# **Explosion victim dies from burns**

An Amarillo man, burned in a Pampa explosion, died over the weekend in a

Lyle Johnson, 62, suffered fatal burns in an explosion at a Pampa home on Tuesday, Nov. 5. Funeral services are pending today in Amarillo.

Michael Smail, 49, also of

dition today at University Medical Center's burn unit in Lubbock.

Pampa fire officials said the two men were cleaning the concrete basement floor of the Dennis Stowers home, 1001 Deer Place, when the cleaning fluid ignited, burning both men.

Johnson was flown from Pampa to the Lubbock burn center by LifeStar heliRural Metro Ambulance to critical" condition. Northwest Texas Hospital and later transferred to the Lubbock burn center. Witnesses said the two men came out of the home with their clothes aflame. Though they appeared to be in shock, they were able to walk to the ambulance.

Johnson died about 1:55 a.m. Sunday. They said

Pampa Fire Marshal Gary Stevens said today that the cleaning fluid being used by the men was the cause of the explosion and flash fire.

Teresa Keller, the house keeper and only other person in the home at the time of the explosion, was on the Hospital officials said second floor of the brick house.

Officials said she was not

injured, but her husband Leo Keller said she was trapped upstairs because the stairwas completely way blocked. She was able to get out and get help, he said.

Fire Chief Kim Powell said every room in the home appeared to have suffered some damage.

Fire crews extinguished three small blazes in the basement caused by the explosion.

# Deadly tornadoes devastate south, east

MOSSY GROVE, Tenn. (AP) Emergency crews searched for survivors early Monday amid the wreckage of communities pulverized by a series of storms that barreled through more than a half-dozen states, killing at least 33 people and injuring more than 200.

The long band of storms, including several tornadoes, stretched from Louisiana to Pennsylvania, with Tennessee and Alabama the hardest hit Sunday. The death toll included 16 in

Ohio. Pennsylvania and Mississippi reported one death each. In addition, one man died of a heart attack in Tennessee on Monday while cleaning up around

One tornado in Ohio blasted apart a theater just minutes after a movie ended. Teams inspecting the damage from that tornado believe it had wind topping 200 mph, a meteorologist said Monday.

The stormy weather continued

Tennessee, 10 in Alabama and five in Monday morning, with tornado warnings posted for sections of Maryland, Virginia, the Carolinas and Georgia. Thousands lost power in the Carolinas and possible tornadoes damaged homes in Louisiana and South Carolina.

The hardest-hit area in Tennessee was a five-mile swath in Morgan County, about 40 miles west of Knoxville. The county includes Mossy Grove, where four people died.

At least 40 people remained unac-

counted-for Monday in Morgan County. Rescuers said most of the missing were probably alive but out of touch with family members because the storm knocked out phone service and blocked

Of the 20 or so residences in Mossy Grove, about a dozen were destroyed. In many cases, all that remained was a foundation and rubble a couple of feet high.

# **Bush honors veterans while** preparations begin for war

Honoring those who served in the wars of yesteryear, President Bush said Monday he will lead America into a new battle if necessary to disarm Iraq. "This great nation will not live at the mercy of any foreign plot or power," he said.

At Arlington National Cemetery, the hallowed burial ground of military heroes situated on a hillside overlooking the Potomac River, Bush said today's military serves "on the scattered battlefields of a new kind of war," in Afghanistan and beyond.

"That mission will go on until the terrorists who struck America are fully and finally defeated," he said.

"This new kind of war also requires us to confront outlaw regimes that seek and possess the tools of mass murder," Bush said. "We will not permit a dictator who's used weapons of mass destruction

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nuclear weapons," the president said.

"The dictator of Iraq will fully disarm, or the United States of America will lead a coalition and disarm him," the president said, drawing a long applause.

Underscoring the threat, senior administration officials said that Bush has approved tentative Pentagon plans for invading Iraq should a new U.N. arms inspection effort fail. The strategy calls for a land, sea and air force of 200,000 to 250,000 troops, officials said.

Bush, who began his day with rain-soaked pre-dawn visit to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial, called on new generations of warriors to draw inspiration from those who served — and in many cases, died — before.

"Especially in this time of war, we see in our veterans an example of courage and selfless sacrifice and service that

WASHINGTON (AP) — chemical, biological or inspires a new generation and will lead this country to victory," he told an East Room assembly after his earlymorning visit to the blackgranite memorial.

America remembers today those killed on Sept. 11, 2001, he said, reaffirming his doctrine of making war with terror networks and, if necessary, ridding the Iraqi regime of its 'weapons of mass murder."

"The time to confront this threat is before it arrives, not the day after," he said, calling this "an urgent task for America and the world."

.. The events of September the 11th clearly demonstrate that a threat that gathers on the other side of the earth can bring suffering to the American homeland," Bush said.

On his impromptu visit to the 20-year-old Vietnam memorial, Bush encountered a group of veterans. "Thank you for serving. God Bless

# Local Red Cross provides tips, film for surviving winter storms

Pampa's Red Cross Disaster Action Team will open its monthly meeting to the public tonight for a showing of "Surviving the Cold."

