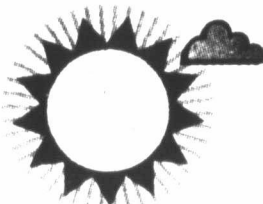

## Camp M.K. Brown - better than ever

CAMP M.K. BROWN — Eighteen months of renovation and construction was celebrated Saturday with the re-dedication of Camp M.K. Brown in Wheeler County.

First dedicated to the honor M.K. Brown in 1969, area Boy Scouts and Boy Scout officials gathered here shortly before noon Saturday to re-dedicate this Boy Scout camp following a \$550,000 renovation project.

Paul Harpole, council vice president of properties for the scouts, commended Laurie

McWeeny, trustee of the Sybil B. Harrington Living Trust which donated the money for the renovation; David Gantz, who coordinated the renovation, and John Curry, who chaired the renovation committee.

The Harrington donation allowed the Boy Scout Golden Spread Council to renovate the dining hall, the Lew Benz building, add a new shower facility, renovate the camp ranger's quarters, build a new garage for camp equipment, buy a new tractor, expand the handicraft center and replace picnic tables and other facilities.

## U.S. orders Indonesian embassy evacuation

BALI, Indonesia (AP) — Indonesia's defense minister blamed al-Qaida and its extremist allies on Monday for the massive bomb attack that killed more than 180 people at a nightclub on the resort island of Bali.

"We are sure al-Qaida is here," Matori Abdul Djilil said after a Cabinet meeting in Jakarta. "The Bali

bomb blast is linked to al-Qaida with the cooperation of local terrorists."

The leader of Jemaah Islamiyah, a group linked to Osama bin Laden's terror network, denied involvement and implicated the United States.

The defense minister's statement was the first time that a top government official had implicated al-Qaida

in Saturday's attack, the worst of its kind worldwide since the Sept. 11 attacks in America. Until now, police investigators have said they had few clues and no suspects in the blasts that tore through the Kuta Beach nightclub district.

FBI and Australian detectives joined the hunt for the killers while

forensic experts painstakingly tried to identify bodies. Indonesian government officials said 181 people had died, though hospital workers put the figure at 190.

Many of the victims were tourists from Australia, where hundreds of burned, bandaged and bruised sur-

## Test: bison died 5,700 years ago

STINNETT — It's official. The buffalo found when contractors were unearthing ground for a new swimming pool in Stinnett in July is ancient.

The bison died 5,700 years ago in what is now the Stinnett City Park.

Deborah Summers, a Stinnett anthropologist, received notification by phone last week from the Florida agency who determines the age of the archaeological finds by carbon dating. She received a written report confirming the phone conversation Friday.

"This is a very significant find for that era because it was during the early archaic sub-stage in the Texas High Plains and bordering regions," she said. "It coincided essentially with the Althormal Long Drought."

In his book written in 1989, Prehistoric Cultural Developments on the Texas High Plains, the late Jack Hughes, a longtime Panhandle archaeologist, said it is extremely rare to find any evidence of life from that time period as there was an extremely long drought.

The bison is also estimated to have weighed approximately 3,000 to 4,000 pounds.

City officials notified Summers immediately following the discovery by a backhoe operator on July 24 seeking her assistance of the correct procedure to follow.

Summers notified Jeff Indeck, curator of archaeology at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum in Canyon. Indeck immediately left Canyon to drive to Stinnett. He told *The Pampa News* in July that he estimated the bones to be between 2,000 and 6,000 years old.

The initial find was made by Paul Lane, construction superintendent, who was operating the back hoe at the time.

Lane had dug down about 13 feet in the area for the deep end of the swimming pool that summer day when he found the bones.

Summers was ecstatic last summer that Lane immediately stopped upon seeing the bones.

"The fact that he stopped and the fact that the city is letting us excavate this site," Summers said at the time, "is wonderful."

During the wait for Indeck to arrive in Stinnett that hot summer day, Matt Karins, 16, a summer employee at the City of Stinnett found an arrowhead (spear point) which was about 2 1/2 inches long in the dirt which was removed around the bison skeleton.

During the next week City Administrator James Stroud estimated approximately 3,000 people visited the site in the Stinnett City Park. City officials were overwhelmed at the number of out-of-town and out-of-state visitors to the site.

