the stops: a mountain sanctuary he visited as a child, the Wawel Cathedral where he celebrated his first mass and the archbishop's palace where he lived for 14 years until being elected pope in 1978.

"This is a return to the years when he was in full strength, and among people with whom he had strong ties," said Jacek Krupinski, who first met the pope during a hiking trip in 1957.

Up to 4 million pilgrims were expected to greet the pope during his short visit home, including 2 1/2 million at an outdoor Mass on Sunday. Authorities have banned alcohol sales in the cities on the pope's itinerary during his visit, as they have during earlier visits to maintain order and ensure public safety.

Poles hold dear a vision of a vigorous John Paul II, who hiked and skied well into his 70s and whose papacy has been characterized by ambitious trips to visit the faithful around the globe.

Photographs of the pope announcing his visit and gracing paper papal flags selling for 25 cents show an elderly but fit pope.

The 82-year-old pontiff has

grown increasingly frail in the three years since his last visit home. He is stooped and relies on aides, canes and mechanical carts to move about. Though he continues to travel, the pope tires quickly, as was evident during last month's trip to Canada, Mexico and Guatemala.

"We see it as domination of spirit over matter," said Krupinski, 67, a retired academic who maintains contact with the pope.

"His mind is excellent, but his age and such an intense life, travels and effects of surgeries, have affected his health. But he

is doing great, if you take into account what he has gone through."

The trip to Poland sparked a new round of speculation that the pope, struggling with symptoms of Parkinson's disease, might retire and stay in his homeland, or that the trip would be his last foreign pilgrimage.

Vatican officials said the pope would return to Rome after the trip, and said a trip to Croatia was being planned for next year.

Poles likewise tried to put out of their minds the possibility that this will be his last visit, recalling similar speculation

during his trips home in 1997 and 1999.

"We just don't want to allow such a thought," said Maciek Hojda, 29, selling papal souvenirs outside of the Kalwaria church and monastery where John Paul will celebrate the final religious ceremony of his visit Monday.

On the eve of his trip to Poland, John Paul asked for prayers to support him during his pilgrimage.

"I would like today to entrust to you in a special way my pastoral voyage in Poland that I will undertake tomorrow, if it pleases God," the pope said

## Millions battle for survival amid monsoon floods in India

LAHORIGHAT, India (AP) — Monsoon rains have sent India's Brahmaputra River surging from its channel, swallowing up villages, drowning hundreds of people and leaving millions homeless.

In Assam state, Arun Kalita's home village of Sootea was swept away. He now lives with his wife and four children under a tarpaulin roof, depending on government handouts to stave off hunger.

Kalita is one of the lucky ones — he and his family survived. But he's haunted by the memory of the home he lost.

"We just kept watching from a distance and could do nothing," said Kalita, 57, his voice choked with emotion. "My home now lies on the river bed."

Annual monsoon flooding has wreaked havoc across

South Asia, killing more than 900 people in India, Bangladesh and Nepal since June and displacing or trapping about 25 million more.

In Bangladesh, the Flood Forecasting and Warning Center said Friday that heavy rains in parts of the Himalayas could cause the third flooding in the low-lying river delta nation since the monsoons began.

Some of the most isolated victims are here in Assam, along the rugged foothills of the Himalayas. At least 39 people have died and nearly a quarter of the state's 26 million residents are now homeless.

After two weeks of destruction, the rains have slowed and the floodwaters have started

receding in much of Assam. But the monsoon-driven weather is unpredictable, and officials worry that intense rains could begin again, raising the water level and bringing more flooding.

This is the way it often goes with the monsoons. Intense rains are drenching some parts of South Asia while other regions are slowly drying out and still others — including 12 states in India — are facing one of the worst droughts in years.

In all, monsoon floods have killed at least 323 people in India, according to official estimates.

Another 157 people have died in neighboring Bangladesh. Water levels in the Ganges, Brahmaputra and

Jamuna rivers, which had receded last week, began rising again Wednesday following fresh downpours in the country's north, officials there said.

But the highest death toll has been in the Himalayan kingdom of Nepal, where at least 424 people have either been swept away by swirling floodwaters or crushed under mudslides in remote mountain villages. Rains were subsiding there on Friday.

Relief officials throughout South Asia are now trying to prevent waterborne diseases such as diarrhea and typhoid, which are deadly in impoverished regions.

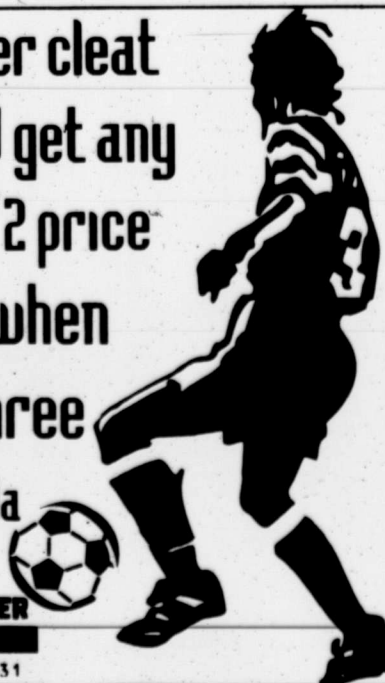
