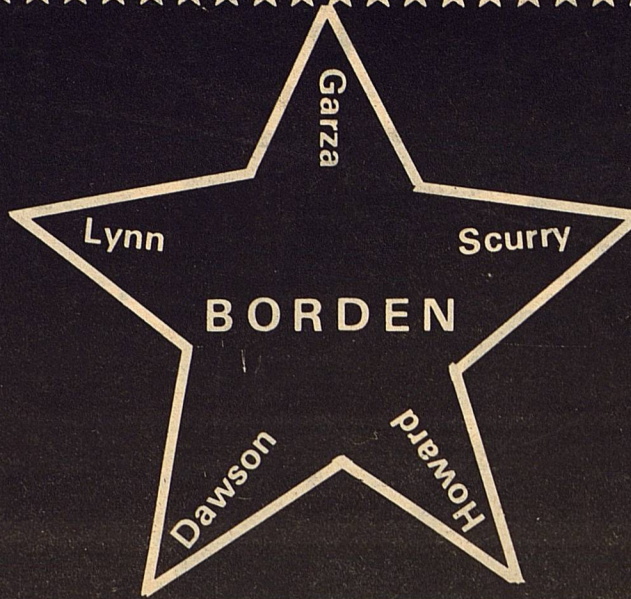

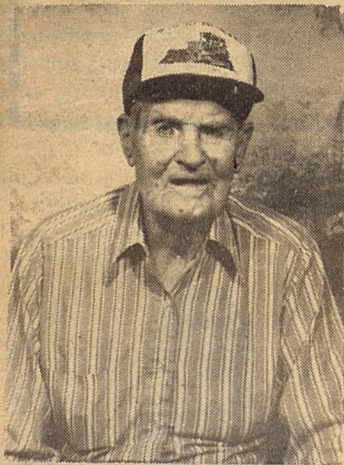

Preston Sharp, 94 of Gail passed away in Cogdell Memorial Hospital at Snyder, April 27, 1984 at age. Mr. Sharp was born in Bell County, Texas October 30, 1889. Mr. Sharp was exactly 94 years, 5 months and 28 days old. Services were held

Preston was married to Miss Ella M. Gill August 5, 1911. She preceeded him in death August 18, 1971.

Preston was a long-time farmer in Bell and Williamson Counties before moving to Borden County in 1943. He retired, after working several years for Roland Hambilton, at the age of 87. He was a resident of Borden County 41 years.

Preston is survived by a son, Sidney C. (Buddy) Sharp of Gail and a daughter, Mrs. Berniece M. Henderson of GGreen Forrest, Arkansas, eleven grandchildren, 27 great-grandchildren, 13 great-great grandchildren and a host of relatives and friends.

Republicans will not Have Precinct Conventio

The Borden County Republicans will not hold preceinct conventions this year, announced Republican County Chairman, Rich Anderson.

This will negote their having a delegate to the state convention, Anderson added.

Under the GOP formula, each of the states 27 congressional districts are awarded three delegates to the National Conventio n to be held in Dallas. Twenty

delegates at-lkarge will be selected by an 11 member panel appointed by President Reagan's state campaign leaders. Texas will send 109 delegates to the National Convention.

Anderson urges everyone to go to the polls Saturday May 5. With three Republicans and nine Democrats viewing for the Senate seat being vacated by John Tower, the voter turnout should be heavy in the state. he said.

Tammy Miller, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miller traveled to Austin, Friday, April 27, to participate in the Shorthand U.I.L. State Meet. She was accompanied by Mr. and Mrs. Miller and instructor, Mrs. Netta Jarrett.

Tammy received the first place honor after taking dictation at 100 words per minute for five minutes and transcribing the material in 13.59 minutes with a perfect paper of 100

percent accuracy. She was the first student to turn in the typed shorthand material out of sixty students from all Classes, 5-A down through 1-A schools.

Attend Precinct Convention Chairman Warns

When Texas Democrats begin the process May 5 of picking their 200 delegates to the national convention, it won't be as simple as going to the polls and voting for Gary Hart, Jesse Jackson or Walter Mondale.

Unlike most states that hold presidential primaries, Texas will conduct a three-stage caucus system.

The system begins after the close of the polls next Saturday, advances two weeks later to a county or senatorial caucus and ends with the Democratic state convention June 15-16 in Houston.

For a chance to become a delegate to the national convention in July, registered voters in Texas must cast a baallot in the primary and return to their polling center at 7:15 p.m. for the precinct convention.