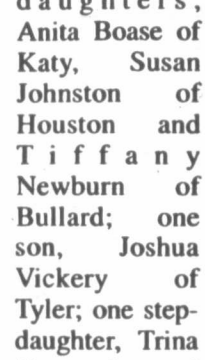

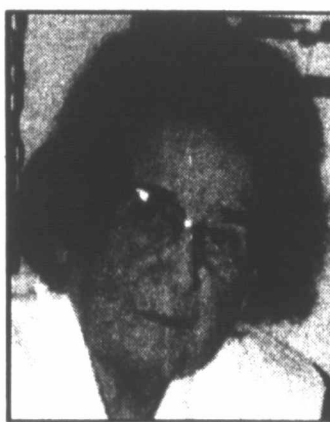

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# Tips pour in; lull between shootings longest since sniping began

BALTIMORE (AP) — Sniper investigators said Monday they have been deluged with tips, including false alarms caused by fear and anxiety, as residents of the Washington remain on edge despite the longest lull in the series of shootings that began nearly two weeks ago.

Cars backfiring, windows shattering and firecrackers popping are among the noises residents have confused with gunshots, believing they are possibly related to the string of random shootings that hit 10 people, killing eight, since Oct. 2.

"We also admit that everyone is edgy. People are hearing things," said Montgomery County police Chief Charles Moose, who is heading the multiagency investigation. "Things are occurring that may normally be overlooked or that may be routine, are certainly getting a higher response from people in their anxiety."

Earlier Monday, for example, four squad cars were sent to a Silver

Spring car dealership when the window of a customer's BMW shattered when he slammed the door.

For the second weekend in row, the sniper took a break. The sniper's last confirmed shooting death was Friday morning in Spotsylvania County, Va., where a 53-year-old Philadelphia man was gunned down as he filled his gas tank.

The break extended into Monday morning, unlike a week earlier, when a boy was wounded outside a school. The 13-year-old boy remains in critical but stable condition, hospital officials said Monday morning.

Moose, who didn't give a specific number of tips his investigators have received, said people can now write as well as call with their tips. He gave an address — P.O. Box 7875, Gaithersburg, Md., 20898-7875.

He added that a second composite image — of a Chevrolet Astro van with a ladder on top seen leaving the scene of Friday's shooting — was not yet ready. During the weekend, he issued a composite image of a white, box-type truck, based on witness descriptions from more than one

shooting location.

Investigators hunting the increasingly brazen killer have logged some inconsistencies: the killer favors suburban gas stations; fires a single round; aside from weekends, has not let two days pass without opening fire again, and, judging from a tarot card left at one of the shootings, appears to enjoy taunting police.

Authorities have refused to release investigative details, saying they don't want the killer to know what they know.

"We don't want to release anything that may cause ... anyone to think they're a suspect," said Mike Bouchard, an agent of the federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

Moose had cut back on his news briefings while saying he wished there was more he could reveal.

"I wish we could give you a name, a mug shot and an address but we're not at that point," he said in one of four appearances he made Sunday on national TV talk shows.

The last killing was Friday morning, when a 53-year-old father of six

was shot while fueling his sedan in a gas station just south of Fredericksburg, Va. At the time, a state trooper stood just 50 yards away, investigating a traffic accident.

Authorities described the serial sniper as not just a local threat, but an attempt to terrorize already anxious Americans.

"This reminds us that people in our past have tried to intimidate and put fear into Americans," Moose said. "This is a strong nation ... and we will not be intimidated."

In Landover, Md., police on horseback and bicycles ringed parking areas before Sunday's Washington Redskins football game against the New Orleans Saints. Fans grilling burgers at tailgate parties said they appreciated being encircled by patrol cars and rifle-toting officers.

"I don't think anybody in their right mind would try something out here," said Bill Freitag of Virginia Beach, Va., a die-hard Redskins fan. "But he's not in his right mind to begin with."

The victims, in Maryland,

Virginia and Washington, D.C., were shot as they carried out daily errands. Four were killed at service stations.

Moose and federal officers refused to comment on published reports that the FBI asked the Pentagon to search records for recently discharged soldiers who had undergone sniper training.

Investigators also would not discuss a yellow piece of paper found at Friday's killing site, which reportedly contained scribbled directions from northern Maryland to the Capital Beltway.

A white truck matching composite images compiled by the FBI was still being sought. And as Sunday wore on without another shooting, a reporter asked Moose if he dreaded Monday morning.

"We won't make any assumptions about any kind of pattern," Moose said. "I never approach Monday morning with a sense of dread."

vivors arrived in Sydney on Monday to tearful reunions with family and friends. Other victims were from Britain, the Netherlands, France, Germany, Ecuador and Indonesia.

Two Americans were killed, the U.S. State Department said, and three others were among more than 300 people injured. Dozens of foreigners remained unaccounted for.

Among the missing was Jake Young, a former University of Nebraska football player who had been working as an attorney in Hong Kong for a London-based firm. The 34-year-old was traveling in Bali with his rugby team, and had not contacted his family since the blast.

