

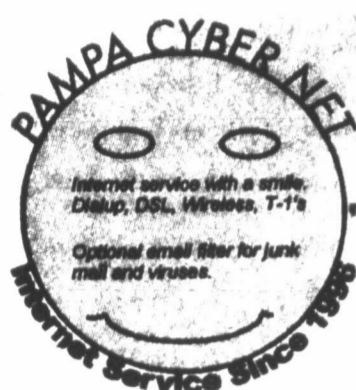
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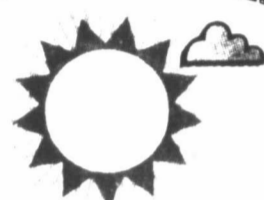

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## Former Pampa officer faces wrongful death suit

BELTON — Closing arguments were scheduled this morning in the wrongful death lawsuit brought against a former Pampa man here.

Belton Police Officer James Cory Powell, formerly a police officer and paramedic in Pampa, was cleared by a Bell County grand jury last year of criminal charges stemming from a Jan. 1, 2001, shooting incident here that left one man dead. The family of the dead man filed a civil suit against Powell and the City of Belton.

Juan Gabino Anzaldus, 25, of Temple, was one of five men in a Mercury Cougar northbound in the early hours of Jan. 1, 2001, on Interstate 35 in Belton when Officer Powell pulled the car over for traveling 74 mph in a 60 mph zone.

Powell told the jury this week that as he shown his flashlight inside the car, he saw two men holding knives. Powell said he radioed for help.

Anzaldus, who was in the back seat of the car, got out

and began walking around as Powell's backup arrived. Powell ordered him back to the car. Anzaldus ran, and Powell chased him into the dark.

Powell said he tackled the physically larger Anzaldus, and they fought. The officer said Anzaldus was holding Powell by the hair, trying to kick him and take his service pistol when Powell drew his .45-caliber pistol and shot in self defense. Powell said from the witness stand that he could

not remember how many times he fired.

An autopsy indicated that Anzaldus was shot twice in the abdomen.

Investigations by Belton Police Department, FBI and Texas Rangers all cleared Powell of criminal wrongdoing. Powell's attorney, Stuart Smith of Waco, told the Belton jury this week.

Anzaldus, who had been wanted for probation violation for an attempted murder con-

viction in connection with cutting a man's throat in 1994, died at the scene. Anzaldus was also on probation for possession of cocaine and marijuana. His father, wife and four children are seeking an unspecified amount of money for Anzaldus' death.

Anzaldus' father, Gabino Flores Anzaldus, told Temple Daily Telegram reporter Brad Stutzman that the lawsuit was about justice, not money.

The case is expected to go to the jury later today.

## Hospital to close labor and delivery unit

Babies will not be delivered at Pampa's Regional Medical Center beginning Dec. 8 following a Thursday meeting of the hospital Board of Directors.

Due to a shortage of obstetricians, both in Pampa and in many areas of the country, the labor and delivery unit of Pampa Regional Medical Center will temporarily suspend operations beginning Dec. 8, 2002, according to an announcement made Friday morning by Chief Executive Officer Norman Stephens.

"Pampa Regional is committed to providing excellent care in every service we provide to the people of our community. With the relocation of Pampa obstetrician Mark Lobaugh, M.D., to another state, we cannot ensure the necessary continuous physician coverage by full-time obstetricians on our medical staff," said Stephens.

"With the input of our medical staff and local hospital

board of trustees, we have made the decision to close our obstetrics service temporarily, beginning Dec. 8," he said.

Stephens said the service will re-open as soon as the hospital is able to recruit another full time obstetrician. Until the temporary closure takes effect on Dec. 8, births at PRMC will be managed by visiting (locum tenens) physicians scheduled by the hospital.

Over the past few years, PRMC has made a significant investment in its obstetrical service, much of this related to ensuring temporary coverage for deliveries by locum tenens obstetricians, according to the hospital news release.

Lobaugh was in private practice in Pampa for four months before he moved to California at the end of October.