After signing in as supporters of a candidate or as uncommitted delegates, those attending the precinct convention elect temporary officers and determine the number of delegates each contender receives.

Supporters of the various candidates then meet separately to chose delegates to the May 19 senatorial district conventions.

A presidential aspirant needs the backing of at least 15 percent of the voters attending the precinct convention to wein delegates to the second stage in the senatorial district conventions.

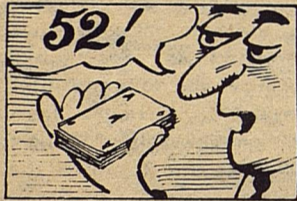
Pre-School Day

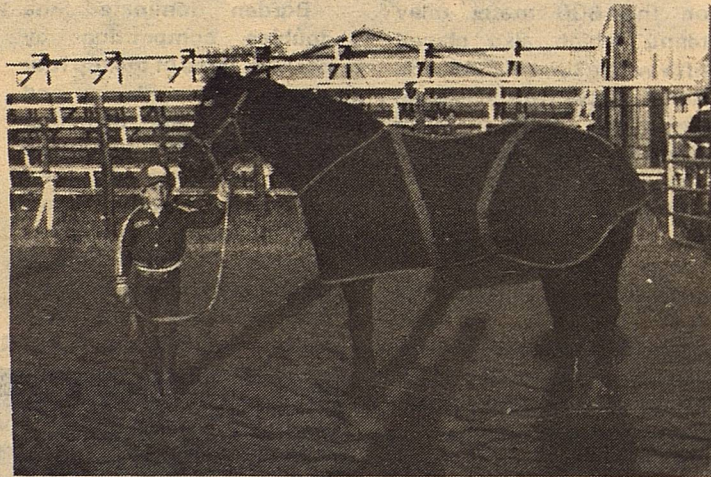
LOCAL FOLKS

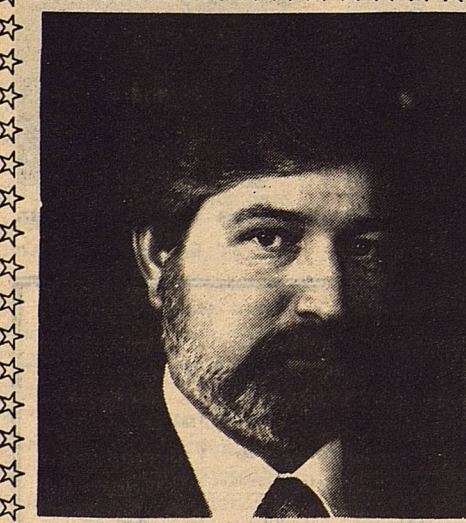

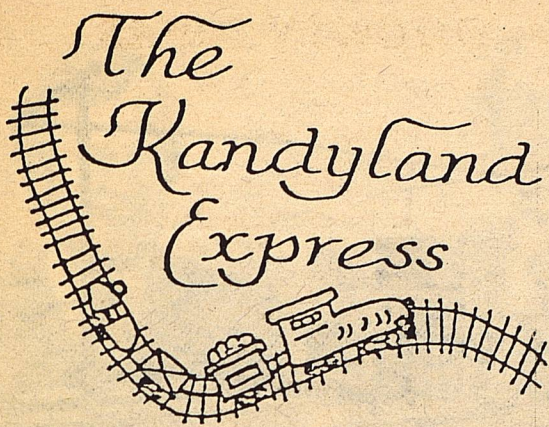

WHEAT PROGRAM CHANGES

Changes in the 1984 wheat program are as follows:

1. You can now enroll in either the ARP, PIK program, or both, if you haven't done so. You can also withdraw from the ARP, PIK program, or both. You will be receiving more information concerning this program in the near future, so watch for letters. All persons on the farm will receive this notification if you have a share in the crop.
2. Sign-up is from April 16, 1984-May 4, 1984. If you enrolled previously, and don't want to change anything, just certify acreage by May 4th.
3. Target price was reduced from \$4.45 to \$4.38 per bushel.
4. A paid diversion is authorized on 10 percent of the farms' base at \$2.70 per bushel times the farms' established yield. Advance payment may be requested.
5. The PIK payment rate has been increased from 75 percent to 85 percent of the farms' established yield. The harvest for PIK requirement has not been changed.
6. Haying and grazing is permitted on set-aside wheat used for any crop. This DOES NOT APPLY to oats or any other small grain. Wheat disposal deadline is May 4th. If not substantially grazed out or hayed by then, request an extension-cost \$20.00 per farm. Grain in the soft dough stage is counted as grain.
7. New enrollee into the wheat program will have until May 18, 1984, to return all program contracts with landlord signatures.