"We're clinging to a thin ray of hope that he's going to be found alive," his father, Jacob Young, said Sunday night from Midland, Texas.

The U.S. Embassy in

Jakarta, often the target of bomb threats, ordered all nonessential staff and dependents to leave Indonesia, the world's most populous Muslim country. However, American businesses in Indonesia declined to follow suit, saying they did not feel the situation warranted drastic moves.

A bomb threat shut down the embassy's club for a second day. The Australian school in Jakarta closed as a precaution.

In Washington, President Bush condemned the attack as "a cowardly act designed to create terror and chaos" and offered U.S. help in finding the perpetrators.

Fearing that terrorists could strike again, thousands of stunned tourists thronged Bali's airport, desperately looking for flights. Many vacationers camped overnight on beaches, shunning built-up areas in case of more attacks.

"We just want to go back to our families," said Carima Sebba, 26, from the

Netherlands. "I'm scared, I won't be back for a long time."

As stocks tumbled in Jakarta by more than 9 percent Monday and the Indonesian rupiah also took a dive against the U.S. dollar, many worried about a long-term decline in tourism, one of Indonesia's top industries.

More than 5 million foreigners visited Indonesia in 2001 — about 1.5 million to Bali alone. All told, they inject about \$5 billion into the economy each year.

No one claimed responsibility for the bombing — the worst terrorist attack in Indonesia's history. But suspicion immediately turned to al-Qaida and an affiliated group, Jemaah Islamiyah, which is said to want a pan-Islamic state across Malaysia, Indonesia and the southern Philippines.

Jemaah Islamiyah has already been implicated in a plot at the beginning of this year to bomb foreign embassies in the region, and

Australia says it is a prime suspect in the Bali attack.

"The attack bears the hallmarks of JI," said an expert on al-Qaida, Rohan Gunaratna. "Only the JI has both the intention and capability to conduct a professional terrorist attack like the Bali operation."

U.S. Ambassador Ralph Boyce told The Associated Press that while the Bali bombings couldn't yet be pinned on al-Qaida, there is evidence that it is operating in Indonesia and reaching out to local extremists.

Abu Bakar Bashir, a Muslim cleric accused of leading Jemaah Islamiyah, denied involvement and blamed the blast on the United States.

"I suspect that the bombing was engineered by the United States and its allies to justify allegations that Indonesia is a base for terrorists," he told the AP in telephone interview from Solo, a city in central Java, where he runs an Islamic boarding school.

Indonesian police refused to say whether Bashir would

be questioned despite repeated calls by neighboring countries that he be arrested.

President Megawati Sukarnoputri, who wept as she toured the wreckage Sunday, promised to cooperate with other nations in the investigation.

Security Minister Bambang Susilo Yudoyono said there were signs that terrorists were planning attacks against key industrial sites, including Exxon Mobil's Arun liquefied natural gas plant in Aceh and the Caltex refinery in Sumatra.

"We will increase the security alert in those areas," Yudoyono said after a Cabinet meeting.

On Bali, there was no visible evidence of a higher security presence or stricter controls at the airport, though police officials insisted that an elite unit had been deployed. Police said they had no suspects.

Balinese officials said that only 39 positive identifications had been made, listing 15 Australians, eight Britons, five Singaporeans, six Indonesians, one German, one

French citizen, one Dutch citizen, one New Zealander and one Ecuadorean.

In London, the government said at least 30 Britons had died.

Seven U.N. staffers from nearby East Timor, vacationing in Bali, were injured and two were unaccounted for, U.N. officials said.

The destruction started when a small bomb exploded outside Paddy's Discotheque in a maze of clubs and bars on Kuta Beach. Shortly afterward, a huge blast from a bomb in a Toyota minivan devastated the Sari Club, a crowded surfer hangout nearby.

The second blast ripped into the open-air bar, triggering a massive burst of flames that officials said was fueled by gas cylinders used for cooking. The explosions and fire devastated much of the block.

Australian Prime Minister John Howard said Monday he was dispatching his foreign and justice ministers to Indonesia to discuss cooperation in the hunt for the bombers.

## Health Department changes HIV federal funding process

HOUSTON (AP) — The Texas Department of Health has changed the competitive process for federal funding for HIV prevention programs this year to help ensure that the most effective programs get the money.

Casey Blass, HIV/STD health resources division director for the state health department, said that changes were made to reflect the changes in at-risk populations and where they are more likely to be found.

Blass said the changing landscape of people at risk for HIV infection has shifted in recent years as studies show that African-American men and women are at a disproportionately greater risk for the disease. Also, he said, at-risk populations are more concentrated in urban areas and are younger.