The only other Pampa obstetrician, Dr. Ann E. Herral, said in a telephone interview Monday afternoon she had not been contacted about the possible closing of (See HOSPITAL, Page 3)

## Lubbock economy one bright star in state

LUBBOCK (AP) — A Panhandle economist has dubbed Lubbock the one bright star in the state's economy, saying most of Texas' metro areas are still reeling from the effects of the ongoing recession.

Economist Karr Ingham of Amarillo said new home construction and sales have carried the area. Permits for new homes climbed a whopping 107 percent in the third quarter compared to last year.

"This has simply been a phenomenal year for Lubbock," Ingham told the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal for its Thursday editions.

The city's stability also has been helped by expansion at Texas Tech University, and national attention for Tech's

basketball program under coach Bob Knight and the summer-long exhibit of 31 medieval frescoes from the Vatican, Ingham said.

Also contributing is a diversification of the traditionally agriculture-based economy and a transfusion of new jobs promoted by Market Lubbock Inc., a city-appointed economic development corporation, Ingham said.

Ingham's report, Lubbock Economic Review, did find a decline in retail sales, which fell 2.3 percent in the third quarter.

Greg Jones, executive vice president of American State Bank, which helped underwrite the report, cautioned that the city might have reached its construction high.

"I think we could see it

slow down in the first or second quarter of next year," he said.

The report came a day after an economist said Houston's economy is outperforming the nation and state and should slowly emerge from the economic doldrums.

University of Houston economist Barton Smith warned that the future of the inflated housing market could be dampened no matter which way the economy goes. A sinking economy could end demand for owner-occupied housing because of job losses and decreasing consumer confidence.

Houston ranks eighth among the nation's 25 largest cities based on its job market performance, Smith said.

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# Push for personal Social Security accounts gains momentum

WASHINGTON (AP) — Emboldened by Republicans' election triumph, proponents of partial privatization of Social Security are pressing for an overhaul of the retire-

ment system as early as next year.

"The odds of that happening were dramatically improved on Tuesday," said Derrick Max, executive director of the Alliance for Worker Retirement Security. "The election results show

you can take a position in favor of modernization and still win by sizable margins."

But Democrats, who campaigned against risking Social Security money on the stock market, say Republicans did not win an election mandate on the retirement system.

"What they have is a mandate to obscure the issue of Social Security," said Rep. Bob Matsui of California, the top Democrat on the House Ways and Means Social Security subcommittee.

Many congressional

Republicans, feeling vulnerable to Democratic election attacks and a sinking stock market, distanced themselves from proposals to let younger workers invest a portion of their payroll taxes in 401(k)-style accounts. They also stopped using the word "privatization," essentially neutralizing the issue.

President Bush said Thursday that Social Security remains among his priorities, though homeland security and the weak economy share top billing.

"I think the Social Security

debate is an incredibly important debate," Bush said, adding, "I still strongly believe that the best way to achieve security and Social Security for younger workers is to give them the option of managing their own money through their personal savings account."

The White House hasn't yet settled on a strategy to get legislation through Congress. Some groups are pushing for a vote within six months after the new Congress convenes in January, though advisers say a year is more likely.

"My guess is the White House is going to turn Congress into a sandbox for all the privatizers to play," said Hans Riemer, senior policy analyst with Campaign for America's Future, which opposes personal accounts.

Matsui urged the White House to detail how to pay for the private accounts when it also wants to fund more tax cuts and a war with Iraq. Congress spent the Social Security surplus and rang up a \$159 billion shortfall last year.

## Jordan

Unit is a model for all other TDCJ facilities," said TDCJ executive director Gary Johnson. "This fine relationship is important to both the mission of the unit and the quality of life of our employees."

Jordan Unit senior warden C.C. Bell pledged that Thursday's observance "not only marks the anniversary of a proud past, it renews our commitment to further enhance our community relationship even more in the future."

TDCJ systems officials on hand for Thursday's observance included regional director Rodney Cooper.

The Jordan Unit, named for legendary Gray County Sheriff R.H. Rufe Jordan, has 276 employees and houses 1,000 minimum and medium custody male offenders. The unit shares its site seven miles east of Pampa with TDCJ's Baten Intermediate Sanction Facility which houses 400-plus parole violators.

