

On Feb. 27, TDH unanimously voted to change the regulations regarding rabies vaccination of dogs and cats. Previously dogs and cats were required to receive annual rabies vaccinations. The new regulations, which went into effect March 19, stipulate that the vaccination interval will vary between. one or three years depending on the need of each individual pet.

The Texas law still requires that dogs and cats statewide receive an initial

rabies vaccine by the time the animal is four months old, and that a booster shot should be given a year later.

However, local ordinances "Both were skunks, and take precedence over the requirement, officials say.

Cities and counties in Texas may have vaccination requirements that require annual vaccinations even though the TDH passed the three-year requirement.

Bill Hildebrandt of the City of Pampa said the Pampa City Commission is expected to review the need to keep the current onc-year requirement in place at their next meeting. Animal He said there has been Control officers met with some confusion about the them several weeks ago requesting that the commission keep the one-year requirement locally because of the high number of rabies cases in Pampa in recent

One rabid bobcat was reported in Gray County in 2000; 17 rabid skunks in 2001; 11 rabid skunks in 2002: two skunks were reported in March of 2003, said Dr. Alexander.

He said eight rabies cases have been reported in the Texas Panhandle this year. Nearby Donley County has had two cases and Carson County has reported three. Hale County has reported one

"The big problem is getting more animals vaccinated," said Alexander. "People aren't bringing them in to get the vaccine and we need about 60 percent of the animals vaccinated."

He said a variety of animals have been diagnosed with rabies across the state, and reported the numbers as follows: cats, seven; cows, six; dogs, 12, goats, four; and horses, five.

"I do encourage all horse owners to get vaccinations for their animals which are used a lot by children because of the saliva coming into contact with the child while bridling the horse," he said. "Also any horses that are valuable and all 4-H animals need to be vaccinated. If the animal is more valuable than the cost of rabies vaccine, I'd vaccinate it."

Alexander said anyone bitten by an animal should contact Animal Control immediately.


Burns of the Animal Control office urges all pet owners to take advantage of the rabies drive this weekend and get their animals vaccinated for the fatal disease. Other vaccinations are also being offered.

"Rabies is already here," she said. "Pets need to be vaccinated to protect them and the people around them."

"The people in the city want to get rid of this problem. We have people in the city coming up to tell us who the bad actors are," Hahn said. "In every instance, our soldiers have shown discipline and restraint."

In the future, he said, tear gas and other riot control measure might be used to quash violent demonstrations.



This time, let's not be stupid

THE RESIDENCE WE WAS TO SHOUT - SHOULD BE SHOUTH THE SAME WHITE

Hillary Clinton's assault on President Bush's economic policies is a dead giveaway to the fact that she's going after the Democrat presidential nomination next year - not in 2008 as all the so-called experts have been predicting.

It's obvious that she looked at the carnival of fools now in the running, and recognized just what fools they are. And she's right - they are a bunch of fools and none of them have any chance of beating George W. Bush next year.

Then she had a second thought: that she and her husband still control the Democrat party, and if they control the Democrat party, they therefore control the purse strings. They can tie up campaign money and starve the others out of the running.

Americans should take a close look at the numbers. Over the next 10 years the government will take in \$27.9 trillion in tax revenue. President Bush wants Americans to have a \$726 billion tax cut, which would mean that the government that would be still getting \$27.2 trillion.

What these serial spendthrifts are saying is that they can't survive on \$27.2 trillion over the next ten years.

I just hope this time the American people aren't so stupid.

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
Congress should get out of miracle biz

Imagine that you and I are in a rowboat. I commit the stupid act of shooting a hole in my end of the boat. Would it be intelligent for you to respond by shooting a hole in your end of the boat?

Or, imagine I were a politician and told you that the Russian, Chinese, Korean, Brazilian and German governments were ripping off their citizens by, on the one hand, taxing them to provide subsidies to their domestic steel industries and, on the other, erecting tariff barriers forcing them to pay higher prices for products made with or containing steel. Would you deem it responsible or intelligent of me to propose retaliatory tariff policy, whereby Americans are ripped off until Russia, China, Korea, Brazilian and German governments stop ripping off their citizens?

Both of these scenarios are applicable to the Bush administration's 30 percent steel tariffs imposed last year. Those tariffs caused the domestic price for some steel products, such as hot-rolled steel, to rise by as much as 40 percent. The clear beneficiaries of the Bush steel tariffs were steel industry executives, stockholders and the approximately 1,700 steelworker jobs that were saved.

Tariff policy beneficiaries are always visible, but its victims are mostly invisible. Politicians love this. The reason is simple: The beneficiaries know for whom to cast their ballots, and the victims don't know whom to blame for



their calamity.

According to a study by the Institute for International Economics, saving those 1,700 jobs in the steel industry cost American consumers \$800,000 in the form of higher prices for each steelworker job saved. That's just the monetary side of the picture. According to a study commissioned by the Consuming Industries Trade Action Association, higher steel prices have caused at least 4,500 job losses in no fewer than 16 states -- over 19,000 jobs in California, 16,000 in Texas, and 10,000 in Ohio, Michigan and Illinois. In other words, industries that use steel are forced to pay higher prices, the products they produce become less competitive and they must lay off workers.

The average hourly wage of steelworkers ranges between \$15 and \$20 plus fringe benefits, so we might be talking about an annual wage package averaging \$50,000 to \$55,000. Here's my question to you: How much sense does it make for American consumers to have to pay \$800,000 in higher prices to save a \$50,000- to \$55,000-a-year job?