"In almost every area of the state, African-Americans have much higher rates of infection regardless of their risk factor, whether it's by sex, injection, drug use, whether it's heterosexual sex or male-to-male sex, their rates are higher across the board," Blass told the Houston Chronicle for its

Monday editions. He said the state is attempting to get the most for its federal dollars by funding intervention programs that service the target population and are theoretically most effective.

He said agencies, in submitting their applications for funding this year, were asked to service the highest risk populations.

Of the 57 HIV prevention programs currently receiving federal funding, 19 will go unfunded next year.

"It's a very frightening future as we look at sexually transmitted diseases and the role of public health. It's becoming no role at all," said Claudia Stravato, chief executive officer of Planned Parenthood of Amarillo and the Texas Panhandle, which lost more than \$98,446.

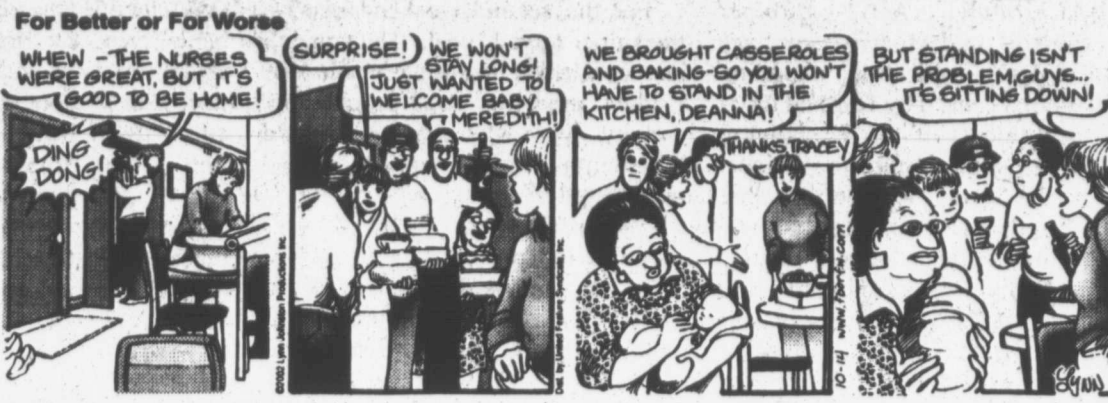

# Cowboys rally past Carolina, 14-13

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Quincy Carter didn't miss Antonio Bryant for the game-winning touchdown this time. He even hit him in a crowd.

A week after overthrowing Bryant streaking down the field wide open, Carter found the rookie receiver for a much tougher 24-yard TD with 56 seconds left Sunday to complete the Dallas Cowboys' dramatic 14-13 comeback over Carolina.

"The best thing is that everybody kept a positive attitude," Bryant said. "Everybody kept saying you didn't get it last week, but you're going to make the connection. It came down to the last second, and it felt great."

Bryant made a juggling catch after he cut between two defenders, the game-winner on fourth-and-14 coming just three minutes after a lucky 80-yard TD pass to Joey Galloway.

"I still don't know exactly what happened," said rookie defensive end Julius Peppers, whose first-quarter interception set up Carolina's only touchdown. "We went from being ahead 13-0 to losing the game. We never saw it coming."

Carter, on his birthday he shared

with Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, directed his second comeback win in three weeks.

After overshadowing a mostly poor performance two weeks ago against St. Louis with a last-minute drive that led to the game-winning field goal, Carter almost did it again against the New York Giants before overthrowing Bryant.

Against the Panthers, Carter went 9-of-22 for 77 yards over the first 55 minutes. But he was 6-of-10 for 148 yards the final two drives with the 80-yarder, the longest pass of his career.

"That's my job as the quarterback. I have to be able to handle the ups and downs," said Carter, now 6-8 as a starter. "I have to be mentally tough."

On the TD pass to Galloway, Carter scrambled out of a sack and steadied himself with his free hand. The pass was nearly intercepted by Deon Grant, but instead he deflected it — straight to Galloway.

Before that, the Cowboys (3-3) had just 174 yards and appeared on the way to their first shutout loss at home since 1991.

"This is one of the craziest wins

I've been involved in," said Emmitt Smith, whose 59 yards got him within 175 of overtaking Walter Payton as the NFL's career rushing leader.

Carolina (3-3) went three-and-out after Galloway's TD. Carter then kept the game-winning drive alive, with a 10-yard completion to Darnay Scott that converted a fourth-and-6.

While the Cowboys continued their lose-win cycle, Carolina lost its third straight game. Since a 3-0 start, the Panthers have lost their last three by a combined seven points, and all in the closing minutes.