Many of the offenders at Jordan work in the unit's sewing factory, a major contributor to TDCJ's highly productive prison industries program. The factory sews the upper portion of shoes which are then finished at the Clements Unit in Amarillo and used by inmates throughout TDCJ's 116 units. The factory also makes inmate boxer shorts.

But while the sewing fac-

tory is vital as a work program, the unit's pride and joy is the community service work its inmates perform for cities, counties, schools and state agencies throughout the Panhandle.

"Whether these offenders are cleaning up the roadsides or painting a school building or clearing debris after a storm, community service work is a vital component in their rehabilitation," ward Bell said. "The community benefits as these offenders learn the work ethic while doing something useful with their time in prison."

Bell pointed out that "diligent work is the basis of all inmate privileges in the Texas prison system, from watching television to having commissary privileges." He noted that Texas is the only state where every able-bodied inmate puts in a full day's work every day and no inmate is paid for their prison work.

Jordan Unit opened in 1992. The Clements Unit in Amarillo and the Roach Unit in Childress were opened in 1991. All the were part of a major TDCJ prison expansion program which marked the first time the state had put prison units in the Panhandle and West Texas.

## Microsoft, Justice lawyers to agree to conditions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Microsoft Corp. and the Justice Department are prepared to agree Friday to minor changes imposed by a judge to the settlement in their landmark antitrust case.

Lawyers for the company, nine states and the Justice Department's antitrust division said they would not object to the changes, which explicitly give U.S. District Judge Colleen Kollar-Kotelly additional authority to ensure that Microsoft abides by the agreement over the next five years.

A spokesman for Microsoft, Jim Desler, said Thursday that the company did not object. Private lawyers familiar with the Justice Department's plans, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the government wouldn't object either.

Marc Violette, a spokesman for the New York attorney general, who coordinated the antitrust fight among states, said officials there have "no problem" with the judge's desired changes.

Legal experts had predicted the sides would approve the minor changes, since they fought so hard to win the judge's broad approval of the settlement. The judge gave the sides until Friday to agree to what she had described as conditional approval of the agreement.

Lawyers for nine other states, which had rejected the settlement with Microsoft as inadequate, are still deciding whether to appeal last week's decision. Many attorneys general in those states were preoccupied this week with political duties related to elections and have just gotten around to studying the Microsoft rulings.

The government's top antitrust enforcer, Charles James, on Thursday defended the government's decision to settle the Microsoft case. In a speech to antitrust lawyers in Washington, James — who was criticized by many of his peers for failing to fight for tougher sanctions against Microsoft — quoted praise from the judge.

Kollar-Kotelly wrote last week that the settlement she approved was not only effective in restoring competition in the

technology industry, it did so in a "clear, consistent and coherent manner."

Microsoft Chief Executive Steve Ballmer plans to travel to Washington next week for a significant speech about the company's future dealings with others in the technology industry and with the U.S. government. Ballmer's speech, "Looking Forward: Innovation and Partnerships with Government and Industry," will be delivered Tuesday at The Brookings Institution, a Washington think-tank, and broadcast over the Internet.

Ballmer, a headstrong executive who once bellowed "to heck with Janet Reno," has adopted a more conciliatory attitude toward Washington and antitrust rules. Reno was the U.S. attorney general who originally brought the antitrust case against Microsoft.

Ballmer, who took over as chief executive in 1998, last week said that Microsoft plans to move forward in the industry as "responsible leader," and that complying with the antitrust settlement was "both a corporate commitment and a personal responsibility."

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# Diana's brother pulled royal banner off her coffin, butler says

LONDON (AP) — Bitterness between Princess Diana's blood family and the royals ran so deep that her brother Earl Spencer ripped the royal standard from her coffin moments before she was buried, former butler Paul Burrell was quoted as saying Friday.

"This was his final insult at the worst of times," said Burrell, in the latest of a string of exclusive interviews with the Daily Mirror newspaper. "It was inappropriate and disrespectful."

Spencer on Friday condemned Burrell's allegations as "yet more hurtful lies."

"The queen's standard was removed as part of the ceremony by her own officer in a dignified and pre-agreed manner," said the earl in a statement.

Burrell, who has sold his story to the tabloid for a reported \$620,000, accused the earl of ignoring Diana's final wishes and said his selfish defiance marred the dignity of her funeral.