The 16-minute film highlights ways citizens can protect themselves in the event of severe winter weather, said Jana Gregory, local American Red Cross executive director. The film will be shown at the local Red Cross office, 108 N. Russell.

"I know winter storms are coming and I'd like to know local citizens have things ready," Gregory said.

"Taking the time to plan with your family now can save you a lot of trouble in the future," Gregory added.

She suggests the following winter storm preparation tips:

learn about the area's weather history;

 learn winter storm warning signs and community-alert signals;

· request information on preparing for winter storms;

• plan and practice a safe evacuation route; have disaster supplies on hand - flashlight and extra batteries, portable, battery-operated radio and extra batteries, first aid kit and manual, protective clothing, bedding or sleeping bags, emergency food and water, non-electric can opener, at least three gallons of water per

person per day, essential medicines and baby supplies, cash and credit cards, identification, insurance and other important papers.

· make arrangements for pets,

· develop an emergency communication plan in case family members are separated. Ask an out-of-state relative or friend to serve as a family contact. Make sure everyone in the family knows how to reach the contact person.

In case of evacuation, Gregory advises citizens to bring along basic emergency and personal items that will be needed in the shelter including pillows, bedding, essential medications and other health related items, extra clothing and a toy or activity for children.

"It's mass destruction, death," said Ken Morgan, an officer in nearby Oliver Springs. "Mossy Grove is destroyed."

Carbon Hill, Ala., was in a similar situation after a nighttime swarm of storms belted the area and sent giant hardwood trees crashing onto homes.

"I reckon about a third of the town is gone," said Terry Murray, part of a crew surveying the extent of the damage in Carbon Hill.

"Everybody's house is just totally gone. My son doesn't even know where his house is," said Sheryl Wakefield in Carbon Hill. "It's gone. It's just gone."

Wind hit an estimated 140 mph in Tennessee and the storms carried torrential rain and golf-ball-sized hail.

Unseasonably high temperatures Sunday in the 80s, followed by a cold front, made conditions ripe for tornadoes, which are not unusual this time of year, said Gene Rench, a National Weather Service meteorologist in Memphis.

The injured included at least 55 people in Tennessee and 50 in Alabama.

The storms cut a 100-mile swath through northwest Ohio farmland, seriously damaging the town of Van Wert. Gov. Bob Taft declared a state of emergency Sunday night in Van Wert and Ottawa counties, but the storms caused problems around the state.

Survey teams inspecting the damage for the National Weather Service believe the tornado that hit Van Wert had winds of 207-260 mph, said John Taylor, a meteorologist in Syracuse, Ind. That preliminary finding would make it a category F4 storm, the second most severe level on the Fujita scale for measuring damage from tornadoes.

Weather service spotters had said they saw four tornadoes hit Van Wert. Taylor said the storm actually was one tornado that included several

The storm destroyed the Twin Cinema just minutes after films ended, and two wrecked cars came to rest in the theater where "Santa Clause 2" had been showing.

Manager Scott Shaffer had about five minutes to get moviegoers into sheltered areas after a weather radio squawked a warning of the tornado. Emergency officials credited Shaffer with saving patrons' lives.

"I was too scared to panic," Shaffer said Monday. He crouched with others in a hallway when the twister struck. "For a few seconds, it got ear-piercing."

In Alabama, nine people died in Walker County as thunderstorms charged across the northern part of the state, said Walker County Deputy Coroner Bob Green.

Green was at the scene where the bodies of two women were found: "They were laying down off the side (of a road)," he said. "It was bad. Carbon Hill had a bad time."

The tornadoes Tennessee came in two waves. Late Saturday and early Sunday, twisters skipped across western and middle Tennessee, killing three people. On Sunday night, the second line of storms crossed the state — this time south and east of Nashville.

Two people, including a 10-year-old boy, were killed and 15 people were injured Sunday night when two mobile home parks, three houses and a church were damaged near Manchester, about 60 miles southeast of Nashville, Sheriff Steve Graves said.


Outside Manchester on Interstate 24, William Fischer's tractor-trailer rig, weighted down with tractor parts, was blown off the road.

"It actually picked me up and spun me around," said Fischer, 29, of Lexington, Tenn. His rig landed upside down but he suffered only bruises. Asked how he could be so calm in recounting what happened, he said: "I don't panic easy."

About an hour later, the tornado ripped through Mossy Grove, damaging at least a dozen houses, said Steven Hamby, director of the Morgan County emergency management center. The dead include a 4-month-old child. Four people were killed in neighboring Cumberland County, officials said.

Near the movie theater in Van Wert, Ohio, Larry Longwell helped hustle about 30 customers into a store basement before a tree slammed into the parking lot.

"I didn't make it to the basement. I was trying to shut that dumb door. All I could see was that pine tree coming at me," Longwell said.



With their 30-26 loss Saturday at College Station, the Sooners (8-1, 4-1 Big 12) fell into a tie for fourth in the Associated Press media poll and dropped from second to sixth in the coaches poll.