"It's a shame that we played so hard and so well, only to come up short," said Panthers coach John Fox. "To be in such control of the game and have a couple of fluke plays happen is a shame."

Said Carolina safety Mike Minter, "They got lucky. Once they got the momentum, it was really tough to stop them."

Carolina almost answered as Chris Weinke — who finished after Rodney Peete sustained a concussion the last play of the first half — completed passes of 24 and 22 yards to reach the

Dallas 41 with 11 seconds left and no timeouts.

Muhsin Muhammad then had a 9-yard catch, but was tackled in bounds. Time ran out before Weinke could spike the ball.

Peete's 25-yard TD pass to Brad Hoover, three plays after Carter practically handed an interception to Peppers, and field goals of 50 and 44 yards by Shayne Graham gave Carolina the lead.

Notes: Graham also missed a 44-yard field goal. ... Carter has five straight 200-yard passing games, the longest streak for Dallas since Troy Aikman the first six games of 1993.

... Carolina's seven sacks were the most against Dallas since Philadelphia had 11 on Sept. 15, 1999. ... Weinke, who had thrown only one pass all season, went 7-of-12 for 114 yards. Peete was 9-of-15 for 84. ... Injuries: Carolina linebacker Dan Morgan (strained groin), safety Jarrod Cooper (sprained knee) and Peete. For Dallas, safety Roy Williams (bruised heel).

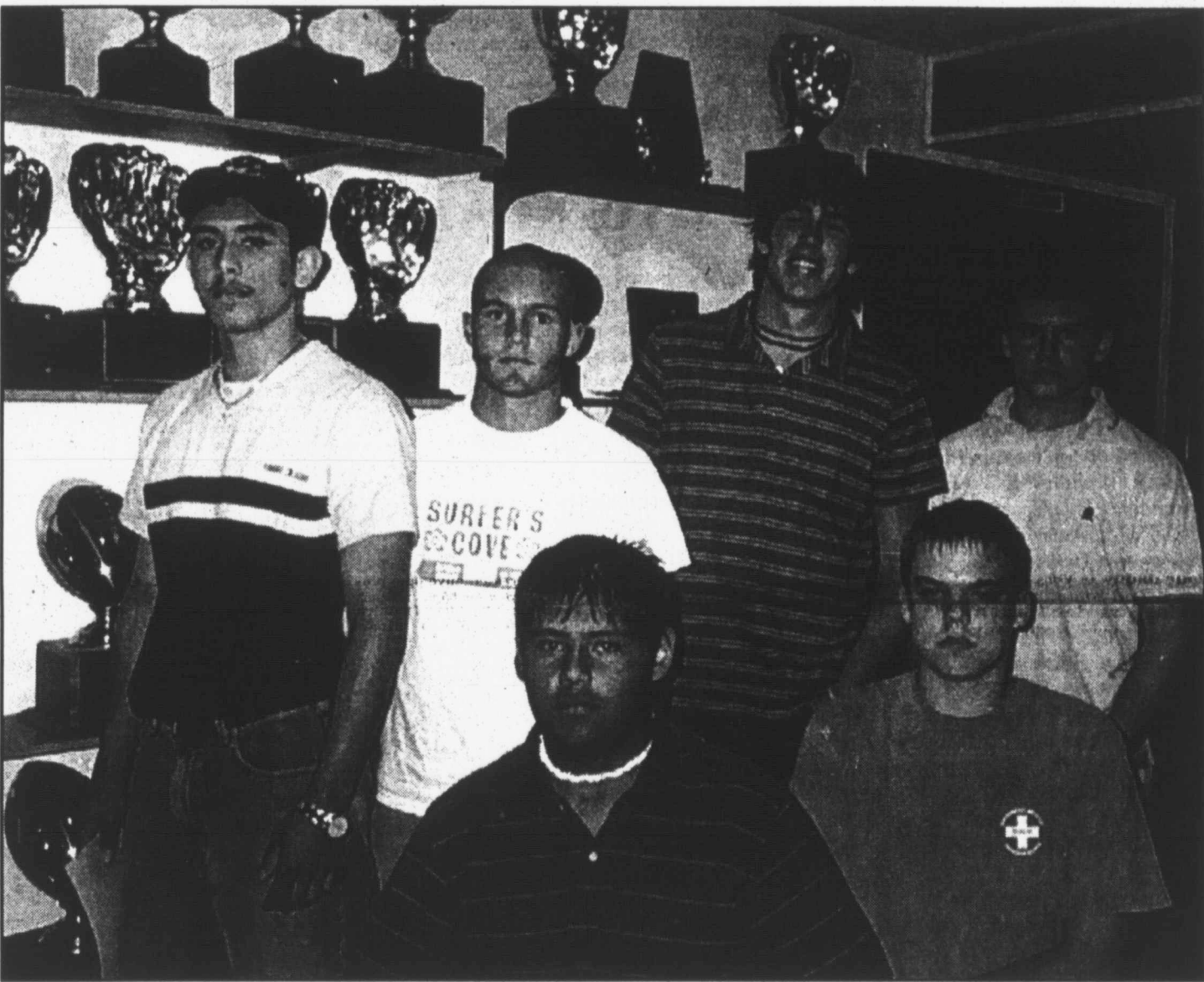

## Santiago's homer lifts Giants by Cardinals

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Barry Bonds is one win away from walking right into his first World Series.