FINAL REPORTING DATE

Acreage reports for small grains must be filed by May 4, 1984. For history credit you must report acres, including zero, even if not enrolled in the program, to preserve your base history. Also, any small grains used as cover on ACR for any crop must be reported by

May 4, 1984. REMEMBER- May 4-ALL SMALL GRAIN-EVEN IF IT IS JUST FOR GRAZING, AND "O" PLANTED ALSO.

DISASTER AFFECTED CROPS

You must notify the County Office before you graze out or destroy any small grains that were intended for harvest-PRESERVE YOUR HISTORY ON THE FARM.

FEDERAL CROP

The sales closing date for filing an application with a certified agent to purchase FCIC insurance for grain sorghum is April 15, 1984, and cotton is April 30, 1984. If you are interested in the insurance you must come by as soon as possible

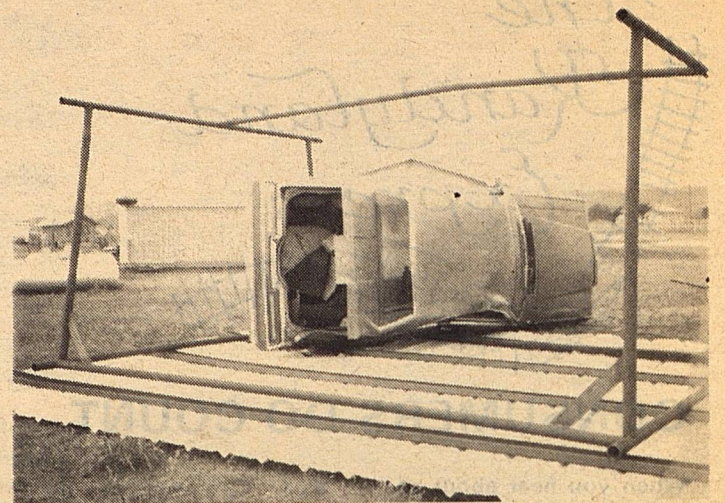
and file a request for us to compute your farms' actual yield.

EMERGENCY FEED

An additional feeding period for purchasing CCC damaged corn is in effect until May 15, 1984, and applications will be accepted during this time. If you do not reapply, you must not have more than a 10-day supply on hand as of April 15, 1984. Also, if your corn is being held by a feed dealer, the 10-day exemption does not apply.

FINAL DATE FOR FEED GRAIN AND COTTON LOANS



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

HANCE PICKS UP NEW ENDORSEMENT

Austin.--Democratic Senate candidate Kent Hance has picked up the endorsement of 17th District Congressman Charles Stenholm for the May 5th primary.

The third term Congressman called Hance the most qualified candidate in the race. He added, "He has proven himself to be the most effective candidate running for the U.S. Senate."

The Stamford Democrat also praised Hance for his conservative philosophy and his Texas thinking. "I think Kent put it best when he said he thinks like a Texas, talks like a Texan and will vote like a Texan in the Senate," Congressman Stenholm said.

Congressman Stenholm's district covers thirty-three counties in western Texas, including the cities of Big Spring, and Abilene. He

serves on the Agriculture and Small Business Committees.

We don't have enough tax dollars to go around now and amnesty will make matters worse," he said.

Hance criticized Doggett and Krueger for their insensitivity to the problems of less fortunate people in America. "We must take care of our own needy people first," Hance said.

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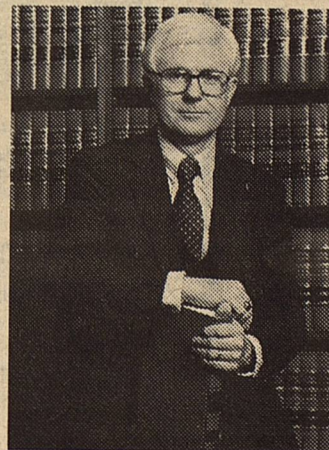

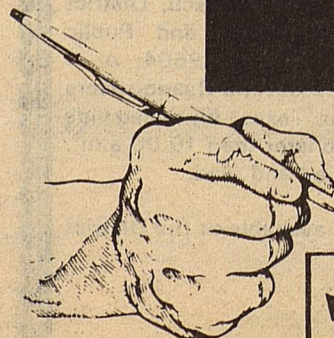