He also claimed the Spencer family attempted to rewrite history, by ignoring a request in Diana's will that a quarter of her wealth should go to her 17 godchildren.

"Diana's wishes have been ignored here," he was quoted as saying. "It is an example of the Spencer family's desire to rewrite history."

The Spencer family has declined to comment on Burrell's interviews, which have sparked a frenzy in Britain's tabloid press.

On the day of Diana's funeral, Burrell — who the princess referred to as her "rock" — said the earl swapped the resplendent blue, red and gold royal banner with his family's black and white flag, and told princes William and Harry: "She is a Spencer now."

"I knew it was not what Diana would have wanted. With that act, her brother was depriving the princess of her proper status in life, a status of which she was proud," Burrell was quoted as saying.

"It seemed it had more to do with his Spencer v. Windsor war than doing what Diana would have wanted."

Britain's Press Association news agency said an unidentified source close to the earl

confirmed that the flags had been changed, but that this was done with the consent of Prince Charles and his boys.

Burrell was last week acquitted of stealing more than 300 items from the princess and other members of the royal family. He was cleared after Queen Elizabeth II confirmed the butler had informed her he had taken some of Diana's personal papers for safe-keeping.

During Burrell's trial, the jury heard that Diana wanted three-quarters of the value of her \$31.5 million estate to go to her sons and one-quarter to her 17 godchildren. The defense implied that Diana's directions were ignored by her mother and her sister.

## Father goes on rampage at school

LIBERTY, Mo. (AP) — A shooting outside a suburban Kansas City grade school left a 9-year-old boy dead, his mother wounded, his father jailed and schoolchildren shaken.

The body of Kawaldeep Singh, shielded from onlookers by a blue tarp, lay in the St. James Catholic School parking lot after the shooting Thursday. The fourth-grader died of a gunshot to the head, Liberty police said.

The boy's mother, Mandeep Kaur Singh, 32, underwent surgery and was expected to recover.

Jaswinder P. Singh, 41, was arrested about 35 minutes after the shooting as he sat in his vehicle outside a Kansas City liquor store. Clay County prosecutors charged him with first-degree murder, first-degree assault and two counts of armed criminal action.

Singh was being held without bond.

According to court records, Mandeep Kaur Singh told a detective who arrived at the scene, "My husband did this. Jesse shot me." Neighbors in Excelsior Springs said Jesse is Singh's nickname.

Krueger, a financial consultant who took a huge pay cut in his new post, says a spiritual awakening led him to conclude seven years ago that re-energized lay members must "transform and strengthen the church." The abuse tragedy is providing the necessary impetus, he feels.

Since Krueger's full-time paid staff numbers three, operations depend mostly on volunteer labor from hundreds of people like widow Mary Ann Keyes, who often spends 16-hour days organizing leaders around the country. Sometimes, she says, "I think, dear God, give me the energy to get through another day."

Post, who works on Voice up to 30 hours a week, has given up gardening and other hobbies. He's seen one movie this year.

Voice has worked hard to cultivate a moderate image — for example, it hasn't demanded Law's resignation. But moderation isn't always easy. At its October council meeting, for example, delegates spent an hour debating caution versus militancy in handling the bishops' bans.

Council members' anger was barely submerged at Our

Lady Help of Christians parish that night.

"We have been insulted. The bishops have allowed the rape of our children, and they have excused themselves," declared Bill Sheehan, a Voice founder.

A bigger challenge is avoiding the church's left-right splits. Post says Voice represents the church's "great center" and welcomes conservatives and liberals if they agree with its vision of lay activism. The organization does not question the hierarchy's authority or any church teachings, he insists.

But two small Boston groups contend that Voice's intent is to overhaul traditional teachings on matters like abortion, celibacy and homosexuality.

One of the groups adopted the name "Faithful Voice" and assigned operatives to attend Voice meetings incognito, sometimes putting anti-Voice fliers on activists' windshields.

More weighty on a national level is a campaign by editor Deal Hudson of Crisis magazine, who considers Voice's moderate pose deceitful, given the liberals who spoke to 4,000 supporters at the group's inaugural convention last July.