With St. Louis manager Tony La Russa unwilling to let Bonds beat the Cardinals, it was the other San Francisco Giants who came through in the clutch.

Benito Santiago followed an unconventional intentional walk to Bonds by hitting a tiebreaking two-run homer with two outs in the eighth inning, leading San Francisco to a 4-3 victory Sunday night in Game 4 of the NL championship series.

"I was so excited they walked Barry Bonds," Santiago said. "I wanted them to pay again."

Bonds scored the tying and go-ahead runs — both after walks. That's been a common theme this year. Bonds was walked a record 198 times this season, including 68 intentionally.

"If they walk him, then they want to be beaten not by the best but by someone else," Giants shortstop Rich Aurilia said. "Tonight it was Benito."

Bonds' brilliance has made the unheard of routine — intentionally putting the tying or go-ahead run on

base. But the move only succeeds if the pitcher can get the next hitter out.

"Strategy is judged on whether it works. So it didn't work. Bad strategy," La Russa said.

Robb Nen nearly blew it in the ninth, throwing a third-strike wild pitch to the lead-off hitter and allowing a one-out RBI single by Jim Edmonds.

But with runners on first and third, Nen recovered to strike out Albert Pujols and J.D. Drew for his third save in the series.

The Giants can win their first NL pennant in 13 years with a win at home Monday night and set up baseball's first all wild-card World Series. Anaheim won the AL championship earlier Sunday.

Kirk Rueter, who won the opener for the Giants, will pitch Game 5 against Matt Morris.

Much of the drama in this series has surrounded Bonds, who is trying to put his past postseason struggles behind him and make it to baseball's biggest stage for the first time.

With two outs and nobody on in a tie game in the eighth, Bonds strolled to the plate and La Russa never hesitated, putting four fingers in the air for an intentional walk.

"Bonds is the most dangerous hitter in the game right now, and it's tough to walk in that clubhouse with giving him a chance to get the hit to beat you," La Russa said. "Santiago has been very tough, but it's a little easier to take."

With a sellout crowd of 42,676 pounding their orange ThunderStix, Santiago

worked the count full.

He then drove a pitch from Rick White into the left-field seats. Santiago pumped his fist and tossed his bat before rounding the bases. Bonds pumped his fist repeatedly on his way home.

Santiago has revived his career after a life-threatening car accident nearly ended it in 1998. He has 11 RBIs this postseason, often coming through after Bonds has been walked.

"I was looking for that type of pitch. He got me out with that pitch. I guessed right this time," Santiago said.

