## Economy: Consumer spending powers third quarter increase

WASHINGTON (AP) - The U.S. econo-
my raced ahead at a 3.1 percent annual rate in my raced ahead at a 3.1 percent annual rate in the summer, powered by hearty consumer
spending, especially on big-ticket items such
as cars.
The rebound in third quarter gross domes-
tic product, considered the best barometer of the nation's economic health, came after a
mediocre 1.3 percent growth rate posted in the second quarter, the Commerce Department reported Thursday. Economists wurry that the growth spurt could be followed by a winter
lull.
GDP measures the total value of goods and services produced within the United States.
Even with the bounce back, many economists predict the economy is losing momen-
tum in the current October-December quarter tum in the current October-December quarter.
Some analysts are forecasting a fourthSome analysts are forecasting a fourth-
quarter economic growth rate of around 2 per quarter economic growth rate of around 2 per-
cent. Others believe it will be a lot weaker at only a 1 percent pace. Most don't foresee the economy falling back into recession.
The economy's struggles will likely be weighing on Americans' minds as they head to weighing on Americans minds as they head to
the polls next week. Democrats and Republicans have sought to blame each other for the economy's troubles in their campaign
strategies to win control of Congress in next week's midterm elections.
President Bush, campaigning
Republicans around the country, has cred Republicans around the country, has credited
his 10 -year, $\$ 1.35$ trillion, his 10 -year, $\$ 1.35$ trillion, tax cut enacted by Congress last year, with helping to pull the
economy out of a recession that began March Democrats point to the tax cut as a key reason why the federal government posted a $\$ 159$ billion deficit in the 2002 fiscal year, ending
four straight years of surpluses. Even though the third quarter GDP perfor-
mance was the strongest since the economy
posted a brisk 5 percent growth rate in the first
three months of this year, it was weaker than three months of this year, it was weaker than predicting. On Wall Street, stocks rose. The Dow Jones
industrial average was up 13 points and the industrial average was up 13 points and the Nasdaq gained 11 points in early trading.
Much of the strength in third quarter came from consumers. Consumand grew at a brisk 4.2 percent pace in the third quarter, up from a tepid 1.8 percant rate in the second quarter. The broad shoulder of the American con-
sumer was like Atlas holding up the economy," said Ken Mayland, economist with

Bush optimistic on terror war

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Bush has been sounding optimistic about how American will and determination will prevail in the war on terrorism, yet given the headlines over the past month, rosy predictions of victory seem to some hard to justify.
His optimism was on display during political campaign stops in five states
over the past few days in the run-up to next week's midterm elections.
"We're making progress at dismantling the terrorist organization. We've hauled in a couple of thousand. One by one we're finding them and bringing
them to justice," Bush said Monday in
Denver.
But the president's confidence is difficult to square with alarmist predictions of the intelligence community and a decided
uptick in the number of terrorist inciuptick in the number of terrorist inci-
dents.
"They are coming after us," CIA
Director George Tenet told Congress two weeks ago, contending that at-Qaida is now "reconstituted" despite efforts by

member their names In addition with the seven clasees people who fail a class will have to wait an entire year to retake it. So if s senior was to fail English IV, wil have oo wair an entire year to retake i.So if a senior was to 1 air Englishiv.
he/she would not be able to graduate. (More teachers and classes will have to be provided in the summer.)Again. more fatiure
Another concern is that students are not able to take as many electives together through the entire ourreof the school year becauseondy four clasese are offered This is true. However. they do have more opportunities with the block schedule to t take more electives in general - one more class each year than on a at the samé time, but they can ake them different semesters, or be involved outsideof class time. They still have the opportunity to akea a wide variety of classes - Just not at the same time.

Then therés the money issue Is the block schedule more expensive for the school district than a seven-period day? Probabbly. But even if it is what about the ppossibility of losing students or staff to other school districcs... that would be a great loss And what about the loss of student and teacher morale - the majprity
of the high school community loves the block schedule Finadly there is the potential academic loss Soreses have risen and more sudents are taking opllege prepatory eests than they did before the lock. Besides as important as money is o our school district at this point in time, some things shouldnt be tosed aside for it.or the lack of it. The block schedule is one of those things
The key solutions to all these problems seem to be better communication and more planning regarding students' graduation plans. We feel that the system of getting out information tostudents and parents about the block and schedule planning ould be improved. There needs tobe more time for explaining the
block schedule o osudens sin midde school oming up to the high school as well as for the suduents already here.
There are three graduation plans students an choose each with different not just an hour) whereeighth graders and their parents talk to counselors and eeachers and high school student leaders about the best plan and ways to schedule classes effectively. Alsoeeach year at high school theresshould be at least half a
dyy in addition to the tuy. in adation torthe curren sccereduling day. whereeeach grade his the the oppor of requirements and keep them posted on the importance GPA and ollege enrance exams
Students ned to figure out how to plan schedules so that the important clases are taken together. No schedule is going to be perfect. but this one fits us well. Changes can be made to the existing schedule without throwing it in the trash and starting all over. It strue that most shools in this aree and around the country do not have the block schedule but this is what sets us apart for the better. We've always known we're the "Best in the West" hopefully it will stay that way.