It'd make better economic sense for

Congress to pass an Aid to Dependent Steelworkers Act, whereby we'd tax ourselves so as to give each of those 1,700° steelworkers, whose jobs were saved, \$100,000 year so they might take off and live in a nice beachfront condo in Florida or Bermuda. While less costly to Americans than President Bush's steel tariffs, it has no political future. The handout would make the protectionist policies apparent and hence repulsive to most Americans.

Article I, Section 8 of the U.S. Constitution says Congress has the authority "To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several states, and with the Indian tribes." It wasn't the Framers' intent to give one group of Americans, such as those in the steel industry, the power to use Congress to tax other Americans.

When Congress creates a special advantage for some Americans, it must of necessity come at the expense of other Americans. Those Americans who're harmed, such as steel-using industries, descend on Congress, asking tor some kind of relief for themselves. It all reminds me of a passage from Marcus Connelly Cook's play "Green Pastures," wherein God laments to the Angel Gabriel, "Every time Ah passes a miracle, Ah has to pass fo' or five mo' to ketch up wid it."

I think Congress ought to get out of the miracle business.

Congress | JSL donation focusing on special education

WASHINGTON (AP) Now that the House has tackled special education overhaul, Senate leaders say their legislation will have similar priorities.

The House on Wednesday reauthorized the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the latest update to a 1975 law that serves children with physical or emotional disorders. Key elements of the plan include earlier intervention for students with learning trouble, better identification of disabled students and reduced paperwork demands on teachers.

House Democrats balked over student-discipline provisions and a plan' that outlines - but doesn't guarantee - years of significant increases in federal spending on special education. The House bill was approved 251-171, with support from 34 Democrats.

The Senate approach: unveil a bipartisan bill by Memorial Day and leave the sticky issues for debate. The Senate has 51 Republicans, 48 Democrats and one independent.

"We're talking about setting a tone and a tenor that's hopefully going to engender some significant, serious negotiations down the line," said Jim Manley, spokesman for Sen. Edward Kennedy, the ranking Democrat on the Senate education committee.

Two issues that split the House and ultimately went nowhere mandatory funding increases and vouchers for private schools will probably pop up in Senate debate, too.

Wife of ex-Enron official, six others, surrender to feds

of Enron Corp.'s former chief financial officer Andrew Fastow and six former executives of the fallen company's defunct broadband unit surrendered to federal authorities early Thursday.

Published reports said indictments were expected to be unsealed Thursday naming Lea Fastow, a former Enron assistant treasurer, and others in a fraud

Lea Fastow, 41, walked into office in Houston shortly after daybreak accompanied by an attorney. Her husband had dropped her off at the office, hugged her and then drove away.

At the same time, the six men were surrendering at an FBI office in Houston. They included the former co-chief executive officers of Enron Broadband Services, Ken Rice and Joe Hirko; Kevin Hannon, EBS chief operating officer; Dan Boyle, vice president; Ben Glisan, treasurer; and F. Scott Yeager, another executive.

She and her husband, who is charged with 78 counts of fraud, conspiracy, money laundering and obstruction of justice, worked at a Chicago bank before joining Enron in 1990. She was assistant treasurer when she left the company in 1997.

Names of the Fastows and their family foundation are on several bank accounts frozen by federal prosecutors before he was indicted Oct. 31.



Johnson guarantees win against Spurs

PHOENIX (AP) — Phoenix coach Frank Johnson figures if Tim Duncan, a fellow Wake Forest alumnus, can guarantee victory, he can, too.

"Game 6 is ours," Johnson said. "We'll see which Wake Forest guy is smarter."

After the Suns beat San Antonio in Game 4 to tie the series 2-2, Duncan calmly said the Spurs would win Game 5 at home, then return to Phoenix and finish the series in Game 6.

The Spurs, the No. 1 seed in the West after an NBA-best 60-win regular season, lead the best-of-seven series 3-2 after winning at home 94-82 on Tuesday night.

San Antonio can validate Duncan's proclamation and eliminate the pesky Suns with a victory Thursday night at America West Arena.

Fulfilling Johnson's guarantee will be more difficult because of the nerve injury to Stephon Marbury's right shoulder.

Marbury's fingers were still numb from the injury after Wednesday's practice, but he vowed to give it his best shot as the Suns try to force a deciding Game 7.

"I wouldn't miss this game for the world," he said. "This is definitely the biggest game of my career.".

Marbury, who scored a series-low 13 points on 5-for-18 shooting in Game 5, tried to shrug off the injury but acknowledged it has bothered

"If his arm isn't right, then guys on the team are going to be saying 'We'll take it and pick up the slack," Hardaway said. "I'm going to be ready."

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



WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. productivity improved in the first three months of 2003, increasing at an annual rate of 1.6 percent as companies produced more while they kept work forces lean.

The gain in productivity posted in the January to March quarter was more than twice the size of the 0.7 percent growth rate registered in the previous quarter, the Labor Department reported Thursday.

The number of workers continuing to draw jobless benefits soared by 110,000 to 3.68 million for the work week ending April 19, the most recent period for which the information is available. That marked the highest level in nearly a year and suggested that not much hiring is taking place.

Federal Reserve policy-makers meet next Tuesday to discuss interest rate policy. Economists believe the Fed will hold the federal funds rate at 1.25 percent, a 41-year low. This short-term interest rate is the Fed's main tool to influence economic activity.

WASHINGTON (AP) -House tax writers plan to retool the centerpiece of the president's tax cut - the elimination of taxes on corporate dividends — to give the benefits to a wider range of investors.

House Ways and Means Committee Chairman Bill R-Calif., Thomas, Republicans on his panel he plans to treat dividend income like capital gains. He would then reduce the 20 percent capital gains tax rate to 15 percent. Lower-income taxpayers who currently pay a 10 percent tax on capital gains would pay only 5 percent.