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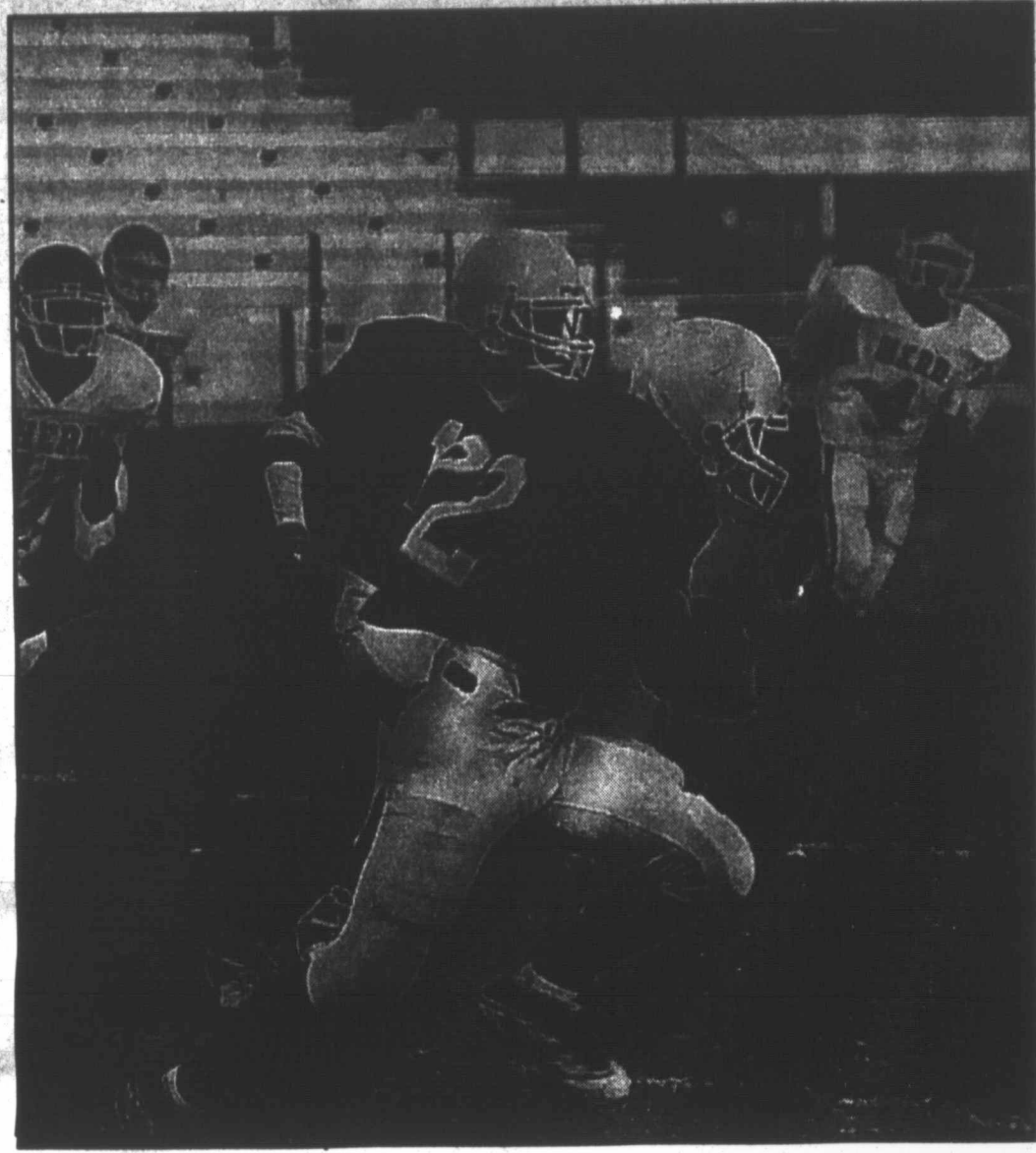

## Angels advance to World Series with 13-5 victory over Twins

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Sixteen years later, the Anaheim Angels got that last out.

So now, after 41 years of heartbreak and losing, they'll be playing in their first World Series.

Gene Autry, Hollywood's "Singing Cowboy" and the team's founding owner, won't be around to enjoy what he wanted so much.

But he's certainly on the minds of those who will, including his widow, Jackie.

"He would be very pleased about this team," an emotional Mrs. Autry said after the Angels beat the Minnesota Twins 13-5 on Sunday to win the AL championship series in five games.

"This was a goal of Gene's all of his life in baseball, and the fact that he's not here to see it personally, I know he's watching it from somewhere."

If that's true, Autry would have a difficult time believing how it came about.

Oh, the 13 runs the wild-card Angels scored were no major surprise, considering the way they manhandled the New York Yankees in the division series, hitting a postseason-record .376.

But ninth-place batter Adam Kennedy hitting three home runs?

A 10-run rally in the seventh inning? And 20-year-old Francisco Rodriguez, who hadn't pitched in a big league game before Sept. 18, earning his fourth postseason victory without a loss?

They all happened.

"I can't really explain it," said Kennedy, who has 23 homers in 1,652 at-bats over 470 regular-season games. "Opportunity came, and it was big today."

"This will go down as one of the best days of my life."

The Twins took a 5-3 lead in the seventh against Rodriguez, who relieved Brendan Donnelly with the bases loaded and one out and allowed all three baserunners to score before retiring the side.

The Angels made him a winner with their 10-run outburst in the bottom of the inning.

"Oh, man. This is tremendous," said Kennedy, the series MVP despite going 1-for-10 without an RBI in the series' first four games.

"We worked hard the last few years to bring it all together and we finally got it done."

Born as an expansion team in 1961, the Angels blew past the Yankees to win their first-round series 3-1, then beat Minnesota four straight times after a series-opening loss.

They humbled the Twins in the seventh inning of the finale, sending 15 batters to the plate against Johan Santana, J.C. Romero, LaTroy Hawkins and Bob Wells.

Kennedy got it started with his third homer — a three-run shot on an 0-2 pitch from Santana — to give the Angels a 6-5 lead.