To calm fears among such conservatives and the bishops, Voice's Nov. 21 council meet-

ing will take up a proposed credo that would affirm the authority of the church, the bishops and the pope, and declare: "We believe what the Catholic Church believes."

Voice's survival is no certainty.

Cash reserves gave fallen from \$130,000 to half that

over the past month, and lack of tax exemption could hobble a vital year-end fund drive. More importantly, it has never been possible to enlist substantial numbers of lay Catholics behind any effort of this sort in the long term.

Krueger is undaunted, not only because he specialized in

business startups but also because he believes the cause has divine support.

"It's a Spirit-driven movement," he says, "so 100 percent of the responsibility doesn't rest on our shoulders."

## Proctor & Gamble ends talks with EDS

CINCINNATI (AP) — The Procter & Gamble Co. said Thursday it has ended its on-again, off-again talks to sell its back-office operations to Electronic Data Systems Corp.

Under a multibillion-dollar deal, EDS would have been responsible for P&G's information technology, employee services and some accounting

and purchasing functions.

Instead P&G, a maker of Tide detergent, Crest toothpaste and dozens of consumer products, said it will split that work among several firms.

"We have decided to modify our business outsourcing strategy," said P&G spokeswoman Linda Ulrey. "Instead of going with a single supplier,

we will look at multiple partners on a step-by-step basis."

The decision was made weeks after EDS's shares lost more than half their value when the company warned it wouldn't reach earnings projections.

"Certainly their earnings warning in September did cause us to pause and re-evaluate," Ulrey said. "Given those changes, we decided it would be more prudent to take a step-by-step approach."

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## About 1,000 more Americans to go to Horn of Africa to fight terrorists

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is sending an estimated 1,000 more Americans to help track down al-Qaida around the Horn of Africa, where the yearlong war on terrorism has produced few visible results so far.

Defense officials said Thursday that the amphibious command ship USS Mount Whitney — to be used as a floating headquarters off the coast of Djibouti — will leave its Norfolk, Va., homeport Tuesday with Marines who will coordinate future military operations in the region.

"This is ... focused on looking for al-Qaida, looking for terrorist cells and dealing with them expeditiously, and directly," Marine Corps Commandant Gen. James Jones said.

The Mount Whitney has a Navy crew of some 560, and members of the 2nd Marine Division who will set up the command center in Djibouti probably will number about 400, officials said. It was unclear if all those Marines would depart next week.

The Americans will join a multinational force of thousands already in Africa — including some who have been trying to catch terrorists there since al-Qaida began fleeing Afghanistan a year ago. There are 700 to 800 Americans at a French military base in Djibouti, deployed several months ago for what defense officials would describe only as "training and contingencies."

Countries and waterways in and around the Horn of Africa long have been plagued by terrorist activity. Al-Qaida and others hide, pass through, train, organize, ship weapons, plot and launch attacks there, U.S. intelligence and defense officials say.

Defense officials have been unwilling or unable to name all the countries or the numbers of terrorists they believe may be there.

In addition to Americans already in Djibouti, there are more than 2,000 French troops and about 1,000 Germans, as well as a number of British forces. The international coalition has flown reconnaissance missions along the coast of East Africa. A ship interdiction program started last year to catch al-Qaida escaping by sea from Afghanistan has caught no one in area, officials have said, though they say the questioning of crews on passing vessels has netted much valuable intelligence and that their understanding of what is going on in the region has improved.

Though there have been highly publicized arrests of terror suspects in Europe, North Africa, Pakistan and Asia, no success of that type have been claimed in the Horn of Africa region, with the exception of Yemen. Across the Red Sea and the Bab al-Mandab Strait from Djibouti, Yemen is a main concern in the region and said to be one of the highest priorities of the new Marine new task force.

Yemen is the ancestral home of Osama bin Laden and the site of the deadly October 2000 bombing of the USS Cole as well as last month's bombing of the French tanker Limburg. The Yemeni government says it has arrested hundreds of terror suspects — and the CIA last week killed a suspect in the Cole and tanker attacks — but the country has remained a dangerous terrorist haven despite joint efforts by its government and the international counterterrorism coalition.

The size of the terrorist problem in the region has never been clear. Officials no longer assert, for instance, that there are terrorist training camps in Somalia, as feared after the attacks Sept. 11, 2001, against the United States.