They're sure to tumble to at least third Monday in the new Bowl Championship Series ratings, which are used to determine the teams that will play for the national title.

But coach Bob Stoops says there is still much football to be played — Oklahoma has three regular-season games left, plus a possible berth in the Big 12 title game — and that his team may

"I don't know about a good shot, but a shot," he said Sunday.

Stoops is taking this approach: If his team can start winning again, beginning this week at Baylor, then it will win the Big 12 South title and play for the conference championship. Meanwhile, perhaps one of the teams ahead of Oklahoma in the BCS will lose.

"If we can do that ... we have good feeling things will work out," he said. ' .

Oklahoma's previous loss ended any chance for a national title. It came in the final game of the 2001 regular season, when Oklahoma State upset the Sooners to deny them the Big 12 South title. They ended up playing in the Cotton Bowl.

The timing of Saturday's loss, while not good, isn't as bad as a year ago.

"Winning will cure a lot,"

# NFL has first tie game since 1997 season

PITTSBURGH (AP) Outstanding performances by Tommy Maddox and Michael Vick, combined with two blocked field goals in overtime, resulted in the 16th tie in NFL history and the first in five years.

Vick rallied Atlanta from 17 points down in the fourth quarter, and the Falcons withstood Maddox's franchise-record 473 yards passing to tie Pittsburgh 34-34 Sunday.

After Pittsburgh's Todd Peterson and Atlanta's Jay Feely had overtime field-goal attempts blocked, Pittsburgh still nearly won it. With only I second on the clock, Maddox lofted a 50-yard pass that Plaxico Burress caught at the Falcons 1-yard line. Half of Burress' body was in the end zone, but the ball wasn't, and the Steelers didn't have enough time to run another play.

It was the NFL's first tie since the Giants and Redskins played to a 7-all stalemate on Nov. 23, 1997. Pittsburgh's last tie was 35all against Denver in 1974, and Atlanta hadn't tied since a 20-20 game against the Rams in 1971, long before the NFL went to

Maddox was 28-of-41 for 473 yards, easily breaking Bobby Layne's 1958 club record of 409 yards. Burress made nine catches for a team-record 253 yards and two touchdowns, but Pittsburgh still couldn't hold a 34-17 lead in the fourth quarter.

Both teams remained unbeaten in their last five games and are

Remarkably, Vick - perhaps the fastest quarterback in NFL history - pulled off the comeback despite being forced into becoming a one-dimensional player. He had 52 yards rushing but still got free to run for an 11yard touchdown on a broken play in the final minute of regulation that sent it to overtime.

Despite fighting off the constant pressure, Vick dodged and weaved his way to a 294-yard passing day, going 24-of-46.

Pittsburgh had the best chance to win in overtime, but receiver Brian Finneran got his hand on Peterson's 48-yard attempt to block it on the Steelers' first OT possession.

Feely's 56-yard attempt in the closing seconds also was blocked, leading to the near-miracle Maddox-to-Burress completion on the final play.

# Bonds' homer not enough as Japan all-stars beat major league team

FUKUOKA, Japan (AP) — Barry Bonds hit a two-run homer, but the major all-stars lost to their Japanese counterparts 8-2 Monday in the second game of their exhibition series.

Bonds hit his first pitch from Chunichi Dragons starter Kenshin Kawakami into the center field stands below the scoreboard at Fukuoka Dome to give the major league all-stars a 2-0 lead in the first inning.

"It was a fastball," Bonds said. "I was glad to give us an early lead. The last thing we wanted was for them to get on top first like last night."

Bonds, who struck out three times in the first game of the seven-game set and is 1-for-7 in the series, is expected to win his fifth NL MVP award Monday. He declined to comment until after the announcement.

Bonds was MVP of the 2000 exhibition tour of Japan, hitting four homers with nine RBIs.

The Japanese all-stars rallied in the bottom of the third. Hiroki Kokubo singled and scored from first on a triple by Kosuke Fukudome. Kazuo Matsui of the Seibu Lions tied the game with a sacrifice fly to center.

In the top of the fourth inning, Michihiro Ogasawara of the Nippon Ham Fighters hit a two-run single, driving in Hideki Matsui and Alex Cabrera. Hiroki Kokubo of the Fukuoka Daiei Hawks hit a two-run homer off reliever Miguel Batista of the Arizona

"I got all of it," Kokubo said. "As the only member of the Hawks on the team, it felt great to hit one here before of the hometown fans.'

Kawakami, 12-6 with a 2.35 ERA in the regular season, held the major league all-stars to five hits and two runs in six innings.

"I thought they would hit me more," Kawakami said. "I was told to pitch the major leaguers inside and it worked."

Hideki Matsui knocked starter Mark Buerhle of the Chicago White Sox out of the game in the fourth inning when he drilled a line drive off the pitcher's left shoulder. Matsui, who wants to play in the major leagues, is a free agent and can start negotiating with all teams starting Tuesday.

"It's just sore," Buerhle said. "It feels like someone punched me in the shoulder. I saw it coming back at me and just tried to get out of the way."

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


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
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