And that was only the beginning.

"They're on a roll," Twins manager Ron Gardenhire said. "Those guys, they just keep playing. And they keep swinging. Goodness gracious, I don't know if I've ever seen an inning like that."

The Angels tied postseason records with the 10-run inning and six consecutive hits — something they also managed against the Yankees.

The "rally monkey" never even had time to make an appearance.

The Angels will play in their first World Series game Saturday when they open at home against the San Francisco Giants or St. Louis Cardinals. A picture of Autry was hanging throughout the weekend on a banner behind home plate and no doubt will be there next weekend.

Jackie Autry, who presented the AL trophy to manager Mike Scioscia in her role as honorary league president, gave up ownership of the Angels in 1996 to the Walt Disney Co. Her husband died two years later.

The Autrys watched in 1986 when the Angels were one strike from the AL pennant but blew a 5-2 ninth-inning lead against Boston in the fifth game and lost Games 6 and 7 of the ALCS.

Four years earlier, they were one win away from the series before losing three straight to Milwaukee. But now, they're winners.

"Everybody is making a big deal of the 1982 and 1986 teams. We had nothing to do with that," said Scott Spiezio, who had three hits and three RBIs.

When David Eckstein caught Tom Prince's popup for the final out, he ran over to Kennedy and tapped gloves, then danced with Tim Salmon.

The Angels mobbed each other between first base and the mound, and fans cheered as Salmon ran around with the AL championship trophy.

Troy Percival, who got the final three outs, joined his teammates for a lap around the field.

"I think there is some portion of relief with some of the guys that have been through the wars here," Scioscia said.

The Twins, who made the playoffs after surviving the attempt by baseball owners to fold them, had had won six straight postseason games when facing elimination, including two in the first round against Oakland.

Trailing 2-0, Kennedy started the comeback with a third-inning homer off Game 1 winner Joe Mays, and Spiezio's homer tied it leading off the fifth. One out later, Kennedy put the Angels ahead with a drive into the right-field bleachers.

Spiezio and Bengie Molina singled to open the seventh. Kennedy bunted the first pitch foul — perhaps the biggest break for the Angels all day — and fouled another pitch with a swing before hitting a hanging curveball from Santana over the wall in right-center.

Kennedy became only the fifth player to homer three times in a postseason game, joining Babe Ruth, who did it twice, Reggie Jackson, Bob Robertson and George Brett.

"He's been a great hitter for us all year long," said teammate Troy Glaus. "He's probably going to get some of the respect now that he deserves."

### Miami still No. 1

MIAMI (AP) — Miami has itself a record-setting streak — most consecutive weeks ranked No. 1 in The Associated Press college football poll.

The Hurricanes, who extended the nation's longest winning streak to 28 games with a 28-27 win over Florida State, remained in the top spot for a record 19th straight poll.

## Ex-Husker missing near Indonesian blast

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Jake Young, a former All-American center at Nebraska has been reported missing in the area of the bomb blasts in Bali, Indonesia.

An explosion at the nightclub and restaurant, thought to be the work of terrorists, killed at least 187 people and injured hundreds more Saturday.

Young's father, Jacob Young said Sunday night by telephone from Midland, Texas, that his son had been living in Hong Kong and was working as an attorney. He had gone to Bali to play a final tournament with his rugby team before returning to the United States, Young said.

"We have not made contact," he said. "I have had e-mail contact with the football club out of Hong Kong."

"We just simply know nothing further," he said.

Young was employed by the London-based law firm of Clifford Chance Rogers & Wells, the world's largest.

Jo-Anne Prokopowicz, a State Department spokeswoman, said Sunday that at least two Americans had been killed and three injured.

"We are not able to release the names or details of these individuals. There are ongoing efforts to identify other possible victims. We are not able to

confirm any other American casualties at this point," Prokopowicz said.

The family has been in contact with the State Department and representatives from the office of Rep. Tom Osborne, R-Neb., Young's former coach, his father said.

His son was planning to rejoin his wife, Laura, and 2-year-old son, Wilson, who recently moved to the Kansas City, Mo., area, the elder Young said.

The native of Midland, Texas, was an All-American for NU in 1988 and 1989.

"We're clinging to a thin ray of hope that he's going to be found alive," Jacob Young said.

Osborne told the Lincoln Journal-Star on Sunday night that he had been in touch with State Department officials.

"Indications aren't good, but they have not gotten confirmation one way or the other," Osborne said.

Nebraska head coach Frank Solich also issued a prepared statement.

"Our thoughts and prayers go out to Jake's family at this difficult time as they wait for more information. It's a tragic situation, and our sympathy extends to all those who lost loved ones," Solich said.