## Report: Combat units need mental health workers

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Mental health workers must be assigned to combat units if the military is to head off problems like those that led to five marital murders this summer, an Army report says.

The report, released Thursday, said the killings were likely due to existing marital strife made worse by frequent separations of military families as the soldiers trained and fought. It said early intervention is the way to prevent future tragedies.

Col. Dave Orman, a psychiatrist who led the study team, said a pilot program is being created to put mental health workers in combat battalions so "the troops can access us casually."

"We're not doing what we need to be doing yet," he said. "There was a prevalent attitude that seeking behavioral health care was not career safe."

If mental health workers, now available at clinics, were in combat units, they might gain the confidence of soldiers and help them before problems escalate, he said.

The report also said getting mental health care to soldiers before serious problems develop also might dispel the attitude that seeking help is a sign of weakness.

"The bottom line is trying to create a different culture so soldiers and their families understand that seeking help

is what we want you to do," said Lt. Col. Yvonne Tucker-Harris, director of the Army's family advocacy programs.

Authorities say four Fort Bragg soldiers killed their wives in June and July. Two of the men committed suicide and the other two are charged with murder. Three of those cases involved Special Operations soldiers who had served in Afghanistan.

In a fifth case, a woman is charged with murdering her husband, a major in the Army's Special Forces.

The report recommended the Defense Department study the impact of increased military operations on family stress. It also said distrust of military family care and mental health programs "may contribute in rare cases to tragedy."

It also said focus groups showed high rates of deployments at an active base like Fort Bragg contributed to marital strife. "Marital discord at Fort Bragg was prevalent theme among all focus groups," the report said.

Under his leadership, Calvary continues to grow spiritually, physically and financially.

### 'Voice of Faithful' grows to 25,000 members

NEWTON, Mass. (AP) — Formed by rank-and-file Roman Catholics alarmed at clerical sex abuse, in just 10 months Voice of the Faithful has gone from meeting in a single Massachusetts parish to claiming some 25,000 lay members.

It also has become the most-disputed organization in the American church — an institution known for its powerful hierarchy and passive congregants.

Voice, which emerged from January open forums at a Wellesley parish, has reached into 33 states, recruiting many members via the Internet. It has 37 parish chapters in Massachusetts and 41 elsewhere.

The group professes to be loyally Catholic. But conservative commentators call Voice subversive to the hierarchy and church teaching.

Seven bishops, in Connecticut, Maine, Oregon, New Jersey and New York, have banned the group from meeting on church premises. Boston's Cardinal Bernard Law went halfway, allowing existing Voice chapters to continue meeting in parishes but forbidding newly formed ones.

Archbishop John Myers of Newark, N.J., accompanied his mid-October ban with a stinging critique.

He said Voice functions "as a cover for dissent, to cause division within the church and to openly attack the church hierarchy." The group's agenda is "anti-church and, ultimately, anti-Catholic," he charged.

The fight over meeting places is more than symbolic. Though gatherings can be held in other buildings, a parish presence is crucial for recruiting members and giving Voice legitimacy as a Catholic organization.

Voice President James Post, a Boston University professor of management who specializes in ethics and corporate accountability, thinks widespread bishops' bans would "put us out of existence or limit our growth."

Two weeks ago he sent an explanatory letter to all U.S. bishops, saying they may have been misled, and arguing that Voice has the right to exist under church law.

Post informed the bishops that Voice wants to "shape structural change within the Church" and believes that lay involvement "is central to correcting the causes of the current crisis." He invited bishops to comment on a proposed Voice plan to promote the laity's role in parish government.

In Boston, a Voice delegation last week conferred with an official of the Boston Archdiocese for the first time in four months, and was told Law is willing to hold his first meeting with the organization's leaders.

The agenda will include Law's halfway meetings freeze, and the fate of \$56,000 that Voice raised directly for Catholic causes in Boston. The cash came from irate parishioners who boycotted Law's annual fund appeal, and wanted their money to go straight to the charities. Last July, the archdiocese said church agencies cannot accept Voice gifts because they bypass the cardinal.

All this notoriety is quite an achievement for an organization that only incorporated in June, hired Executive Director Steve Krueger in July, moved into a nondescript office in the Boston suburb of Newton a month later and has yet to win badly needed tax exemption.

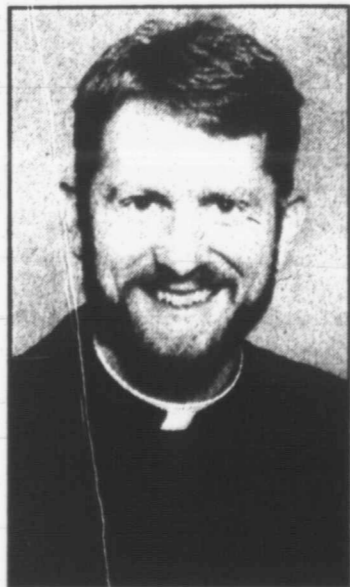
The afternoon service will be followed by a reception and time of greeting where members and friends can welcome the Rev. Erickson, his wife Jere and their infant son Seth.

At the start of the season, it seemed far more likely that when San Diego visited St. Louis to start the second half of the season, the Rams would be 6-2 and the Chargers 3-5.

Instead, it's the opposite. Still, circumstances are changing. The Rams have won three straight after starting 0-5, and the Chargers, who started 6-1, were blown out 44-13 by the Jets at home last week.

"There's a lot of reasons why we lost that game," San Diego linebacker Junior Seau said. "We didn't play well, we didn't tackle well, we didn't protect the ball. We didn't do a lot of things. We couldn't even outside kick well. Those games happen."

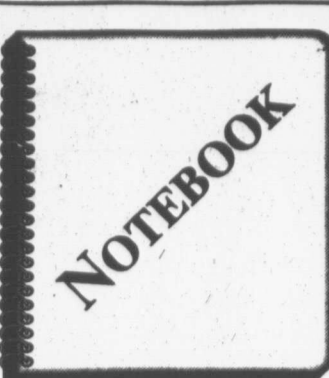

That sequence of events in Lincoln perfectly captured the Longhorns' last four weeks: wounded after a tough loss to Oklahoma, Texas has bounced back with three straight wins and put itself right back in the national championship chase.

CHICAGO (AP) — If Dusty Baker needs an enormous challenge after his successful 10-year run with the San Francisco Giants, the Chicago Cubs appear willing to provide it.

Cubs general manager Jim Hendry called Baker on Thursday, one day after the Giants announced Baker, who led them to the World Series, wouldn't be returning as manager.

"We want to get the right guy. We certainly expressed our interest to Dusty and he seems interested in us. Hopefully we'll move forward at a good rate," Hendry said.

Among those Hendry has already interviewed are Bob Melvin, Ken Macha, Buck Showalter and Fredi Gonzalez. Macha will manage the Oakland and Showalter will guide Texas next season.

Baker hasn't interviewed for a job in 10 years, and he said he'll have a lot of questions for Hendry.

"I want to talk to them about the minor leagues, the day games, the city, the prospects, the expectations," Baker was quoted as saying.

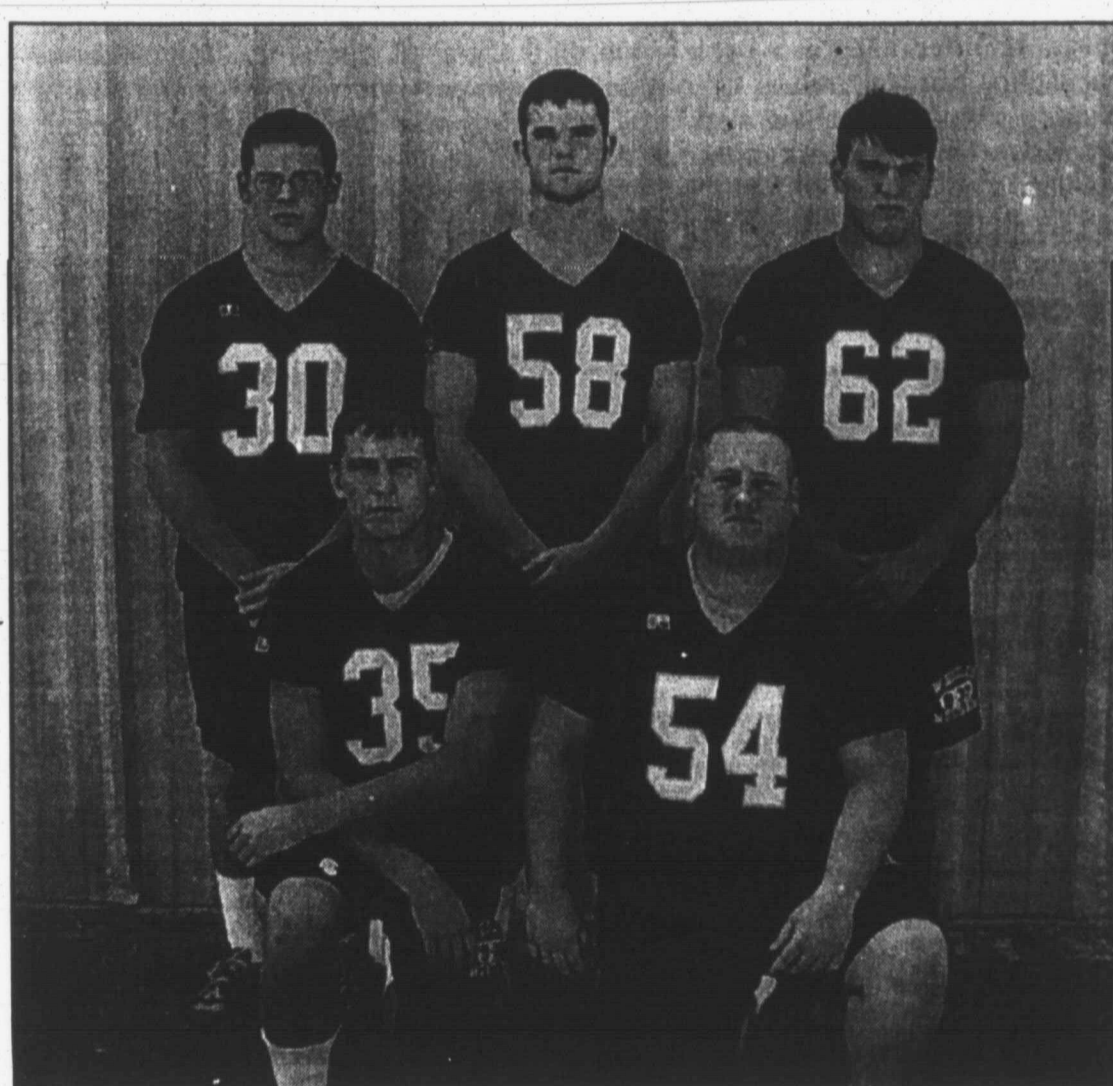

## Thomas frustrated after Dolphins' lopsided setback to Green Bay

DAVIE, Fla. — The annual swoon came early this year for the Miami Dolphins, testing their resiliency and Zach Thomas' patience.

So far the Dolphins' mighty-mite middle linebacker has kept his cool, refraining from the sort of emotional outburst that served as a soundtrack to past collapses. Even an embarrassing 24-10 loss at Green Bay on Monday didn't set him off.

"I was so frustrated. I didn't want to say nothing stupid," he said Thursday.

Thomas, an All-American at Texas Tech after the game about the Dolphins moping at halftime when they trailed only 14-0, but there was no blowup from the team's feisty leader.

Maybe this week. The Dolphins (5-3) will try to break a two-game losing streak Sunday night against the New York Jets, a team that has tormented Thomas for much of his seven-year NFL career.

Miami lost eight games in a row to the Jets before beating them Sept. 22, and the Dolphins haven't won at Giants Stadium since 1997. It was there a year ago that Thomas staged a postgame meltdown, calling the Dolphins "garbage" and "a terrible team" after they blew a 17-point lead in the second half.

He doesn't regret the tirade.

"I try to hold it in as much as I can, but I never regret any of that stuff," he said. "It's just me being myself. I don't think you should hold back if you feel like you gave the game away, and that's what happened."

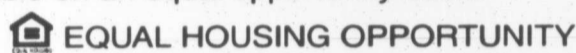
